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Potek konvencije rudarjev v Springfieldu

Rebelni rudarji iztrgali unijo Lewisu.—Howat predsednik zborovanja.—Opozicija proti Farringtonu in poročila o teroriziranju članstva.—Pozdravne brzjavke slovenskih rudarjev.—Zastopnica angleškega delavstva nagovorila delegata

Springfield, Ill. — (Izvirno Prosveti.) — V pondeljek zjutraj ob devetih je bila otvorjena v tem mestu konvencija rudarjev, ki so se upri Lewisovemu režimu in mu odrekli pokorčino. Znamenja so, da bo ta konvencija zabeležena kot največji dogodek v ameriškem delavskem gibanju sedanje dobe.

Da je bila konvencija otvorjena zjutraj in ne ob eni popoldne kot je bilo označeno v pozivu sklicanje konvencije, je odgovorno to, da so voditelji upornega gibanja želeli dobiti prednost nad Lewisovo konvencijo, ki se vrši istočasno v Indianapolisu, in ga poraziti s tem, da springfieldsko zborovanje prej osvoji novo ustavo in ime unije kot Lewisova skupina. To je uporniška konvencija tudi dosegla, ker je ugrabilo ime in sprejela začasno ustavo 40 minut prej ko Lewisova konvencija.

Največja značilnost springfieldske konvencije je v tem, da so delegatje absolutno porazili "mašino" in so zborovanje vzel v svoje roke. "Steam roller," ki je bil viden takoj po otvoritvi in je trajal kakso uro, je bil temeljito izrujan in vržen med staro šaro, ko so delegatje zahtevali, da mora Fishwick odstopiti od predsedništva konvencije, katero je otvoril in jo misil občudno voditi po običajni načini "železnih" in mnogokrat bedastih voditeljih. Prisili so ga, da je odstopil in na njegovo mesto je bil soglasno izvoljen Alex Howat, bojevit voditelj kansaških rudarjev. Delegatje so tudi obenem prisili prvotno vodstvo konvencije, da je prišlo na izvolitev vseh konvenčnih odborov izmed delegatov. Namen je bil, da jih imenuje predsednik, kar je tudi misili storiti, s čimur je povzročil malo revolucijo.

Ko je Howat, ki ima zaupanje praktično cele delegacije, prevezl predsedništvo, se je nemir maglo poleg in konvencija se je spremenila v pravo "rank and file" zborovanje. S svojim simatičnim nastopom, prevarnostjo in demokratičnim razpoloženjem je upival na delegatje, da je maglo sprejeti začasno ustavo, katero bo konvencija pozneje poljubno spremenila. In ker je s tem činom, z osvojitvijo United Mine Workers of America prehitela Lewisovo konvencijo, je s tem uporno ali novo rudarsko gibanje pridobilo veliko prednost. Pričakuje se namreč, da se bo boj, kateri skupini najpridupa unija, zanesel na sosedice.

Prvi konflikt se je pokazal takoj, ko je dal svoje poročilo poverilni odbor. Nastal je, ko je John Brophy predlagal, da se Farringtonova poverilnica vrne odboru v preiskavo. Farrington, kot znano, je bil prejšnji predsednik illinoiskih rudarjev in sel pred tremi leti v službo Peabody Coal kompanije za tri leta. Ta kontest je pokazal, da ima Farrington tako malo prisostva med rudarji, vaj ne na konvenciji, ker ga je skušalo zagovarjati le par delegatov. Njegova zadava bo prišla se na razmotrjanje, ko poroča o nji poverilni odbor. Do kakih frakcijskih spopadov še ni prišlo, prvič ne radi tega, ker je bila "mašina" takoj ob pričetku počaščena in drugič, ker je med delegati močno razvit duh solidarnosti, ker se zavedajo velikih nalog, ki čakajo novo gibanje.

