Slovenska naselbina v Clevelandu se bo spominjala 2. obletnice katastrofe

Korporacija, katere namen je pozidati slovensko naselbino na kraju, kjer je plinska katastrofa pred dvema letoma vse porušila v pustila samo prah in pepel, je sklenila, da naj se vrši ob 2. obletnici spominsko praznovanje. Začetek programa bo ob 2:30 popoldne v nedeljo 20. oktobera.

Za program je določenih nekaj govornikov, ki bodo povedali navzočim o nadalnjem programu zidanja hiš na tem prostoru in o načrtih, ki so za to naselje določeni in od mesta odobreni.

Dozdaj je dograjenih že 6 novih hiš in tudi hiša, ki jo je korporacija sama postavila. Ta hiša bo v nedeljo na ogled vsakemu, zunaj in znotraj. Hiša bo prodana samo za ceno, da se krije stroški zidave.

V nedeljo bo tekom programa

zasajena tudi prva lopata za novo cesto, ki bo vezala 61. in 62. cesto. Ta cesta se bo imenovala "Grdina Drive" in bo tekla od Trupiničeve hiše na 61. cesti, kjer se bo vršil tudi ves program.

Program bo vodil mestni odbornik 23. varde, Edward J. Kovacic; navzve bo tudi mestni odbornik 10. varde, Edward L. Pucel in več drugih mestnih odbornikov. Narod je vabiljen, da pride k temu programu.

Kdor bivših posestnikov na pogorišču želi kupiti nazaj parcele ali pa hišo, ki jo je zgradila korporacija, ima prednost, toda priglasiti se mora do nedelje.

Na zadnji seji so bili navzoči zadovoljni z delom odbora ter ga potrdili še za naprej. K odboru je bil prideljen še stavbenik Joseph Demshar, ki bo skušal pospešiti zidavo nadaljnijih hiš.

Vsi vojaki rekrutirani v 1945, bodo poslani domov pred 1. jan.

Nekje mora biti nekaj precej napek

Milwaukee, Wis. — Mrs. Gertrude Behr je šla na sodnijo po razporoko. Kot vzrok je navedla to, da ji je njen mož povedal, da se je zagledal v nekega nemškega dekleta, ko je tam služil z ameriško armado.

Njen mož Peter pa pravi: ne bo držalo. On je služil pri letalcih in sicer ves čas na Pacifiku, ne pa na Nemškem.

Zed. države so ustavile 90 milijonov, ki so bili namenjeni za Češko

Washington. — Državni oddelek naznanja, da je ameriška vlada ustavila pogajanja za \$50,000,000 posojila češki ter tudi ustavila prenos za \$40,000,000 vrednosti raznih potrebskih, ki so bile določene za Česko.

Ta akcija ameriške vlade znači, da je začela biti bolj ostra v svoji inozemski politiki.

Državni oddelek je dal jasno razumeti, da so tega krivi čehi sami, ker so njih voditelji potegnili s Sovjeti, ko so ti trdili, da hočejo Zed. države rabiti svoj denar za razširjenje ekonomskoga imperializma. Ta ocitanja so se pojavila v ruskem in češkem časopisu.

Češka je zaprosila v Ameriki za \$50,000,000 posojila, s čemer bi nakupila tukaj poljedelske stroje in druge potrebski. Da ne bi čehi misili, da hočejo Zed. države s takim posojilom njih deželo ekonomsko zaslužiti, je Amerika pogajanja za takto posojilo ustavila.

Cehi so že prej dobili v Ameriki kredita za \$50,000,000. S tem denarjem bi dobili razne potrebski iz vojnega preostanka.

Ameriška vlada je tudi to ustavila; tega blaga bodo dobili samo za \$10,000,000, kar je bilo že naročeno.

