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
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ON THE COVER ...



LEGENDARY AND TRADITIONAL SLOVENIAN EASTER CUSTOM

(by Draga Gelt in "The Slovenians from the Earliest Times")



n Slovenia, all regions particularly prepare for Palm Sunday. The children's role is to take a special bundle of greenery to the church. In Prekmurje it is named PRE-SMEC, PUŠELJ or ŠOP, and is made of different types of wood. When brought

home, it is carried around, inside and outside, over the fields and parts are left on the roofs, above the main door and in store-rooms; some is stored for 'bad' times, such as illness or storms. In Stajerska the greenery is named VEJNIK, PEGELJ, ŽEGEN, BUTARA, PUŠELJC or PRESMEC and is made of hazelwood sticks, decorated with ribbon, flowers and sometimes oranges and apples. In Koroška it is known as the SNOP, PRESTO or CVET-NIK, and is sometimes very long, but has to be very thin. It is taken to the church by two or four men, is bound with hoops of a willow tree and decorated at the top with a small cross of willow. Sometimes the SNOP is too long to be brought into church, so it is left by the door and is carried in the procession. The children and men hurry home, because being home first with the SNOP means good harvest and fortune for the home.

Gorenjska knows the bundle of greenery as BE-GANICA, HEBANCA or PRAJTL. Sometimes BE-GANICA is made of seven to nine types of wood and decorated with apples. Sometimes a small branch of OLJKA (palm tree) or a cross is added at the top.

Dolenjska has the LESENI ŽEGEN or ŽEGEN, which is made of at least 25year-old hazelwood sticks covered with ivv. and the white band at the bottom has a bunch of red heather (sometimes Gorenjska also used heather, if it is in flower), at the top is **OLJKA** - palm branch.

Bela Krajina has a DRENEK or MOŠKI ŽEGEN, made mainly of cornel tree sticks, hazelwood, willow, palm branches and juniper-bush, with some walnuts and apples.

Slovenska Istra uses only palm branches, specially that with a fruit, named PALME or PASINE, decorated with curved roosters PETEH, made of the soft inside of fig tree wood, and a small religious picture or gilded palm branches.

Ljubljana and surrounding villages use BUTARICA which is made of hazelwood twigs, a juniper-bush at the top and decorated with circles of coloured chippings of wood.

In some areas small crosses are made of the Palm Sunday greenery after the blessing, and put on the fields, parts of the house or behind the picture of Saints.

The days before Easter Sunday are spent partly on field work and tidying around the house, but after Wednesday there is only baking and other preparations for celebration of Easter. Young boys prepare the tree fungus for the blessed fire, which is taken from house to house the Saturday morning before Easter Sunday. On Thursday evening, the church bells toll for the last time and the RAGLJA – a rattle, takes over. In the side chapels of almost every church was a "god's grave" which was decorated with flowers and bright lights.

Good Friday brought, apart from the restrictions on work and food, the predictions: if it rained, it meant a bad year for harvest.

Easter Sunday started with early Mass and a procession with many banners, happy singing and praying, then the VELIKONOČNI ŽEGEN - specially selected and prepared foods - were eaten. In most regions KOLAČ or POTICA, meat, mainly ham, Easter eggs, named PISANICE and horseradish (root) are included in the ŽEGEN, each type of food having its own meaning. Potica - walnut roll (or sometimes bread), represents the crown Jesus was given, the meat, His body, the root of horseradish the nails with which He was nailed to the cross and Easter eggs, the resurrection. The foods are taken into the church on Easter Saturday for the blessing, or to the 'Znamenje' - small chapels on crossroads, which priests visited. The foods are placed in special baskets and carried on the head, covered with a white lace cloth decorated, especially in Gorenjska, with flowers.

Easter was a family celebration, so on Easter Monday people visited neighbors and relatives after attending Mass. Many games were played such as the game called PIRHE SEKAT (chopping of Easter eggs), (a type of bowling with Easter eggs) and TURČANJE (hitting the eggs while they roll on grass). In the Kropa district a large picnic was held at which games were played all the afternoon, and in Bela Krajina, the dance such as MOST (bridge), KURJI BOJ (rooster's fight) and TURN (the tower) were popular.

