

Baraga in the arts



In 1993, a major renovation of St. Vitus Church in Cleveland, Ohio was undertaken. Sloveparishioners find greater inspiration in in the art work that brings them closer to their religious traditions. The portrait of Bishop Frederic Baraga shown here graces one wall of the beautifully decorated church.

At the Basilica of the Immaculate Conception Washington, D.C., the Slovenian Chapel is, in itself, a work of art. Two of the marble walls flanking the altar dedicated to Slovenian Patroness. Marija Pomagaj are adorned with relief sculptures by Slovenian master-artist, France Gorse, and one of them shows missionary Bishop Baraga baptizing the Indians.

IMPROVING OUR BRANCH "BUSINESS" IS VITAL

In preparation for the annual Board of Director's meeting, I have been reviewing the minutes of our February, 1996 gathering. This annual event reminds me of our March "Lenten" renewal; where we have an opportunity to take stock (of our own lives and SWU goals), and are able to recognize areas that need improvement and try to implement those improvements. I am happy to report that much has been accomplished in the past year; many policies continue to be reviewed and revised (for the good of our Union) and a long list of "hope-to's" remains to be completed before this Board's remaining two years are done. Each elected and appointed Board Member will be reporting on the year's progress and (or) failures. They will then solicit advice and suggestions from each other about ways to improve and upgrade each department and solve some of the most frequently reported Branch problems. We recognize that changes are never easy, and progress is impossible without the co-operation of all our members.

ne of my concerns is the ongoing practice of extra assessments for Branch members on the local level. Several 1995 Convention delegates complained about the extra assessment that was in effect on the National level for a number of years. At the Convention, this was discontinued and instead dues were raised; Branches were asked to sponsor individual fund raisers to maintain their treasuries. We find that most do follow this directive; others continue to assess their membership in violation of the Convention Directives. I hope that in the near future we will consider having the National Treasurer assume the task of checking with each Branch Treasurer (by a specific form letter) to ascertain the format and financial condition of the individual branches, review their annual report (audit) on the disbursement of funds and try to implement a more "universal" or centralized method of branch bookkeeping. I feel obliged to impress on the branch officers the importance of using funds raised by each separate branch activity for the intended benefit of their Slovenska Ženska Zveza. Some branches use their SWU monies to sponsor "outside" activities such as civic donations, church donations or separate scholarship awards, and neglect the main responsibility of SWU membership; namely our own Heritage and Cultural Activities, our Scholarship Foundation and our ZARJA magazine. Although it is commendable to be involved in local charities etc., our main purpose as SWU members should be to support the programs and interests of SWU as practiced over the years; all intended to promote our great organization's old and new young members and to keep our Slovenian Heritage alive. Although the Branches are financially independent of each other they should be organized on a similar basis. As it is now, some branch treasuries have no separate SWU checking accounts; funds are mixed with private accounts; some officers control funds with no report to the membership and no democratic vote allowed on the spending of these funds. Certain branches have large savings accounts and even Certificates of Deposit. These branches are not in compliance with the bylaws (Article XIV 14:05 through 14:14)... concerning annual audits. This is the combined responsibility of the local Branch president, the secretary, the treasurer and the auditors. They are responsible for the fiscal management of the branch. In some cases, an officer has died leaving no arrangement for the successor to "take over the books." Some "outgoing" presidents have refused to relinquish the books to their newly elected successors.

ust as we were all trying to use the Lenten Season to purge our bad habits, take stock of our spiritual progress and "start with a fresh slate after the EASTER PROMISE, I hope 1997 will be the year when all Branches will cooperate fully with the National Board's Directives, and faithfully follow the intent of the bylaws for the continued progress of our Slovenska Ženska Zveza.

NATIONAL SECRETARY -- KEEPING UP-TO-DATE

They say that March comes in like a lion and goes out like a lamb. It has been the complete reverse here at our desks. There was somewhat of a calm in February as we started the billing, then came the onslaught of reports that are due, taxes to be paid, preparation for the Annual Board Meeting, to say nothing of the life that does exist beyond SWU. But, we have forged ahead, and hopefully, with a little luck, billing will be completed before April's end.

