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## AMERIŠKE ČETE SE Približale CHERBOURGU

Dve nemški armadi  
zdrobljeni v Italiji

## RUSI V OFENZIVI NA SEVERNI FRONTI

LONDON, 13. jun.—Ameriška  
pehota je okupirala Monten-  
grov, nemško vojaško trdnjav-  
o, v prodiranju proti Cherbourg-  
u, se glasi uradni komunikate. Prve  
čete so oddaljene le deset milij  
od velike francoske luke.

Radio Berlin je danes nazna-  
nil, da je bil general Marck, po-  
veljnički nemški sila na polotoku  
Cherbourg, ubit v bitki z za-  
vezniki.

London, 13. jun.—Nemško po-  
veljstvo je začelo pošiljati rezerve  
v Cherbourg potem, ko so  
ameriške čete po ljudi bitki oku-  
pirale Carentan, nacijsko voja-  
ško trdnjav. Zaveznički so po  
padcu Carentanu zabilo zagodo  
v nacijske linije in levo krilo  
nemške armade je zdaj v nevar-  
nosti uničenja.

Ameriške mobilne enote so že  
prodile do dospovedi Cherbourga.  
Prve so se približale Valo-  
gnesu, ki je oddaljen samo deset  
milij od francoskega pristanišča  
mesta. Cherbourg je zdaj  
izpostavljen zavezniškemu top-  
niškemu bombardiranju. Enote  
britiske in ameriške bojne mornar-  
ice že bruhajo izstrele na  
nemške pozicije pri Cherbourg.

Zavezniška invazijska ar-  
ma je raztegnila mostiča v Nor-  
mandiji na dolžino 60 milij in ši-  
rino do 18 milij. Operacije invazi-  
jske armade podpirajo bojna letala.  
Več tisoč britskih in ameri-  
ških bojnih letal je metalo  
bombe na nemške komunikacijske  
zveze in letališča v Franciji.

Uradni komunikat, objavljen  
danes zjutraj, pravi, da so za-  
vezniki ujeli čez 10,000 nemških  
vojakov v prvem tednu po in-  
vaziji severne Francije. Samo  
Američani so včeraj ujeli 1800  
sovražnikov pri Carentanu pred  
okupacijo tega mesta.

Neapel, Italija, 13. jun.—Dve  
nemški armadi sta bili zdrobljeni  
v Italiji, poroča glavni stan  
ameriškega generala Marka W.  
Clarka. Ameriške in britiske čete  
so zdaj prodrijo proti zapadne-  
mu italijanskemu obrežju in  
Orbetelu, ki leži 71 milij severo-  
zapadno od Rima.

Ostanki nemških vojaških  
enot, ki so izgubili večji del  
orožja in opreme, beže v smeri  
Florence. Vsi poskusi feldmar-  
šala Kesselringa, da zavre pro-  
diranje zavezniških kolon, so se  
izjavili.

London, 13. jun.—Ruske oklopne  
in pehotne kolone so po pre-  
bitju Mannerheimove linije pro-  
drile osem milij daleč ter zasedle  
Raivolo in čez 30 drugih fin-  
skih vasi in naselbin. Prve kolone  
so dosegale do točke, ki je  
oddaljena samo 40 milij od Vil-  
puri, drugega največjega fin-  
skega mesta.

Poveljnik ruske armade, ki je  
začela ofenzivo na Karelijski  
obzori nad Leningradom, je gene-  
ral Leonid A. Govorov. Cilj te  
je zdrobitev Finske, zaveznic  
nacijske Nemčije. Odporniki  
nemške armade se ruši pod ruski-  
mi udarci.

Pearl Harbor, Havaj, 13. jun.—  
Ameriški bombniki so izvršili  
nove napade na japonske mor-  
narice in letalske baze na otokih  
Timian, Saipan, Rota, Truk,  
Param, Eten, Dublon, Ponape in  
Moen. Bombe so porušile več  
vojaških objektov in zanetle  
pozare. V spopadih v zraku so  
American sestreli 38 japonskih  
strojnikov.

## Chautemps se odpovedal vodstvu

Bivši francoski  
premier izključen  
iz stranke

Washington, D. C., 13. jun.—Camille Chautemps, trikratni francoski premier, se je javno odpovedal ambiciji vodstva v novih vedenjih bodoče francoske vlade. Naglasil je, da je dal slovo politiki, zaeno pa je protestiral, kar ga je stranka radikalnih socialistov, katero je nekdaj vodil, izključila.

