Do 562,000 jih je brez dela radi stavke v premogovni industriji

Pittsburgh, Pa. — Stavka premogarjev je povzročila, da je danes brez dela direktno ali indirektno do 562,000 oseb širom dežele. Stavka gre že v četrti teden.

Na stavki je 400,000 premo-garjev, ki kopljejo mehki pre-mog. Iz simpatije do njih je za-stavkalo 25,000 premogarjev, ki kopljejo trd premog v vzhodni Pennsilvaniji.

Poleg tega jih je radi stavke doma najmanj 70,000 pri želez-nicah in nad 45,000 v jeklarski industriji. Računajo, da bo je-klarska industrija izgubila do konca tedna najmanj 600,000 ton jekla radi stavke.

White Valley, Pa. — Jakob Vehar je šel 1. aprila v stari kraj, v vas Žiri, kjer ima malo domaćijo, dva sinova in hčer — žena mu je umrla pred več leti. V Ameriki je bil 35 let, večino-ma v tukajšnji naselbini.

Amerika in Anglija protestirala zaradi incidentov v Trstu

Iz Moskve še vedno ni prišel odgovor, kaj misli glede Trsta

Washington. — Ameriška vla-da je vložila uraden protest za-radi incidentov, ki so se zgodili na tržaškem ozemlju, pri čemer je jugoslovansko vojaštvo strelja-lo na ozemlju, ki ga imata za-sedenega Anglija in Amerika. Zadnji tak slučaj se je pripe-til 29. marca, ko je jugoslovan-sko vojaštvo streljalo na Angli-že in to ne z onstran meje, am-pak prav z ozemlja, ki je okupi-rano od ameriškega in angleške-ga vojaštva. Druga dva taka slu-čaja sta se pripetila 12. de-cembra 1947 in 22. marca 1948.

Prav tak protest o istih slu-čajih je izdala tudi Anglija. Protest ameriške vlade se gla-si: "Vlada Zed. držav kar naj-ostreje protestira zaradi kršitve meje svobodne tržaške države od strani jugoslovanskih okupacijskih čet in zaradi izživalnih de-janj proti oboju angleško-ame-riške cone, ko je to izvrševalo svojo službo.

Vlada Zed. držav pričakuje od jugoslovanske vlade, da bo nuj-no izdala potrebna navodila svo-jim odgovornim zastopnikom, da se kaj takega več ne ponovi, ker bi to resno ogrozilo življe-nje angleško-ameriških čet in policije Beneške Krajine, ki vr-sijo službo na ozemlju svobodne tržaške države, ki je pod angle-ško-ameriško okupacijo."

Tako izjavlja državni oddelek in istočasno javlja, da ni prišel od Sovjetske zveze še noben od-govor na predlog Francije, Veli-ke Britanije in Zed. držav, da se izroči svobodna tržaška drža-va Italiji. Državni oddelek upa, da bo prišel iz Moskve v krat-kem zadovoljiv odgovor, da se lahko čim prej spiše protokol v tem smislu.

Državni oddelek ni povedal, kakšna akcija bo podvzeta od strani Zed. držav, Anglije in Francije, ako Sovjetska zveza ne bo pristala na ta predlog, ali če sploh ne bo odgovorila v pri-mernem času.

Zadnji gori omenjeni treh in-cidentov se je pripetil 29. mar-ca južno vzhodno od Bazovice in sicer kakih 300 jardov proč od jugoslovanske meje na ozemlju, ki je pod okupacijo angleških in ameriških čet.

Kako ne, če ni drugih kandidatov. To je "demokracija," v katero še vedno mnogo bedakov veruje.

Tukaj je bilo zastopanih 17 okrajev z severno zapadne Ohio, celo iz Clevelanda se je pripelja-lo dva polna busa Millerjevih pri-jateljev.

Mr. Miller je govoril večino o problemu obilnega farmar-ja. Problemu so mu dobro znani, saj je doma iz podeželja.

V sredo večer je govoril Mil-ler v Newark, Ohio, kjer je od-govoril Franku Lauscheu svo-jemu protikandidatu, na njego-ve napade glede "bosimsa." Na shod sem je bil povabljen tudi Frank Lausche, toda je postal besedo, da ne more priti.

