

Roosevelt objavil detalje relifnega programa

Delavci, ki bodo uposleni pri federalnih projektih, bodo prejeli \$19 do \$94 na mesec. Predsednik je razdelil deželo na štiri sekcije in reliefne plače na vzhodu bodo višje nego na jugu. Bivši kaznjenci in osebe rahlega zdravja ne bodo uposleni pri javnih delih

Washington, D. C., 21. maja. — Predsednik Roosevelt je si danes določil mezo, delovne ure in delovne pogoje za reliefne delavce, ki jih bo federalna vlada upoštevala pri javnih projektih.

S posebno odredbo je predsednik razdelil deželo na štiri sekcije in določil plače, ki jih bodo reliefni delavci prejeli v posameznih sekcijah. Ta plača bo \$19 na mesec za neizurjene delavce na jugu do \$94 za izurjene delavce na vzhodu. V Illinoisu na primer, ki spada v prvo grupo, bodo neizurjeni delavci prejeli \$40 do \$55 na mesec, izurjeni in profesionalci pa \$61 do \$94.

Mezno lestvico je predsednik konstruiral na bazi povprečne meze, kar pomeni, da bo plača reliefnih delavcev 20 do 30 odstotkov nižja ko "običajna meza". Ta lestvica je bila sestavljena v smislu priporočil, ki so jih predsedniku predložili komiteji treh tisoč okrajev. Vsak teh komitejev je bil sestavljen iz reprezentantov delavstva, biznisa in krajevne reliefne uprave.

Roosevelt je dalje določil osemurnik in 40 ur dela v tednu pri reliefnih projektih. Za delavce, ki so uposleni pri projektih, ki jih financira federalna administracija javnih del, je tudi določil osemurnik in 130 delovnih ur na mesec.

Za fante v civilni konzervatorski armadi (COC) bo ostal v veljavi obstoječi delovni teden, ki je 40 ur. Nobena oseba pod 16 letom starosti ne more dobiti dela pri reliefnih projektih in izključeno so tudi osebe, katerih upoštevati pri teh projektih bi ogrozila njihovo zdravje ali varnost. Dalje so izključene osebe, ki so kdaj bile poslane v zapir ali pobiljevalnice.

Prednost uposlitve bodo imeli člani družin, ki so na reliefni listi, toda od vsake take družine bo dobil delo samo eden član, obenem pa se bo pazilo, da ne bodo drugi delavci, ki so spoštovani za dela pri reliefnih projektih, zapostavljeni. Na podlagi objavljenega načrta bo vlada upoštevala pri teh projektih \$200,000 delavcev.

Preiskava potopa britskih ladij
London, 21. maja. — Britska trgovska zbornica je včeraj prišla s preiskavo, ki naj ugotovi vzroke potopa štirih parnikov. Ti parniki so "Millipol", ki se je potopil na Atlantiku v zadnjem oktobru; "Usworth", ki se je potopil v decembru, in "La Cresta" ter "Blagowrie", ki sta se potopila na Pacifiku v januarju t. l. Moštvo vseh teh parnikov je utonilo.

Kitajci urgirajo bojkot ameriških produktov
Nanking, 21. maja. — Dr. Vintu Ma, vodilni kitajski ekonom, je povzel vlado in trgovce, naj bojkotirajo ameriško blago, kar bo po njegovem mnenju najuspešnejši protest proti politiki s strani, ki jo izvaja Rooseveltova administracija. Ta politika je ustvarila finančno krizo na Kitajskem in se je raztegnila tudi na Japonsko, Mehiko in druge države, ki imajo srebro vredno.

Stavka francoskih mornarjev končana
La Havre, Francija, 21. maja. — Stavka francoskih mornarjev, ki je pretela, da bo onemogočila odhod največjega francoskega parnika "Normandie" proti New Yorku, je bila včeraj končana.

Parnik "Champlain", na katerem so mornarji zastavljali 15. maja in potem razširili stavko na druge parnike v havreškem in marsejskem pristanišču, je odplul proti New Yorku.

Dva tisoč mornarjev se je vrnilo na delo
Dva tisoč mornarjev se je včeraj zbralo na shodu in izreklo, da se vrnejo na delo. William Bertrand, mornarični minister, jim je namreč obljubil, da bodo od naslednjega prejeli letno plačo, kar jim bo zagotovilo stalne dohodke. Prej so dobivali plačo le za čas, ko so bili parniki na vožnji.

