ITALIJA UTRJUJE OBREZNA MESTA

London, 14. apr.—Vodilni člani britskega kabineta so se vrnili s počitnic v London, kjer bodo danes imeli izredno sejo, na kateri bodo formirali nove smernice v zvezi z italijansko-abesinsko vojno. Zunanji minister Eden, ki je dosegel iz Zeneve sinodi, bo vprašal za nadaljnje instrukcije, kakšno stališče naj zavzame, če se bodo pogajanja glede končanja afriške vojne, ki jih vodi Liga narodov, izjavil.

Člani britskega kabineta imajo pred seboj težak problem. Sankcije, ki jih izvaja Liga narodov, so sicer omajale ekonomsko strukturo Italije, niso pa preprečile italijanskih zmag v Afriki. Poostreitev sankcij, prepoved pošiljanja olja v fašistično državo, kar bi Mussolini smatral za "sovražni čin", bi bila po mnenju angleških državnikov dvomljive vrednosti. Gotovo tudi ni, da bi odbor triajstorce Lige narodov podpril oltine sankcije, katere je Anglija v načelu odobrila.

Nekateri angleški časopisi argumentirajo, da edino militaristične sankcije lahko prisilijo Mussolinija na kapitulacijo, te pa morajo podpreti vse v Ligiji narodov včlanjene države, druge ne bodo učinkovite.

Da li bo Edan dobil instrukcije, naj na prihodnji seji Lige narodov pritiska, da ta razglasí militaristične sankcije proti Italiji, v tem momentu ni znano. Nič ne verjame, da bi Francija odobrila tako akcijo in posledica bi bila postlabšanje odnosov med njo in Anglijo.

Pariz, 14. apr.—Meitem, ko italijanska armada osvaja novo koso abesinskega ozemlja in se bliža dan, ko bo Mussolini zahteval vso Abesinijo kot kolonijo, ki jo je podjarmil z oboroženo silo, je Italija zapovedala z militarističnimi pripravami doma, ker sluti, da ji bo Velika Britanija skušala izigrati sadove italijanskih zmag v Afriki.

Italija je prepričana, da bo prej ali slej prišlo do preizkušnje, kdo naj kontrolira Sredozemsko morje — ona ali Anglija. Fašistična država shuti, da je konflikt neizbežen in je že začela utrjevati svoja obrežna mesta, katerim preti nevarnost napada s strani angleške vojne mornarice.

Zanesljive informacije se glase, da Italija polaga mine na več milj dolgi črti, da zaščiti svoja pristanišča pred možnim napadom. Ta pristanišča so Neapelj, Genova, Palermo, Ostia in Messina. V zadnjem času je zgradila utrdbe za težke topove iz vseh obrežnih mest.

Rim, 14. apr.—Fašistični časopisi je včeraj objavilo poročila z afriške fronte, da so prve italijanske armade na mesto okupirale ozemlje v bližini mesta Desje, abesinske trdnjave, ki je bila pred nekaj dnevi še glavnost cesarja Selassieja. Druga italijanska kolona je zasedla polotok Gorgora, ozemlje na obrežju jezera Tana, ki je izvir reke Nil, katera zlagata z vodo angleški Sudan in Egipt.

(Z okupacijo tega ozemlja so italijanske čete pričele v direktni stike z angleškimi. Britska carinska postaja je na drugi strani Gattabata, kjer je tudi letališče, za angleške aeroplane. Potok, ki je sedaj suh, deli mesto v dve polovici. Na vzhodni strani je abesinska carinska postaja, katero so Italijani zasedli, na zapadni pa angleška. Preko tega ozemlja je Abesinija dobivala živila in bojni material iz britskega Sudana.)

Addis Ababa, 14. apr.—Sedem italijanskih vojaških letalcev se je včeraj pojavilo nad abesinsko prestolico in povzročili veliko paniko med prebivalstvom, dasi niso vrgli nobene bombe. Prijeteli so od severne strani in po kratkem obletu mestu so se vrnili nazaj.

Izbiranje je težko, ker Whitaker, branitelj otožencev, vprašuje vsakega izbranca, če je čital ali slišal v radiu govor Normana Thomasa, socialističnega voditelja. Thomas je organiziral odbor za obrambo civilnih pravic in Tampi in Whitaker smatra ta odbor kot "grdo zaroto proti lojalnim državljanom" Tampe.

Družavni pravnik Rex Farrow je v neprestanem besednjem spopadu z Whitakerjem zaradi njegovega postopanja v igranju s predosodiči zoper socialistike, kateri enostavno meša komunisti. Sodnik Dewell je dovolil Whitakerju, da lahko izrablja Thomasove govore, da si je pripomnil, da Norman Thomas ni pred sodiščem.

Federalna vlada mu je poklonila \$50,000

Washington, D. C.—(FP)—Thomas D. Campbell, "kralj pšenice", je dobil od federalne ustanove AAA \$50,000, ker ni posejal več akrov zemlje s pšenico.

To je prišlo na dan na konferenci, katero je imel notranji tajnik Harold I. Ickes s časopisnim poročevalci.

Campbell je vzel v najem 25.000 akrov indijanske rezervacije v Montani, dve tretjini od federalnega biroja in eno direktorjevo na podlagi eksperimentov v kolegiju Harvardu, ki se docela ujema s prejšnjimi doganjaji znanstvenikov glede električne lastnosti življenja. Novo odkritje je, da drobni delci proteina — takozvane molekule — v človeškem telesu in ostalih živih organizmih proizvajajo električno silo iz sebe. Ta električna sila je ravnotežna, to je pozitivna in negativna.