Thank you to the many who have responded so quickly with payments. Thank you also for reading the February issue of ZARJA, and following the directions given. We still receive cash in the mail, and I hope this will cease. If you don't have your own checking account, perhaps a friend or a family member would issue a check for you.

Wish we could send roses to several people, like the one branch president who called and expressed her gratitude and appreciation for all that is being done, and who recognized the fact that there are other things to be done besides SWU work. And to the branch secretary who called and offered an apology for her past remarks; it was most appreciated, and received. To the member who anonymously sent in \$100 for ZARJA, just to show her appreciation for all that SWU has done for her, and in particularly for a Thank You to Irene Odorizzi and Corinne Leskovar. Such tributes are well deserved. I'd even send a rose to those members who start their phone conversations in such belligerent ways, threatening to quit, criticizing the system, complaining about the mistakes, and then end their call by saying "it was nice talking to you". To all the secretaries who try so very hard to iron out problems within their branches, to keep me updated on things, thanks for making the job so much easier.

One little reminder, we find that when we receive payments, they are not the correct amounts. Some members change the amount to agree with what they have paid in past years. The following annual assessment schedule is to be followed: Class A members under 75 years of age, \$12.00. A members over 75 years of age, \$8.00. Class B members under age 75, \$15.00, B members over age 75, \$10.00. Social members are \$15.00 and Junior Members are \$4.00.

And, PLEASE, if you want to send a donation in for ZARJA, Heritage, Scholarship or to SWU itself, these amounts must be made in separate checks. They cannot be included with your dues payments. We will appreciate your attention to that fact.

Have a very happy spring. We hope to have many good things to tell you about after our Board Meeting. It's like a spring cleaning of old matters that have to be taken care of, ditched, tossed out, to give us renewed hope for our future.

The Honorable Ambassador Ernest Petric will return to Slovenia this summer after five years at the Embassy of the Republic in Slovenia in Washington, D.C.


Ambassador Petric claims the distinction and the honor of being the first ambassador to the United States from Slovenia in 1991 which at that time had just achieved independence from Yugoslavia. He established the first embassy in an office building in Washington, D.C. at 1300 19th St. N.W. A few years later the building at 1525 New Hampshire Ave. N.W. was purchased and the embassy began to entertain dignitaries and members of the Slovenian organizations and the local Slovenian community for significant events.

Thinking back five years ago, reminds me of the Slovenian adage, "Vsak začetek je težak," (All beginnings are difficult) and I'm sure the ambassador and his staff could relate to this statement in the initial days of his ambassadorial duties in the U.S.A.

Ambassador Petric is to be complimented on the manner in which he established the embassy and the manner in which he conducted Slovenian affairs. In his gracious and personable way he mingled with the Slovenian community in the U.S. traveling throughout the States, simultaneously verifying the identity of the American-Slovene as a significant ethnic group in the U.S.

ANCESTORS' EPISODES ON TV

PBS Television is airing a genealogical series by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints. This religious group, known as the "Mormons", has been a forerunner in preserving ancestral records and in assisting the public in researching family history. They have a large complex in Salt Lake City for research as well as centers throughout the U.S. where information from Salt Lake City may be attained.

The 10 episodes consist of:

- "Getting Started." Explores the question, "Who am I?" with tips on how to start a search for roots, beginning with a pedigree chart.
- "Looking at Home." Viewers learn how to start at home to find clues to their ancestors and pieces of the past.
- "Gathering Family Stories." Mining the memories of older family members, with tips on how to conduct and record interviews.
- "The Paper Trail." Viewers see how ancestors "come alive" through the records they left behind.
- "Libraries and Archives." Endeavors to take the fear and mystery out of library and archive research.
- "Census and military records." Explores two of the most commonly used records and how rich biographical information can be gleaned from them.
- "African American Research." Explores the challenges inherent in such research.
- "Your Medical Heritage." Deals with the life-saving potential of family medical pedigrees.
- "High Tech Help." How technology is revolutionizing the family history process.
- "Leaving a Legacy." Explores the question, "One hundred years from now, will anyone know who you were?"

