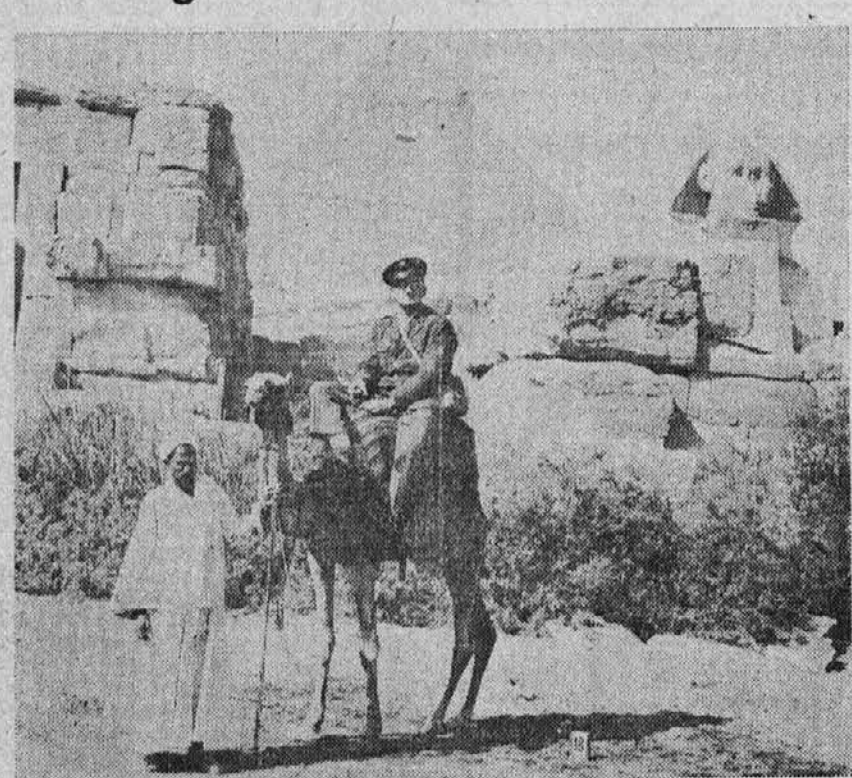

"Here is a picture of me before the second pyramid just outside Cairo," writes Pfc. John L. Modic, former LIFE reporter, now overseas with the Army.

"My guide is a sorry Arab. He is sorry I didn't give him more money with which to support his family for generations to come. I told him he could bloody well jump off the Sphinx before I'd give him another piastre. (He got me for plenty before the ride was finished anyway.)"

"My camel's name was Susine, not Arabic, but an Arabic pronunciation of 'sunshine'."

"This name is very misleading, because camels have anything but a sunny disposition. They are disgruntled creatures and hate the business they were brought up in. 6. Friendly group conversations after adjournment.

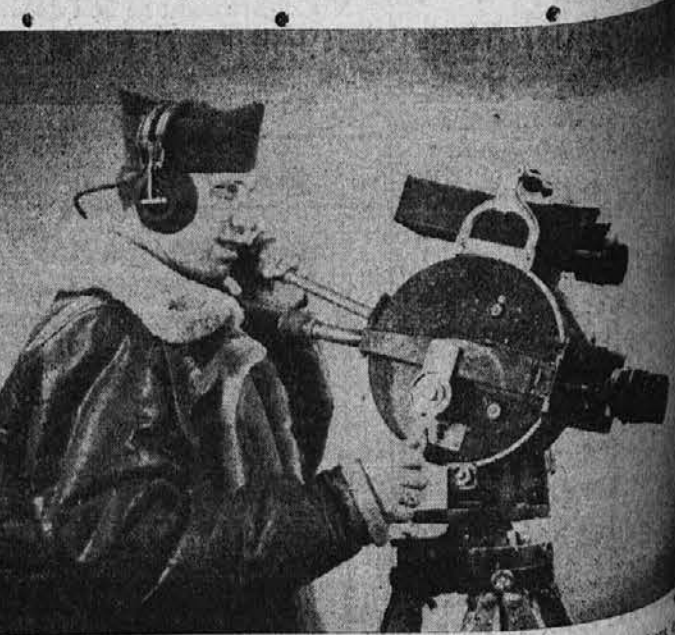
