Ho.

Resolucija zahteve od Japon-

cev le akademiko oblikuje glede  
evakuacije Mandžurije, vso od-

govornost za rešitev konflikta  
pa nalaže predlaganemu pre-

iskovalnemu komitetu, ki pa ne  
bo mogel pogoditi o rezultatu  
svoje preiskave pred spomladjo.

Jasno je, da Liga nima nobe-

ne moći in ne more preprečiti  
Japonskem okupacije Mandžurije  
in dati zagotovila Kitajski, da  
bi kdaj dobila Mandžurijo  
nazaj. U. Ita legalni ekspert  
kitajske delegacije, zahteve, da  
komitej, ki je sestavil resolu-

cijo, uključi v resolucijo klavzulo,  
ki bo dovoljevala Japoncem pri-

rejeti gonje na banditke tople

## Koncert "Save"

Prošlo nedelje je imel pevski zbor "Save," odsek kluba št. 1 JSZ, v dvorani CSPS svoj prvi koncert v tej seziji. Zboru načeluje pevovodja Jacob Muha, ki se mu je posrečilo, da je iz raznovrstnega materiala združil dokaj zvočno skupino pevec in pevki, ki so pokazali ne le resno vojo, temveč tudi lepo stopnjo izvezbanja.

Sporod koncerta je obsegal večinoma preproste, z narodnim čustvovanjem prežete skladbe. Mešani zbor je zapele "Dani se," "Triglav," "Le pevaj" in "Svarilo." Slednja, v kateri sta nastopili kot solistki Anna Miško (soprano) in Anna Hribar (alt), je bila podana zelo efektivno in je izvala toplo odobravanje.

Po aplavzu sodeč je ta del sporeda izval največ odobravanja pri publiki. To je razumljivo. Marsikdo, ki je opazoval prizor na održu, se je spomnil na dobo, ko je kot koscev vrskal in prepeval v družbi mladih grablje, kajti prijetni vtiši iz mladosti se ne pozabijo tako hitro. Zbor, solisti in solistke, ki so nastopili v spevogri, so zadovoljivo rešili svojo nalogo. Prav simpatično sta nastopila v solospevih V. Žagar in A. Narobe, A. Medved, ki poseduje prijeten bariton, ni bil tako siguren v svojem nastopu na nedeljski prireditvi kot na prejšnjih Savinih.

Vzrok je v puhlih predsednikih in puhli ekonomski, socialni in politični filozofiji vladajočih strank, ki menijo, da socialno zavarovanje uvede "paternalizem" v vlado, to je ocetovsko skrb za ljudi, kar bi pokvarilo ali ubilo bedasto naziranje o ameriški demokraciji, da si mora ljudstvo samo pomagati, če zabrede v stisku. Na drugi strani pa vidimo, da imajo iste vladajoče stranke popoloma drugačno naziranje o industrijskem in finančnem kapitalu. Tam nočajoči čisto nič slišati o kakih demokracijah in kapital, privatni kapital, je skrbno zavarovan od vseh strani z raznimi državnimi in federalnimi zakoni in fondi; tam je paternalizem v največjem razmahu. Na primer feležniškim družbam je po federalnem zakonu zajamečen dobitek šest odstotkov od obratnega kapitala.

Ampak mnogoteni pristaši vladajočih strank — takozvani liberalci ali progressivi in razni reformisti, med katerimi, treba je priznati, so tudi nekateri cerkvenjaki raznih sekt — so spoznali hinavstvo omenjenega naziranja in danes zahtevajo socialno zavarovanje za ameriške delavce. Delavške stranke v Združenih državah zahtevajo in agitirajo za to zavarovanje že trideset let. S to agitacijo so dosegli že toliko, da je v zadnjih dvajsetih letih večina držav sprejela takozvani odškodninski zakon, na podlagi katerega so delodajalci prisiljeni plačevati odškodnino za delavce, ki so ubiti pri delu ali umrli za industrijskimi boleznimi. Vsote odškodnine so povprečno nizke, nekaj je pa le. Nekaj držav je medtem tudi izboljšalo te zakone. Dalje je nekaj držav sprejelo starostno pokojnino, ki je sicer zelo revna in omejena, toda boje je to kot nič. V drugih državah se že precej let veliko razpravlja v zbornicah o raznih osnutkih starostnega zavarovanja. Led je prebit.

Edino federalna vlada se še ne gane. V kongresu je sicer bilo že precej načrtov predloženih, ki pa so bili pokopani že v odsekih. Pokojni Berger je v vseh svojih terminih predložil načrte socialnega zavarovanja, seveda zmanj. Bil je sam in pritisnjal zunaj, da je bil slab. Vendar bi bilo federalno zavarovanje te vrste najboljše in najefektnejše, ker bi enako veljalo za vse države in bi koristilo delavcem vse republike. Enoten federalni zakon, ki bi objel industrijske bolezni in smrtni, starost, trajno in nemoglost in brezposelnost, bi bil najboljši.

