Dne 18. septembra 1940, predno se je pričela jubilejna kampanja za angleško poslujoča društva SNPJ ob njihovi petnajstletni in za mladinski oddelek na splošno, smo v Prosveti sugestirali sledičo neoficielno kvoto novih članov: za angleško poslujoča društva v osmih mesecih 3000 in za mladinski oddelek na splošno v petnajstih mesecih 5000.

V sedmih mesecih kampanje so pa angleško poslujoča društva pridobila 1386 članov in mladinski oddelek na splošno 785, skupaj oba oddeka — kot je bilo poročano zadnjin sreda — 2171 članov. Skupno število je komaj okrog 25 odstotkov sugestirane kvote.

Iz tega lahko vsak član izvaja lastne zaključke in lahko zadeže dozene, kje in kaj je glavni vzrok počasnosti naše kampanje.

Resnica je, da relativno in z ozirom na okoliščine rezultat kampanje do danes ni tako slab. Če bi namreč postavili nizjo kvoto, bi lahko rekli, da je rezultat zelo dober. Iz poročila Fraternal Monitorja, ki ga v današnjih številki prosvete citira gl. tajnik, je SNPJ med vsemi večjimi slovenskimi podpornimi organizacijami pridobila največ članov v preteklem letu.

Ampak pravilo napredovanja je, da ne sme biti nikdar zadovoljen s svojim napredkom, če hočeš napredovati!

BREZPLAČNO ZDRAVILSTVO V NOVI ZELANDIJ

Nova Zelandija se nahaja v sedanji svetovni vojni na strani Velike Britanije. Ta dejela je velik otok na južnem Pacifiku nedaleč od Avstralije in spaša med svobodne angleške dominojne, kakor Avstralija, Južna Afrika in Kanada.

Nova Zelandija je žrtvovala na tisoče svojih sinov v bojnih kampanjah v italijanski Libiji in na Grškem — in se vedno sipiže z Avstralijo vred svoje moštvo in bogastvo v žrelo vojne, v katero je stopila prostovoljno za obrambo svoje demokracije v drugini britanskih narodov.

Kajti Nova Zelandija je zares demokratična dejela. Lahko rečemo, da je najdemokratičnejša izmed vseh delov Velike Britanije in v socialnem oziru je najnaprednejša dejela na svetu. Nova Zelandija ima že nekaj let socialistično, delavsko vlado, ampak samo ime ali beseda "socialistično" še ne pomeni napredka, če ni napredka tudi v dejanjih ali praksi; naprednost in demokratičnost novozelandske vlade je v dejanjih — in to šteje.

Klub temu, da je Nova Zelandija v vojni, je 1. marca t. 1. začela izvajati program brezplačnega zdravniškega oskrbovanja bolnikov. Zbornica je odobrila ta program že pred dvema letoma, toda novozelandski zdravniki, ki so večinoma prav tako

izdaja svoje publikacije in še posebno list Prosveta za korist, ter potrebne agitacije svojih društev in članic in propagando svojih idej. Nikakor pa ne za propagando drugih podpornih organizacij. Vsaka organizacija ima obdajajočo svoje glasilo. Torej agitacijski dopisi in naznani drugih podpornih organizacij in njih društva naj ne pošljajo listu Prosveta.

moglavci in nazadnjški kakor ameriški, so zavlekli izvajanje načrta; izjavili so, da ne bodo kooperirali z vlado. Seveda, če zdravniki nočejo prostovoljno kooperirati, ne more vlada nicesar storiti; lahko jih bi prisilila, ampak to bi ne bilo demokratično. Socialistična vlada Nove Zelandije je raje počakala in agitirala med zdravniki toliko časa, da je z lepo besedo pridobilu večje število zdravnikov za kooperacijo pri novem načrtu. Vsebuje pridobi nikdar, toda, če jih je pridobil polovico, je bil to velik uspeh in lahko je pričela z izvajanjem.

V novem socialnem zdravljenju ni nič obveznega. Vse je prostovoljno. Vsakdo, ki hoče, se registrira, pri vladu za zdravstveno oskrbo in dobi posebno karto in kadar zbole, gre k zdravniku, ki kooperira z vlado in v dobi brezplačnega zdravniškega posrežja, zdravnik je pa plačan od države \$3.50 za vsakega bolnika in država mu povrne tudi vozne stroške, kadar se vozi k bolniku na dom. To je vse stvar.

Kako daleč odzad je capija Amerika za Novo Zelandijo v tem oziru! Devetdeset odstotkov ameriških zdravnikov nočeše nimirati slišati o takem socialnem napredku. Seveda, zdravniki imajo s svojega stališča prav, da se borijo za svoje ekonomske interese, nimajo pa nobene moralne pravice vztrajati, naj na tisoče siromakov umre vsako leto samo zato, ker nimajo denarja, da bi šli k zdravniku — in baš to je posledica privatnega zdravilstva v Ameriki!

Enkrat mora priti čas, ko tudi Amerika doseže socialno stopnjo socialnega pionirja Nove Zelandije.

For Members of Slovens National Benefit Society and American Slovenes

Drive Promises to Net 2500 Members

Last week's official report showed that in April, the seventh month of the Jubilee Campaign, the drive brought us 301 new members, 193 adult and 108 juvenile.

Therefore, the grand total for the seven-month period of the campaign as of April 30 is 2171 new members. This represents an average of almost 312 new members for each month of our eight-month campaign. On this basis we can conclude that the final campaign month, the month of May, will be at least as productive as the previous months have been, thereby boosting the net results to the 2500 mark.

Of the eight most active lodges in April, the honors were evenly divided between the English and Slovene speaking lodges: four and four. For April, as in preceding months, the official list included lodges which have secured five or more new members and have added to the sum total.

