Child Labor Amendment

The New York Committee for the Ratification of the Federal Child Labor Amendment has signed an urgent request to the legislature of that state to ratify the amendment, and to this vital reform on its way. The committee includes some of the most prominent lawyers of New York. More important still, the material nails one fake so neatly that it deserves to be quoted far and wide.

"Governmental power with respect to child labor is not new," says the committee. "Legislatures have always possessed greater power than is conferred on Congress by amendment."

That is a fact too often forgotten, even friends of the amendment. This amendment creates no new legislative power. Any state can curb child labor if it wishes. Many states have done so. But state action cannot be uniform; and states which protect childhood at a commercial disadvantage as compared to those which do not.

Only Congress can make rules which cover the country, and that is the reason for amendment.—"W. L."

Sickness and Poverty

A story of the kinship between poverty and sickness has just been published by the Bank Memorial Fund, cooperating with the S. Public Health Service. House-to-house canvass of about 7,500 families of workers was made in eight cities.

The average yearly income of these workers in 1929 was about \$1,700 per family. In 1932 it was about \$900 per family. The question was whether this drop affected their health. Edgar Sydenstricker, long with the Bureau of Labor Statistics at Washington, answers in the Survey Magazine:

"In each city, the highest sickness rate was found among the families who had suffered most severe decline in income. The illness was more than 60 per cent higher among persons whose economic status had dropped from 1929 to 1932 from reasonable comfort to poverty than among their neighbors who had suffered no decline of income."

He finds further that in families of the unemployed, sickness was 66 per cent higher than among the families of full time workers, and 27 per cent higher than among families with someone working part time.

Dr. Sydenstricker admits that the death rate has not risen during the depression. He attributes this largely to the activities of health departments, hospitals and the medical profession generally in helping the people through; but health has suffered, and lives will pay the price.—Labor.

To Members of English Speaking Branches

The present general campaign and its success is dependent largely upon the members of the English-speaking lodges. The field for agitation among those speaking our Slovene language is gradually diminishing, due to the restriction of immigration and the general depression. For these reasons it is necessary for members of English-speaking lodges to concentrate all their energy on the campaign.

If there is any fraternal society deserving of support, especially from the working classes, it is certainly ours, which has done more for the mutual and educational benefit of its members than any other similar organization in this country.

The democratic form of management in our Society is so broad that the members have absolute power over conducting the affairs of the organization. The Slovene National Benefit Society maintains various classes of death and sick benefit as well as disability benefit, with very moderate assessment. Our financial stability is safe and sound, and insurance for those who want to become a member is secure.

Our agitators must be capable of explaining the term "fraternalism" to those who lack this knowledge and are not yet members of any fraternal organization. They must thoroughly understand that fraternalists are building a society on brotherly relations, social justice, and equal rights for all. The establishment of these principles is so significant that a thorough comprehension of them will carry sufficient weight to induce people to prefer a fraternal organization to other types of insurance companies.

This is a sincere appeal to members of English-speaking lodges of our Society TO ENTER THIS CAMPAIGN with a full determination and self-conviction in the worth of our Society, and your success is assured. The secretarial department will gladly give you its full cooperation and furnish you with the necessary information you may require.

Do not overlook section 1, of Article 22, of the by-laws, which provides:

"In special cases the Supreme Administrative Committee shall have the power to decide upon admission into membership of persons not of Slavic origin."

In cases such as the above, it is recommended that the character of the person be thoroughly investigated.

Let us distinguish our thirtieth anniversary with an extensive increase of our membership.
