Slovenski naseljenici, ki smo prišli v Ameriko pred vojno, smo vsi prišli iz države Avstrije, toda samo dežele, kjer smo bili rojeni (Kranjsko, Primorsko, Goriško in del Stajerske ter Koroske), so bile naša domovina. Ne smete zamenjati naše narodnosti z kisikom, ki mu ga nuditi narava sama v zraku. V višini 6000 m pa dobre pljuče priljubljene komaj polovico toliko kisika kakor v mori višini in če bi človek napravil takšno turo brez počasne prilagoditve in brez zaloge umetne kisike, bi njegovo združje gotovo trpeč. Sa se pojavitvena slovita "gorska bolezen" je v primerno nižjih legah. Razumljivo je, da visokih legah brez prilagoditve in umetne kisike ne more opravljati kakšnega večjega dela, pri čemer pa se pomankanjanje kisika izraža toliko v slabotežji delavnosti misi, ki likor v manjši zmogljivosti možganov, ne vpliva neugodno ne samo na mišice, temveč na vse telesne in duševne funkcije. Nekemu ne užnje ekspedicije na Mount Everest se je n. pr. zgodilo, da si mahoma ni vedel več posneti, čemu je vzel prav za prav fotografijo kamero s seboj. Prilagoditev, aklimatizacija se izraža v splošnem z boljšo izbravo kisika mnogine, ki je v ozračju na razpolago, tako da se ne ustavlja niti delovanje možganov. ## Federacija za podaljšanje NRA

**Voditelji kritizirajo člane senatnega finančnega odseka**

Washington, D. C. (FP)

Izvršni uradniki Ameriške delavske federacije so posvarili kongres pred socialnimi nemiri, industrijskimi boji in stavkami, če bo sprejet resolucijo, ki jo je odobril senatni finančni komitej. Ta resolucija priporoča kongresu podaljšanje zakona obnovne same za deset mesecev, dočim federacija podpira Rooseveltovo administracijo, da se zakon podaljša za dve leti.

V pismu, ki so ga voditelji federacije naslovili Rooseveltu, pravijo, da akcija senatnega odseka pomeni opustitev administracijske obnovitvene programe, ker resolucija med drugim določa, da pravilniki ne smejo veljati za osebe in podjetja, ki so udeleženi samo v notranjedrvavni trgovini. Dalje prepoveduje določanje cen v pravilnikih v vseh industrijah razen rudniških. Ako bo zakon podaljšan v taki obliki, kakor jo je priporočil senatni odsek, bo najmanj 75 odstotkov ameriških delavcev prizadetih. Od zakona obnovne bi ostalo le okostje, senata, ki bi krila le nekatere dejavnosti, uposlene v podjetjih, ki spadajo v področje meddržavne trgovine.

### The Chamber's Hopeless Plea

Henry I. Harriman, president of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, doubt voices the hopes of most of his organization's membership and of private business in general. Harriman's plea is that, while certain "New Deal" measures are good, they should not be pressed now. He urges delay until some un-named future date in order that private business may have a chance to "recover."

If there is any argument which should meet with favorable consideration from Franklin D. Roosevelt it is the one advanced by Harriman. After all, the recovery of private business and the salvation of the private profit system are the only objectives which the "New Deal" seeks. Offering reform to Labor and relief to the millions who can not be hired by private profiteers is only a means whereby the ends of the President may be served.

However, the Chamber's plea is bound to be fruitless. What Roosevelt is doing in the way of reform is the necessary act of conforming to changed conditions. And there is a law of Nature which decrees that both individuals and nations must either adapt themselves to the material conditions which surround them or die.

What has happened is that private industry has developed to a point throughout the world where the employment of people to produce wealth for sale is no longer possible. As long as the sale and profit motive persists millions of people can be taken from idleness only by placing them upon public jobs.

In setting up a work relief program for private industry's unemployables, in providing some degree of administration patronage for and control over the organized employed and, above all, in attempting to codify industry under codes which will place production and profits within more or less definite limits, the President is making adaptations which may save the capitalist system for some time to come.

Of course private business does not like the taxation which such policies necessitate. Even less do they relish the paternalistic governmental control which Roosevelt seeks to impose upon industry. But that merely means that Roosevelt is wiser than most business leaders, not that he is less sincere in his desire to preserve the private profit system and its master-and-slave class relationships.

So far as recovery is concerned, the hopes of the Chamber of Commerce are bound to be dashed. The patient can not recover. All that can be done is to keep it alive by frequent reform operations, taxation transfusions and fascist stimulants. But capitalism is in its death throes and nothing can prevent its ultimate dissolution.

### The Abundant Life!

For the instruction and guidance of employees of a leading retail establishment in Chicago, the management in 1855 issued the following rules:

"Store must be opened from 6 a. m. to 9 p. m. the year round.

"Store must be swept; counters, base shelves and showcases dusted. Lamps trimmed; pens made; doors and windows opened; a pail of water, also a bucket of coal, brought in before breakfast (if there is time to do so) and attend to customers who call.

"Store must not be opened on the Sabbath unless necessary, and then only for a few minutes.

"The employee who is in the habit of smoking Spanish cigars, being shaved at the barber's, going to dances and other places of amusement, will surely give his employer reason to be suspicious of his integrity and honesty.

"Each employee must pay not less than \$5 per year to the church and must attend Sunday school regularly.

"Men employees are given one evening a week for courting and two if they go to prayer meeting.

"After 14 hours of work in the store, the leisure hours should be spent mostly in reading."

Contrasting these orders with practices prevailing today is an object lesson in the advancement of American workers over the years. While there is much room for improvement in the condition of those who serve the public in retail establishments, few would be willing to exchange present conditions for those indicated in the rules of conduct set out above.

And even a few controversial subjects ought to get an airing. It has been ages since any noticeable controversy ran in these pages. An exchange of opinions should prove enlightening. I'm not suggesting anarchical differences; differing opinions can be orderly.

Here's one question that can readily draw response among interested SNPJ members: The question of Supreme Board officers vested with voting right at the convention.