Roosevelt podprl Richberga
Washington, D. C.—Predsednik Roosevelt je odobril program Donalda R. Richberga, načelnika odbora NRA, ki med drugim zahteva podaljšanje zakona obnove za nadaljnji dve leti. Roosevelt je pokazal, da je zelo nezadovoljen z akcijo senata, ki je podaljšal življenje zakonu obnove samo za devet mesecev. Obeta se hud boj za ta program v nižji zbornici, kajti administracija hoče, da zbornica pregleda je senatno akcijo.

Kampanja za občinsko elektrarno
Stavkarji v ztraja jo v boju
Centralia, Ill.—Zaradi stavke, ki je izbruhnila pred več tedni proti Illinois Power & Light Co., ne dobiva prebivalstvo v več ko 50 vaseh in mestih plina in elektrike. Sedaj so se zganili občinski uradniki in pričeli s kampanjo, da se zgradi električna centrala, ki naj bi nadomestila privatno. Sestavili so že zadevne načrte, ki jih bodo predložili administraciji PWA, od katere pričakujejo posojilo, katero jim bo omogočilo gradnjo elektrarne.

Jugoslovanka obsojena v smrt
Belovar, Jugoslavija, 21. maja. — Kmetica Milka Pavlovič je bila na tukajšnjem sodišču obsojena v smrt na vešalih. Spoznana je bila za krivo na obtožbo, da je zastrupila svojega moža in pet sorodnikov.

Poljska zabredla v resno krizo

Varšava, 21. maja. — Dasi je maršal Pilsudski zapustil Poljako kot neodvisno državo, ji je pustil tudi dva neresena problema, ki ogrožata bodoči obstanek republike. V splošnem se ni nikdar naglašalo, da so bile diktatorjeve ambicije dalekosežnejše nego tiste, katere je aktualno uveljavil s porazom boljševiške armade v prvih letih po svetovni vojni in s svojimi puči v Gornji Sleziji in Vilni.

Največja njegova eskapada, kampanja, ki jo je vodil l. 1920 proti Ukrajini, se je izjalovila. On ni dosegel svojega namena, da bi Ukrajina postala del poljske republike. Z anektiranjem Galicije si je nakopal silno sovražstvo Ukrajincev.

Druga ambicija Pilsudskega je bila federacija med Poljsko in Litvo. Ko je videl, da ne bo mogel uveljaviti svoje ideje, je poslal generala Żeligowskega v Vilno, da izvede okupacijo.

Direktna posledica diktatorjeve politike je obstoj dveh držav v vzhodni Evropi, ki se odprto pripravljata za vojno s Poljsko. Ta sta Litva in Ukrajina in obe sta prepričani, da bosta uresničili svoje načrte v prihodnjem konfliktu. Ukrajinci zahtevajo popolno neodvisnost, da ne bodo razkosani ko sedaj, dočim Litva stremi, da pride Vilna pod njeno oblast.

Po smrti Pilsudskega, ki je vladal Poljsko z železno pestjo, se je situacija zelo spremenila. Vrhovna oblast je prešla v roke predsednika Mieczkija in zunanjega ministra Becka. Notranja kriza se je poostila, ker se sedaj drugi politiki borijo, da pridejo na krmilo.

Jeze se pa nad predsednikom radi "persekucij" nasprotnika

Washington, (FP) — Smrtjo senatorja Cuttinga iz Nove Mehike, ki je bil ubit v letalski nesreči na povratku v Washington, je bila odprta nezazelenjena rana med liberalci radi njegovega "persekutiranja" po Rooseveltu.

Sprvega sta bila s Cuttingom dobra prijatelja in ga je ubiti senator aktivno podpiral v njegovi predsedniški kampanji 1932 kakor je štiri leta prej Al Smitha, čeprav je bil republikanec. Ker pa ni mogel pogoltniti vsega "new deal", si je s tem nakopal predsednikovo jezo. Posledica je bila, da mu je Roosevelt pri zadnjih volitvah dal zausnico in blagoslovil njegovega reakcionarne nasprotnika. Kljub temu je bil senator Cutting ponovno izvoljen.

Liberalci mu tega niso odpustili. Kakor pravi kongresnik Amle iz Wisconsin, je prav to "persekutiranje" senatorja Cuttinga povzročilo, da so liberalci po vsej deželi pričeli dvomiti v predsednikovo iskrenost. S senatorjevo smrtjo in okoliščinami, ki so vodile do nje, je s strani mnogih liberalcev umrlo pa tudi zadnje upanje v predsednika in njegov "new deal". Za razočaranje med njimi so seveda še drugi vzroki.

