

### TOO WELL DISGUISED

"Bandits are coming; bandits are here" these words do not excite any anxiety or fear, three turies ago all trepediation of them has been wiped. All that remains of bandit mobs today are stories to us by our grandfathers, who, however, were not fortunate in avoiding the hoodlums.

In the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries band ry flourished on a large scale. They were the time when small towns had no military outposts nor regular or closely stationed patrols. People had depend, in most cases on self-defense. How show these then be a match for the bandit army who we surprisingly drilled, skillful and well protected? The conditions, therefore, opened wide the doors to honesty. Many were tempted to start putting hands on other people's property, for they argued one could bring them to justice. If it succeeded a far times, the greediness for bigger plunder carried the further. Such a person would gather around him helers, people of his own kind, and soon he had a well organized troop of maurauders who could be stopped by no one. These bands became a terror not only to the defenseless peasants but even lords behind doors and town folks surrounded by stone walls trembled before them. The hand of the pillager drew back the heaviest bolt and could climb over the higher

Since the evil are fearful of light and the society of honest people, these criminals gathered in large forests-dark and unapproachable holes were the best dwellings and hideouts for the brigades. Here there would assemble, hold conferences and distribute their spoils. Every large locality had its own mob and all the bands had by mutual consent plotted territory in which to "work" and out of which they could not go.

The vast Sumberk forests were no exception this rule, around the year 1737. They kept inside of them, during this period, one of the largest and most bloody bands in Slovenia. This crowd was headed ! a Turkish half breed, Hasan Bisic, and numbered over fifty men.

On the sultry summer night in July 1737 the horde had gathered in the hills of Sumberk to plan an atrocious raid into the neighboring town of Kostanjevic. It was still early, having scarcely darkened, and the discussions as to what place they should select for their victim was in progress.





In another few minutes the leader was rapping on the barred doors. He knew not how his ally had come into the friary, nothing had been said of what means he should use to gain admission, but Bisic was certain that Pugler would be inside, for he had told him to be there and his word had to be obeyed.

What was his surprise therefore when upon his rap he saw, thru the small grated window, sauntering towards him a friar—the porter.

"The dirty dog never came," his voice was filled with anger, "Stand back we will have to kill," to his henchmen.

The bolt was drawn back and into the room rushed the entire troop, sabers held high. More than ten daggers were thrust into the supposed Bonhomme before he could utter a word.

Into the rooms the pillagers ran, never giving a second glance at the dead man. The last guard finally had the chance to view the victim closer, and the information that they had killed their own comrade froze the muscles of all-they stood as if glued to the floor. With consternation, half ran into the minster there to repent and reform while the others ran back to their horses and into the forest. But the incident so un manned the tribe that Hasan Bisic never staged an other raid.