Delavške unije so podujale peticije državnemu legislatetu in državnemu departmantu, naj dovoli čarter unijski zdravstveni kliniki in še pretekli teden so bile njihove prošnje uslušane. Carter, ki je bil izdan zdravstveni centrali, je odpovedal nevarnost napada od strani profitabilnih medicinskih interesov, ki so bili glavna zapreka gibanju, da se delavški preskrbi cenena zdravniška oskrba.

Krojaška unija je poslala posebno deputacijo k govorju Rooseveltu, kar je povzročilo, da se je govorje zavrel za stvar in porabil svoj vpliv pri izpostavljanju dovoljenja. Unija sta zastopala Benjamin Schlesinger od International Ladies Garment Workers unije in njen pravni svetovalec Morris Hillquit.

Unijski zdravstveni centrali je edina delavska institucija v Ameriki, ki nudi zdravniško in zobozdravniško oskrbo organiziranim delavcem po nizkih cenah. Krojaška unija vzdržuje zdravniške klinike za svoje člane v Cincinnati in v Chicagu. V Clevelandu je umrla Urula Kaprol, starca 66 let in doma iz Velikega Mraževa pri Krščem. V Ameriki je bila 24 let in zaposlena dva sina in dve hčeri. — Dalje je tam umrla starca rojakinja Marija Kastelic, roj. Škufo, starca 86 let in doma iz Zverčev pri Hinjah. V Clevelandu je bivala 37 let in zaposlena tri sinove in eno hčer.

V Waukeganu je umrl 18-letni Emil Podboj za ponesrečeno operacijo na slepiču.

V Port Washingtonu, Wis., je zadeva srčna kap Franka Viščnika, ki je bil doma iz Ljubljane v Savinjski dolini in kjer zaposlen zeno. Bil je pet dni v nezavesti, nakar je umrl.

V Moon Runu, Pa., je umrl star naseljenec John Zagode. Star je bil čez 60 let.

"Ceneno in pokorno" delavstvo bo imelo spet priliko menjanje se z industrijsko demokracijo

Detroit, Mich. — (F. P.) — Kot vse druge industrije, se tudi avtne polagoma izseljuje v južne države. To je razvidno iz gibanja v zadnjih mesecih.

Kelsey Wheel Co., ki izdeluje kolosa za fordke, je pred dvema tednoma odprla svojo tovarno v Memphisu, Tenn. Z gradnjo tovarniških poslopij nadaljuje; kadar bodo dovršena, bodo zavzemala prostor dvesto akrov. Ta kompanija producira avtne kolose z manjšimi stroški kot Ford, čeprav ima ta v svojih tovarnah uveden sistem najhujšega prigajanja. Posledice tega gibanja se že kažejo: Ford je zaprl svojo tovarno kolos v Hamiltonu, O.

Delavci iz južnih držav, ki so prišli v Detroit in dobili delo pri Kelsey Wheel Co., se bodo vrnili nazaj, ker družba jim obljubuje dobro-mesdo v "domači" državi. Kakšna bo ta mezda, je znane iz valedov tekstilne industrije. Tudi tekstilni magnati so objavili visoko mezzo delavcem, ki se izselijo na jug, potem pa so jim znižali plačo na 30 centov na uru.

Fisher Body, podružnica General Motors Co., je tudi pričela z gradnjo svojih tovaren v južnih državah, obenem pa je zaprla mnogo svojih tovaren v Detroitu. Vzrok za presestitev so mizke mezde, katere plačuje delavcem na jugu. Briggs Co., ki je na glasu, da najbolj izkoristi delavce, je pričela graditi tovarne v Memphisu in v drugih mestih južnih držav. Tudi ona je ponudila svojim delavcem iz južnih držav visoke mezde, ako se vrnejo v svoje kraje, "da uči hribove v produkciji avtomobilov", za kar jim obljubuje 60 na uru.

Kampanja je imela za posledico, da se je izselilo mnogo delavcev iz Detroita. Odšli so brez denarja, obupani in razočarani. Kdo ve, kaj vse se lahko izčini iz situacije. Tekstilni magnati so tudi misili, da bodo lahko nemoteno izkoristili delavce na jugu, a so se brdijo prevarali. Delavci v južnih državah so dokazali, da se znajo boriti za svoje pravice, kot so to pokazale številne stavke v tekstilnih središčih.


