VROČE BITKE V SE-VILLI

Madrid, 28. jul. — Vladno pošlo se glasi, da je situacija v guadarramskem gorovju, ki se razteza 50 milij severno od Madrixa, zadovoljiva. Premier Jose Giral, ki se je večeraj vrnil s fronte v Madrid, je izjavil, da so se rebeli umaknili in vladne čete jih sedaj zasedujejo. Druga poročila naglašajo, da so se pekovski delavci dobro izkazali v akciji, kar tudi cestni železničarji. Okrog 60 bikoborcev, med temi tudi ženska Pilar Rodriguez, se je pridružilo vladnim četam.

Br. Frank Kerze piše že delj časa v Glasu Naroda o "naših" zadevah: jednotah, listih in drugih rečeh. Pred kratkim je objavil načrt za združenje vseh naših podpornik organizacij, dne 23. julija pa piše v omenjenem listu o združitvi slovenskih listov v Ameriki. Gledate Prosvete je zapisal:

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Timely Thoughts

800 New Juveniles

That's the net result of the campaign for first three months.—According to official figures released in the organ last week, the first three months of the present Juvenile Membership Campaign, ending June 30, have brought in approximately 800 new juveniles or, to be exact, 788.

The official announcement jubilantly states that whenever the members of our Society determine to do things they always accomplish them successfully. This they have clearly demonstrated anew during the current drive for new juvenile members. The result accomplished thus far is convincing enough to believe that at the end of the campaign our Society will again pass the 50,000 mark, in both departments. But in order to attain this goal we must at once decide to enlist every eligible youngster into our Juvenile Department.

ONE MORE THING. We noticed, with considerable regret, that on the list of twelve lodges and individual members who succeeded in procuring the greatest number of new juvenile members for June, not a single English speaking lodge or individual belonging to ESL is represented! Why? Can it be the heat? Or the drought? Or the dull summer period? Remember that the senior lodges and individual members active in the campaign are not immune to these natural calamities. It simply means that you'll have to step on it. It is up to you ESL members to speak up now—with actual results! Remember that the future of your lodge very largely depends upon the number of juveniles on your lodge roster.

Impulse Obeyed

Just a word or two about good intentions. The other day an auto driver "intended" to stop at a railroad crossing. He even "intended" to slow down and to put on the breaks—but he didn't. There was a terrific smash-up and he lost his life. Had he obeyed his first impulse, he would have avoided the smash-up. We know people who always intend to get busy, but they couldn't stand the heat, nor the rain, nor the cold, nor the wind . . . and their "good intentions" never amount to anything.

On the other hand, there are some people who have the best of intentions but the trouble with them is that they become too easily discouraged. They are readily content to let things drift, trusting in some "supernatural" power to provide ways and means.

ALL TOO OFTEN good intentions are lost in indifference. If we once tackle a proposition and are bound and determined to go through with it, we'll often find that results are surprisingly good. There are many worthy things we intend to do, but often fail to do them. For instance, to speak to some one we know, about becoming protected in the Slovens National Benefit Society and about insuring his children in it during the present campaign. Also, to solicit new subscribers to the Daily Prosveta.

It is mainly a matter of intention followed by performance. The impulse of good intentions should be obeyed immediately, and in most cases it will bring forth good results.

Women's Business

We'll make an exception and say a word or two about women, or rather, to be more precise, about "Contemporary American Women Poets," a book of comprehensive anthology, containing the work of 1,311 poets, edited by Tooni Gordi.

It is a known fact that women in this country are active in practically every field of endeavor. They are active in strikes, labor parades, in science, art, politics, as well as in the kitchen, the nursery, etc. At any rate, the above-mentioned anthology reveals few love poems as per the reviewer Jon Shipley in the July 25 New Leader, but it does reveal a surprising number of poems on social themes.

PROMINENTLY REPRESENTED are the well-known names—Edna Milley, Margaret Widdemer, Lucia Trent, Harriet Monroe, and others. More important than the names is the fact that one could gather from this book an excellent collection of labor poems. Babette Deutch has a vehement poem on Sacco and Vanzetti, while Mary Sinton Leitch's and others' in that category are aimed at lynching; lost and won strikes; against injustices; etc., etc. From these labor poems, in the reviewer's opinion, "emerges a quiet insistence on seeing the world as it is and on having the woman's share in it, and in the struggle to make it a world habitable for self-respecting humans."

Social Consciousness

Whenever we speak of social consciousness, we include all workers—factory, miners, railroad, sailors, white collar, small merchants, laboratory, and all.

Social consciousness or mindedness—a feeling for others—is the prime necessity of all workers. Without a sincere and deep social consciousness a workers' victory will never materialize and we will not witness a real collective society.

Capitalists cannot be socially-conscious if they are true to themselves and to their capitalistic end and means. Let us not look for it where it does not exist and where it cannot be. We must, however, inquire why there is not more social consciousness among workers.

