Napredek SNPJ v jubilejnem letu

Dne 20. januarja je začel zborovati v Chicagu glavni odbor SNPJ. Zborovanje bo trajalo najbrž tri ali štiri dni. Iz poročil gl. odbornikov, ki so jih podali na prvi seji, je razviden lep napredek jednote zadnjega pol leta in v preteklem letu sploh.

Iz poročil sledeči izdružki:

V letu 1929 je stopilo v jednote 6716 odraslih in otrok (4478 odraslih in 2243 otrok) v obeh oddelkih. V tem času je umrlo 414 članov in 1171 je bilo izločenih; čisti napredek na članstvu je torej 1888 članov. Jednota je štela 31. decembra 62,130 članov v obeh oddelkih. Istočasno je bilo ustanovljenih 25 novih društev. Samo v zadnji polovici leta je bilo ustanovljenih 28 novih društev.

SNPJ je sporadno napredovala tudi na premoženju. Finančni napredek v zadnjih šestih mesecih znaša \$291,332.22, v celotnem letu pa \$416,354.27. Dne 31. decembra 1929 je imela SNPJ \$4,174,584.21 premoženja.

Dne 1. julija 1929 je začela jednota po sklepu zadnje konvencije posojevati denar tudi svojim članom na zemljišča in poslopja. V prvih šestih mesecih znašajo okrog \$10,000.

Zadnjega pol leta je jednota plačala za 336 operacij članov. Največ operacij je bilo na slepiču, namreč 136; nato je bilo 40 operacij za hernijo.

Reorganiziranje mladinskega oddelka

Br. predsednik Cainkar in br. tajnik Vider sta priporočala, da se radikalno reorganizira mladinski oddelki. Sprajeti je treba nova pravila. Zavarovalnica se mora zvišati po novi državni lestvici in assessment se porazdeli v tri starostne grupe.

Federacija jugoslovanskih podpornih organizacij

Br. Cainkar je poročal, da so bili v smislu resolucije 9. redne konvencije storjeni prvi koraki za federacijo jugoslovanskih podpornih organizacij v Ameriki. Povabljeni so bile vse jednote, zveze in zajednice, naj izvolijo zastopnike za skupno konferenco.

Dozlej sta se odzvali le Hrvatska Zajednica in Jugoslovanska podpornica zveza Sloga. Društvo sv. Družine v Jolietu je odgovorilo, da predloži stvar gl. odboru, ki ima sejo ta mesec. Druge organizacije še niso odgovorile.

Široko polje v Kanadi

SNPJ je po hudem boju in težkah dobila poslovnicu od dominionske vlade v Kanadi, da lahko organizira svoja društva in pridobiva nove člane tamkaj. Zdej bo treba še iskati poslovnicu v nekaterih provincah. Provinces Ontario jo je že dala. Predno smo imeli poslovnicu, so nam delali v Kanadi velike ovire; pri nekem našem društvu so celo a-retirali društvene odbornike. Ta ovira je zdaj odstranjena in Kanada nam nudi široko polje za organiziranje jugoslovanskih imigrantov v naša društva.

"Mrtvec" razbil krsto in pobegnil

Queretaro, Mehika. — Pogrebništvu in ljudem, ki so spremljali Jose Lazara na pokopališče, da ga pokopajo, se je polastila panika, ko je "mrtvec" razbil krsto, skočil iz nje in pobegnil v trenutku, ko je imelo njegovo truplo biti položeno v grob. Njegovi prijatelji so bežali na vse strani in v svoji paniki so padali čez grobove in spomenike. — Lazara je popeljal bodaj in ko je ležal v nezavesti, ga je zdravnik proglasil za mrtvega.

Novo zdravilo proti raku

Dva zdravila v San Franciscu se upajo postati zdravila za vse vrste raka

San Francisco, Cal. — Dr. Walter Bernard Coffey in John D. Humber, eminentna kirurga v tujaknjem Southern Pacific General Hospitalu, sta odkrila nov serum proti raku in sploh izrastkom divjega mesa. Serum je izločeno iz posebne porcije ovcje adrenalne žleze in ko se injicira (vbrizga) v bolnikovo telo, je tako močan, da uniči vse izrastle divjega mesa.