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



ANSWER TO THE JESUITS

By Ernst Haeckel.

PROFESSOR TARTUEFFE. After the appearance in 1908 of Dr. Arnold Brass's *das Affenproblem*, the *Allgemeine Zeitung* of Munich published an anonymous article upon it. This anonymous article was the direct occasion of my reply of December 24th, and it produced a whole series of disputes. The main point about the "Tartueffe" article (as I had to call it!) is that the anonymous Professor X takes Dr. Brass's "extraordinary severe charges" as proved and unwillingly deduces: "That they not only destroy the scientific reputation of a man who, despite some slips, was held in high repute among wide circles but they also exposed a positive stain upon German science!"

The rest of the article and the author's appeal to the opinion of the German embryologists were so perfunctory, so Jesuitical, that I felt I was forced to my reply of December 24th. Besides, I had another motive, occasioned by the action of the *Allgemeine Zeitung*. The editors sent me the issue containing the "Tartueffe" article with a characteristic letter, in which they offer me their columns for a short reply to the article, which, they said, they had printed with profound regret though they had left compelled to do so, because it came from a source raised high above doubt both as to scientific knowledge and loyalty.

Of course, I did not accept the *Allgemeine Zeitung's* offer, but sent my reply to the Berlin *Volkzeitung*, the editor of which is one of the few liberal newspaper heads who have worked for the advancement and propagation of the doctrine of evolution.

THE FALSIFICATIONS OF ARNOLD BRASS. Dr. Arnold Brass provides the most plentiful source upon which the Jesuit press has been drawing for some years to make charges against me of falsifying illustrations. Much as I dislike to touch upon the personal character of my opponents, I am compelled to do so in this case. For Brass is considered the star witness in the great "embryo suit," and it is upon his

authority that the numerous charges of falsification are brought against me. He is distinguished from most of the other scientists in the Kepler League by his knowledge of zoology, anthropology, comparative anatomy and ontogeny. But he misuses his knowledge to the utmost in order to throw a veil over the truth, or, as

At the time that I asked for a raise, I felt that I was worth \$40. However, now I feel that I was worth more, not because a beginner is paid \$38, but because my responsibilities were greater. When I was with the SNPJ, I made out the state insurance reports and also copied most of the statements, during regular working hours. Now the employees work overtime copying the statements, and it has even been rumored that professional auditors were hired to make out the original reports to the states. Economy!! They couldn't afford to give me \$40 a week, but now they are willing to go through greater expenses to have the work done. That certainly is poor management. At the time that I asked for a raise, Bro. Novak stated that I wasn't worth \$38, but at the last meeting of the Supreme Board, it was he who moved to approve a salary of \$38 for a beginner. Is it any wonder why many of the members are discontented, when they are never given a square deal? It certainly would be gratifying if an answer could be given, but without a doubt the statements in this article will not be given thought by those in charge. I sure would like an answer from those responsible why everyone isn't treated alike regardless of affiliations one might have on the outside.

As far as my three week vacation was concerned, Bro. Vider had no right to kick. I was only paid for one week, and as for work being delayed, there wasn't any worth mentioning. Before I left for my vacation, I brought all of my work up to date, putting in many extra hours, and even working on the Fourth of July. And for all this overtime, I wasn't paid a cent. What right had he to kick? My work was down to date, and before I left, Bro. Vider stated that he would continue to keep one of the temporary employees in account of my leaving. If I am correctly informed, that temporary employee is still working, but whether or not she is working on what I left behind, I do not know.

It is not the purpose of this article to discredit anyone who deserves it. It merely is the result of their actions and methods in seeking honor at the expense of someone else. My belief is that anyone who seeks credit by applying that method isn't much of a man, and if he isn't capable of earning distinction with his own ability—rather making a "fish out of someone else"—that part isn't worthy of an office in the SNPJ.
