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

Short History of Slovene Literature

4. Romantiv novelists prose writing

Simon Gregorcic and Levstik are the two outstanding names connected with the period of romance and realism connected with Stritar's "Zvon". Pagliaruzzi, Askerc, Cimperman, Kersnik who have also contributed to the store and advancement of Slovene poetry cannot be counted properly into this period because they have fully developed only in a later period.

More widely developed was the novel and especially in the direction of Stritar's romantic and sentimental novel with which he is closely identified. The novel which shows the direction of the novel of this time can best be seen in Stritar's "Svetinova Metka"

and "Rosana". Even more representative of the older novel form was the work of Josip Ogrinc (1844-1879) born at Podgorja near Kamnik and professor of nature study at Vinkovcic in Croatia. He tried his talents in novels and drama. His most known works are the comedy "V Ljubljano jo dajmo" (Let us send her to Ljubljana) which appeared in 1868 and the novels "Vojnomir", 1871, "Setev in žetev" (Sowing and Reaping) 1875. The best of his works are "Podobe iz narave" (Pictures from nature) and "Obrazi iz naroda" (Pictures of the Nation). Another representative of the age was Dr. France Celestin (1843-1895) professor in Russia and later in Zagreb. He began his literary work with some verses but soon shifted to novels where he became really famous with his literary essays "Naše obzorje".

Ivan Tavcar. The most brilliant representative of the romantic novel among the Slovenes was and is Dr. Ivan Tavcar. Ivan Tavcar was born in 1851 at Poljanih near Skofja

Loka. He studied at the gymnasium at Novo Mesto and Ljubljana. He was graduated from the law school in Vienna. After passing his bar examinations he devoted himself to the profession of law as an attorney in Ljubljana in 1884. He became politically prominent as the state representative and as ambassador and lastly as the mayor of Ljubljana.

Tavcar first appeared in the role of literateur when the Zvon did not exist. He was the contributor to the annual publication "Zora", published by Trstenjak and remained a constant contributor until the editor Janko Pajk did not get himself into trouble with the literary men in Ljubljana namely Levec. Levstik, Jurcic and Stritar.

Tavcar's Style.

Extraordinary events, intense passion contrasted with humble fellings are the manner of his writings and form some of the best there is in Slovene literature. Stritar's influence becomes evident in the early writings of Tavcar. The influence can be traced to Stritar's "Zorin" and is noticable mainly in the first person parration and often in the content of the things told. Later Tavcar developed his own style and infused with his own personality which is shown mainly in the peculiar romantic irony in which he pauses in the middle of a passage to make some ironic remarks about this or that contemporary fault. This romantic irony later is minimized and the writings become a wonderful example of realistic-remantic writings which appeared in the "Vienna Zvon" in the "Ljubljanski Zvon", so peculiar to all literature. His romantic descriptions of the castle and the people who lived in them are classic examples of the Slovene novel. Peculiar as it may seem he combined in many of his writings the realistic and the romantic trends into one whole. The stories which he told were very romantically placed into a realistic background of place and time which the author himself has exrerienced. This characteristic is noted most in "Ivan. Savl" and the pictures of his birthplace Skofja Loka "Med gorami" (Among the mountains) among which the best are "Posavceva česnja" (Posav's Cherry) and

"Sarevčeva sliva" (Sarev's Plum). One of the best of Tavcar's novels is a picture from the religious battles and religious troubles whose locale is Skofja Loka, "Vita vitae meae" (Life of my Life). In the novel of the times of Leopold I., "Ivan Solnce" there are traces of satirical nature of Tavcar which has been so widely developed in contemporary literature. The best example of this characteristic is seen in "Mrtva srca" (Dead Hearts) and especially in his satirical Utopia "4000" and the extensive historical novel "Izza kongressa" (From the Congress). With the "Cvetje v jeseni" and with the culturo-historical novel "Visoska kronika" he returned to his loved mountain country. Pavlina Doljakova.

Comparable to Tavcar's early novels are the novels of Pavlina Daljakove married Pajk. She was born in Padua of Italian and Slovene stock and was raised as an Italian. It was only after she lived with her uncle in Solkan as an orphan that she became completely Slovene. In 1876 she married the editor Prof. Janko Pajk and lived with him in Maribor, Gradec, Brn and Vienna lastly in Ljubljana. Her literary work was begun when she began publishing a series of poems in the Zora which she collected and published in 1878. Soon however she devoted all of her time to novels. She studied Stritar's work and became inbued with his style. The effects of her studies can be plainly seen in her "Odlomkih iz ženskega dnevnika" (Selections from a Woman's diary). She is definitely romant/2 in style and specializes in the delienation of feminine character which interestes her most. Of similar content are the stories she wrote for the "Kres" and the Ljubljanski "Zvon". For the Mohor Society she wrote some popular folk tales and became interested in ethical question concerning women, love and friendship etc.

From Stritar's Romantic school came also Anton Keder but Jurcie's influence is also shown in his work. Anton Koder was born at Radomelj near Kamnik in 1851. He was a postal official in Tyrol and later lived as a retired man in Ljubljana. His first attempts were some verses but he became interested in novels and

was the principle contributor to the "Kres" a new paper published in Celovec. Dr. Jakob Sket is ranked with Anton Koder for his contributions to Slovene Li terature which consisted mostly in some novels. principle contributions are "Milko Vogrin" and "V klova Zala" the later a historical novel of the Turkish inroads into Slovene lands. His principle fame, ever, rests in his activities for literature in the Slove schools.

Fran Levec.

The most interesting prose writer of Strital circle is Fran Levec. He was born at Jezica near Liv bljana in 1846. When he completed his gymnasium went to Vienna to study at the University where specialized in German and History. After his company pleted studies he taught in Gorica where had students among others Joseph Pagliaruzzi and Kare Strekelj. When he was at the technical school Ljubljana he was the teacher of Ivan Cankar. La he was made the principal of the school and still superintendent of schools in the entire country.

As a student at the Gymnasium he began poetry the most known of his poems is "Cerky" (The Little Church). As a teacher of Slovene he developed into the first Slovene biographer of liter people and the first and finest Slovene essayist. most noteworthy of his biographical contributions the Zvon are those of Vodnik, Preseren, Cop and ko. To these must be added the interesting biograph ies of Erjavec, Levstik, Valjavec, Koseski. The beautiful and sympathetic of all is the "Spomit" Kersnika" (Memories of Kersnik). Important as as a man of letters he is equally important in nection with the organization of Slovene Literary deavors. When he accepted the position of editor the renewed Ljubljanski Zvon he raised upon a plane of literary merit. In connection with his c as the president of the Slovenske Matice he made annual the first organ interested in the sciences interested the organization of the Slovenska Ma in literature work of Slovene contemporary men.