Zdravnika izjavljata, da injekcija ni potrebna direktno tam, kjer je rak, kajti serum sam najde rambolno mesto; tudi na površje nobenih slabih posledic kot to dela radij, ki povzroči otekline, opelino in izgošče bolečin. Serum pomori le divje meso in se ne dotakne zdravih in normalnih stani.

Zdravniki avtoritete, ki so zvedo preiskale pravijo, da je treba počakati še na rasne preizkušnje, vendar pa imajo veliko upanje.

Prenapolnjeno jetnišnice v državi Washington

V njih se nahaja še mnogo irlev razredne justice

Seattle, Wash. — (F. P.) — Državna jetnišnica v Walla Walli in državna pobiljevalnica v Monroviu sta prenapolnjeni s jetniki. Asociacija za reforme v kaznilnicah je baš te dni poslala v javnost poročilo o strašnih razmerah, v katerih žive jetniki v teh kaznilnicah. V celicah, ki so bile zgrajene za dve osebi, stanujejo stiri ali celo pet jetnikov. Za 25% kamencev ni dela in morajo prečepati 24 ur dnevno v nespremenjenih celicah. Jetniški nadzorniki in čuvaji v teh kaznilnicah so znani po svoji surovosti, ki jo stresa nad kamence.

V kaznilnici v Walla Walli se nahaja mnogo jetnikov, ki so bili vrženi v ječo radi svojih aktivnosti v delavskem gibanju. Med njimi je osem irlev razredne justice, ki so bile obsojene na več let ječe na obtožbo, da so sodelovali pri bombnem napadu v Centraliji, ko se je vršil pohod militaristov, v katerem so demonstrirali za vojno pripravljenost.

Unijaki uradniki v Kentuckiji

Madisonville, Ky. — W. D. Duncan, predsednik 23. distrikta rudarske unije, je te dni prišel v to mesto s tremi unijaki organizatorji, da preiščejo razmere na premogovnem polju v tej državi in da vzbudijo zanimanje med rudarji za ustanovitev rudarske unije.

Čikanski vlak se prevrnil v graben

Birmingham, Ala. — Vlak Louisville & Nashville proge, namenjen v Chicagu, se je v pondeljek zvečer prevrnil v graben 22 milj od Birminghama. Dva potnika sta bila ubita in 25 do 40 ranjenih.

MORNARIČNA KONFERENCA V LONDONU

Med udeleženci veljalami so velike razlike v zahtevah

London, 21. jan. — Konferenca Združenih držav, Velike Britanije, Francije, Italije in Japonske za smanjšanje bojnih mornaric je bila formalno odprta danes predpoldne v galeriji dvorane lordovske zbornice v Londonu. Konferenco je otvoril kralj George s prečitanim nagovorom in nato so se vrstile govornice vseh vodilnih delegatov. Prvi dan zasiedanja je potekal brez malega med samimi govori.

Včeraj je bila predkonferenca, na kateri so sprajeli dnevni red. Sinoči je bil ceremonijalen banket v hotelu Savoy, pri katerem je bilo a delegatov vred 600 gostov. Bilo je veliko govorjenja. Državni tajnik Stimson, vodja ameriške delegacije, je rekel, da želja Američanov je, da ta konferenca odpravi vse tajnosti in tekmovalnja med narodni glede pomorskih bojnih sil.

Amerika in Anglija stojita najbližje glede programa redukcije. Obe zahtevata pariteto v krizirskih in odpravi podmornikov. Realizacija se le glede velikosti bojnih ladij ali drednatk. Anglija zahteva, da se drednatke popolnoma odpravijo, Amerika pa meni, da bi se gradnja teh ladij ustavila za pet let.