On je bil informiran, da je stranka na svoji seji v Alžiru iz-  
ključila tudi Georges Bonneta,

bivšega francoskega poslanika v Washingtonu in več drugih.

"Kot politik sem prestar in  
odločeno protestiram proti odlo-  
čitvi stranke radikalnih sociali-  
stov," je dejal. "Nobenega na-  
uka ne potrebujem o patriotiz-  
mu. Zdi se mi, da moji bivši  
kolegi niso seznanjeni mojimi  
aktivnostmi v Washingtonu. A-  
ko bi bili, me ne bi izključili iz  
stranke."

Chautemps je dospel v Ameri-  
ko kmalu po kapitulaciji Fran-  
cije pred Nemčijo 1. 1940. On  
trdi, da živi v Washingtonu kot  
privatni francoski državljan. V  
svoji izjavi je naglasil, da bo  
njegovo delo v Washingtonu po-  
jasnjeno po osvoboditvi Fran-  
cije. To delo je koncentrirano  
v prizadevanjih za osvoboditev  
v zavezniških obrežjih in  
zavezniško zmago.

Trdi se, da sta Chautemps in  
Bonnet vodila kampanjo proti  
generalu Charlesu de Gaullu, pred-  
sedniku francoskega narod-  
nega odbora.

New Orleans, La., 13. jun.—  
Okrog 600 delavcev je zastav-  
kal v ladjevadni Delta Ship-  
building Co. in s tem zavrl-  
il parnikov. Stavka je  
predvidljivo do konca, ki je  
oddaljena samo 40 milij od Vil-  
puri, drugega največjega fin-  
skega mesta.

## Stavka ustanila produkcijsko tankov

Protest proti disci-  
plinarni akciji

Detroit, Mich., 13. jun.—Pro-  
dukcijski tankov v tovorni Gra-  
ham-Paige Motors Corp je bila  
ustavljena zaradi stavke 4000  
delavcev. Voditelji teh so izjavili,  
da je stavka protest proti  
disciplinarni akciji proti šestim  
delavcem.

Uprava korporacije je izjavila,  
da krajevna svetna unija, katere  
člani so stavkarji, ni predložila  
nobene pritožbe in da ni mogla  
navozati stikov z voditelji unije.

Konflikt se je pričel zadnjo  
soboto, ko je okrog 400 delavcev  
odložilo orodje. Uradniki unije  
so izjavili, da so storili v znak  
proteste proti odslovitvi šestih  
delavcev. Slednji so postigli de-  
lo pred določenim časom, niso  
pa obvestili delovodijo. Prizadeti  
trdi, da so odšli domov, ko so  
dokončali devet ur dela v to-  
vorni. Pričakuje se, da bo kon-  
flikt kmalu izravnан in da se bo  
do vseh stavkarji vrnil na delo.

Nemci ne zaupajo voditeljem  
bolgarske armade, med katerimi

so mnogi naklonjeni sovjetski-  
Rusiji. Iz tega razloga propagira-  
jo ustanovitev nove politične

stranke in oborožene milice pod  
svojo kontrolo.

Milica naj bi podpirala autoritete v borbi proti  
državni sovražnini elementom.

Bolgarski lutkarski režim je v  
škripici. Lotiti se mora na loge  
reorganiziranja komunikacij in  
rekonstrukcije železniških prog,  
postaj in drugih naprav, ki so  
bile poškodovane v zavezniških  
bombnih napadih. Ministrstvo  
za promet je dobilo dodatni kredit  
in vseh šest milijonov levov  
za financiranje popravljanja železniških prog.

Bolgarski rodoljubi se upirajo  
nemški oboroženi sili. Nači-  
ski list Donau Zeitung, ki izha-  
ja v Belgradu, poroča, da je So-  
kolov, načelnik bolgarske poli-  
cije, mobiliziral posebne  
policijske oddelke za vzdržavanje  
reda v Bolgariji. Več rodo-  
ljubov je bilo nedavno arretiranih  
v Sofiji in drugih bolgarskih  
 mestih. Nekateri so bili obozo-  
ni v smrt in ustreljeni.