NEWS FROM A ZARJA READER

Hearing complimentary news about the SWU and ZARJA is always a joy and I'd like to share a few brief remarks from a letter received from Sophia Stalzer Wyant of the Gottscheer Research & Genealogy Association in Palisade, MN.

Slovenian Food

A recent gift was a well researched and detailed up-to-date travel book (excellent arm-chair reading) titled Slovenia by Steve Fallon, Lonely Planet Publications, Paraphrasing the food section [with permission from the publisher] the author says, "Remember that Slovenia is a tiny place so Slovenian food is very influenced by its neighbors' cuisines. Hungary contributed goulash (golaz) paprikás (paprikas) and filled thin pancakes (palacinke). From Austria, it's sausage (klobase), Wiener schnitzel (Dunajski zrezek is "Vienna cutlet") and strudel (strudel or zavitek). Italy gave gnocchi (njoki), risotto (rizota), and raviolilike (zlinkrofi). Balkan foods are tiny grilled ground meat rolls (cevapcici) and shish kebab (raznjici).

"Distinctively Slovenian are groats (zganci), hulled, very coarsely ground grains - buckwheat, oats, barley, wheat or corn. [Marion's note: Grits used in the Southern U.S.A. are smaller than groats.] Slovenian breads are generally excellent. Most Slovenian meals start with soup (juha) often with noodles (rezanci). The main course includes meat, game (or fish, mostly near the coast). An excellent prepared meat is prsut, air-dried, thinly sliced ham that is nothing like Italian prosciutto from where it gets its name. Struklji are poached, rolled dumplings made with cheese often with chives or tarragon added. A boon for vegetarians is that Slovenes like fresh salad (solata) - a most un-Slavic partiality. Popular krofi are jam-filled raised doughnuts which are very tasty. And finally, for dessert, Potica, a kind of nut roll, which is almost a national institution."

Slovenians think it is, too, Mr. Fallon! And thanks for the concise description of Slovene history, people, language, etc. - i.e., "The little mark on top of the c, s, and z is called a carrot in English and a **stresica**, "little roof in Slovene." Also, thanks to Julie Kaluza and Corinne who helped me translate Slovenian words.

Marion Juricic Bowers 940 Galleron Road St. Helena, CA 94574 (707) 963-7795 Katherine Popich of Healdsburg, CA, a member of Branch #30 (at large) wrote and said, "When I receive Zarja, I always find something my mother made for us. The Ajmpren/cucumber sauce brought back many memories". Her recipe for Ajmoht follows.

AJMOHT (VEAL SOUP)

2 large veal shanks (to net 2# boned) 1 c. celery, diced

3 quarts cold water 2 T. oil 2 t. salt 2 T. flour

Pepper to taste 1 medium onion, diced

2 large potatoes, peeled, cut into 1" dice Cider vinegar to taste 2 bay leaves

Boil veal, water, salt and pepper, covered, for 1 hour. Strain the soup, remove and discard bones. Cut the veal into 1" pieces. Put the soup and meat back into the pot, add potatoes and bay leaves. Simmer while making ajmpren (roux): heat oil, add flour, stir until slightly browned. Add the onion and 3 T. of the soup, cook until the onion is soft. Add the celery and amjpren and cook 15 minutes. Pass vinegar for each person to add. Serve with bread and butter, salad, a glass of wine, milk or fruit juice - and a prayer.

Serves 4

Keith and I attended a wedding where the bride's mother, Mrs. Ophelia Rios, prepared the following recipe (multiplied!) to hundreds of guests. She was kind to share her recipe with me.