Po mnenju nekaterih je prišlo do razkola med Rooseveltom in Cuttingom največ vsled tega, ker je predsednik videl v njem močnega nasprotnika in nevarnega tekmeča. Cutting je bil namreč izredno močna osebnost in povrh še radikalnih nazorov. Dasi bogat, je nastajal med njim in kapitalizmom vedno globokejši prepad. Nedavno, sledno na strani izkoriščanih,

WAGNERJEV NAČRT BO SPREJET V ZBORNICI

Predsednik Ameriške delavske federacije se veseli zmage v senatu

PRAVICA KOLEKTIVNEGA POGAJANJA

Washington, D. C. — (FP) — Sedaj, ko je senat sprejel Wagnerjev načrt, ki odpravlja komanijske unije in daje delavskim unijam pravico kolektivnega pogajanja, se slišijo napovedi, da ne bo naletel na opozicijo v nižji kongresni zbornici in da bo gotovo sprejet.

Kongresnik W. P. Connery je dejal, da je uverjen, da predsednik Roosevelt podpira načrt. Ako bo le izrekel besedo načrtu v prilog, tedaj ga bo zbornica sprejela brez posebnih amendentov. Roosevelt sicer še ni podal izjave glede tega, obljubil pa je, da bo o načrtu razpravljal z voditelji kongresa.

Ako bo načrt sprejet v nižji zbornici v obliki, katero je odobrili delavski odsek, bo vseboval provizijo, ki ni vključena v omenjeni, ki ga je sprejel senat. Ta provizija določa, da mora stalni federalni delavski odbor priti pod jurisdikcijo zveznega delavskega departamenta, namesto da bi postal neodvisna ustanova.

Za to provizijo so se borili predstavniki Ameriške delavske federacije in načelnika delavskega departamenta Frances Perkins, ki so dobili na svojo stran tudi člane delavskega odseka nižje zbornice.

Sprejetje Wagnerjevega načrta v senatu je izzvalo veliko veselje v krogih Ameriške delavske federacije. Predsednik Green je dejal, da je načrt konstruktiven in bo ustvaril pogoje za realno, vitalno in izvedljivo kolektivno pogajanje.

Žrtve sovjetske letalske nesreče pokopane

Moskva, 21. maja. — Prebivalci Moskve so včeraj videli največje žalne demonstracije, ko so bile žrtve letalske nesreče pokopane v bližini donskega samostana. Nad milijon ljudi se je zbralo ob cestah, po katerih se je pomikal pogrebni sprevod, katerega so se udeležili visoki vladni uradniki. Krste, v katerih so bili ostanki 49 žrtev, ki so izgubili življenje, ko je največje letalo na svetu Maksim Gorki treščilo na tla, je nosilo osebe državnega letalskega inštituta. V zraku nad sprevodom je krožilo veliko število letal, katere so vodili tovariši žrtev.

Za javno lastništvo kanadskih industrij

Montreal, Kanada. — Kanadski delavski kongres se je na svoji letni konvenciji, ki se je vršila v tem mestu, izrekel za javno lastništvo vseh temeljnih industrij, zemlje in naravnega bogastva.

pred smrtjo je celo omenil, da bi moglo celo več koristiti, če bi zapustil senat in pričel propagando proti obstoječim zlom zunaj — med ljudstvom.

In ker ga je Roosevelt poznal bolje kot marsikdo drugi, ga je skušal eliminirati iz javnega življenja. Tega mnenja so mnogi liberalci v Washingtonu. Abesinija spet apelira na Ligo

Zahteva, naj Liga ustavi imperialistične aktivnosti Italije

Zeneva, 21. maja. — Svet Lige narodov se je včeraj ponovno sestel, da razpravlja o sporu med Italijo in Abesinijo. Takoj po otvoritvi zasedanja je bil alarmiran radi protesta, ki mu ga je naslovil abesinski cesar Haile Selassie.

"Očitno je," se glasi protest, "da si hoče Italija nepostavno prilastiti važen del abesinskega teritorija. V zadnjem času hoče Italija prepričati svet, da je okupacija abesinskega teritorija potrebna v interesu civilizacije. To je dokaz, da se je odločila, da uresniči svoje imperialistične ambicije pod to pretezo."

Selassie zahteva, da Liga narodov podvzame korake, ki naj bi ustavili italijanske militaristične aktivnosti v vzhodni Afriki. V protestu naglašala, da je Italija koncentrirala veliko armado ob abesinski meji in da se pripravlja za vpad na abesinsko ozemlje.