Rudarji naj se  
odpovedo počitnicam

Notranji tajnik Harold L. Ickes,  
ki je tudi administrator za kurio-  
rje, je apeliral na rudarje, člane  
unije United Mine Workers of  
America, naj se odpovedo počitnicam v tem letu. V svojem ape-  
lu je naglasil, da vojne indu-  
strijije potrebujejo ogromne kol-  
čine premoga, zato je treba po-  
večati produkcijo. To se bo  
zgodilo, če se rudarji odpovedo  
počitnicam.

Podpisali so ga člani kulturne skupine 10. ljubljanske brigade in izrazili globoko zahvalo Adamiču in njegovim sodelavcem v Ameriki za velik napor v prid osvobodilnega gibanja v Jugoslaviji. Dr. Nikola Mirkovič, kojega ime je omenjeno v tem pismu, je 29-letni Jugoslovan srbskega pokolenja, ki je prostovoljno pred manj kot enim letom vstopil v ameriško armado in je bil poslan v Jugoslavijo. Teden dni po datumu tega pisma je padel in žrtvoval svoje mlado življenje v boju zoper vnanje in notranje sovražnike jugoslovanskega ljudstva. Pismo se glasi:

**Dragi tovarši Adamiči!**

Že dolgo z občudovanjem zasledujemo ves Tvoj ogromni napor, ki si ga v Novem svetu zastavlji v prid naše pravične narodne in socialne borbe. Spominjam se Tvoje odlike in možate besede še izza časa Tvojega obiska v domovini, ko si bil dobro spregledal našo teda vladajočo reakcionarno klico in ji kreko povedal v brk svojo ostro sodbo. (V knjigi "The Native's Return". Opisnika.) Tu vidiš odilej se je doma veliko spremeno. Vstal je novi, mladi rod, prisia je iz za meja stiska, kakršne naš narod še ni doživel, in v njem se je prebudilo vse, kar je zdravega spalo v njem. Danes Slovenca skorajda ne bo več spoznali.

Pisec seveda predstavlja sebe kot prijatelja Anglie in Amerike in upa, da bo kot tak sprejet in se bo mogel izliveti v zasplojenem besu proti sovjetom. Pisec očvidno ne ve, da so celo nacifaštov že davno opustili vsako upanje na razdor in razkol med Moskvo, Washingtonom in Londonom... Naj bo uverjen, da je resnica že zmagala in da bo na kraju zmagala tudi pravica. Naj v tem smislu uravna svoja bočna dejana in upošteva to dobro namenjeno svarilo."

Louis Adamič je k temu pismu napravil sledenje pripomo:

I want to share this letter with my fellow South-Slavic Americans supporting the Yugoslav Liberation Movement. The letter came through Dr. Nicola Mirkovich, a young friend of mine, a Serbian (from Serbia) in U.S. military service, who was in Yugoslavia in April. On May 2nd Dr. Mirkovich was killed somewhere in a battle in which he joined the Partisans against the Nazis. Slava mu!

Iz pisma je razvidno, da naši borce v Jugoslaviji "že dolgo" zasledujejo naše delo v Ameriki, delo v prid osvobodilnega gibanja, kakor tudi delo onih, ki to gibanje omolavajojo in ga zasmehujejo. Da zaveznički podpirajo ta pokret v Jugoslaviji, je ponovno razvidno iz govorov premierja Churchillja, iz drastičnih korakov, ki jih je povzel kralj Peter in iz vesti, ki prihajajo iz Jugoslavije. Vsi oni, ki namenoma vodijo škodljivo propagando

proti temu gibanju, bodo enkrat morali dajati odgovor.

Dne 8. junija je prišla iz Washingtona naslednja novica: "Zdržene države so podvlele uradne korake, da se zaprejo jugoslovanskemu generalu Draži Mihajloviču vrata za njegovo publicitetno v Ameriki.

Državni tajnik Hull je prejel od justičnega tajnika Biddleja pismo, zahtevajoč odstranitev iz liste privilegiranih združenih narodov Milija N. Sokića, ki je registriran pri justičnem tajniku za agenta kraljeve jugoslovenske vlade in izdaja za Ameriko bulletine iz glavnega stana generala Mihajloviča.

Dolg komentar o tem ni potreben. Najbrž je justični tajnik doznan, da so novice o Mihajlovičevi borbi proti sovražniku gole izmišljotine, namenjene za propagandne svrhe in je tem enkrat napravil konec. Vesti o teh "bojih" je širil po Ameriki zlasti Fotičev Srbobran iz Pittsburgha in nekateri drugi plačani agenti. Zavezniške vojaške komisije v Jugoslaviji, v Titovem in Mihajlovičevem stanu, so pač sporočile resnico, katero označuje SANS in Združenih odborju južnoslovanskih Amerikancev že skoraj leto dni.