MRS. RIOS' MEXICAN WEDDING PORK

6# pork butt, boned and cut into 4 pieces 1 T. salt
1 12 oz. can frozen orange juice concentrate 3 C. milk
1 bulb (10 or 12 cloves) garlic, peeled Garnishes below

1 or 2 hot chili peppers or more to taste

Simmer all on very low heat in a deep covered pot for 4 or 5 hours. Cool 20 minutes, (may be made a day ahead and refrigerated - the fat will solidify and be easy to remove). Skim off fat, discard bone, remove meat and shred meat with 2 forks. Reheat the meat in a very large casserole dish or large, deep ovenproof platter, Cover with some of the sauce. Heat and serve the rest of the sauce separately. Garnish dish with red, yellow and green bell pepper strips and sliced sweet onion. Optional: Serve with corn or flour tortillas, refried beans, sliced tomatoes, grated jack cheese, guacamole, shredded head lettuce and lemonade, beer or soda pop. And thank God for such delicious food! OLE! Serves 10 - 12

Thirty-five years ago, a friend, Irene Bodrov, invited me to her parents' home for a Russian Easter celebration. She gave me this recipe. Happy Russian Orthodox Easter this year on April 27.

EASY PASKHA

1/4 # butter, softened 1/2 c. chopped almond

3 T. sugar 1/2 c. glacé (candied) mixed fruit

1/4 t. salt 1/2 c. golden raisins

2# cream cheese, softened Garnishes below

1 T. brandy or sweet liqueur

Cream butter, sugar and salt. Add cream cheese and brandy. Cream again. Mix in nuts and fruit. With a stiff spatula, form a truncated (top 1/4 cut off) pyramid. Place 4 small pieces of wax paper on 4 sides of a serving plate. Place Paskha on dish and "neaten it up". Remove paper. Garnish with almonds, candied cherries, Easter eggs and edible flowers (pansies, dandelion flowers, rose petals, etc.). Paskha can be eaten as dessert or as a spread on coffee cake, pound cake or potica,

MEMORIAL TO ROSE KOZAR

Rose Kozar was one of our oldest branch #23 members. She became a member in 1929. She was what I would call one of those Slovenian pioneers, coming to the United States when she was only 15 years old -- still a young girl.

Her mother was killed in a bombing during the first World War. After that, her dad came to the U.S. and left Rose with his sister, then came back to get her in 1920.

Her dad had settled in Eveleth, MN where she lived with him, but she had to go out and work. Her first job was babysitting and helping out a family in Virginia. She used to walk every day to and from, rain or snow! When she was a little older she got a job in Eveleth at a boarding house where she cooked and cleaned.

While living in Eveleth, she met Anton Kozar and it wasn't long after that her dad and his parents thought they should get married. They were married in 1923.

They then moved to Milwaukee, WI and lived there a few years before deciding to come back to Eveleth. In 1927, they moved to Ely, where they lived the rest of their lives. Her husband died in 1966.

They had a family of five girls and one boy. Rose was kept very busy raising her children and she also went out to work as the children got older. She worked as a cook at one of the older establishments (Charlie's Hamburger

Shop), then as a housekeeper at the Forest Hotel, and later, a job at the Ely Bloomenson Hospital in the housekeeping department until her retirement in 1970.

One of her daughters, "Dolly", and I were classmates and I'll always remember how nice her mother was to "us kids" whenever we stopped by on our way to school. Even up until she passed on, all her friends, relatives and neighbors say you couldn't find another person who was so kind, patient, understanding and neat, with a special array of quietness, sereneness, and complete contentment -- never complaining and always with a nice smile and happy greeting to pass on to all she met. "Yes,

she was such a wonderful person and had that 'inner beauty and peace' that only very special people have."

As I said, Rose was one of our oldest S.W.U. Branch 23 members and attended as many meetings as she could. She was one of those quiet, dependable workers who was not afraid of hard work, always "pitching in." In 1991, when we honored all of our mothers, Rose had her daughters as special guests and one of her wishes was that they become S.W.U. members, and so they did! Thank you, Rose, for your belief in the Slovenian Women's Union and the pride you took in your membership.

Rose Kozar, 91, of Ely, MN died on December 14, 1996 in the Ely Bloomenson Hospital and her funeral mass was at St. Anthony's Catholic Church in Ely. She was born December 8, 1905 in Opatije selo, Slovenia to Joseph and Catherine Peritz. She was a member of St. Anthony's Church, V.F.W. Auxiliary, the S.W.U. and the Women's Life Insurance Society.