Francija hoče imeti večjo mornarico in je proti odpravi podmornikov. Noče paritete s Italijo.

Italija zahteva pariteto s Francijo in se strinja s Anglijo in Ameriko, da se podmorniki odpravijo.

Japonska zahteva v razmerju s Ameriko in Anglijo večjo mornarico.

"Slovenski tednik" iz Buenos Airesa, Argentina, poroča, da je parnik 8. decembra spet pripeljal 240 Slovencev iz Primorja v Argentino. Same mlade moči. Največ jih je prišlo iz krajev St. Peter in Postojne. Iz ene same male vasice Bače jih je prišlo 16.

Bojak Ivan Balar se je težko pobli, ko je pri delu padel s stranske skladišča v Buenos Airesu. Ponesrečje se je tudi Anton Hvalič, doma iz Črnič v Vipavski dolini. Padel je v voza, s katerim je prevažal pivo.

Radio povzročil umor

Pottsville, Pa. — Peter Jurček v bližnji naselbini Primrose je bil 20. t. m. ustreljen radi tega, ker je pustil svoj radio i-grati pozno zvečer. Michael Silas, ki stanuje v drugi polovici hiše, je ob pol enajstih zvečer tolkel na steno, ko je Jurčkov radio i-gral poskočne komade. Ker se Jurček ni zmenil za trkanje, je nekaj hipov kasneje stopil Silas v njegovo stanovanje s puško v roki in ga ustrelil.

Mestni uslužbenci izvojevali 44 ur dela v tednu

Seattle, Wash. — Mestni uslužbenci, izvenšani gasilcev in policajev, so izvojevali 44 ur dela v tednu in boljše delovne razmere. Agencijo za skrajšanje delovnih ur je vodil centralni delavski svet. Ta pridobitev bo dobro vplivala na delavce, ki so uspešni pri privatnih družbah in med katerimi se je že pojavila zahteva za skrajšanje delovnika.

Šerif in njegovi pomočniki obtoženi kršitve prohibicije

Galveston, Tex., 20. jan. — Šerif okraja Fort Bend H. W. Collins in štirje njegovi deputiji so bili včeraj aretirani na obtožbo, da so kršili prohibicijski zakon. V zvezi so bili s butlegarji, ki so zalagali okraj z opojno pijačo.

Delavska federacija zahteva registracijo inozemcev

St. Petersburg, Fla. — Eksekutiva Ameriške delavske federacije je na svoji seji zadnji teden odobrila zahtevo tajnika delavskega departamenta Davisa za registracijo vseh inozemcev v Združenih državah. Predsednik Green je pojasnil, da je to "potrebno prvič radi tega, da pride boljše kontrola glede števila brezposelnih delavcev in drugih, da se prepreči nepostavno dohajanje inozemcev v to deželo." Mnogi napredni delavski voditelji so proti temu, ker bi to bil nov sistem špijonaže proti tujerodnim delavcem.

Stavka farmških delavcev

Aretacije na dnevnem redu. Oblasti groze s deportacijo

El Centro, Cal. — (F. P.) — "Ako ste vi zagovornik teh podgan, bi bilo potrebno, da vas zapro," je dejal šerif Imperial okraja Leo Gallagherju iz Los Angelesa, ki je prišel v okrajno jetnišnico, da izpoluje oprostitve delavcev, ki so bili vrženi v ječo radi aktivnosti v stavki poljedelskih delavcev. Štirje od jetnikov, ki jih je Gallagher našel v ječi, so bili pretepeni od šerifovih pomagačev, ker so se upirali aretaciji.

Stavkarji so večinoma Mehikanci, Japonci in nekaj Amerikancev. Mehikiški konsul je prišel posredovati med svojimi rojaki in jih nagovarja, naj se vrnejo na delo.

Kakor hitro je bila napovedana stavka, so oblasti pričele s nasiljem. Zastopnica Mednarodne delavske obrambe Ida Rothman je bila aretirana, ker se je zavzela za preveč stavkarjev. Zvezni naseljeniški urad je prišel s zasilaševanjem tujcemskih delavcev in grozi s deportacijo.