My sister, Anka, my boyfriend, Frank and I have been doing quite a bit of skiing at Brandywine. I think we're ready for the Austrian Alps!!





If your Easter ham with bone-in (best flavor) weighs 7 to 8 pounds bake 18 to 25 minutes per pound, uncovered at 325° without adding water, using a rack in a shallow roasting pan (a boneless 5 to 6-pound ham also takes 18 to 25 minutes per pound). The inside temperature of both hams should reach 135°. A meat thermometer is advised. Let stand 10 minutes, covered, for easier carving. OR, follow directions on your ham wrapper.

Leftover ham is used in HAM POLYNESIAN STYLE recipe by Mary Ann Samuelson of Br. 89, Oglesby, IL and HAM ROLL-UP from THE AMERICAN HEART ASSOCI-ATION COOKBOOK. The PASTA SALAD is highly recommended in My Golden Care Update newsletter. AP-RICOT-ANGEL FOOD CAKE is a delicious dessert from Ann Dragovan of Br. 20, Joliet, IL.

HAM POLYNESIAN STYLE

- 3 cups diced cooked ham
- 2 tablespoons butter, melted
- 1 can (8 ounces) pineapple
- tidbits with juice
- 1/, cup raisins

- medium green pepper, cut in strips

- tablespoon cornstarch 1 1/2

In large fry pan, heat ham in butter. Add the pineapple with juice, raisins and green pepper strips. Cover and simmer 15 minutes. Mix the brown sugar, cornstarch, chicken bouillon, vinegar and soy sauce. Add to simmered ham mixture and cook until boiling, stirring constantly. Serve over hot rice. (Cooked fresh carrots can also be used). Yield 6 servings.

HAM ROLL-UP

- 8 thin slices baked ham 8 slices low-fat cheese (mozzarella or low-fat Cheddar)
- 16 cooked fresh asparagus spears or canned or frozen, if frozen, thaw first

Roll each slice of ham around 2 asparagus spears and pin with toothpicks. Place 1 slike of cheese on top of each roll; place under broiler until cheese melts. Serve immediately. 1 roll 200 calories.

Parade Magazine: "Select asparagus with tips that are firm and tightly closed. Fat spears are just as tender as thin spears. Wash asparagus to remove any sand. In a large frying pan or roaster, heat 1-inch lightly salted water to boiling; add asparagus and boil slowly, uncovered, for about 5 minutes. Drain. Serve hot with melted butter or hollandaise sauce, or cold with French dressing.

FIRST LADY OF SWU REMEMBERED

In response to my request for members to submit memories and experiences relating to the founder of the SWU, Marie Prisland, I received the following incident as written by Matilda Ausich, Charter member and Recording Secretary of Branch 103, Washington-Virginia-Maryland. A very interesting aspect of Tillie's experience is that she received Marie Prisland's autograph in her book, FROM SLOVENIA TO AMERICA.

"In reflecting on our Slovenian heritage, one cannot do so without realizing the unity of the Slovenian women immigrants and their children which became a reality with the formation of the Slovenian Women's Union by the founder, Marie Prisland--this was indeed a dream come true.

Many events were enjoyed by the various branches, including the visits to Washington, D.C. for the National Convention, and the dedication of the Slovenian Chapel at the Shrine of the Immaculate Conception. We owe a big thank you to Irene Odorizzi, the founder and first President of Branch 103 and now the National Heritage Director, for her tireless efforts in uniting the women in this area.

You may recall the late arrival of members coming to Washington for the Chapel dedication. Branch 103 provided refreshments for the weary travelers at St. Thomas Church Hall in Washington, D.C. under the direction of Irene. It was at this time I purchased a copy of Mrs. Prisland's book, "FROM SLOVENIA TO AMERICA." It was indeed a privilege when Irene introduced me to Mrs. Prisland, who was seated at a table busy with other matters, yet graciously took time out to autograph my book. Her own inscription follows:

> To: 12 August 1911 How. Mathilda Cassick with best wiskes her health and happimen. Mario Presiland Topomin powetitue slovenske kapelice, 15, augusto 1971. Washington, D.C.