She is survived by five daughters: Rose (Frank) Mavetz, of Galesburg, IL, Leone (Louis) Debernardi and Jeanette Steinert of Minneapolis, Delores "Dolly" Maki of Ely, Marie "Bonnie" Klun of St. Paul, and a son, Kenneth Kozar of Lyons, Colo.; 12 grandchildren, 23 great grandchildren, and 4 great great grandchildren!

Začetki Katoliške Cerkve v Ameriki
FRANC JAKLIČ

IX. BARAGA REDNI ŠKOF SAULTSKI LETO 1860

 oktobra 1860 je pisal Baraga sestri Antoniji v Rim zadnje pismo, ki se nam je ohranilo. Pisal ji je v odgovor na njeno pismo z dne 9. septembra. Baragovo pismo je stvarno in precej hladno. Sporoča ji, da je zvedel od nečakinje Marije, da je Amalijo v Trebnjem zadela kap; možgani so ji deloma ohromeli, zato se svojega stanja ne zaveda dosti in le še životari. Njej pravi: "Veseli me, da se dobro počutiš." Torej je bila zdrava in ji je dekliški zavod dovolj dobro uspeval. O sebi piše; "Jaz sem vedno zdrav in močan, kakor v svojih mladih letih." Dela ima dosti, ker v Saultu opravlja tudi župnikove dolžnosti. Ako se zanima za njegovo delo, naj bere pisma, ki jih še zmerom pošilja Leopoldinini ustanovi. Pismo zaključuje: "Ostani še zanaprej zdrava in še zanaprej moli zame, kakor tudi jaz zmerom molim zate." Pripiše ji svoj naslov; torej sta si tako poredkoma pisala, da ni dobro vedela, kakšen naslov ima kot škof. Zadnje pismo mu je poslala po Crooksu, zdaj ji pa piše, da je Crooks že zdavnaj mrtev.

Poslej izgine iz Baragovih pisem vsaka sled za Antonijo. Na starost se je vrnila v Ljubljano. Nekateri so pisali, da kot popolnoma brezverska. To pa najbrž ne bo res, saj jo Baraga v zadnjem pismu prosi, naj še zanaprej zanj moli; torej mu je bila v pismu omenila, da moli zanj. Res da je imela zmerom nekoliko zmedene verske nazore; verna je pa bila vedno. V Ljubljano se je najbrž zato vrnila, ker je bila za vodstvo in poučevanje na vzgojnem zavodu prestara. Prihranki so ji v LJubljani hitro skopneli; bila je zapuščena, tudi od trebanjskih nečakov in nečakinj, in je živela v siromaštvu. V šentpeterskem predmestju št. 162 je imela najeto sobico. Tam je umrla 21. maja 1871 za otrpnenjem pljuč. Šentpeterski kaplan ji je mogel, kakor piše šentpeterska mrliška knjiga, podeliti samo poslednje olje. - Hiša nekdanjega šentpeterskega predmestja št. 162 je prav nizka hišica, ob kateri se zavije iz Metelkove ulice proti glavnemu kolodvoru. Hišica je še sedaj taka, kakor je bila ob Antonijini smrti. Vrata v 1. nadstropje, do katerih se pride po zunanjih stopnicah na levi strani, so ozka. Torej je res, kar so si bili Ljubljančani zapomnili: da so pogrebci morali krsto po vrveh spuščati skozi okno. Tam je torej umrla zadnja od treh Baragovih. Zadnja se je rodila, zadnja

je umrla. Dočakala je 67 let in je za tri leta preživela brata-škofa.

Na božično jutro leta 1860 je novomašnik Gerhard Terhorst v Saultu prvič zapel glorijo. Baraga ga je pridržal pri sebi, ker bi se drugače ne bil mogel ganiti iz Saulta. Za obe saultski šoli je najel učitelja, ki je pa bil, kakor se je kmalu videlo, malo sposoben.