Kot poročajo, ne namerava Mr. Lausche imeti nobene urad-ne odprtje za svojo kampanjo.

Rim. — Komunisti v Italiji grozi-jo, da bodo sklicali 12. do 18. aprila stavko po vsej Italiji. Prvi dan bodo stavkali 1 uro, drugi dan dve in tako na-prenej. Vzrok je, ker je na Siciliji izginil nek delavski vođa in ko-munisti zahtevajo od vlade, da ga vrne.

Potniki so prisilili češkega pilota, da jih je peljal iz dežele

Od 26 oseb se jih je 6 priglasilo, da hočejo nazaj na Češko

Munich Bavarija. — Na ame-riškem letališču je pristalo češko prevožno letalo, ki je vozilo pot-nike in posadko. Kot pripovedu-jejo, je bilo letalo na potu iz Prage v Bratislavo na Slovaško, ko so potniki zrevoltirali in pri-silili pilota, da je dal kontrolo iz rok. H kontrolam se je potem vsedel nek bivši pilot, ki je slu-žil pri angleški zračni armadi. Ta je krenil letalo naravnost proti Nemčiji ter pristal na ame-riškem letališču.

Tam so vprašali dolece, kate-ri hočejo ostati v ameriški coni in kateri se hočejo vrniti nazaj v Prago. Šest se jih je priglasi-lo za domov, med temi neka že-n-ska in pilot, ki so ga potniki od-stavili od kontrol. Češki konzul Dvorak je izdal tem šestim vize za domov.

Letalo ostane na ameriškem letališču, dokler ne pridejo ponj češki letalci iz Prage, je rekel češki konzul.

Jugoslavija in Italija bosta izpustili zaprte osebe in jih vrnele

Belgrad. — Med Jugoslavo-jia in Italijo je prišlo do sporazuma, da ponesilci in izpustiti osebe, ki so zaprte, ali ki čakajo na ob-ravnavo ter jih poslali druga drugu.

Jugoslavija je pristala na to, da bo dana na prosto voljo ita-lijanskim državljanom, ki so v ječi v Jugoslaviji, da se vrnejo domov v Italijo. Nekoč je bilo število takih v Jugoslaviji 1,500, dočim je bilo v Italiji zaprtih le 100 Jugoslovancev.

Ameriško poslanstvo v Bel-gradu je predložilo jugoslovanski vladi listo Italijanov, ki so izgi-nili iz Beneške Julije. Na tej li-sti je zapisanih več 5,000 imen, ki so izginili neznano kam iz Ju-lijske Krajine.

Polovanje Angleža po Korolanu

Leta 1644 se je rodil v Norwichu v vzhodni Angliji mož, pozneje dobro znani zdravnik Edward Browne, ki je v svojem življenju mnogo prepotoval. V svojem potovanju je prišel tudi v naše kraje. O njegovem potovanju se je ohranil dnevnik, iz katerega posnemamo nekaj zanimivosti, ki jih je Browne izdal v knjigi.

Brownova knjiga je izšla leta 1673. Trinajst let pozneje je izšel v Nurnbergu tudi nemški prevod. Ta prevod je služil kot vir Valvazorju, ki je 1689 leta izdal svojo "Slavo vojvodine Kranjske," kjer čestokrat navaja po cele odstavke iz Brownovega dela, zlasti pri opisovanju Ljubelja, Cerkniškega jezera in idrijskega rudnika. Prejkone je imel Valvazor v roki tudi angleški izvirnik, ker na nekem mestu popravlja nemški prevod.

V svoji knjigi pravi pisec, da ne more potovati s peštno kočijo, ampak na konju, da se lahko ustavi, kjerkoli želi ter krene, če treba, tudi na stranske poti in steze. Pot ga je vodila z Dunaja skozi Baden, Bruck, Knittelfeld, Judenburg, St. Vid.