Muskegon Heights, Mich. — Zadnji petek je v bližnjem Moorlandu bik umoril farmarja Johna Fifolte. Bik se je vanj zaletel, ko ga je gnal h koritu, da ga napoji. Na farmarjeve klice je priletela žena, pograbila vilen in s pomočjo domačega psa zapodila bik proč. Na ženine klice je priletela žena, pograbila marji, ki so delali v bližini, bika pognali v hlev, kjer ga je mesar potem ustrelil, umirajočega seda pa odnesli v hišo, kjer je izdihnil še predno je prisel zdravnik. Pokojni je bil star 62 let, doma iz vasi Šmihel-Stočice pri Novem mestu, v Ameriki od 1906. V tej okolici je živel 34 let. Poleg žene tukaj zapušča dva sinova, hčerko in dva vnuka, v starem kraju pa dva brata in dve sestri.

Milwaukee. — Po kratki bolnici je za vnetjem možganske je ponavljal izjavu maršala Timrene umrl Stanley J. Rozich, ta, ki je zanikal, da bi imel v načrtu, da se polasti Trsta z obroženo silo. To je baje Tito izjavil napram ameriškim žurnalistom.

Pittsburgh, Pa. — V jeklarni Jones & Laughlin Co. je nastala razstrelba v plavžu, ki je ubila dva delavca, več jih pa nevarno ranila.

New York. — Louis Budenz, bivši komunist, je imenovan Avstrijska Hans Bergerja kot tajnega ruskega agenta v Zed. državah, ki vodi vse komunistične aktivnosti tej deželi.

En vzrok je to, ker hoče armada hraniti, drugi je pa to, ker hoče imeti armada same prostovoljce.

Washington. — Vsi vojaki, ki so bili rekrutirani tekom leta 1945, bodo odpusčeni pred 1. januarjem 1947, tako po roča armadno vodstvo. Glavni vzrok tega koraka je to, ker hoče imeti armada same prostovoljce.

Drugi viri pa zatrjujejo, da bo večji vzrok to, ker je predsednik Truman ukazal, da se zniža stroške armade in tako pomaga balancirati budžet.

Zadnji teden je armada ustavila vsako rekrutiranje novinovcev do konca tega leta. Republikanci pravijo, da je treba za vsem tem iskati tudi "nekaj politike," ker se je to izvršilo tik pred volitvami.

S to odredbo bo odpusčenih iz armade okrog 235,000 vojakov, ki so bili rekrutirani tekom lanskoga leta. Poleg tega jih je zdaj doma kakih 200,000 ali pa na potu domov za časten odprt.

S tem bo zapustilo armado do 1. januarja 1947 kakih 435,000 vojakov. Na vrsti je tudi kakih 30,000 častnikov za odprt. Letalsko poveljstvo tudi naznana, da bo odprstilo kakih 8,700 častnikov, ki niso kot "redni" na listi.

Po tem novem programu bo ob koncu letosnjega leta štela armada okrog 1,310,000 mož. Od teh jih bo samo kakih 200,000 rekrutiranih, drugi bodo pa vsi prostovoljci. Armada upa imeti v letu 1947 same prostovoljce.

Postava za rekrutiranje vojakov neha 31. marca 1947. Ako se bo priglasilo dovolj prostovoljev, ne bo armada od danes naprek poklicala potom naravnih komisij nobenega novinca več. To še zlasti v slučaju, če mednarodni položaj ne bo slabši kot je danes.

V pozni jeseni 1943 obkolijo partizani njegovo hišo, jo izropajo, baš so zaklali prešiča, gospodarja pa odvedejo s seboj. Po tednu dni ga najdejo na svaskem produ mrtvega. Truplo kaže jasne znake mučenja. Partizani po svojih zaupnikih tako močno terorizirajo vaščane, da si ne upajo udeležiti se pogreba, ker za udeležbo je zagrožena smrт. Ljudstvo je brez obrame, izročeno na milost in nemilost kom. partiji.

