Za stavbne delavce stejejo vse, ki so v kakršnikoli zvezi z gradbeno stroko, tudi mehanike in kovače. Nadure znašajo povprečno \$50 odstotkov osnovne plače. Privatniki v konkurenčni plačijo officialno tudi \$1 in več.

Another Thanksgiving, was celebrated this year — to mark the coming of a new batch of men and women to the colony. In the years that followed, there were other Thanksgivings, and at length it became a feast held every year.

Stored on the Hoof

Dr. Karl F. Butler, president of the American Institute of Cooperation, recently touched on a vitally important yet little recognized phase of the meat and animal industry.

"Nations with large livestock herds," he said, "have an automatic cushion between the people and the harvests. They simply represent stored food on the hoof." In other words, the grain, grass and other fodder the animals consume is turned into meat. It is ready to be used when needed. And, on top of that, the natural fertilization of the land which results from the raising of livestock is a vitally important element in maintaining and increasing the humus content of our soils.

Countries which depend entirely on their harvests to support the people are periodically plagued with famines. China and India are prime examples of this. These countries have no animal industry of consequence. They must live on their rice and their grain in the form in which it is produced. A series of poor crops may result in the death by starvation of hundreds of thousands of people. In the United States, where we can rely on livestock as a dietary cushion in years of subnormal harvests, the food supply is always adequate.

Furthermore, a very substantial percentage of all livestock is raised on grass, forage and other foods which are not suited for human consumption. But, when converted into meat, they provide much of the nation's sustenance.

This country is fortunate in its progressive, growing livestock industry — and in the thousands of packing plants which compete for the meat supply, and send it through the channels which bring it finally to the dinner table in the most edible form.

This and That from Washington

By Congressman Frances P. Bolton

THE incoming Senate makes an interesting study. Curiously enough there is comparatively little change in the background. According to late information, the Senate of the 81st Congress comes from the following professions and occupations: law 64; business, real estate, insurance, 11; agriculture 6; politics and Civil Service 6; journalism 4; teachers, 3; bankers, 2; bank tellers, 1; dentist, 1; actor. Of these one is listed under both agriculture and publicity, and another under both law and business.

A study of their ages is interesting: 3 are in the thirties, 21 in the forties, 39 in the fifties, 20 in the sixties, 12 in the seventies and 1 in the eighties. The probability is that Chairmen of Committees will be at least 66 years old.

RECENTLY the Bureau of Internal Revenue began a change in its auditing methods with a view to simplification. A test is being made in Washington, D. C., and Maryland, of a form combining Social Security and the Withholding Tax. If this proves successful it will be used nationally.

THE Treasury Department has issued the 1948 Corporation Income Tax Return form for general availability towards the end of this month. It is substantially the same as that of 1947. Its number is Form 1120.

MOTION pictures as educational media are being used increasingly by government and near-government organizations. A new aviation "March of Time" film has just been released to all larger theaters. It is intended as a way of giving the public a chance to see the latest United States planes which are to be constructed as part of the program for strengthening our air power.

The Labor Relations Council has a series of informational films in the Labor Relations Field produced

by the United States Office of Education. One of these is called "Placing the Right Man in the Right Place." Another film similar in usefulness is "52 Pay Checks" in which the Nunn-Bush Company explains its "continuous wage plan." Few methods of education are more useful than those of the movie screen.

M. R. A. G. BRYANT, the retiring President of the National Chinese Tool Builders' Association, has recently made a point which it would be well for more of us to appreciate and to emphasize. When he says that a majority of American manufacturers are engaged in producing items that are not needed in large quantities, he suggests that too many people at home and abroad think of us as a nation of streamlined plants, making long runs on identical parts. Granted that this "mass production" plays a vital part in our economy, the fact is that our development of interchangeability has given us a flexible technique that adapts itself readily to work of any value. Mr. Bryant explains this dramatically when he says: "The genius of America lies not so much in the theory of mass production, as in the interchangeability of parts, which is applied to small lots as well as to mass production." Never was America's genius, in no matter what direction it may be found, so greatly needed as now.

THE first International Red Cross Conference held since the war, took place recently in Stockholm. It was somewhat clouded by the fact that only 56 nations attended. When one remembers that the Red Cross is the badge of those pledged to relieve suffering wherever it may be found, one cannot but regret deeply that some of the Balkan States refused to attend, and that the Russians were not on the floor of the Conference but in the gallery, in spite of a unanimously carried resolution offered by the French Government delegate, urging them to state their grievances in open session and let the Conference judge.
