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

## No-Bake Cereal Fruit Balls



Children at home? Cereal Fruit Balls are needed. Because the no-bake sweets make up moist and soft, they are grand snacks to have on hand during humid weather. They keep well in a tightly covered container in a cool place. As mothers know, cereals and fruit are good for children. Oven-toasted rice cereal is the crunchy ingredient used in this recipe. It and other breakfast cereals are economical sources of food energy, protein, minerals, and the B vitamins.

**Cereal Fruit Balls**

1 cup quartered dried apricots	1½ teaspoons grated lemon rind
½ cup water	½ teaspoon salt
½ cup thick applesauce	3 cups oven-toasted rice cereal, crushed to make 1½ cups
1 cup sifted confectioners' sugar	Granulated sugar
½ cup nonfat dry milk solids	
½ cup finely chopped walnuts	

Cook apricots in small amount of water until tender and water evaporates. Cool, mash and add remaining ingredients, except granulated sugar; mix well. Shape into balls, using a tablespoonful of mixture for each ball. Roll in granulated sugar. Chill. Roll in additional granulated sugar just before serving. Yield: 3 dozen balls.

Washington, D.C. — Vice-President Hubert Humphrey has caught the baseball fever along with thousands of other Washington fans. The Vice-President, however, went out to D.C. Stadium to see his beloved Twins.

It's not unusual for Humphrey to root for the Twins. After all, he is a former mayor of Minneapolis and a former Minnesota Senator.

Humphrey visited the Twins' dressing room two years ago when they clinched the pennant in Washington. He visited the clubhouse again recently when the Twins played here.

The Vice-President asked the Twins if anybody wanted to visit the White House. Russ Nixon, player representative for the Twins, said he and several others would be interested. When Humphrey learned the name of the Minnesota player rep, the Vice-President cracked: "Oh, no, not another Nixon trying to get into the White House. I understand you have been trying hard to get in."

**Dayton, O.—The front bumper on some 1968 Model cars will not be chrome; it will be the same color as the body of the car.** This was disclosed by the Pontiac Motor Division and Dayton Inland Manufacturing Division of General Motors. The bumper on Pontiac's GTO models will be made of a new polymer material combination that resulted from a four-year Inland development program. The Endura bumper, as it's known, will absorb energy on impact. It is a combination of a synthetic compound backed with a heavy gauge steel reinforcement.

**Red Cross Hiring Men and Women for Vietnam**

"Due to the vast build-up of U.S. military strength in Vietnam, American Red Cross services in that country have greatly increased, but not nearly enough to cover the arrival of the new troops," said David A. Leahy, Greater Cleveland Red Cross chapter chairman.

In order for the Red Cross to maintain adequate recreational and communication facilities for the military in Vietnam, qualified persons from the Cleveland area are being hired for jobs as Recreation Workers, Recreation Aide (open to women only) and Assistant Field Director on Red Cross Installations in Vietnam, (open to men only)

Leahy announced.

A Recreation Worker must have a Bachelor's Degree with a major in recreation. No experience is required. Salary begins at \$4856 plus full maintenance.

Recreation Aides must have graduated from a four-year college and have some skill in some recreational activities. Salary begins at \$4856 plus full maintenance. Both will serve in military hospitals in Vietnam.

Five new Assistant Field Directors, for a tour of duty of at least one year, are needed from the Cleveland area. Duties of the Assistant Field Director, Leahy explained, "involve counseling servicemen and women with personal and family problems, many of which are created by forced separation from loved ones."

Other duties include assistance with transportation arrangements in emergencies, aiding communications between servicemen and their families, and working with local chapters of Red Cross in providing similar services at home.

Forgive me for being late in sending a note of thanks to all our friends for the wonderful Jubilee Mass and celebration on July 2nd. The affair was held in St. Vitus Church and it brought back many memories. It was under the late Msgr. Ponikar that I learned the real meaning of love and respect for our fellow mankind.

It was August 24, 1942 that I first pronounced my Vows of Poverty, Chastity and Obedience as a Religious Brother of the Society of Mary. Seems like only yesterday after 25 years, but time goes so fast that we do not notice it.

In my 25 years as a Marianist, I've had many different assignments. The work I am doing now, here at the Mission in Puerto Rico with Christ's poor is the biggest challenge of my life. Here we are 2 Priests and myself trying to build a new parish of about 10,000 people in an area of 25 square miles. In this area we take care of 12 missions. We are now building chapels in these areas and also recreation rooms, if possible. In this project we hope to help the youth better themselves and to give them a ray of hope. So thank you all for your help whether it was with a donation or just your prayers. There are so many persons to thank that I am afraid if I tried, I would forget many. So please accept this as my thank you, and the assurance of a remembrance in my Mass and daily prayers.

May God bless you all and Mother Mary guide and protect you.

BI-PARTISAN SOCIAL SECURITY COMPROMISE. After nearly six months of hearings and executive consideration the House Committee on Ways and Means has agreed on Social Security legislation providing a \$3.2 billion package of benefits for more than 23 million older Americans. The new bill is sponsored by the Chairman, Wilbur D. Mills of Arkansas, as well as the ranking Republican, Honorable John W. Byrnes of Wisconsin.

The bill, H.R. 12080, which supersedes the Administration proposal, H.R. 5710, provides a general boost of 12.5 percent and a minimum increase of at least \$6 a month. Monthly benefits would range from \$50 to \$159.80 instead of from \$44 to \$142 at present. The Administration had asked for an average increase of 15 percent with those receiving the minimum amount being increased to about \$70. However, Committee members felt the tax increase this would necessitate would be too heavy a burden when added to the income tax boost the President seeks.

The new bill calls for boosting the taxable earnings base from \$600 to \$700 a year effective January 1, 1968. This means that workers will be paying a maximum additional Social Security tax of \$44 a year. Republicans had proposed a cost of living increase in benefits of eight percent. But since then living costs have increased by two percent — up to 10 percent — and are expected to increase another two percent by the time the new law could take effect. The new rates would become effective the second month after passage. In another move, the Committee dropped the Administration plan to require retired individuals to pay income tax on Social Security benefits.

**VIETNAM MAIL.** The Post Office reports first-class mail to servicemen in Vietnam is being delivered in 3-5 days after it is posted in the United States. On a space-available basis, small parcels are delivered in about 10 days and large ones, sent by ship, in about 45 days.

A first-class letter with a 5-cent stamp goes all the way by air if it has the correct APO or FPO address and number.