Na Gorenjskem vlada silno pomaranjanje duhovščine. V delželo pride par nemških duhovnikov iz Koroške. Ti se smejo svobodno gibati, tudi po ozemlju, katero kontrolirajo izključno partizani. Med njimi duhovnik Boike — doma iz Nemčije, ki upravlja iz Kranja, kjer ima svoj sedež več župnij. Pa skupno uporabljajo neuskupno pridobljeni živiljenjski potrebščini za čisti komunizem. To naziranje je rodilo prave cvetke neskončno dobesednega komunizma. Za smrtni greh zoper svetost ideje so na primer šteli, če je nekdo pojedel za dva dinarja sira, nekdo drugi pa za dva dinarja klobase. Če hočeta oba pokazati, da sta res zavedna komunisti, mora vsak od obeh pojesti za en dinar sira in za en dinar klobase, čeprav bi enega bolel želodec od sira, drugega pa od klobase. Revolucionar mora z navdušenjem sprejeti tako žrtev na svoja remena. Če noče, je to dokaz, da mu manjka primerna količina razredne zavesti in komunistične ideologije. Izjemna se napravi samo takrat, kadar to dovoli celokupna komuna. Pa se je našel tudi tu izhod.

Zajednica je imenovala tričlansko "higijensko komisijo," ki naj prosilca preišče in ugotovi njegovo zdravstveno stanje. Bolnik je sicer izrel prizoričilo od kaznil. zdravnika, vendar je ta navaden "buržujski sluga," ki ne pozna interesov proletariata. Njeni niso mogli verjeti, zato so moralni sami ugotoviti, ali je prosilec potreben mleka ali ne. Ta komisija je bila sestavljena iz samih medicinskih strokovnjakov in industrijskih proletarcev — skrahiran študent prava, zarađi poneverbe članarine iz stranke izključeni frizer in na svobodi alkoholu vdani kleparski mojster. Ta izbrana komisija je sicer ugotovila, da ima prosilec vneto grlo, toda da bi s primerno požrtvovalnostjo namesto toplega mleka vendar lahko jedel klobaso in nato pil hladno vodo.

Ker je prosilec še vedno prizoričil, mu je vrhovni odbor sporočil, da se mora, če priznava program kominterne in njeeno odprto pismo mleku odreči. Če tega ne stori, ga morajo imeti za pripadnika svojega razredno nezavednega, same enomilionskega naroda in za pripadnika njegovega "črnega voditelja."



According to public opinion, Sen. Taft has weakened his chances, if he intends to be a presidential candidate on the Republican ticket, with his criticism of the Nazi at Nuremberg.

The tropical storm, which was expected to hit Florida with full force last week, miraculously avoided the state and hit both Carolinas but with lesser force.

Last week, Eisenhower, his wife and son, were guests of the king and queen of England at Balmoral castle in Crathie, Scotland, and attended church with them on Sunday.

SAINT LUKE, THE EVANGELIST

Today is the feast of St. Luke, the Evangelist. This writer was a native of Antioch, the capital of Syria. He was an educated man and a physician. Tradition also tells us that he was skilled in painting, and that he did a very beautiful portrait of the Blessed Mother. Whether or not he painted her, he certainly did know her quite well, since only she could have told him the details of the Annunciation of the Birth of John the Baptist, and of the Incarnation and the words of the angel at the Annunciation of the Birth of Christ.

St. Luke wrote his gospel in Greek, about twenty-four years after the Ascension, for the Greek converts. His literary style is better than that of any other Evangelist, and this was appropriate for the Greeks, because they could appreciate fine literature.

The symbol for St. Luke is an ox, because his gospel starts with Zachary in the temple offering sacrifice and oxen are usually connected with sacrifice.

He was converted by St. Paul and became his missionary companion. They both worked long and hard for the spread of the Young Church.

CATHOLIC ATTITUDE ON INDUSTRY

Cooperation cuts deep into preconceived pretensions of personal prerogatives. The wild onslaughts of Liberalism, of rugged individualism against the sanctity and the sacredness of the human being in the past have leveled industry to a state of chaos, to a plane of social anarchy. Whatever appearances of order that exist are the result of natural resistance to total decay. They are remnants of a unity that once did bind men together in brotherhood; they are not the good effects of a thoroughly bad system. In spite of courage, we have associations, for instance, of working people today. Because of conflict, they bear the marks of dictatorship in some instances, and of corruption in others, wounds inflicted from within and without, in the long struggle to preserve their very existence. Unless, tempered by the cool balm of the cooperative spirit, they, too, will turn to conquest as a sustaining principle should the wheel of fate favor them unduly as the industrial battle is waged on the principle of conflict.