Citatelji Prosvete, ki prejemajo dnevnik, so gotovo z zanimanjem čitali izjave dr. Metoda Mikuša, Josipa Vidmarja, dr. Edvarda Kocbeka, dr. Josipa Rusca in dr. Marijana Breclja, ki jih je prejel SANS iz starega kraja. Nihče izmed njih ni komunist. Komikor nam je znano, so bili pred vojno pripadniki, bodisi liberalne ali ljudske (klerikalne) stranke.

Na vsakega čitatelja, ako ni torijski ali klerofaistični strankar, morajo te izjave gotovo napraviti globok vtis. Napisane niso bile za ameriške Slovence, marveč so apel, globok apel na one rojake v starem kraju, ki so napravili usodno zmoto in se znašli hote ali nehotne na strani nacifašističnih okupatorjev, v vrstah kvizlingov.

In dasi so te izjave namenjene Slovencem v rodni domovini, posebno pa slovenski duhovščini, so vendar na mestu tudi med nami v Ameriki. Prvič so na mestu vsled tega, ker nas seznanjajo z vso veličino osvobodilne borbe v rodnih krajih; drugič so na mestu, ker nam omogočajo, da si ustvarimo dokaj točno sodbo o dejanskem položaju, ki se je tam razvil pod okupatorsko oblastjo; in tretjič so na mestu radi propagande in gonjenja, ki jo je Ambrožičeva klerikalna klika pričela voditi v Ameriki proti SANSu in sploh proti osvobodilnemu gibanju v starem kraju.

Teh izjav ne mislimo porabiti (vsaj pri Prosveti ne) za kakšno gonjo proti Ambrožičevi klerikalni kliki ali onim, ki so nasedli njeni umazani, neetični in strankarski propagandi. Če bi storili kaj takega, bi se le ponizali na isti nivo politične in etične propalosti, ki jo kaže Ambrožičeva klika v vsej svoji klerikalni ali celo klerofaistični negoti. Če bi storili kaj takega, bi le ponizali in blasfemirali ono po duhu in socialnem stremljenju veliko borbo, ki jo vodi naš narod z drugimi jugoslovanskimi narodi vred v staro domovino.

Te vrstice so namenjene le kratkemu komentarju teh izjav z namenom, da poudarimo važnost in veličino te epske borbe naših bratov in sester na njih in naših rodnih tleh. Pravijo nam, da jim gradio iz urada ZOJSA predsed. V pretiravanju in demagogiji ne poznamo nobenih mej: iz vsake kolone njim neljubega gradiva napravijo dve, tri kolone. Ponosni so na svoje "duševne umotvore" in že ali celo javno pozivajo čitatelje, naj jih tudi oni hvalijo in občujejo.

Drugi se sklicujejo na "amerikanizem," nas rote, naj ne "vtikamo nosu tja, kjer nas nič ne briga," marveč se naj zanimamo le za vojaško zmago Amerike. Kakšen bo mir, to jih ne briga, ali pa v svoji neomejeni naivnosti slepo verjamejo v "pravičnost" in "modrost" zavezniške tajne diplomacije. Kdor je drugačnega mnenja, kdor slepo ne drvi za kakšnim političnim Mojzesom ali Mojzesi, komur zgodovina ni začeta knjiga, marveč se zanima za evropski in svetovni mir in celo za stari kraj, kritizira tajno diplomacijo in sejanje vzrokov za tretjo svetovno vojno, ko še drugi ni prisla do viška—kdor ne trobi v njim zverišen in zamašen rog, je po njih mnenju—"strankar" v najslabšem pomenu besede.

## The Fifth War Loan Campaign

The national goal of the Fifth War Loan drive, which started last Monday, June 12, and will close on Saturday, July 8, is 16 billion dollars. The U.S. Treasury seeks to raise this huge amount during the campaign to meet part of the cost of the present war and Victory which will follow.

Each state, county, city and town has its assigned share in the drive. For instance, the goal set for Chicago and Cook county is \$94 million dollars. Volunteer bond forces and the Treasury Department are holding a series of events designed to spur purchases to attain the national goal. Last Monday President Roosevelt headed the nation in "Civilian D-Day" ceremonies inaugurating the drive. He spoke during a one-hour radio program broadcast over the combined four major networks. Four previous national War Loan drives raised more than \$6 billion dollars, and each exceeded the amount requested.