At this point it is gratifying to report that the Pioneers of Chicago, Lodge 559, for the seventh consecutive month lead all other lodges in the current drive. In April they added another batch of 11 new members to their previous record of 55, and boosted their total to 66 at the end of last month. Incidentally, the aggregate membership of the Pioneers as of May 16 was 770 in both departments, which places them as one of the largest lodges in our Society.

By adding nine new members in April, Little Fort Lodge 568 of Waukegan has jumped to third place with a total of 33 new members; second place honors having been retained by the Harmonizers Lodge 700, Roundup, Mont., with a total of more than 40 new members to their credit.

The other two ESL's, namely, the Milwaukee Badgers and the Newark (N. J.) Fraternalites, each secured five new members in April, the former boosting their campaign total to 17 and the latter to 15 new members.

While the Chicago Pioneers tenaciously and zealously cling to first place and several other ESL's vie in a serious competition to climb the ladder as high as possible, our Cleveland and Pennsylvania ESL's again failed to be included in the active list for April. None of them succeeded in securing five or more new members in any of the campaign months.

Why? Is it because of insufficient incentives? Or lack of interest, enthusiasm and idealism? Or too much competition?

We are lead to surmise that a combination of all these elements is responsible for the slow response to the campaign call from some of our strongholds. However, we believe that the incentives offered by our Society are attractive enough if we examine them from every angle. It is also true that the selective service law was a determining factor to some extent, but that holds true everywhere. That is, most of our lodges had to reckon with practically the same obstacles.

We are still hopeful, however, that the last month of the drive will awaken some of our dormant lodges and include them in our campaign record!

Your Dollar

Cotton Blankets

You can get a heavy cotton blanket for around \$2. That more than any other factor, explains why two-thirds of the blankets produced in the United States are made of cotton. But where warmth is required, either wool or part-wool will give better service and more value for the money spent.

The main disadvantage of cotton is the weakness of the nap. When the nap wears down the blanket loses a good part of its warmth. With careful washing and handling you can, however, get service from a cotton blanket. Using a blanket cover will help preserve the nap. Wash with neutral soap and lukewarm water, handling as little as possible. Do not rub or wring the blanket, but press out the excess water gently. Shake the blanket at intervals while drying to restore fluffiness.

CU tested 12 brands of cotton blankets. Among the highest quality were: **Barkay** (\$2.75); **Dakota Jacquard** No. 3203 (\$1.95); **Koolnit** lightweight (\$1.50); **Fieldcrest** lightweight (\$1).

Labor—Cotton Blankets

The following blankets, among those CU tested, are union-made, under contract with the Textile Workers Union of America (CIO): **Dakota Jacquard** and **Fieldcrest** (both Marshall Field & Co., Chicago); **Koolnit** (Pepperell Mfg. Co., Boston).

What Price—Price Controls?

Price controls of consumers' goods are meaningless without quality controls, points out CU's **BREAD & BUTTER** weekly. If the price of chambray workshirts, for example, is fixed at a dollar without any quality standards being fixed, manufacturers may use such poor material and poor workmanship that the shirt will not be worth buying at any price. Both price and quality must be controlled if consumers are to benefit. CU urges that the government establish quality standards and increase production of consumers' goods. This would hold down prices more effectively than government-imposed price controls.

Tax the Profiteers

In a recent issue, **BREAD & BUTTER** attacked the proposed high taxes on low incomes and on sales of consumer goods. "Until all profiteering is taxed out of existence," comments **BREAD & BUTTER**, "consumers must fight any tax increase imposing lower standards of living on those whose standards are already low."

Auto Radios

This year's auto radios are somewhat improved over the last batch CU tested, September 1939. A number of new convenience features have been added and the general level of performance is better, too.

In its May 1941 issue, CU rates 21 models of auto radios, ranging in price from \$15 to \$70. Sets were rated for sensitivity, operation of automatic volume control, push-button tuning, amount of undistorted volume, tone quality and other features. Some of the lowest-priced radios gave better performance than expensive sets. Among the "Best Buys" were: **Sears' Silverstone Cat. 6301** (\$22.95) plus transportation; **Philco Model AR-50** (\$39.95); **Motorex Model 481** (\$44.95).

If you buy a non-mail order brand, try to get a good discount from the list price, CU advises. Many dealers give such discounts on request.

Union-Made Auto Radios

Of the auto radios tested by CU, the following are union-made under contract with the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers (AFL): **Western's Truetones Nos. D-1190 and D-1191**; **Lafayette Nos. B-110 and B-111** (all manufactured by Wells-Garner & Co.) and **Sonora** (Sonora Radio and Television Corp.)

The following are union-made under contract with the United Electrical, Radio and Machine Workers of America (CIO): **Philco** (Philco Radio Corp.); **Sears' Silverstone Cat. No. 6301 (RCA)**; **Ward's Airlines Cat. No. 567** (Belmont Radio Corp.)

Coats and Suits

This is the season when most women are thinking of their summer wardrobe—with the chief emphasis on cool fabrics. But this is also the season of sales on suits and coats.

BREAD & BUTTER thinks it would be decidedly worthwhile to shop the sales and buy now that suit or coat you will be wanting to wear in the Fall months—unless the very latest style is of great importance to you.

Price rises of 10% to 15% on women's coat and suit materials for Fall are estimated by three leading mills supplying fabrics to the trade. It is more than likely that a corresponding increase in retail price—or cut in quality—will take place at the same time.

Men's Summer Suits

Several companies are reported to be dropping tropical worsteds for the 1942 season. One trade paper interprets this as a sign that mills are hoping to cut out their less profitable lines next year and