"V St. Vidu smo se ustavili (verjetno ni pitoval sam, ker govori večkrat v množini) ter imeli priložnost prisostvovati uprizoritvi latinske komedije v frančiškanskem samostanu. Bilo je v maju; višje gore je še

pokrivaj sneg, nižje pa so bile vse zelene, polne smrek in mecesnov. Vreme je bilo deževno.

Iz St. Vida smo potovali v Gospo Sveto. V tem kraju je mnogo starih; mnogo pa so jih že raznesli v druge kraje ali uničili. Na tem polju sem videl tudi starino, o kateri toliko govorijo: vojvodski urestol — (Browne ga imenuje — King chair). Narejen je iz kamna, ter sestavljen v obliki dveh naslonjačev, obrnjenih drug proti drugemu. Na treh izmed teh kamnov so napisali, ki pa so gotovo starejši kot sam stol. Ob ustoličenju koroškega vojvode, pa naj si bo kralj, knez ali cesar, sedi on sam ali pa njegov namestnik na eni strani prestola, proti vzhodu, kmet pa na drugi strani, ki je obrnjena na zapad. Med ceremonijami ali obredi se dvigne kmet ter podari knezu debelega in suhega vola. Kmet mora vzeti suhega in vrniti debelega. Nato dobi oni, ki naj bo ustoličen, od kmeta še lahko zaušnico in s tem je ustoličenje končano. (Browne je ustoličenje slabo opisal. To je storil verjetno le po ustnem izročilu, ker se njegov opis ujema s poročilom opata Janeza Vetrinjskega. To tudi ni čudno, saj je od zadnjega ustoličenja pa do Brownovega prihoda h Gospe Sveti preteklo 400 let. Obenem se je pa tudi oblika obredov pri ustoličenju spremenila. Ernest Zelezni je bil 18. marca 1414 leta zadnji, ki je bil slovesno ustoličen ter je sedel tudi še na knežjem kolu. Leta 1651 pa se je zad-

nji vršilo ustoličenje po zastopnikih Ferdinanda IV. na vojvodskem prestolu, kajti Leopold I. je bil leta 1680 že ustoličen v celovski deželni hiši. (Op. prevaj.)

Od Gospe Svete smo šli v Celovec, ki je sedaj glavno mesto Koroške (do 16. stoletja je namreč bil St. Vid). Trg mesta krasi mramornat steber z Marjinih kipom na vrhu, cesarjev kip, predvsem pa lep vodnjak sredi trga. Ogromen zmaj izklesan iz enega kamna, stoji na njem, pred zmajem pa Herkul s kijem. Pravijo, da je to kip kmeta, ki je ubil zmaya, razsajajočega nekoč v teh krajih. Tudi to so pripeljali z Gosposvetskega polja. (Spomenik z zmajem so postavili 1636. leta. Kamen pa ni z Gospe Svete, kakor misli Browne, ampak so ga izklesali na Križni gori). Izmed nenavadnih starih običajev v teh krajih pripovedujejo tudi tegale: Če je bil človek osumljen tatvine, so ga obesili in tri dni zatem sodili. Če je bil kriv, so njegovo telo pustili viseti, dokler ni izginilo, v nasprotnem slučaju so ga pa snežili in pokopali na javne stroške ter opravili molitve za njegovo dušo (poročilo Eneja Silvija). Toliko iz Brownovega dnevnika, kjer govori o naših krajih. Zanimivo je, da je ravno Celovec in Gospo Sveto tako podrobno opisoval, ko je sicer pri drugih v glavnem le označeval kraje, skozi katere je potoval.

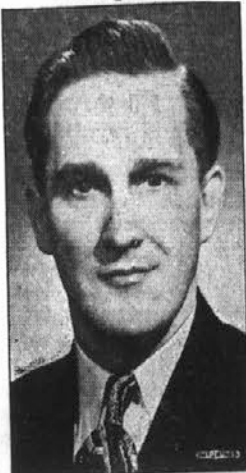

Koestler Talks on European Dilemma

A penetrating analysis of the worldwide conflict between Russian Communism and democracy will be provided for Greater Clevelanders by Arthur Koestler, internationally renowned author and journalist, when he lectures here April 20 in the Little Theatre of Public Auditorium.