To be sure, the amount of sixteen billion is a tremendous sum of money, yet, it is but a fraction of the huge amount of money needed by our country to bring the war to a victorious end.

The war has not yet been won, although victory is clearly in sight. Our brilliant successes in the Pacific and Mediterranean are only the beginning, as are the brilliant successes thus far achieved in the invasion of France. But as we march from one success to another, more equipment is required and more men are being drafted daily. All this costs tremendous sums of money. That's why we must lend every available dollar to the government during this "invasion drive."

This year, according to estimates, the American people will have about 50 billion dollars surplus over their regular expenditures and after taxes. A large part of this huge sum must be saved because it cannot be spent for non-existent merchandise—and certainly there is no better way to save it than by investing in government securities—in war bonds and stamps.

At this time America has one of the largest armies in the world. Among the men and women in the armed forces of our country are thousands of our Slovene boys and girls, and approximately 5,000 of them are members of the SNPJ.

Let's not fail them on the home front. Let's back them with continuous buying of war bonds and stamps. Let's go over the top in the Fifth War Loan drive even as our boys are now going over the top in France and in Italy!

Through purchase of war bonds we on the home front can convince our fighting men that we believe in the cause for which they are risking their lives on the battle fronts.

## To All Lodge Correspondents

It is well known that some of our lodges frequently include in their articles announcements relating to games of chance: drawings, raffles, bingo games, card and buncy parties. However, postal regulations prohibit publishing items covering games of chance to which an admission fee is charged, therefore, all copies of the paper in which such matter appears are nonmailable, or subject to confiscation in accordance with postal regulations.

On the other hand, we wish to make it clear that announcements of card or buncy parties where no admission fee is charged are admissible to the mails. However, matter relating to such parties where admission fee is exacted from the players, is nonmailable under the law, notwithstanding the fact that the announcement contains no reference to an admission fee.

Of course, it is difficult for us to ascertain from the sponsors in advance whether an admission fee or charge of any kind is exacted from the players. However, it is the duty of each lodge announcing such parties to clearly specify whether an admission fee is charged or not. In this way you will help safeguard our postal privileges and make it possible for the paper to be delivered on time and intact.

The cooperation of our members and lodges in this matter will be greatly appreciated. Meantime, we will continue to delete all reference to games of chance in our columns in accordance with postal regulations.

Futility prevails in our efforts to persuade some of you to attend the usual meetings. The drawing amounts to \$6 at this month's meeting—you may be the fortunate one.



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# Our Front

The 5th War Loan drive is on! During the next four weeks the people are expected to spend 16 billion bucks for Invasion Bonds.

That is the national goal—sixteen billion—to be reached by July 8. It is expected that the quota will be subscribed and even surpassed; each of the previous four drives oversubscribed the amount requested. It is estimated that approximately fifty billion dollars surplus will be in the hands of the people this year, and a large part of this money will have to be saved somewhere for the simple reason that all of it cannot be used for merchandise that does not exist. There is no better investment than government bonds, this time in Invasion Bonds. There is no shortage of bonds, and there is no ceiling on them, either.

Let us remember that our boys are giving all they've got, now! We've got to do the same. We must throw in everything we've got!

Last Saturday evening, Circle 26 gave us a delightful performance at the SNPJ hall in Chicago. In fact, it was one of the best juvenile programs ever staged at the hall.

Edward Udovich, Circle president, was the announcer throughout the program, and his lines defined the purpose and pattern of the affair. In between, were the solo numbers and duets which displayed some real talent.

Rak for the colorful costumes. Evelyn Mozina was the banjo accompanist.

### Next Convention

My suggestion, therefore, is to leave the matter of representation alone until the next convention, if at that time the delegates feel a change should be made, they will decide. Convention time, however, is a matter that should be shortened.

# MEMBERSHIP DRIVE IN MAY YIELDS 329 MEMBERS

**Mary Udovich Enters Campaign With 14 New Members.—Lodges No. 138, 381 and 559 in the Lead**

The results of the SNPJ 40th Anniversary Campaign, during the month of May, reveal a total gain of 329 members in both departments of the Society. In addition there were also a number of increases of mortuary insurance. Of the new members admitted, 179 were juveniles and 150 adults. Included in the adult group were 53 transfers from the Juvenile Department insured for \$500 or less, and 40 insured for \$1,000 or more.

