ANNOUNCEMENT

of the

New Name and Fourth Juvenile Convention Campaign

The Supreme Board at their annual meeting on Jan. 29, 1941, decided that the Fourth Juvenile Convention will take place in Ely, Minnesota, August 8th, 9th, and 10th, 1941.

Delegates to the Fourth Juvenile Convention will be selected on the same basis as at other conventions, that is, through a National Membership Campaign which opened February 1st and closes June 30, 1941.

This Pre-Convention campaign was titled appropriately: "NEW NAME CAMPAIGN OF THE AMERICAN FRATERNAL UNION."—And the results should show how much our members are satisfied with our new name.

Any member of the Juvenile Department, who is from 12 to 18 years old is eligible to become a candidate for delegate to the Fourth Juvenile Convention. In Minnesota, the age requirement is from 10 to 18 years; and also younger juveniles provided they attend the Juvenile Convention with their father or mother, or any other adult person.

Also, members of the Adult Department will be given the privilege to attend the Fourth Juvenile Convention as Honorary Delegates.

Regular and Honorary delegates to the Juvenile Convention will be granted a free trip to the city of Ely, Minn., and return and will be paid \$3.00 per day per diems, while traveling and during their stay in Ely, Minn. Every delegate must pay his own room and board during the trip and while in Ely, Minn.

In order to become a qualified regular or Honorary delegate, each candidate or lodge member must enroll a required number of new members into the adult or juvenile departments. For each new member, and for listed insurance written, the candidate will receive "credits" in the form of "points"—as shown in the following schedule:

In order for candidates to qualify as Regular or Honorary delegates, it is necessary for them to enroll enough new members to raise the following required points to qualify from their particular state, according to the schedule below:

For members who are transferred from the Juvenile to the Adult department and are insured for \$500, no credits will be given. However, should the member being transferred accordingly be written for insurance in excess of \$500, additional credits will be given on the amount of increase.

Candidates will be given credit also for members who increase their death benefits.

Names and addresses of every candidate for Regular or Honorary Delegate must be sent to the Home Office, American Fraternal Union, Ely, Minnesota, not later than June 15th, 1941.

Every candidate must enroll new members into the lodge he or she is a member; otherwise no credits will be given.

Following respective lodge meetings in June, until the end of the campaign, power has been vested in the lodge president, lodge secretary, and lodge treasurer, to approve new-member certificates without having to call a special meeting for that purpose.

Medical examinations for Juvenile members is required only in the states of Ohio and Idaho. Other states do not require this.

Applications of new members must be in the Home Office at Ely, Minnesota, not later than July 5, 1941.

If every member takes care of this obligation—to pay dues on time—according to the by-laws, everything will be in order and it will prove to the best interests of all concerned.

Patriotism and its Relationship to AFU Key-note as Ely United Lodges Entertain Supreme Officers at Banquet

Ely, Minn. — Relationship of a vase of deep red, white and blue carnations to the flag of the United States of America, and the meaning it portrayed to the New Era of the American Fraternal Union, stirred a vibrant patriotic audience in the Ely Community Center cafeteria, Sunday, Jan. 26.

Janko N. Rogelj, our supreme president noted this as he sat in a packed banquet hall, preparing to address a gathering of the United Lodges of the AFU, who arranged this banquet as a fraternal gesture to the new Supreme Board who were gathered in Ely for the annual audit and supreme board meeting. He opened his talk pointing out this relationship and stirred the audience to the core as they took the interpretation to their hearts, inaugurating what may send our AFU soaring to new and greater heights, not only as

a true fraternal and benefit society, but also one loyal to the cause of the United States and true "Americanism."

Bro. F. E. Vranichar, our first supreme trustee spoke in English and stressed to Ely citizenry, especially the vast amount of publicity given Ely by the American Fraternal Union.

The Supreme Secretary is allowed to give candidates credit also for those members who were enrolled during the period from Jan. 1st, 1941 to Feb. 1st, 1941. The lodge secretary may notify the supreme secretary to whom points for these members may be credited.

No candidate or delegate will be allowed to transfer his or her points in favor of another candidate. Should a qualified delegate be unable to attend the Fourth Juvenile Convention because of various reasons, he or she shall be paid fare, per diems, and treated just as the other delegates who attend the convention.

For those new members accepted during our Union's New Name Campaign, regular cash premiums will not be paid until after the new members enrolled during this period will have paid five months assessment.

Supreme Board Inaugurates Drive; To Culminate in Fourth Juvenile Convention August 8-10

Qualification of candidates will be decided by the same "point" system used last year. Details will be forthcoming from the home office soon. Watch this paper for further "NEW NAME CAMPAIGN NEWS!"

Meantime, you can start right in. Start your drive immediately and see if you can't be among the first to qualify for this fine trip.

Dancing will follow the banquet. It is expected Roger Peckinpugh, new manager, would be among the honor guests and that Judge Lausche would be toastmaster.

First Tenpin Bowling meeting of Cleveland lodges was held at Four Points Tavern Wednesday, and although no definite decision resulted, it started the ball rolling toward making preliminary preparations for the tournament. Cards were mailed out for a meeting scheduled this week in Nova Doba office at which a definite action is expected.