Stavkarji zahtevajo 50c na uro in osemurno delo. Otrokom, ki še niso dosegli 16 let, naj se delo prepove, za vse druge delavce, moške in ženske, naj bo enaka plača za enako delo; v tem oziru ne sme biti nobene diskriminacije. V stavki je prizadejih tisoč petsto delavcev.

Skupne reparacije

Francija in Anglija pomirili malo entento in Madžare

Haug, Holandija, 21. jan. — Delegatje tiristvenih in zadolženih dežel so včeraj podpisali protokol o plačevanju vojnih reparacij in s tem je bil Yungov reparacijski načrt sprejet. Podpisala je tudi mala ententa, ki se je tepla do zadnjega za boljše plačilne pogoje od Ogrske. Pod pritiskom Anglije in Francije so se potolažili s kompromisom. Ogrska bo začela plačevati svojim upnikom po \$3,105,000 letno leta 1943 in plačevala bo do leta 1966. Istočasno bo Avstrija plačevala \$230,000 letno. Tiristve katoliške cerkve in Habsburžanov glede zaplenjenih posestev pridejo pred mednarodno sodišče in če bodo odobrene, jih odplačajo večale iz posebnega skupnega fonda.

Nova Fordova tovarna v Nemčiji

Kolin, Nemčija. — Ford je te dni podpisal pogodbo z mestno občino za zgraditev tovarne, ki bo stala en milijon dolarjev. Arhitekt Edmund Koersen je izdelal načrt. Vsa dela bodo oddana v izvršitev lokalnim podjetjem.

Coming Into the SNPJ Fold

WITH the inauguration of our youth movement within the Slovene National Benefit Society, occurring a little over four years, many of our older members viewed the new phase with considerable scepticism, professing its inception a dead issue. Their arguments were wholly based on the common notion saturated with erroneous implications, namely, that our youth, in general, is frivolous and careless and entirely devoid of any constructive work for organization enterprises, that their principal thought centers in athletics and sports, and that the younger generation of American Slovenes surely is doomed to perdition in the fast assimilating American melting pot.

Rash conclusions would at once label our older members cherishing those contentions with unjust and erroneous charges for lack of real comprehension. But hasty verdict cannot be uttered, for they had sufficient ground to be sceptical about our life and our work with the Society. Their declaration was justified in that they have had ample examples in their own local lodges where this problem of our younger generation proved unsuccessful, where attempts were being made to enlist the junior members in lodge work. No real interest evolved from such statutes. The younger members, attaining the adult statutes in the organization, showed no interest and indeed were exhibiting total indifference towards the lodge and its functions. That indifference was being manifested everywhere, with a few honorable exceptions where those active possessed the knowledge of their parents native tongue in speech and writing.

Beginning with the new movement within the organization, this chief obstacle of indifference has been removed. Our youth throughout the organization's jurisdiction has stepped to the front with vigor and energy manifesting its willingness for real constructive and earnest work in all our major and minor settlements. And today over SIXTY local junior lodges are in existence under the banner of the Slovene National Benefit Society. This gives us ample proof that the organizers of the youth movement have grasped the proper time and the right idea which gave impetus to our youth movement in large dimensions. Having sixty English-speaking local lodges, this new movement only proves that our young people are rapidly realizing the importance and real value that is embodied in our Society. Today our young people are coming into the SNPJ fold, and their achievements in the period of four years are worthy of our recognition and full support in all of their endeavors for the interest of the members within the organization.

The Riddle of the Universe

By ERNST HAECKEL

Summarized by Vance Randolph
(Copyright by Vanguard Press.)

In accepting the Golden Rule as his highest ethical principle, the monistic philosopher not only allies himself with many of the great ethical teachers of heathen antiquity, but with the early Christian moralists as well. This apparent harmony in the matter of ethics is disturbed, however, by the fact that the Christians have embraced many other teachings which are altogether incompatible with the Golden Rule, as well as with other ethical principles associated with modern science.