Leta 1860 so Baragi postavili v Saultu novo enonadstropno hišico. Bila je lesena, tudi zunaj lično pobeljena. V njej je pa ostal samo tri leta.

LETO 1861

V začetku leta 1861 se je vnela "civilna vojska" med severnimi in južnimi zveznimi državami Severne Amerike. Severne so zahtevale, da tudi južne dajo svojim štirim milijonom zamorskih sužnjev svobodo, kakor so jim jo po zgledu Anglije one dale. Južne države pa niso hotele, češ da bi brez črnih sužnjev propadla njihova veleposestva, zlasti še velikanski nasadi bombaža. Ločile so se od severnih zveznih držav in ustanovile lastno državno zvezo. Izbruhnila je vojska, ki je divjala in morila štiri leta. Ozemlje, ki ga je škof Baraga duhovno oskrboval, vojske sprva ni dosti čutilo.

Na trebanjskem gradu je Amaliji v njeni zadnji bolezni stregla hči Jožica. Začasno je obolela in jo je nadomestovala njena poročena sestra Marija. Tej nečakinji Mariji je Baraga 12. januarja 1861 pisal pismo. Sporoča ji, da se ravno odpravlja v 50 milj (80 km) oddaljen kraj. "Malo me skrbi, ker je te dni silno mrzlo. Davi sem moral mleko, ki je od sinoči ostalo v naši majhni obednici, z žlico kopati iz lonca, ker je bilo zmrznilo; k sreči je bila kava prav gorka in je vse odtajala. Tudi kruh je zmrznil. Voda v umivalniku je bila sam led." Potem naslovi nekaj prisrčnih besed na njeno mater, svojo sestro Amalijo, ki se ji je stanje medtem nekoliko zboljšalo. Piše ji: "Ti si torej še zmerom slabotna. Pa kako srečna si, da si sredi svojih dragih. ki te ljubeče negujejo in so skrbno pozorni nate. Če bi bil jaz pred smrtjo tako dolgo bolan, kakšen revež bi bil! Tujec sem v tej daljni deželi in vsi moji dragi ste daleč od tu. Zmerom prosim Boga, da me po kratki bolezni pokliče s tega sveta; vendar prepuščam vse njegovi najsvetejši volji." Takrat pač ni slutil, kako dolgotrajno in hudo bolezen mu je Bog za nazadnje pripravil. V pismu izraža svoje veselje nad bogoslovcem Andolškom, ki se je že v enem mesecu dobro naučil angleškega jezika. Pred božičem je angleško tako gladko pridigal, "da se mi je - pravi Baraga – zdelo, kakor da pridiga v našem kranjskem jeziku." Torej so ne samo on, ampak vsi Gresslovi v Trebnjem imeli slovenščino za "svoj" jezik. Naposled opominja Amalijo, da naj potrpežljivo, v duhu pokore in vdana v božjo voljo prenaša bolezen.

CULTURAL GARDENS IN CLEVELAND UNDERGOING RESTORATION

The city of Cleveland, Ohio is undertaking the restoration of the Cultural Gardens that were erected in 1935 in honor of the many ethnic communities and their historic leaders. The "Gardens" have been almost totally destroyed through years of neglect, vandalism and misuse.

The new surge of interest in restoring this Cleveland landmark is quite interesting to the newer ethnic communities who are trying now to update and re-focus on who will be memorialized in the new garden-park.

Because of Bishop Baraga's prominence in the original Cultural Gardens, there will be a new Baraga monument, according to the current news releases.

Over sixty years ago, at the dedication of the original Baraga sculpture in the Slovenian portion of the cultural gardens there were appropriate speeches, parades, etc. and thousands of people in attendance. Comments made in the publication, "ZARJA - The Dawn" describe some of the participants in the event, namely, the then Archbishop of Ljubljana, Dr. Gregory Rozman, who came from Slovenia to preside at the dedication. Archbishop Rozman also was devoted to the missions and Baraga, as the foremost proponent of the missionary spirit of the time in Slovenia. The report continues, "The unveiling of the sculpture of Baraga was witnessed by thousands of spectators and many in Slovenian national costumes - never before had so many people gathered for one event of this kind in Cleveland. Among the crowd were 300 members of S.W.U. in their native dress, who laid a wreath of flowers at the base of the Baraga monument in honor of their respect for the great Slovenian-American missionary.