Prej so znanstveniki mislili, da so molekule živih teles električno neutralne, a to odkritje v Harvardu je podrobno nujno. Po tem odkritju je vsaka molekula (molekula je skupina dveh ali več atomov) elektromagnet.

Interveniral je so razne delavke v liberalne skupine in tudi zvezni delavski odbor, toda vse zmanjšali. Consumers Research se je zatekla k razbijanju stavke. Odlok delavskega odbora, da mora vrniti delo radi unijskih aktivnosti odpuščenim uslužencem, je ignorirala.

Italijanka spravi moža v zapor z obdolžitvi- jo, da je žalil diktatorja

London, 14. apr.—Giovanni Giglio, kateri je bil poročevalec delavskoga lista "Daily Herald" v Rimu sedemnajst let in je bil zadnji teden izgnan iz Italije, je objavil v svojem listu članek, v katerem pravi:

"Italijani kot celota so silno nezadovoljni z Mussolinijevim režimom, ki jih je potisnil v vojno, od katere ne morejo prilagovati nobenim koristim. Oni vedo, da bo dežela popolnoma obubožana ne glede na to, kako se vojna konča — z zmago ali porazom — toda ljudje morajo močati. Vsakodob, ki v krogu svoje družine izreče mnenje, da je Mussolini blazen, je v nevarnosti, da ga postavijo pred izjemni fašistični tribunal za začito države. To pomeni najmanj deset let v zaprtju."

"Zgodilo se je že, da so se žene iznebile svojih mož, ko so povedale policiji, da so govorili zanikanje o Mussoliniju. Temu je sledila aretacija in potem odsodba v zapor.

"Znan dejstvo je, da se je Mussolini zapletel v afriško vojno, ker se je poslabšala gospodarska situacija v Italiji pod njegovim režimom. Celo oni, ki so sprvega odobravali afriško vojno, so se prilegli zavestiti, da bo cena za Mussolinijevo pustolovčino previsoka in da bo dežela spravila v polom.

"Cene živiljenjskih potrebskih so stalno naraščajo. Olje, sladkor, kava, slanina, riba, zelenjava in sadje stanejo zdaj polovico več kakor so pred štirimi meseci."

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

Report of supervising committee is accepted as read.

Bro. Vider mentioned that the supreme medical examiner had addressed a letter to this meeting in which he expressed the wish that the provisions of the by-laws pertaining to the loss of fingers, be interpreted on the basis of medical opinion. This subject will be discussed later. This letter of the supreme medical examiner may be considered as his report.

The report of the supreme medical examiner was accepted.

Bro. Gradišek moved that a special committee be elected, to study appeals and complaints, and applications for special benefits.—The motion was seconded and unanimously approved.

Brothers Lokar, Malgai, Somrak, Cvetkovich and Ambrosich were nominated. All accepted nominations.

Bro. Zaitz moved that the aforementioned be unanimously elected. The motion was seconded and carried.

Discussion - Concerning Reports and Recommendations of the Members of the Supreme Board

Bro. Cainkar recommended that equipment for taking moving pictures be purchased. Pictures showing various activities of the Society, of our headquarters and transaction of business in va-

rious departments, with suitable explanations, would be interesting and at the same time serve as useful alive propaganda—not only because they move on the silver screen, but also because additions can be made of any interesting or important events, so that such a film would become a record of our history. He explained that the administrative committee had endorsed the idea, but that they desired the approval of the supreme board also, before acquiring the necessary equipment.

A lively discussion followed in which Bros. Olip, Godina, Terčelj, Lokar, Vider, Petrovich, Zaitz, Molek and Somrak took part. The consensus of opinion was that moving pictures are modern propaganda, in the same manner as the radio, and that we should not be too conservative in such matters. There were others who thought that we had plenty of good speakers who could do more to promote the success of the Society than could moving pictures.

Bro. Zaitz moved that the supreme board authorize the administrative committee to acquire significant and interesting films and to have them arranged in a complete moving picture, which shall then be placed at the disposal of the lodges.

Bro. Cainkar reported that the English speaking lodges wish to have Labor day proclaimed as S.N.P.J. day. This day should be celebrated by conferences, speeches, motion pictures and in various other ways. The young people already regard it as S.N.P.J. day. Bro. Cainkar recommended that this idea be approved by the supreme board.

Bro. Lokar moved that the suggestion of the English speaking lodges, namely, that Labor day be celebrated as S.N.P.J. day, be approved by the supreme board. The motion was seconded.

Bro. Petrovich made an alternative motion to the effect that supreme board instruct the administrative committee to assist the English speaking lodges to the fullest extent at their celebration in Pennsylvania on next Labor day.—The motion was seconded.

During a lively debate different opinions were expressed: Some thought the real labor day—May Day—should be chosen for this. Others thought that this would be agreeable but not fitting. American Labor day always falls on Monday, which actually means two and a half day holiday. And others again thought that each federation should be free to select any holiday for their affairs, and that it would not be advisable for the Society to dictate that all celebrations should be held on a certain day.

Bro. Petrovich's motion was carried by a majority vote. The administrative committee will, therefore, offer the English speaking lodges their entire cooperation on the occasion of the celebration on this year's Labor day in Pennsylvania.

JUVENILE MEMBERSHIP CAMPAIGN

Bro. Vider recommended that all members of the Juvenile department be exempt from payment of two monthly assessments, in April and May. The financial standing is such as to permit this and it would serve to create great interest in our organization.

Bro. Godina moved that the assessments of the Juvenile department for April and May, 1936, be omitted.—The motion was seconded and carried.

Bro. Vider reported that the federation for Milwaukee and West Allis, and Lodge 5 had recommended an extension of the membership campaign.—Due notice was taken.