The combined membership gain for the first two months of the campaign totals 620 adults and juveniles. This figure is 74 less than were enrolled in the opening two months of the Victory Campaign early in 1942, which means that there is plenty of room to spare for improvement. The percentage of lodges now participating, who have contributed one or more new members to the campaign, is approximately 38 per cent. In the past four weeks, the number of contestants has increased from 76 to 106.

**Leading the campaign for the second month in a row is JOHN ZIGMAN, Lodge 138, Strabane, Pa., who holds first place with a total of 19 new members, an increase of four over the previous month.**

After spending nearly a month and a half watching the progress of the campaign from the sidelines, MARY UDOVICH, member of Lodge 102, Chicago, Ill., finally decided to try again. We are happy to announce her entry as a contestant and, also, that her efforts in the closing weeks of May netted a gain of 14 new members and second place in standings.

You will have no trouble recalling the achievements of Sister Udovich in the previous two campaigns. She finished in the runner-up spot in the Victory Campaign with 264 new members, and then won the highest individual honors in the Juvenile 30th Anniversary Campaign last fall with 56 members. Counting the 14 credited to her in the present drive, she has a grand total of 334 new members from June 1942 to June 1944, for one of the really outstanding records of the SNPJ. In spite of the fact that this is her third consecutive campaign in as many years and is again working the same territory, it will not be surprising to find her name high among the final leaders, for Sister Udovich is a "go-getter" who doesn't know the meaning of the word "quit."

Tied for third place honors with 10 members each are MILAN MEDVESEK, Supreme Officer and member of Lodge 5, Cleveland, Ohio, and LENHART WERDINEK, Lodge 29, Thomas, W. Va. These two contestants, as well as Brother Zigman and Sister Udovich, have already qualified for special awards and honors, which will be determined finally by their respective standings at the conclusion of the campaign on November 30, 1944.

There were two prominent gains of 9 new members each in May, one by John Strumbel, member of Lodge 381, Aguilar, Colo., and the other by Lodge 393, Worcester, N. Y., the secretary of which is James Milavec. Both lodges filled their quotas. Milan Medvesek's increase of six members was next best for the month, while gains of 5 were recorded for Lodge 262, Farrell, Pa., whose secretary is Frances Gorence, and by Ursula Ambrozh, contesting for Lodges 130 and 268, a member of the Supreme Board.

**ANTON ZORNICK, Lodge 87, Herminie, Pa., who is much of the time on the road canvassing for new and old subscribers for the Prosveska and Proletiarc, is doing quite all right in the campaign. To date he has 8 members to his credit and needs only six more to reach the lodge's quota. Brother Zornick was also one of some forty or more contestants in the Juvenile Campaign who succeeded in attaining the quota. If he does it again, it will be an achievement worthy of special reward and honor.**

An interesting highlight of the present campaign is produced with the entry of John Shaffer, Secretary of Lodge 537, Crivitz, Wis. It was Brother Shaffer who wound up in a tie for second place with Leo Schweiger (584) in the Victory Campaign in the state of Wisconsin. When the final standings were reported, each had 62 members. The cancellation of both lodges is exceptionally good, being less than 5% in either case.

**Lodge 747, Milwaukee, Wis., whose secretary is Joseph Ritonik, deserves honorable mention this month for a gain of 4 new adult members, each of whom is insured for \$1,000. Likewise, Lodge 682 (J. Z. Jrs.) of Library, Pa., for its gain of 3 adults and one juvenile. Rose Podlesnik is the Secretary here, with Helen Dermottis, the President, and Frances Dermottis, the Treasurer. Joe Kolenc, Lodge 381, Aguilar, Colo., moved into a tie for fifth place with Mike Baloh, Lodge 7, Claridge, by adding 5 members to his former total of three.**

The three lodges leading the campaign on June 1 are **Lodge 138, Strabane, Pa., with 19 members; next is Lodge 381, Aguilar, Colo., with 17 members, and in third place is Lodge 559, Chicago, Ill., with 16 members.** All three are uncomfortably close to each other and not very far ahead of a dozen other lodges, who are in good position to overtake them before another month has elapsed.