What a nice remembrance from a great lady, and the founder of our organization! Thank you, Marie Prisland."

Thank you, Tillie, for sharing this experience with us. We hope that other members will take the cue and write or call me about the memories they have of the SWU's First Lady. Welcome to the Washington, D.C. area, Patty Satch, member of Branch #1 Sheboygan, and most importantly, the daughter of Mary Turvey, granddaughter of Margaret Fischer, and the great granddaughter of Marie Prisland. That's quite an impressive SWU ancestry.

REQUEST TO KENNEDY CENTER FROM SLOVENIAN AMBASSADOR TO U.S.

Can you recall your visit to the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C.? If so, you undoubtedly saw the colorful national flags displayed overhead in the Hall of Nations. The following article was printed in the March 1st issue of the Washington Post newspaper.

Unfurling a Miscue at the Kennedy Center

• When Ernest Petric, Slovenian ambassador to the United States, visited the Kennedy Center recently, he was surprised to see the flag of the former Yugoslavia still hanging in the Hall of Nations.

"That flag is absolutely nobody's flag anymore," he said yesterday. "Imagine if my prime minister or foreign minister would want to go see a beautiful performance... then he would see the flag and say, 'Haven't you done anything to remove it?'-

So we tracked down those responsible for the center's flags. "I'm really not quite sure whether it is up there or not," admitted Susan Creger of the National Park Service. "The State Department contacts us and then we take it down... It's probably on my list... It will be removed."

As for Petric, he'll celebrate, he says, if "one day we see the flag of Slovenia up there."

Congratulations to Slovene Ambassador, Ernest Petric for notifying the Kennedy Center of the omission of the Slovene flag to the Hall of Nations.

The next time you visit Washington, D.C. visit the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts and when you walk through the Hall of Nations, look for the Slovene flag. We hope that very soon, it will be displayed with those of the other nations of the world.

MAGAZINE ARTICLE



Začetki Katoliške Cerkve v Ameriki

FRANC JAKLIČ

BARAGOVO PRVO POTOVANJEV V EVROPO (29. septembra 1836 do 8. oktobra 1837)

Baraga je prišel v domovino samo zaradi svojega misijona; zato se je v domovini ustavil še manj ko dva tedna. Niti ljubljena sestra Amalija ga ni mogla za dalj časa privezati nase in svojo družino; samo nekaj dni je ostal v trebanjskem gradu, kjer je takrat bivala.

Da je Baraga že takrat slovel po domovini, nam priča tudi tole: Nekaj ljubljanskih duhovnikov je hotelo izdati knjižico "Pripomoček, sveti rožni venec Bogu in Mariji dopadljivo moliti". Prosili so Barago, da naj pred odhodom v Ameriko napiše uvod. Res ga je 14. aprila 1837 napisal in vanj izlil svoje globoko prepričanje o vzvišenosti, potrebnosti in uspehih molitve, zlasti rožnega venca. Na koncu pravi: "Sedaj grem zopet nazaj v Ameriko in bom skušal z božjo pomočjo še kaj nevernikov k naši sveti veri spreobrniti in na pot zveličanja pripeljati. Ali prosim vas, pomagajte mi z gorečo molitvijo. Misijonarji ne bodo nikoli nič opravili pri nevernikih, če jih verni kristjani ne bodo podpirali z molitvijo."

"Jožefove ustanove", ki si jo je bil zamislil, da bi v Ljubljani nabirala letne prispevke za njegov misijon, pa ni ustanovil.

Ob odhodu se je poslovil od rojakov s temle pismom: "S čustvi najprisrčnejše zahvale za lep sprejem, s katerim so me moji spoštovani rojaki počastili, zapuščam domovino, svojo drago, nepozabno domovino. Bridkost ločitve mi zelo omiljuje zavest, da se velika večina mojih spoštovanih rojakov toplo zanima za vse, kar je plemenitega in svetega. Ta zavest mi bo ostala globoko zapisana v srce in domovina mi bo tem ljubša, čim več dolžnosti imam, da jo spoštujem. – Čeprav me poklic, s katerim me je Gospod v svojem usmiljenju oblagodaril, pelje na drugo zemeljsko poloblo, vendar ne bo minul prav noben dan mojega življenja, da se ne bi v duhu mudil med svojimi ljubljenimi rojaki in se veselil krščanskega duha, o katerem sem med obiskom dobil tako lepe vtise. Dal Bog, da se v večnem blaženstvu vsi snidemo v tisti pravi domovini, kjer ne bo več ločitve."