The most serious error of Christian ethics is the morbid and perverse exaggeration of altruism at the expense of self-interest and self-respect. The Christian moralists have always preached forgetfulness of self, and have professed to despise self-love as a matter of principle. Every thoughtful person must see that this is as unnatural as it is impractical, for egoism is essential to self-preservation. In a very real sense, we may say that altruism itself is only a kind of enlightened selfishness. No great achievement has ever been accomplished in the absence of egoism, and we must recognize that it is only the excessive or perverse development of the egoistic impulse which is to be condemned. Such expressions as: "Love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which despitefully use you, and persecute you" are useless and utterly impossible to put into practice. A similar counsel is: "If any man will take away thy coat, let him have thy cloak also." Put this in modern language, and we have: "When some unscrupulous scoundrel has defrauded you of half your goods, give him the other half, too." Or, to translate it into the language of modern politics: "When the pious English take from you simple Germans one after another of your new and valuable colonies in Africa, let them have all the rest of your colonies also—or, best of all, give them Germany itself." Such moral teachings as this, it may be noted, are seldom quoted with reference to specific situations, and are never taken seriously by anybody. The glaring contradiction between preaching and practice is a familiar fact in every civilized Christian state.

Another unnatural turn of the Christian ethics is due to a dualistic view of the human organism. The Christian assumes that each individual is composed of two parts—a soul and a body. Since the soul is supposed to be immortal, it is regarded as of much more importance than the mortal body, and this view is responsible for the bodily weakness, lack of physical training, and personal filthiness which characterized the medieval Christian, in sharp contrast to the splendid manhood of Pagan Greece and Rome. Many of the ancient peoples made daily baths and exercises a part of their religious ritual, but the Christians paid special reverence to the man who gave no heed to his bodily welfare, but devoted his whole life to fasting and prayer. One particularly disgusting phase of this ascetic developed in the flagellants, who gloried God by abusing and scourging their own bodies.

Because of the Christian notion that man was created in the image of God, and thus is made of different stuff from all the other animals, Christianity is totally lacking in that sympathy with the lower forms of life which is accorded so prominent a place in the ethics of Buddhism and many other ancient religions. In the south of Europe in particular, where Christianity is the prevailing religion, the needless suffering inflicted upon dogs, horses, cattle and so on is frightful to behold—a melancholy contrast to the kindly treatment which these animals receive in many non-Christian countries. Very different, too, are the feelings of the monistic scientist, who regards himself as a blood relative of the lower animals, and whose physiology teaches that their organs of pain and pleasure are practically identical with his own. The false anthropism of the Christian also deprives him of the Pagan love of nature, which is the source of some of the keenest and most ennobling pleasures known to civilized man.

A much more serious defect in the Christian manner of life is due to the conviction that this life is of no great importance—a mere preparation for the eternal bliss of the next world. This view sometimes leads otherwise intelligent men to sacrifice a great portion of their earthly pleasures, and to make light of all human progress, as a matter of small moment in the sight of God. These people, in theory at least, would disregard all the accomplishments of technical science, all the pleasures of music, painting and literature—everything, in fact, which makes life endurable. The pursuit of pleasure and convenience and ease, says the Christian, is always futile and nearly always injurious. It cannot be denied that Christianity is and always has been an enemy to all humanistic ethics and to civilization in general.

The Christian attitude toward sex is another most deplorable feature. Jesus never married, and seemed to regard sexual love as a necessary evil at best; he appeared to know nothing of the refining influence of family life. He shared the Oriental idea of woman as a subordinate being, inferior to man in every way, and thought that sexual intercourse was somehow degrading or unclean. The gospels tell us very little about Christ's contact with his own family, but his treatment of his mother was certainly not characterized by any great show of filial affection. This belittlement of the joys of the home and of the wholesome pleasures of fatherhood and motherhood is anti-social in the extreme, and is opposed to the best interests of society everywhere.