There can be no possibility of cooperation between management and labor unless objective norms of justice be established. There can be no mutual working together unless a common goal, a mutual objective be envisioned. There can be but a constant renewal of bitter hostility if both

employer and employee must contend viciously for an undetermined share of the same prize.

Boy Scout Collection

Scout Executive Geo. E. Green of the Boy Scouts of America announced today (Oct. 1) that Greater Cleveland Scouts and Cub Scouts will engage in an intensive "hunt" to find Cub and Scout uniforms, camping equipment and test-taking equipment of former members that is usable and can be shipped overseas to help rehabilitate Scouting in war-torn countries.

Taking its cue from the expression of a generous giver, "he'd give you the shirt off his back" the drive is known as "The Shirts-Off-Our-Back Campaign" and will enlist the cooperation of the 16,000 Cubs, Scouts and Senior Scouts and their leaders in Cuyahoga County.

Here's what the Scouts are looking for:

Boy Scout and Cub Scout shirts
Breeches and shorts (scout and Cub)
Neckerchief slides, neckerchiefs and lanyards

Scout and Cub Hats and Caps
Scout and Cub belts
Scout and Cub stockings
Tents, sleeping bags, cooking kits, mess kits, bugles, compasses, First Aid kits, signal flags, whistles, fire making sets, axes, knives, haversacks, pack frames and all kinds of Boy Scout and Cub Scout books.

Items may be new or used — but they must in all cases be usable. ALL ITEMS SHOULD BE CLEAN AND IN GOOD REPAIR before they are turned in. Official badges and insignia, other than buttons, should be removed.

All equipment should be brought to the Bingham Boy Scout Training Center, 12406 Lake Shore Boulevard in SATURDAY, OCT. 19, between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. This will be the

only COLLECTION DAY. Former Scouts, parents of former Scouts and Cubs, may bring the material directly to the Training Center, or get in touch with their neighborhood Troop or Cub Pack and ask them to bring it in.

Mr. Green advised those persons who had Scout or Cub equipment they wanted to give, but who did not know where their nearest Troop or Pack was located, could call the Boy Scout Office, Prospect 6061 and either ask for this information or give their name and address and arrangements would be made for a Scout or Cub to pick up the equipment PROVIDED it was not too bulky or heavy for one boy to handle.

Scouts and Cubs are asked to share some of their equipment with those less fortunate than they are.

"Nothing but Scout and Cub equipment will be picked up or is asked for. This is strictly a Scout-equipment collection, it is not a general clothing collection. We want no garments other than Scout Uniforms," stated Mr. Green.

A simple donor tag will be made available to anyone who wishes to attach it to their contribution and in this manner it is hoped many personal contacts may be developed between American Scouts and Scouts in foreign lands.

The need is great and immediate, according to Howard Patton, National Director of the World Friendship Fund of the Boy Scouts of America, New York City, which is financing the cost of shipping the material overseas.

A Belgian Troop reports: "Our Troop was founded on April 2 despite Nazi occupation, and we grew in silence, and with a great deal of success, just the same. In the terrible offensive that ruined our Belgian fields, all the material we had was completely taken away."

From Holland a leader writes: "The Jardies took all our material, and gave it to the German Jugend, we have nothing."

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One of the most dramatic stories involving Scouts comes from the Philippines:

When the Seventh American Fleet was bombing a target around a coastal Philippine town, a naval officer saw frantic but accurate semaphore flag signals being wig-wagged from the beach. It spelled out a request to withhold fire until the signaller could come aboard and give more accurate information regarding the enemy target. A few minutes later three dripping Philippine Boy Scouts arrived. The leader was fourteen-year-old Boy Scout Valeriano Abelio. He and his comrades had not forgotten their semaphore training and they were able to give our fleet information which helped eliminate the enemy as well as save the homes and lives of 8,000 civilians.