Moj zvesti služabnik Andrej mi je bil do zdaj na vsem potovanju, po suhem in po morju, zelo vdan in koristen. Ko bi ga ne bil imel na morju s seboj, bi bila težave še hujše občutila. V njem imam velik zaklad, za katerega se pogosto zahvaljujem božji previdnosti. Zmerom je dobre volje in za vse voljan in pripravljen. Je tudi zelo pobožen in vesten in povrh tega še cel vseznalec, ki mo bo v veliko korist, posebno ob Gorenjem jezeru, kjer ni delavcev, ki bi znali cerkev urediti.

Dodatno Ti moram še tole sporočiti da sem na ladji tri nedelje nemško pridigal, – kolikorkrat so mi pač okolnosti to dovolile. V 2. razredu, kjer smo bili mi, je bilo okoli 230 potnikov. Skoro polovica od njih je bilo katoličanov, drugi so bili protestantje in judje. Pa tudi ti so z velikim zanimanjem poslušali pridige in so vsako nedeljo vpraševali, če bo gospod imel službo božjo.

Proti koncu naše dolge morske vožnje sem zložil pesem za pri izkrcanju, po nekem znanem nemškem napevu, ki smo jo, brž ko smo zagledali suho zemljo, peli s tako ginjenostjo, da so nam solze zalivale oči. Dal sem jim jo en dan preden smo zagledali zemljo. In vse, kar je le znalo pisati, si je pesem prepisalo; ljudje so komaj mogli dobiti dovolj papirja. Izšla je namreč prav ob času, ko je morala vsakoga zanimati, čeprav ni sama na sebi prav nič-zanimiva."

V New Yorku je moral z Antonijo in Češirkom ostati štiri tedne. Tovorna ladja, na katero so bili naložili njegove zaboje s cerkvenimi potrebščinami in indijanskimi knjigami, je namreč zadela na skalo in bi se bila kmalu potopila; morala je nazaj v Havre, da so jo popravili. V New Yorku je Baraga pridno pomagal župniku nemške cerkve. Antonija je bila največ pri družini avstrijskega konzula. Njene družbe so si tako želeli, da so jo s kočijo hodili iskat pred njeno stanovanje. Iz njenih pisem se vidi, kako dobro ji je to delo. Vsa Antonijina pisma do dolga, da ji večkrat zmanjkuje prostora. Iz njih odseva duhovitost in precejšnja razgledanost. Mnogo je dala na zunanjosti. Bila je vedra in živahna do razigranosti, vse drugačna kakor brat ali kakor Amalija. Zanimajo jo naravne lepote; včasih tudi pomodruje. Njen slog je šaljivo nagajiv in večkrat dolgovezen, njena nemščina ne brez napak. Težko je v njej zaslediti še kaj pristno slovenskega.

New York je s svojo novostjo, bogastvom, resnobo in vljudnostjo napravil nanjo velik vtis. Seznanila se je tudi z Ramasayem Crooksom (Kruksom), predsednikom Ameriške družbe za nakupovanje kož, ki je imel tudi veliko uvozno in izvozno podjetje in je bil lastnik več ladij. Baraga ga 12. oktobra 1842 v pismu do nadškofa Mildeja imenuje svojega "posebnega prijatelja indobrotnika." Crooks ga je vsako leto obiskal, ko se je zaradi poslovanja družbe in plovbe ladij vozil po Gorenjem jezeru. Baragi in drugim slovenskim misijonarjem je oskrboval razne pošiljatve. Pozneje se je videlo, da je bolj poslovni človek in trgovec kakor pa Baragov prijatelj. Njegova hči se je poročila s sinom protestantovskega pástorja.