Koestler, who arrived in America only two weeks ago for his first visit to this country fresh from a tour of Italy, is famous for his "Darkness at Noon" novel about the Moscow purge trials, "Thieves in the Night" a novel about Palestine, "Arrival and Departure," "Scum of the Earth" and "The Yogi and the Commissar."

He is making a speaking tour across the nation with appearances in New York, Washington, Boston, Chicago, Hollywood, San Francisco and Cleveland under the auspices of the International Rescue and Relief Committee, an organization devoted to helping anti-totalitarian refugees in Europe. The IRRC is a participating agency in American Overseas Aid and United Nations Appeal for Children.

"The European Dilemma", the subject of his talk, refers to the confusion of the people over clinging to imperfect democracies or turning to economic despair to Communism.

Koestler is contributing his lecture tour to the IRRC because this organization helped his anti-totalitarian friends escape the detention camps at Le Vernet, France, and others where he also was imprisoned.

Koestler was born in Budapest and educated in Vienna. Before he was 21 he had farmed in Palestine, worked for an Arabian architect and edited a weekly in Cairo. Then he became a correspondent for a chain of German newspapers, taking part in the Arctic expedition of the Graf Zeppelin. In 1931 he joined the Communist Party, travelled through Central Asia, spent a year in the USSR. He covered the Spanish Civil War and was imprisoned by Franco. After quitting the party he was again put in a concentration camp. When released he joined the British Army as a private. Now, at 41, he lives on a sheep farm in Wales.

Fate Plays Its Pawn

In a drab suburb of London there lives a dignified lady whose social status is high but whose bank balance is dangerously low. I will call her Mrs. Stockwell in this story, which you probably will not believe. I didn't either.

Because of her impressive family connections, Mrs. Stockwell received an invitation to the wedding of Princess Elizabeth and Philip Mountbatten, and immediately was confronted with the problem of what gift to send. Rum-maging desperately through the stocks of the curiosity shops and pawnbrokers in her neighborhood, she came upon three isolated pieces of an old chess set that caught her fancy. They obviously had been carved by a master — and the price, fifteen shillings, was right. Mrs. Stockwell bought them, wrote out her card, and asked the proprietor to send them to the Princess at Buckingham Palace. Amidst the splendor of the other gifts, Mrs. Stockwell hoped her own paltry offering would be overlooked.

When the presents of the royal couple were put on exhibition for relatives and friends, Mrs. Stockwell peered anxiously at the glittering array. There was no sign of her chessmen. She turned in relief to leave the room — and then saw her gift, alone in a glass display case, with a dozen people gazing at it in admiration. A placard explained, "These priceless pieces have been missing for a century. Three generations of the royal family have sought them. Mrs. Henry Stockwell found them. Her invaluable gift completes one of the finest and most precious chess sets in the world."

Mrs. Stockwell drew her moth-eaten fur boa a little tighter about her neck and walked proudly out into the cold sunlight of the November morning.

Result of Failure of Two Party System

Ray T. Miller, former mayor of Cleveland and Democratic candidate for Ohio's governorship, injected a sober note into the campaign as he called attention to the results of failure of the two party system of government in foreign lands.

"Police states and dictatorships can't gain power in any country where the two-party system remains strong and alert," Miller stated. "If we are satisfied with the development of our great country, with our laws and our constitution that respects human rights and human freedom, tribute must be made to the work of party politicians, for they helped build a great America."

Acknowledging the tendency of some Americans to make light of the term "professional politician," Miller cited the nation's need for trained and politically astute leaders.

"If we have any hopes for the future, those hopes must be based on faith in the two-party system that has thus far done such a masterful job. And to strengthen that hope it is paramount that we give aid to the development of outstanding political leaders and to strengthen rather than weaken the two-party system."

Following up his deep faith in democratic forms of government, Miller pointed to this nation's free press as a major instrument of guarding our freedoms against infringement by any foreign ideology.