Novi kongres, ki se otvoril prihodnji pondeljek, se morda zgane. Pritisak vseh organiziranih sil za socialno zavarovanje je baš danes tako velik in močan, da je nekoliko upanje na zmago. V novem kongresu je večje število progressivcev in reformistov. Niso zanesljivi; z nekaterimi plati so celo nazadnjaki. Kljub temu je med njimi nekaj takih, ki imajo smisel za socialno zavarovanje, vsač za skromen poskus. Psihološki moment je danes tak, da bi močan pritisak od zunaj in dober nastop v zbornici strl opozicijo.

Mnogi reformisti pripravljajo federalno zavarovanje proti brezposelnosti. Te dni je v Washingtonu konferenca odbora, ki sestavlja nekak program za kongres v ta namen. V tem odboru so zastopani pristaši socialnega zavarovanja brez razlike strank in prepričanj. Zastopani so tudi socialisti po Normanu Thomasu. Odbor bo vodil veliko agitacijo med kongresniki in senatorji za sprejetje svojega programa. Odbor pa potrebuje moralno podprtvo vsega delavstva v Ameriki, aka hoče uspeti. Vse delavške organizacije morajo stati za njim.

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

### Editorial Comments

#### Campaign Results

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# Can Business Acquire Social Conscience?

(Continued from last week.)

During the last year I talked with dozens of corporation officials in Eastern states, a few of whom were personally very much distressed by the unemployment situation, especially during the winter months, and conscience-stricken, were contributing liberally to the various emergency relief funds, while their organizations were cutting wages and discharging more employees.

"But," I said to one of them, pre-tending naivete, "couldn't you as a big shot in your company use your influence and change the policy pertaining to labor in your employ?"

He answered, impatiently: "My influence in our company, like the influence of most corporation presidents, is limited. I can't do much. I can suggest, yea, but a suggestion which goes contrary to long-established policy or tradition always encounters strong opposition. We have a board of directors which decides on matters of policy. Most of our directors are elderly men. Such a change in our labor policy as you suggest would immediately strike them as radical, and they are conservative men with set mental processes. Do you see what I mean? This is true of our company, which I think is a typical one. I, as president, and Mr. B., as general manager, can be progressive only in such matters as installing new machinery and new methods, whereby our overhead is cut. We can be radical only when all our directors and our shareholders can see at a glance that what we propose is sound business, that is, immediately profitable. . . . I know what you mean, but 'stabilizing' our particular industry, I very much fear, would cause a row in our company. I doubt if I or anyone else could convince our directors that guaranteeing all-year employment to our people would be good business.

## The "Intelligent" Employer

But the average employer seems incapable even of grasping and discussing the idea of industrial stabilization. He is usually a college graduate, but has no developed social ideas. He is solely a business man. He is keenly alert and opportunistic in keeping up-to-date with "progressive business methods" (most of which operate to reduce employment), but ponderously tenacious when business touches on anything outside of business. He is a hard worker and good at routines, congenitally eager to have people look up to him and to keep on the good side of his economic superiors. He is anxious to convince you of his own importance in the business he happens to be in; he calls himself an executive but, to far as I have been able to detect, hasn't the faintest idea where he and his enterprise are headed.

Last fall I spoke with an executive who had just laid off 600 men and reduced the wages of the remaining 700. I reminded him of President Hoover's request to industry in November, 1929." "That's all very well," he said to me angrily. "Mr. Hoover can talk. We have to protect our stockholders," he emphasized. "Besides, why should we wait up our 1928 payroll, when other industries are reducing their right and left, both by discharging men and wage-cuts?"

And, incredible as it may seem, I have met, or I know of, "executives" who deal with immense resources, millions of dollars and thousands of men, and whose only conception of the current depression is

Harmarville, Pa.—In primeval days the occasional lack of material necessities conducive to the comforts of life was probably attributed by our ancestors as acts of Providence, but in this modern era of inventions and mechanization we cannot be misled to believe that it isn't due to some human element within our own sphere.

A review of history reveals periodic slumps and the resulting turnover among the reigning powers since the beginning of civilization. In the earliest period it was merely a matter of one tribe rebelling against the aggression of another, and then gradually broadening in scope until we see one nation pitted against another for the spoils of war (new territory, etc.) which is a spontaneous outcome for the victor and its distribution among the governing body or lords, and thus we see the rise and fall of civilization in its various stages via the Spaniards, Romans, Greeks, French and we may view its deterioration under the capitalist regime of today.

To launch and promote the Modern Industrialization required a greater diffusion of knowledge, thereby ex-

panding the scope of the Educators until finally it was within the grasp of all; and so we see a gradual rise of the laboring class in politics and social standing. As a reaction to mergers, affiliations and the consequent centralization of power financially and politically, we note the gradual termination of individual initiative and enterprise.

To rise politically required unity, therefore many fraternities were initiated and since the laboring class constitute the bulk membership in these lodges it requires little thought to see why lodges are linked in the outcome of politics, since politics should really act as a governor to business. The Sherman Anti-trust Act was drafted by men with great foresight, but today industries overrule it and we wonder what law is and its extensiveness.