**Lodge secretaries are reminded once more not to forget to fill out and enclose a CREDIT CARD with each new membership application forwarded to the main office. This is not required for all transfers from the Juvenile Department, but only those insured for more than \$500. Do not hold back membership applications, but mail them to headquarters as soon as final approval has been given by the lodge. Be sure that all questions have been answered correctly. This practice will insure prompt service in the issuance of membership certificates, and insure a more complete campaign report shortly after the close of each month.**

Pictures of several of our successful campaign contestants appear in this issue of the Prosveska. More will appear later. If your aim is to finish ten or better in the campaign, have one ready and waiting for request. Best reproductions are obtained from a portrait photograph about postcard size.

### New "Miracle" Drug Cures Shellshock

# Official Proceedings

SNPJ EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE  
Meeting of May 10

Meeting was called to order at 1 p.m., all members of the committee were present. Minutes of the previous meeting were approved as read.

President reports that no one has applied for the position of assistant editor. He also reported that he had attended the affair sponsored by Lodge 107 in St. Louis, April 30. According to his judgement, there could have been better attendance at such an important jubilee; nevertheless, he believes that moral success was achieved.

Secretary submits letter from Lodge 2 of La Salle, Illinois, which will celebrate its 41st anniversary and the 40th anniversary of the SNPJ Sept. 24; they have asked for President Vincent Cainkar as speaker and at the same time to show the SNPJ films, which is granted. Lodge 2 also suggested that the executive committee should ask the State Insurance Department to postpone our convention until after the war, due to present conditions and lack of transportation facilities. Secretary is instructed to explain to them that since the law provides that a fraternal society must hold its conventions at least once every four years, such a request would be of no avail.

Local lodges in the City of New York will jointly celebrate the 40th anniversary of the Society on Oct. 15 and they ask for Bro. Mathew Petrovich as speaker; request granted.

He also reports that he had attended the 40th anniversary celebration of the SNPJ held by Lodge 5 in Cleveland on May 7; the program was very good, and all who rendered their services in the program deserve our recognition.

Juvenile Director submits the following: The Cleveland SNPJ Athletic League asked for a \$50 appropriation for the local bowling tournament held April 15 and 16. Request approved. The Committee also approved the sum of \$150 for the Midwest bowling tournament held in Chicago May 6 and 7.

Juvenile Circle 15 of Verona, Pa., asks for financial aid for athletic activities; the committee approved \$35. Lodge 755 asks for the showing of the SNPJ films on May 14. Since Juvenile Director will be there the night before, this request was granted. Bro. Vrhovnik also reported that the affair held by Lodge 8, South Chicago, at which he represented the Society, despite the limited number of participants, was a moral success.

Treasurer reports that he attended the executive committee meeting of the United Committee of South Slavic Americans in New York on April 25, at which meeting he substituted for Ebin Kristan, president of the SANS, who is still ill. En route home he also stopped in Cleveland and attended the funeral services for the late Frane Somrak, former supreme board member of the SNPJ and SSPZ. He also spoke at the local SANS meeting, where our members are very active in the movement. The most important item at the New York meeting was the appointment of Zlatko Balokovic as acting president of the U.C.S.A. to replace President Louis Adamic, who withdrew from activity because of overwork, resulting in nervous exhaustion.

Head editor reports that according to the understanding with the executive committee he had asked Bro. Molek if he would accept the position of assistant editor, which he declined.

Applications for various benefits were approved (details in Slovene minutes).

Meeting is adjourned at 3 p.m.

## Meeting of May 24

Meeting was called to order at 1 p.m., with all members of the committee present. Minutes of the previous meeting were approved as read.

President reports that the Susnar property, Milwaukee, Wis., was finally sold and the transaction will be completed sometime next month.

He reads a letter from the federation of Westmoreland County, Pa., which will sponsor a program June 25 for the benefit of SANC and the federation. They ask Bro. Zaitz to appear at the speaker, request approved, but in case Zaitz cannot attend, Vidrich will take his place.

There has been only one application for assistant editor, Milan Medveck, under the condition that his starting salary would be \$45 per week. The committee approved the application and the amount of the starting salary, with the understanding that he would resign as a member of the auditing committee.

President further reports that the plan of the entire ceiling of the plantation was coming down and that steps were taken for protection of machines and property repairs. The committee approved his action.

Secretary submits the following:

Victor Mihovec of Lodge 124 asks for special benefit because of the amputation of one foot and funeral expenses of his late father, Jacob Mihovec. His mother is crippled and his sister must remain at home to take care of her, this leaves only one Victor Mihovec to take care of the family. The committee approved \$100 for special benefit.

