Washington. — Jugoslovanski poslanik je naznani državnemu oddelku ameriške vlade, da je komunistična jugoslovanska vlada pripravljena začeti z pogajanjem, da se poravnava, starci računi med obema deželama.

Jugoslavija je opetovana zahtevala od ameriške vlade, da oprosti za kakih \$60,000,000 jugoslovanskega zlata in drugih vrednot, kar je ameriška vlada zamrznila, ko je Hitler zavojeval Jugoslavijo. Tito zahteva to zdaj za svojo vlado.

Ameriški državni tajnik je rekel, da ne bo nobene poravnave, dokler Jugoslavija ne poravnava svojih starih računov. Tako Jugoslavija še ni plačala za dvoje ameriških letal, ki jih je izstrelila nad Bohinjem pred 18 meseci in tudi ni plačala za ameriške posesti, ki si jih je prisvojila, ko je Titov režim prevzel Jugoslavijo s pomočjo Rusije. Amerika je cenila te posesti na \$42,300,000 pozneje je to znižala na \$20,000,000, toda Titov režim je rekel, da je to vsaj \$15,000,000 preveč.

Titova vlada se je bridko pritožila, da Zed. države bolj trdo postopajo z Jugoslavijo kot z vsak drugo državo. Vendar da je zdaj pripravljena na pogajanje, da se enkrat zaključijo računi.

John L. Lewis je bil 68 let star

Washington. — John L. Lewis, predsednik premogarske unije, je včeraj praznoval 68-letnico svojega rojstva. Vzel si je kratke počitnice, toda javnost ne ve, kam je sel.

da je zdaj na vladu ležeče, da privede cene za 15% nižje, kot so bile pred enim mesecem. Umetno dviganje cen je za stalno ustavljen, je izjavil Stassen.

V diplomatskih krogih trdijo, da se bo začela Sovjetska Rusija na pomlad pogajati z zapadnimi zvezniki; za to da so že vidna znamenja.

Washington. — Diplomatski viri vidijo jasna znamenja, da se mehčajo odnose med Zed. državami in Sovjetsko Rusijo in da se Rusija pripravlja, da se bo začela še pred spomladjo dogovarjati z zapadom na povsem sprejemljivih točkah.

To trdijo uradniki v ameriškem državnem uradu in pa višji uradniki v tujezemskih poslanstvih. Sovjetska Rusija je na pravila zadnje čase nekaj korakov doma in zunaj, ki vse kažejo, da je začela Moskva popuščati v svoji nepristopnosti in ošabnost. Prvi od zadnje vojne so vidni znaki, da bo Rusija pustila do sebe, čeprav je sicer zaenkrat še precej glasna v svojih obdolžtvih proti zapadnim zaveznicom.

Ceprav ruski diplomati kažejo svojo kosmatno in trdo pest, pa je že opažati v isti pesti tudi oljkinovo vejico, kjer sicer popki še poganjajo, ampak poganjajo pa.

V zadnjem času je bilo več resnih incidentov, ki so prešli sicer skor neoporenko, toda ki kažejo, da se teh manjših skupaj, da se nekaj dobrega kuha v diplomatskih lončih.

Naj navedemo tukaj nekaj teh "incidentov":

Rusija se je naenkrat odločila, in to prvič po dveh letih zavlačevanja, da bo dala živež in žito za reparacije v Nemčiji.

Moskva je obvestila zapadne zavezničke, da je za polovico popuščila na svojih zahtevah za vojno odškodnino od Avstrije, da se tem omogoči nova pogajanja za vstrijsko mirovno pogodbou.

Novi ruski poslanik v Washingtonu, Aleksander Panjuškin se je tajno približal načelniku ma obveznih odsekov za tujezemski zadeve v zbornicah: poslanskih in senatnem.

Moskva je postala naenkrat voljna plačati za 87 ladij, katere je posodila Amerika ob času vojne ter da je voljna pogajati za plačilo za 11 bilijonov dolarjev, za kolikor so ji dale Zed. države raznih potrebišč in v vojni. To se tiče samo tistih stvari, katere Rusija lahko uporablja v mirnem času. Kar je rabila v vojni, je dobila iz Amerike brezplačno.

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Vse to kaže, mislijo diplomatki krog, da želi priti Rusija do boljših odnosov z Zed. državami.

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

This and That from Washington

TWENTY-TWO nations are now eligible to participate in the scholarship plan which may have available \$140,000,000 during the next 20 years. The agreements with Burma and China have been completed and draft agreements are under consideration with the Philippines, Italy, New Zealand, Greece, Egypt and Belgium.

Completion of these agreements puts into operation the Fulbright Act which foreign governments may pay in their own currencies in part for the sales of American surplus property overseas with scholarships and other educational enterprises in their own countries for American students. For Americans the Burma-China agreements include transportation both ways, tuition, maintenance and incidental expenses.

Plans for making the grants actually available are not completed, but a public announcement will be made as to the time applications may be sent in. Additional information can be had by writing the Division of International Exchange of Persons, Department of State, Washington 25, D. C.

CERTAIN very interesting matters have developed in European Recovery Program hearings relative to the results of government sales of so-called scrap to scrap dealers for 10-LST's and other such war materials. These

dealers then sell the scrap to the mills at a much higher price receiving in payment in addition to money, certain amounts of steel sheets, etc. These they then sell pretty much to the highest bidder. It has been suggested that the government could and should have sold this scrap directly to the mills who in turn would make direct sales. Such straight-forward handling would ultimately benefit the tax payer, who originally paid a little through the nose for war material. It is interesting that it has been said before the Foreign Affairs Committee that there is really no scarcity of steel rather than it tied up in this complicated handling.

THE Senate Committee on Foreign Relations has concluded its hearings on the European Recovery Program and will start writing a bill. The House Committee on Foreign Affairs hopes to conclude its hearings in another week if it can secure certain information it considers extremely important.

A subcommittee of the Committee on Education and Labor begins hearings on February 9th on H. R. 4408 which would provide equal pay for equal work to women.

ON the subject of conservation:

The chief of the U. S. Forest Service has said we are sawing timber from our forests 1½ times as fast as we are replacing it with new growth.

Secretary of Defense Forrestal testified before a House Subcommittee that we are using underground oil reserves four times as fast as they are being replenished; that the pinch may come in ten years.

On hundreds of bulletin boards in Greater Cleveland's industrial plants, the story of the need to expand the city's voluntary hospital system is being presented.