Situacija, ki jo je ustvarila Italija v Afriki, alič oni, ki je rezultirala v vojni med Japonsko in Kitajsko zaradi Mandžurije. Kitajska vlada je takrat tudi pošiljala proteste proti Japonski Ligi narodov, katere je slednja ignorirala. Ko je Japonska dosegla svoj cilj in dobila Mandžurijo pod svojo oblast, je izstopila iz Lige narodov. Mussolini je nedavno tudi zapretil, da bo Italija izstopila iz Lige, ako se bo slednja vmešavala v njen spor z Abesinijo.

Francija in Velika Britanija, ki imata tudi kolonialne interese v Afriki, sta že namignili, da se ne bosta vmešavali v italijansko-abesinski konflikt, ker se bojita, da bo Italija uresničila svojo grožnjo in izstopila iz Lige narodov.

Trije francoski častniki ubiti

Oran, Alžirija, 21. maja. — Trije francoski vojaški častniki so se včeraj ubili, ko je letalo, v katerem so se nahajali, treščilo na zemljo v bližini Sredozemskega morja.

Sponsorji hočejo, da država pridržijo vsoto federalnega davka v svoji blagajni

RAZPRAVA V LEGISLATURI OBNOVLJENA

Springfield, Ill., 21. maja. — Governor Horner je naznanil, da bo napel vse sile, da državna legislatura odobri načrt glede zvišanje kupčijskega davka z dveh na tri odstotke. Debat o tem se bo danes obnovila in zadeni načrt bo prišel ponovno na glasovanje. Doslej je nižja zbornica glasovala že štirikrat, toda nobenkrat ni načrt prejel zadostne večine glasov, ki je potrebna za takojšnje uveljavljenje.

Opozicija, ki vodi boj proti zvišanju kupčijskega davka, je sedaj sestavila nov načrt, ki ga bo danes predložila zbornici. V smislu tega načrta naj bi vsi prebivalci Illinois, ki plačujejo federalni davek, poslali ta davek državi blagajni in ta denar naj bi se rabil za nasičevanje brezposelnih. Sponsorji pravijo, da bi na ta način dali krepko zaščito H. L. Hopkinsu, načelniku federalne reliefne administracije, ki je odklonil nadaljnjo podporo iz federalnega sklada za oskrbo illinoiskih revežev, dokler legislatura ne odobri zvišanje kupčijskega davka.

Clinton Searle in Thomas P. Gunning, voditelja opozicije, poudarjata, da se denar, ki ga morajo plačevati illinoiski davkoplačevalci, ne bi smel stekati v federalno blagajno, dokler država ne dobi svojega deleža iz deferalnega reliefnega fonda. Druge države, ki prispevajo veliko manj v federalno blagajno kakor Illinois, še vedno prejemajo federalno podporo, dočim je bila Illinoisu odtegnjena. Oba sta obdolžila Hopkinsa diskriminacije, češ, da gre denar, ki ga prispeva prebivalstvo Illinois, v federalno blagajno, za nasičevanje bednih v drugih državah.

Stavka tekstilcev v Clevelandu

Cleveland, O., 21. maja.—Včeraj je izbruhnila stavka v tovarni Industrial Rayon korporacije, ki je rezultirala v ustavitvi obrata. Unijski uradniki pravijo, da je v stavki zavolevanih okrog tisoč delavcev. Takoj prvi dan je prišlo do praske, ko so stavkarji in njih simpatizirali skušali preprečiti privatnemu detektivu vstop v tovarno. Detektiv je vseeno izsilil vstop, ko so pričeli metati plinske bombe med množico in jo tako prisilili na umik. Družba je dobila nekaj stavkove kazov, ki jih drži v tovarni. I-mela je težave, ker jim ni mogla dostaviti živil, ker so stavkarji okupirali ozemlje okrog tovarne, zato je najela nekega letalca, ki je vrzel živila z letala na dvorišče, katerega so stavkoki hitro pobrali in se nato spet umaknili v tovarno.

Naciji izgnali švicarskega reporterja

Berlin, 21. maja. — Avtorite-te so odredile, da mora Eduard Behrens, berlinski poročevalec lista "National Zeitung", ki izhaja v Bazelu, Švica, zapustiti Nemčijo v 24 urah. Behrens se je zameril nacijem zaradi poročil, ki jih je pošiljal svojemu listu. Berlinska vlada je hotela že enkrat prej izgnati reporterja, toda zanj se je zavzela Zveza tujezemskih poročevalcev in tako je Behrens ostal.