Iz New Yorka so na počasni tovorni ladji odpluli po reki Hudson proti severu. V Búffalu je dal Baraga natisniti zvešček z glavnimi pravili očipvejske slovnice in z navodili za učitelja, kako naj indijanske otroke nauči lastnih imen, ki se omenjajo v Jezusovem življenju. Knjižico je dal leta 1845 ponatisniti. Na Erijskem kanalu se je čudil živahnemu prometu in mestecem, ki so v tistih mesecih, kar se je on tu vozil, zrastla na obali.

Dne 8. septembra je Antonija obširno popisala Amaliji svoje vtise s potovanja. Njeno versko naziranje nekoliko spoznamo iz tehle stavkov: "Zelo tuje mi je v Ameriki versko življenje. Saj bivam prvikrat v deželi, kjer katoliška vera ne prevladuje, in večkrat sem si mislila, kako se kakšen protestant ali jud počuti pri nas. Naše (to je katoliške) cerkve so povsod najmanjše in najubožnejše, templji raznih krivih ver se pa košatijo v svojem blišču. Američani si seveda vso stvar olajšajo in se kratko malo ne priznavajo k nobeni veri; vendar so prav dobri, skromni, zares vljudni ljudje in imajo gotovo najblažja čustva. V srcu so večkrat boljši kristjani kakor tisti, ki se imajo za kristjane."

VELIČASTNA VELIKA NOČ

Pred stoletji so naši predniki najprej opravili strogo zapovedan post. Nato so živo občutili s srcem in dušo prelep velikonočni praznik. Ta je po lepoti in veseljem vsa praznovanja tekom leta: prekosil.

Pomlad, že topla in zelena, je veliko pripomogla k najlepšemu dnevu leta. Travniki so bili že očiščeni, na polje je redkokdo še stopil. Ljudje so se oprijeli dela doma. Vse, kar je navlekla zima v hišo in zunaj nje, je moralo biti pospravljeno. Gospodar je pregledal dvorišče, skednje in hleve.

Gospodinje so imele dela na pretek: pekle so potice in kolač, kuhale klobase in prekajeno gnjat; če ni bilo hčera, so morale barvati pirhe. Otroci so se vrteli okrog mater in matere so jih morale poditi izpod nog.

Velika sobota je bila že vsa praznična. Delo je že počivalo-vsaj za moške. Če je bil v navadi blagoslov jedil popoldne, je gospodinja sama napolnila pisan jerbas, ki je smel biti samo za velikonočno rabo. Z nekako slovesnostjo je polagala jedila v jerbas in otrokom pojasnovala, kaj pomeni kolač, kaj hren, kaj gnjat, kaj rdeči pirhi. K materi je nato pristopila odrasla hči, jerbas pogrnila z velikonočnim prtom, katerega je sama okrasila z vezenjem in obrobila s čipkami. Hitela je z jerbasom na glavi v farno cerkev k blagoslovu; če je katera izmed deklet želela poročiti tisto leto, je morala prva poleteti iz cerkve.

Na veliko soboto so bile proti večeru ponekod tudi velikonočne procesije. Zvonovi so se oglasili. Otroci so oblekli nove obleke. Skupine mladih in starih so se razvrstile v procesijo, katero so vodili fantje z velikimi banderi. O, kakšna slovesnost: zvonarji so pritrkovali, pevci so peli, ministranti so zvončkljali, starejši pa molili. Župnik je nosil monštranco in blagoslavljal.

Na nedeljo, na praznik Kristusovega stajenja, so morali biti ljudje samo doma ali v cerkvi. Gostilne so bila prazne. Šele v pondeljek, ki je bil tudi praznik, je bil dan veselja, dan obiskovanja sosedov, dan igranja in nabiranja pirhov. Dekleta so že vedele, kateremu fantu bodo pirhe podarile.

DECLENSION (sklanjatev)

In our language declension denotes the relationship of individual words in the sentence, which in English with only some exceptions (like the Saxon genitive) is expressed by the use of prepositions. These different forms of nouns are called "cases" (skloni). There are six cases: Nominative, Genitive, Dative, Accusative, Locative, Instrumental (imenovalnik, rodilnik, dajalnik, tožilnik, mestnik, orodnik).

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

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

Holy Saturdays of Yesterday


When I was a child, Easter was, as it is now, a special time to spend with family.