"Newspapers and radio are vital in making democracy work. The public must be kept informed on all policies, on all programs and duties of all public officers and their offices. Because we have the two-party system in America we are safe-guarded against deliberate abuse of the right of a free press. A member of one party certainly is going to see that we get the full truth about the policies of the opposing party — and an editor or columnist or radio commentator does his best job when he presents the full truth all the time."

Miller's own policy of press releases while he was mayor of Cleveland followed that belief. He issued such releases regularly and fairly, even when they were unfavorable to his administration. The 55-year-old native of Defiance, Ohio, has visited more than 90 counties in the state during his primary campaign and fully intends to cover them all.

"It's hard work," Miller admitted, "but the people of every county have a right to know what I stand for — and its my job to tell them."

This and That from Washington

By Congressman Frances P. Bolton

THE House more than met its deadline of March 31st for the Recovery Program by passing "S. 2202 as amended." All in all this bill, which is probably the most important measure passed in many years, is as good a compromise as could be had. When one considers the divergence of views represented by the membership it is rather an amazing fact that there were but 74 votes against it.

Great anxiety is felt in the matter of what the President will do in nominating an Administrator. So very much depends upon the prompt appointment of a top man who will have the support of the country. Delay on the President's part can create a situation full of confusion. It is more than unfortunate that there is so little confidence in the Administration at a moment when the greatest wisdom and the most unquestioned patriotic zeal is of such vast importance. Every safeguard possible was written into the language of the bill, but the initial step has to be taken by the President. Should he delay his nomination of an Administrator, you may want to write him urging prompt and wise action.

I find myself unable to refrain from expressing to you my deep joy in the overwhelming support you of the 22nd District have given the Recovery Program. There have been some honest protests, written with very real anxiety lest the program prove to be too great

a drain upon our own resources, and I am indeed grateful for them. But the opinion has been so strong in support of the program which is a step we as a Nation must take, whether for good or for ill, that it has been very impressive.

FEDERAL Aid to Education (S.472), sponsored by our Senator Taft, is considered a well drawn measure which very carefully protects against federal controls. Briefly, \$300 millions annually are authorized. States will distribute the money in the same way they now do. At least \$45 per child will be spent by local, state and federal governments. Under the bill, the education fund yardstick will be 1% of the income of the residents of the state. Federal money will be apportioned on the basis of the difference between state expenditure of 1% of income and a required minimum expenditure of at least \$45 a child each year. If states are at the minimum level, \$5.00 will be appropriated for each child. Federal grants beyond the minimum of \$5.00 will be reduced if states spend less than 2.5% of income on education. By 1952 each state must put at least 2% of its income in Schools and allocate at least \$50.00 for each pupil.

According to evidence submitted Ohio, with a personal income of \$8 billion, 632 million, with 1,539,000 children from the age of 5 through 17, spending 1.6 percent on education would receive \$5,021,000 of federal aid.

IT is interesting to learn from all parts of the country that as workers have direct experience with the Taft-Hartley law they find that it works to their benefit and gives them a security and protection they have not heretofore possessed. You will recall that that was the contention of its supporters.

Wake Up, Young America!

The Fifth Column is in your midst, trying to worm its way into the hearts of the young American Slovenes, with its misleading information that it is fighting for the Freedom of the Press. Isn't that something that America already possesses? It's a part of our Constitution! You can criticize our President and nothing will happen to you, — BUT, if you dare to criticize in Yugoslavia, it means your death warrant.

However, there is no law, — God's or man-made, which gives you the right to take away a man's good name. In our wonderful country, he also has the freedom to resort to law and make you prove your statements. In America freedom is for all, — not for a select few.

So don't let yourself be caught in the web of false information, which is just a scheme to get your sympathy and before you know it you'll be roped into Communism — fighting your God and your Country.

Follow the straight American way, obeying the laws of God and of your country and don't let yourself get befuddled with all this crying about the Freedom of the Press. We cannot stress enough the importance of keeping your hands clean in case of war.

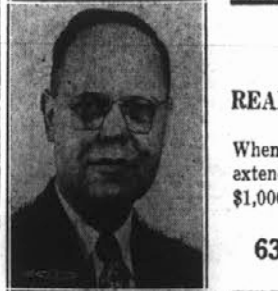
