## Short History of Slovene Literature

By F. T. SUHADOLNIK

3. Literary Movement Among the Korosh and Stajerish

Pohlin's grammar and the typical Ljubljana dialectical phonetic writings were violently resented by the Slovenes in the outlying provinces. If his innovations were adopted the rift between lingual unity would have widened and there would have been no hope of ever achieving any semblance of unity of language.

The literary men of the provinces realized this very much and they began to counter battle. It was through some misfortune that the manuscript of Ivan Ziga Popovic, the most serious and erudite objector to the innovations, a professor at the University of Vienna and a deep student of Slovene literature.

Ozbalt Gutsmann was born at Grabstajn about the year 1727. He was educated at Krems and entered the Jesuit order at Vienna. He was later the perfect of schools, studied philosophy and theology and came to Slovenia as a traveling missionary priest. After the Suppression of the Jesuits in 1773 he was a missionary in the Korosch province until his death at Celovec in

In 1770 he published for the Korosh Slovene priests a book of meditations on the Christian Truths which could also be adopted for sermons. The meditations are written with localisms of the Celovec and show the strong influence of the Testament Slovene. In the book Gutsmann completed the Bohorcic characters by designating the use of the "S" which from his time on was not confused with the "S" as a symbol for "Z". In a special german edition he attacks Pohlin's innovations and establishes a historic and etymological foundation forms as contrasted with the phonetic forms of the words as Pohlin advocated. It

is evident that Gutsmann wrote the treatise with the knowledge of the other Slav languages. The book appeared in a new edition in 1777. This new edition is important in the development of the Slovene language for in it Gutsmann formulates the rule for the form and the use of the newly discovered locative case. The declentions were now complete in the Slovene language.

The most important publications of Gutsmann, however, were the Windische Sprachlehre \_\_ a grammar published in 177 and a dictionary, Deutsch-Windisches Worterbuch in 1789 which were published with the financial aid of Count Groess. The grammar is based on the local Korosch national dialect and the Slovene of the Gospels and the Epistles. As an appendix he added the glossary of terms and their pronounciations and another appendix of proverbs and sayings. The book lived through six editions the last published by Urban Jarnik. The dictionary is the repository of the contemporary Korosh expressions and is based on the living language and the living use of the words in the Celovec locality. Besides the grammar and the Dictionary Gutsmann also published a large Catechism for use in schools, a translation of the Epistles and Gospels, a Prayer Book and a collection of Mass Hymns.

Almost simultaneously the Stajerish attacked Pohlin through the medium of Joseph Hasl, a Jesuit who served a preacher at Ljubljana but who claimed to be a "Slovnez is Celanfkege mejfta na Shtajerfkemu". He published a series of works of Gabrie! Hevenes. In the preface he states that he uses the old characters throught his work because "the people understand it best. Though he knew the correct Slovene works he nevertheless preferred to use the foreign words "rather than the correct Slovene words which the people could understand only with great difficulty or they may not understand them at alll." Incidentally Hasl was the first Stajerish who strived to use correct and pure Slovene.

At Celje two other men worked for the ever increasing list of men who swelled the ranks of the literary roster. They were Francis Xavier Gorjup and that they advocated were along moral lines which were

Gaspar Rupnik. Gorjup wrote an explanation of the Gospels and Epistles while Rupnik published an new translation of the 'This Holy Lent Consecrated to the Suffering of Christ of Hevenes which Hasl translated for the Stajerish three years previously. Rupnik also published a book of "Catechism Hymns" in 1784. Both of the Celje authors wrote a bad Celje dialect which was very much influenced by the language of the authors of the Krajn province. In eighty years they were followed by who were famous in the lists of literary men.

In the Slovene Goriza Leopold Volkmer was very active. Born in Ljutomer in 1741. He was consecrated to the priesthood in 1,764 in the diocese of Sek and worked as a chaplian in Mali Stajer until 1808 at which time he retired. He died at St. Urban in 1816. His main work was the translations and the edition of church hymns that were to conform to the reforms of Joseph II. The first volume "Peifme k tem opravilt te fvete mefhe" appeared in 1783 and the second Der Meszgesang, Mefhna pefem was published in 1789. He also composed poems for the use of the State, which remind one very much of the poetry of similar nature that appeared from the pens of Gellert. The ideas and forms must have been copied from Gleim, Gellert and Lessing. Personally he had only one of his state songs published his others were collected and published by Anton Murko in 1835 and by Pajek in 1885.

With the Slovenes of the Coastal province the Catholic clergy also became interested in literature. Miklos Kuzmics, the pastor at St. Benedict, who published a whole series of books about 1780. The books included primers, prayer books, Hymnals, Gospels for Sundays and holydays, and a Bible history of the Old and New Testaments.
