Manila, 18. avg. — General MacArthur je danes ob 2:45 po- poldne naznanil, da ga je obvestila japonska vlada, da so bili izbrani odposlanci, ki bodo podpisali kapitulacijo in da odpot- jejo jutri z letalom v Manilo.

Ta beseda je prišla iz Tokia po dveh dneh izbegavanja in ko je MacArthur sporočil v Tokio, naj brez nadaljnjega odlašanja izpolnijo njegove ukaze.

MacArthur je tudi ostro prijel Hirohitija, ker so bila včeraj napadena nad Tokiem ameriška fotografična letala. Protizračne baterije so-streljale nanje in 10 japonskih bojnih letal se je za- podilo vanje. En ameriški bombnik je bil močno obstreljen, toda noben mož posadke ni bil ranjen. Toda Amerikanci so sklatili

dvoje japonskih letal. Spopad je bil 20,000 čevljev visoko v zra- ku pri belem dnevu.

General MacArthur ni določil zadnjega dneva, ko se morajo javiti k podpisu kapitulacije japonski zastopniki, toda razumeti je pa dal, da ne bo trpel nobenega zavlačevanja brez vzroka.

MacArthurjev glavni stan poroča, da so dospeli v Manilo že posebni odposlanci ameriškega vojnega oddelka, odposlanci angleškega admirala Mountbattena in zastopniki avstralske ar- made. Ti bodo navzoči pri kapitulaciji Japoncev.

Cesar Hirohito je ukazal vsej svoji bojni sili, da položi orožje. Posebni odposlanci iz cesarske rodbine so nesli cesarjev ukaz vsem garnizijam po Pacifiku. Obenem je pa Hirohito urgiral

MacArturja naj ustavi rusko ofenzivo v Mandžuriji.

Radio iz Moskve je naznanjal, da je ruski poveljnik v Mand- žuriji, maršal Vasilevski, poslal japonskemu poveljniku v Mand- žuriji ukaz, da se poda do pondeljka. Rusi, je govoril radio, so odločeni nadaljevati polno ofenzivo, dokler Japonci ne položijo orožja.

MacArthur je sprejel pojasnilo Japoncev, da ne morejo po- slati emisarjev v Manilo do danes. Dovolil jim je, da sami dolo- čijo čas.

V Mandžuriji je, glasom ruskih poročil, položilo že 20.000 Japoncev orožje in se predalo Rusom.

Stalin je že prej obljubil, je rekel Churedill, da bo šla ruska arma- da na Japonce tri mesece po zmagi nad Nemčijo.

Res je pa, je izjavil Church- ill, da je atomska bomba prihr- nila najmanj 1.000.000 ameri- škim in 250.000 angleškim voja- kom življenje, ker je prisilila Japonce na kolena, predno je bi- lo treba deželo s silo invadirati. Churchill je tudi izrazil skrb glede Balkana, kjer dobivajo ali so že dobili komunisti diktator- sko moč v roke.

SOFIA — Štirje ministri so odstopili, ker je premier bol- garske vlade določil, da se bodo vršile volitve 26. avgusta. Od- stopli ministri so hoteli volitve odložiti.

OSLO — Najmanj 58 oseb je bilo ubitih in na stotine ra- njenih, ko je tukaj eksplodirala nemška ladja, naložena z muni- cijo. Med ranjenimi je tudi mnogo Amerikancev in Angležev.

BERLIN — Berlinskim meščanom je bilo ukazano, da izro- čijo vse zlato, srebro in druge dragocenosti v teku 10 dneh na zavezniško poveljstvo.

HAMBURG — Angleške vojaške oblasti so izločile od mest- ne administracije 2.710 nazijskih uradnikov. Nekatere so areti- rali, druge enostavno odpustili.

DUNAJ — Trije vojni zločinci so bili obsojeni na smrt, eden pa na 8 let ječe. Spoznani so bili krivim, da so ubili 102 Juda.

NEW YORK. — Radio BBC poroča, da bodo zavezniki odšli z Norveške 30. avgusta in jo prepustili lastni upravi.

DUNAJ — Tukaj so ameriške vojaške oblasti aretirale Constance Drexel, doma iz Filadelfije, ki je tekom vojne iz Ber- lina razglašala nazijsko propagando. Naciji so ji za to plačevali po \$32 na teden.

Vlada je odpovedala vojnih naročil za 258 milijonov dolarjev tukaj

NEWS FROM OUR BOYS IN THE ARMY

Le Havre, France
July 30, 1945

Dear Editor:

Just dropping a few lines to the people of Newburgh. First of all, I want to thank you for putting my last letter in the paper.

I know the people would like to know what I am doing here. Well, we are building an army camp for the G.I.'s. This camp is a redeployment center, through which the G.I. has to pass before going on board ship. The camp will hold 40,000 G.I.'s.

The G.I. can enjoy himself by going to a movie and stage show every night. There is a big PX warehouse, where the G.I. buys PX rations and can play all kinds of games. This camp will be a stationery camp for the next five years to come. Being built by the 1186 Engr. Combat Group, it should be finished by September 1945.

I don't know when I am coming home as there are a lot of Divisions to some home first so that they can get 30 days furlough and after that go to the Pacific. August 6 will be 3 years overseas for me and 37 months in the army. I just have to wait my turn. I have 100 points to get out and I'm keeping my fingers crossed. The reason I have 100 points is I have 5 Battle Stars and if I hadn't been in the hospital for my operation, I would have one more Battle Star. All the

rest of the men have 105 points or over.

While I was in Kassel, Germany, the people I saw there weren't starving at all. They were nice and fat and they had plenty of food and yet the U. S. government is sending food to Germany now.

Well, I'm getting along fine since my operation and all I want to say is "Hello" to you all and hope you are all in the best of health.

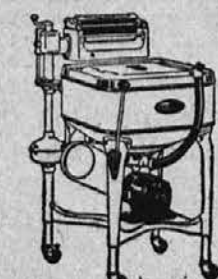