Tenth Anniversary of English-Speaking Lodges

Every Lodge should Enroll in Campaign; Prompt Action is Essential to Push Forward Our Membership Drive

This year marks the tenth year since the first English-Speaking Lodge of our Society was organized. This anniversary is an important event and must be respected as such and observed by our members, especially by the members of our English-Speaking Lodges of the Slovene National Benefit Society.

The new campaign which was decreed by the Supreme board has not yet stirred up as much interest as was anticipated among our youth, in spite of the cash awards which have been designated for agitators, namely \$1.00 for every new acquired member between 16 and 35 years of age procured for the Adult department, and 50c for members admitted into the Juvenile department; the Society also pays medical examination fee up to 50c.

Besides giving the aforesaid awards, it must be remembered, that our Society is also an organization of principles for the interests of the workers, a fact which an agitator should not forget to mention. It has often been apparent that our youth is not interested in principles, but merely in material gain. However, friends, if you want an assured existence, this is an important question which must be heeded.

This depression has shown that fraternal co-operative benefit organizations are more secure than private, and that many private insurance companies with seemingly larger assets than the average fraternal society, have failed. Private insurance corporations are primarily founded for the purpose of profit to the individual whereas fraternal organizations are founded for the benefits, protection and interests of their members.

I appeal to you, in whom lies the future of our Society, that if you desire to see this workers' benefit organization live and conduct its business as successfully in the future as it has in the past, get to work now and agitate among the youth, just as the pioneers of our Society have done since it was founded and as they are still doing to the present day. There is now a better field for agitation for fraternal benefit insurance than there has been for many years, because people are beginning to discover that privately owned insurance companies have no future.

Upon YOU it depends how you are going to celebrate the Tenth Anniversary of the founding of English-Speaking Lodges of the SNPJ, and upon YOU depends also to a great extent, the PROGRESS of the SNPJ.

Relieving the Jobless

In a report to the U. S. Senate, FERA Administrator Hopkins declares that "There are states where the stoppage of Federal funds as a means of forcing officials to do the duty would have no other result than to reduce the people on the relief rolls to starvation." The desperate relief crisis in Illinois graphically illustrates this.

What is happening is that relief in a number of states has been taken over by the FERA and other states are likely to transfer the job of relieving hunger to that Federal relief agency. It is estimated that 2,500,000 persons have been taken from relief rolls and given work-relief jobs and more are to be employed as the work-relief program develops. It is also estimated that the states contributed about \$200,000,000 less to relief last year than was expected. In any event, the relief problem becomes more grave.

The work-relief program is another effort to "prime the pump" in the hope that the wages paid and the materials needed to carry on various public works projects will so stimulate industrial activity that it will continue without further government nursing. If the stimulant fails, then what? More government borrowing to supply more stimulant. But, as we have said before, there is a limit beyond which borrowing must be restricted. What then? This question is giving the experts the shivers. They drift and hope, hope and drift, remembering the words of the Bourbon King, "after us the deluge."—James Oneal.

Patents and Social Change

Early this month the Patent Office issued its two-millionth patent, the first having been issued in 1791. In the forty-five years from 1866 to 1911 alone there were a million patents issued. This period witnessed the birth of capitalist production, its development through its individualist phase, and also into the stage of corporation and merger capitalism. That is to say, within less than a half-century capitalism made gigantic strides in this country, developing at a faster tempo than in any other nation, and today this giant form of production is stricken.

The enormous number of patents issued indicates the fertile ideas which an unrestricted capitalism fostered in this country, as most of the patents are related to production, distribution or exchange in one form or another. If only ideas for the mastery of capitalism for human welfare had kept pace with patent ideas, the workers would have more power than they have today.—T.N.L.

The Chain Craze

Have you come into contact with the chain route to prosperity? Not the chain gang but the chain letter? We have received ours. Not the "send-a-dime" chain but the "send-a-quarter" chain which comes "From One Who Wishes You A Lot Of Money" and who reaches us through the "Prosperity Club." But just as we were ready to be promoted into the rich class, Solicitor Crowley of the Post Office Department rules that prosperity by the chain route is a "lottery" and a "fraud" and we are out of luck. And now we continue to be depressed by the depression.

It is curious how this craze has spread and the faith many people have in it as a way out of the depression. In Denver alone it is reported that a normal Saturday mail of 90,000 pieces of first-class mail had increased to 285,000 pieces. Credulity may yet inspire organization of a chain party to abolish the depression.—New Leader.