Secretary of Sick Benefit Dept. presents an application for a total compensation claim submitted by

Markus Adrijan of Lodge 9, which is approved.

Juvenile Director reports that he had attended the program given by Juvenile Circle 21, Sharon, Pa., May 13, in celebration of their 5th anniversary and the 40th anniversary of the Society. On the following day he attended the banquet given by the Circle and in the evening he showed the SNPJ films. He also attended the meeting of Lodge 262. As representative of the Society at these affairs, Brother Vrhovnik reported that both were very good and that the general spirit was high and friendly.

Their latest campaign has been aimed at putting over the "Brewster-Bailey" bill, which would subject all men from 18 to 45, including 4-Fs, to compulsory conscription into industry—and into Hitlerized "labor battalions" if they refuse to take jobs where ordered.

War chieftains made desperate appeals before the Senate Military Affairs Committee for the bill, but the arguments they advanced proved so flimsy that few committee members were convinced.

As a matter of fact, interest in the measure has been so slight that Chairman Robert R. Reynolds (Dem., N. C.), announced last week that hearing would be suspended. "Further testimony would be a waste of time and money," he said.

If committee members want to vote on either the Brewster-Bailey or the more sweeping Austin-Wadsworth conscription bills, a meeting for that purpose will be called, Reynolds said. So far, there has been no demand for that, he declared.

That doesn't mean, however, the "brass hats" have given up the fight to get control of the nation's workers. One wise Senator told a representative of "Labor":

"Don't get off your guard. The 'brass hats', as you call them, are still on the job. As your paper Labor said last week, they'll still try to use the coming invasion as an argument to put over their scheme."

Senator Warren R. Austin (Rep., Vt.), a sponsor of one of the shackling bills, indicated that something like that is in the wind when he claimed "eventually the public demand will be so great that this legislation will be enacted."

But the fact is, it is becoming more apparent, week by week, the "brass hats" have exaggerated the manpower shortage as an argument for the "forced labor" legislation. Actually, cutbacks in production are growing. The Navy has already slashed its orders for fighter planes and the Army is reported to be planning to do likewise.

One of the significant developments of the week disproving the cry of lack of manpower was a "bombshell" tossed by the Labor-Management Manpower Committee in Buffalo. "Brass hats" and other Washington officials have been claiming Buffalo is an "acute labor shortage" area, but the committee, which knows the situation first hand, got up on its hind legs and declared flatly "there is no shortage."

Labor chiefs admit, however, that in many areas there is a serious problem of turnover of workers. To meet that, the War Manpower Commission, with tentative labor approval, has drafted a program for stronger "voluntary" controls than now exist to regulate job shifting among male workers.

The controls would make it harder for workers to quit existing jobs unless they move to war plants with a higher "priority" rating. Employers would be required to do all their hiring through the Employment Service, or through designated agencies, such as unions, where special arrangements for that purpose are made with the Employment Service.

Labor members of the commission's labor-management committee, to which the plan has been submitted for approval, said they would go along with it, provided that safeguards are laid down to protect workers from being induced to go to jobs having lower than prevailing among male workers.

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## Plan to Draft Workers Again Stymied; Congress Refuses to Be Stampeded by "Brass Hats"

"Brass hats" have been stymied again in their drive to steam up Congress into passing "labor draft" legislation to militarize the workers of America.

Their latest campaign has been aimed at putting over the "Brewster-Bailey" bill, which would subject all men from 18 to 45, including 4-Fs, to compulsory conscription into industry—and into Hitlerized "labor battalions" if they refuse to take jobs where ordered.

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But the fact is, it is becoming more apparent, week by week, the "brass hats" have exaggerated the manpower shortage as an argument for the "forced labor" legislation. Actually, cutbacks in production are growing. The Navy has already slashed its orders for fighter planes and the Army is reported to be planning to do likewise.

"If union people, cooperators and farmers realized what kind of problems we are going to face after the war, they would learn to get interested in each other's activities," Reuther said. "The building of strong cooperatives with the full support of labor constitutes a major part of a program of building for abundance."

We are not training people to win the peace as we are training them now to win the war, Reuther pointed out. "The time is ripe for a bigger educational program on a nationwide scale to promote cooperative growth than we have ever had before. The UAW will throw its forces into the campaign, through its Consumer Division, which is training people to set up store and housing co-ops."

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