A special souvenir album was issued with commentary by prominent Clevelanders. Among them, Mr. Joseph Grdina expressed the feelings of the local committee who were in charge of the procurement of the sculpture of Baraga. He describes how this was done: "As soon as the money was beginning to come in, the work began. To make the fine bronze sculpture of Baraga, the Cleveland artist William McVey was contacted. It was to stand on a pedestal of black

granite that was specially ordered in Ljubljana, at the stoneworks of F. Toman who made the piece as an honor to both cities, Ljubljana and Cleveland. At this time we must express gratitude also to Rev. Kazimir Zakrajsek, the pastor of Sts. Ciril and Methodius church in Ljubljana who came to our aid in finding the best stonemason. Our enthusiasm for this project was building for some years, ever since it was mentioned in the book, 'America and Americans' by Rev. J.M. Trunk, and later, the KSKJ had the same proposal. That is why it is so appropriate that the Slovenian metropolis in America honors Baraga with this monument.

We will never need to defend the fact of Baraga's being worthy of the honor as the most outstanding Slovenian-native son in America. We are proud that we followed Baraga who brought our culture and civility to this country. Whenever the Poles wish to show their forefathers in this country, they present Pulaski and Kosciusko who were their heroes. And, we present Baraga, who did so much also for his own people, especially in his written works, such as 'Dušna Paša' which shows how much he loved his people.

"Baraga has already been honored by the community where he lived and worked where they have named streets, schools, parks and a town after him. So, why should we not do the same? Standing before this monument we need never fear answering questions from Americans about who he was — what did he do. Americans already know that Baraga was a part of their own history.

"And one more thing, there may come a time when the Slovenian language and identity in America may be lost. At this time there may be forces wishing to destroy our monuments – even this city may need to do this in the name of progress. I only say this may happen – not that it will happen! At that time, however, any American standing before this Baraga monument will know him and praise him for the life's energy and culture that he brought with him to this continent – and his contribution will be written in golden letters in the history of this country."

Albina Novak v ZARJI - leto 1935:

Cleveland je imel prvo čast pozdraviti v svoji sredini prevzvišenega nadškofa ljubljanskega Dr. Gregorija Rožmana – drugega Barago, ki prihaja v Ameriko kot misijonar. Misijonsko delovanje mu je bilo od nekdaj najljubše in posebno pri srcu so mu mladinski misijoni. Ker prihaja v Ameriko kot misijonar mu kličemo: dobrodošli med nami naš misijonar Baraga Rožman!

Evharistični kongres v Ljubljani je evharističnega škofa Dr. Rožmana postavil na svetovni sloves. In kot evharističen vladika je prišel med nas, na proslavo škofa Baraga, ter na narodni evharistični kongres Zedinjenih držav, kjer je bil navzoč kot slovenski zastopnik ljubljanske škofije in kot misijonar.

Sijajno je uspela slavnost odkritja spomenika škofu Baragi, ki se je vršila v Clevelandu v nedeljo 22. septembra. Nepričakovano ogromne množice ludstva so se zbrale ob cesti ter z vsem navdušenjem gledale impozantno parado pri kateri je prisostvovalo na tisoče vnetih katoliških Jugoslovanov. Še nikdar v zgodovini Ameriških Slovencev ni bilo toliko ljudstva zbranega skupaj ob eni priliki. Ta dan nam bo ostal v trajnem spominu, kot dan, naše najpomembnejše zgodovinske slavnosti v Ameriki.

Prišlo je veliko število odličnih gostov iz vseh različnih krajev. Naša Slovenska Ženska Zveza se je posebno odlikovala na ta dan. Zastopala nas je naša glavna predsednica, ki je v imenu S.Ž.Z. položila krasen venec na spomenik škofa Baraga. Tri sto naših članic se je pa udeležilo parade v lepih narodnih nošah.