Among American workers there still prevails the individualistic interest, that is, — each for himself regardless of the other fellow. Everyday experience should have convinced the masses that individualism in the economic world is already dead. Modern, mechanical, mass production of necessities is social by its very nature from the fact that everyone is included in the system of production by performing a certain part of his work. Why has not the American worker awakened to this fact? Because he looks only at the means of production and the product, and these two are still in the hands of individuals and individual groups; he cannot comprehend the social nature of production and sees only the result—the private capital.

This economic contradiction is confusing and misleading. In other words, the average worker has accustomed himself to think in terms of his predecessors generations ago, before the era of social production while all of this was performed individually. This shows how slowly average person changes his mind and concepts. The average American still looks at economic production through the eyes of the middle nineteenth century; the American capitalist through careful use of every means of culture safeguards the old economic theory as long as possible. This is the pillar upon which private capitalism hinges!

In the age of individual production, when everyone produced for his own needs, private ownership of tools and product was logical. That theory ceases to be logical when capital produced on a large scale is socially-produced.

The logical development of economic needs is that socially-produced capital must also be socially-owned capital! This is the only practical solution of the present economic crises.

As long as the mass of the American workers will live under the delusion that every worker is a potential capitalist if he so desires—thinking in terms of individual production which no longer exists—so long will live the greatest contradiction in the history of mankind: a system of social production of necessities with a private ownership of capital and product.

To remove this contradiction, social consciousness is necessary. It is necessary that the workers begin to think in terms of group interests of all the workers, instead of their own, personal. This is the key to the solution of the economic question.

American economy will never again be individualistic. This passed away forever with the advent of machines and mass production. He who still thinks in terms of economic individualism is fully 80 years behind modern times. He is in a true sense backward, even though he is unconscious of the fact and cannot be responsible for his ignorance.

Those who continuously strive to awaken their fellow workers to social consciousness are the best educators. Keep up this good work until the end of your day!

And this condition means something else. It means that—

Unless the army of dependents is increased private industry is headed for another collapse—and another and another until the final crash ends in the destruction of civilization itself. Only the blind will find hope in a business revival which leaves a third of the nation's population out of the picture. Only "liberals" with a supreme contempt for the intelligence and self-respect of the exploited working class would advance such prosperity as a campaign argument.—Reading Labor Advocate.

What Does It Mean?
Every woman should be seriously concerned with the recent Supreme court decision which declared that the New York state minimum wage law for women is unconstitutional.

It means that employers will have the right to hire and exploit women as low as they wish without any interference from state or Federal governments.

It means that the pay of many laundry workers has already been cut from \$15.40 a week to \$8 and \$6 a week.

It means that in some beauty parlors operators are being hired for as low as \$3 a week.

It means that waitresses were cut from \$7.20 a week to \$5.10 a week.

It means that all women will have a full share of liberty(!): those who try to get rid of unearned millions on foreign princes and those who stand all day long at the mangie machines under the sharp eyes of foreman for \$6 a week.

It means that employers in other states will not be slow to follow New York in effecting a similar wage reduction.

It means that Luciano's or Capone's vice ring will be able to thrive quite well regardless of whether these gentlemen happen to be in the hoochegow or not. The name of the leaders is not important. The conditions for such rackets are made fertile. Can you imagine any girl being able to live in a city decently with \$3 or \$6 or \$8 a week wages?

What is the way out for these working women and others like

them? Organization! Unions! A cooperative demand for decent wages and working hours! It'll be a long hard fight, but one that is bound to come.

The Chicago Pioneers have set another precedent of which they can be justly proud. Their last picnic emphasized strictly all union-made goods. No other brands of cigars, cigarettes, or bread were bought, despite the fact that we had tempting offers from non-union concerns by way of putting on an advertising campaign that would doubtless have brought in a bigger attendance.

Collective bargaining is the basis of all fair Labor relations.

It is the tap root and the foundation of a sound industrial structure. It is the thing most hated by profit-hungry, despotic employers, such as the United States Steel Corporation and the big four tobacco companies.

Every unionized plant or industry helps not only those immediately employed; it helps Labor everywhere. The first union was established at tremendous sacrifice. Compared to that, the last union was established with ease. The first union was established in defiance of public sentiment. The last union had public sentiment with it.

Every union helps every union. Patronize the products and services of every union. Look for the label and demand it until you get it. On cigarettes it is easy, for every leading place carries the union brands. On some other things it is harder to get, but persistent demand will help to bring more unions into being. Use your buying power to build unionism.





In New Jersey a woman teacher was dismissed for getting married. A high court has ordered that she be reinstated, on the ground that a law or rule forbidding female teachers to marry is unconstitutional, as depriving them of rights or interests without due process of law.

To refuse to salute the flag is, we think, rather silly. But it is much sillier, and wicked besides, for the state to try to make hypocrites of our boys and girls by compelling them to express a regard for the national emblem which they do not really feel.

As for the rule excluding married women from the teaching staff of our public schools it is unutterably stupid as well as unjust. Other things being equal, a woman who has the emotional experience of married love and of maturity is a better teacher than one whose life is not thus enriched.

So all judges are not lacking in a social conscience. Here and there one speaks and acts in accord with equity and the ideals of democracy.—T. N. L.