Topics of the Week

"If I am designed you lord's slave by nature's law designed
Who was an independent wish ere planted
In my mind?
If not, why am I subject to his cruelty or scorn?
Or why has man the will and power to make his fellow mourn?"

Some one hundred and thirty summers have passed since Robert Burns while plowing his fields composed the above lines and since the Scotch peasantry of today are far advanced on the road to greater freedom and better conditions because of their all-mighty and successful Labor party, labor unions, co-operative societies and building and loan associations. Still, like the workers of all lands they are in a condition of economic slavery, for the master's voice and the slaves submission are still heard and seen among the highlands.

It is true that organized Capital, the master, has less power and the slave more freedom than when Robert Burns gave to the world his immortal poem. Yet a few men because of their organized wealth and capital still hold the economic power over the many millions of people and because of their right to hire and discharge and to say who can and who cannot work and as the laws and customs sanction this power, the workers have no alternate but to yield or starve to the economic whip held in the hands of the privileged few.

In school, the youth is taught rules and axioms intending to explain the contradictions and inadequacies of an outworn social system, but no knowledge is imparted to them which would prepare them to face the great problems of life. Leaving school, youth comes face to face with the great problems of getting a job, of having sufficient leisure, of receiving high

enough wages to insure a decent living, of earning enough to risk marriage, of accumulating a surplus fund in some financial institution to insure against the risks of unemployment, sickness and old age. The proper solution of these great problems has a tremendous effect on the life of every individual and in most cases it spells the difference between happiness and ruin. Our present day inadequate educational system with its teaching methods influenced by the doctrine of individualism instead of socialization, forces youth to solve these riddles of life from their own experience.

Why were independent wishes planted in your mind, if they were not put there with the purpose that you exercise all reasonable and useful means to give them expression? And as we see that economic bondage are the prison bars that prevent us from exercising and enjoying our independent desires, our problem then resolves to that of cutting the bars and set our souls free. Organization and education are the hammers and chisels that will remove the bars from our economic prison and enable us to enjoy the Sun, Light and Air of freedom ushered in by a new economic structure, its pillars of Justice and Square Deal to All, firmly resting upon its solid foundation of Industrial Democracy. We must build bigger and better organizations of the workers, by the workers and for the workers, which includes political, industrial, financial, co-operative and educational associations in order that the organized workers become more powerful and influential than organized capital and in order to hasten the coming of the day, which shall usher in a new order of freedom based on industrial democracy.

Initiative On Old Age Benefit

The ninth regular convention of the Slovene National Benefit Society considered the problem which has grown out of the steadily increasing number of members who, because of old age, are either barred from modern industries or otherwise unable to find gainful occupations, and who are more or less depending on the society for support. After thorough discussion of this question it passed a resolution directing the supreme board to prepare two practical plans for old age insurance of our members and submit them to referendum vote.

The supreme board went to work immediately after the adjournment of the convention. It studied various systems known as old age insurance, and after careful analysis of its effects has worked out two different plans for old age benefit of our members which are submitted herewith as motion No. 1 and motion No. 2 to be voted upon by the entire membership. In preparing these plans much consideration has been given to the economic conditions prevailing among the majority of our members and special effort was made to work out something that will answer their needs and circumstances best. Either of these two plans is practicable and would fit our circumstances well, and is, therefore, recommended for adoption.

MOTION NO. 1

The supreme board of the Slovene National Benefit Society moves that section 8, article XXII of its by-laws, which now reads as follow:

"Sec. 8. In addition to classes of insurance and funds as provided in the foregoing sections, the Society shall have a special fund to be kept entirely separate from other classes or funds, and to be known as a special benefit fund. Each member shall pay 50 cents per month into this fund as provided in Section 2, Article XXIII. The Administrative Committee may make payment from this fund when it considers necessary as in time of epidemic or natural catastrophe, and especially to members of the Society who are in dire need."
