Thank you to all of our concerned readers residing in Euclid's zone 44123 for contacting the American Home's office this week and informing us of the poor mail delivery service. We received more than 50 calls pertaining to this matter.

I immediately contacted Mr. Donald Gerome, administrator coordinator of mail processing. He expressed concern, but stressed, "Due to the future postage increase we have a huge increase in volume." I immediately responded, "How come it is only Zone 23 that has the major problem? It seems to me Zone 23 bundles are lost and I demand a complete inspection."

Finally, after a week of constant phone calls, the papers are being delivered — the Jan. 25th edition on Feb. 6! The postmaster of Zone 23 has assured me when the papers arrive there they are immediately delivered.

When Jim delivered the Tuesday, Feb. 5 paper to the main post office, each package was marked "Urgent, Rush — Top Priority" by the supervisors at the Orange Avenue receiving station.

However, before they are forwarded from the American Home, each piece of mail is separated and bundled accord-

ding to zip codes and marked with designated self-sticking red, green, or yellow signals.

Perhaps all of our complaints should be registered with our Congressmen and we should demand Congressional action before we will soon be paying \$50 for each paper's delivery.

Incidentally the American Home raised its rates for the first time since 1977 and wouldn't you know it, the post office's hefty 14% increase will absorb a great deal of it.

This past week I have neglected my administrative duties in hopes of trying to resolve this mail problem and show our readers we do care and are truly concerned with the mail delivery.

Perhaps Anne Kristoffs statement sums up this horrendous encounter of mine with the postal department. "I have been living at my present address in Euclid for 13 years and the post office is still stamping my mail, "New Street."

Legal Requirements of Non-Profit Groups

Part II

In my previous article, reference was made to some of the regulations pertaining to corporations not for profit in order to maintain their legal status.

In reviewing various Articles of Incorporation, it has been noted that many of the articles are in need of an amendment in order to update current requirements.

Many of the purpose clauses of the corporations have become outdated, and the corporations have added to or changed their purposes without making proper amendments by having the same recorded by the Secretary of the State. It is a requirement in order to obtain or maintain a tax exemption.

that a purpose clause pertaining to the "dissolution of the corporation" be included in the articles.

The purpose clause must state that all of the assets of the corporation must be transferred to such organization or organizations organized and operated exclusively for charitable, educational, religious or scientific purposes as shall at that time qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 or corresponding provisions of any future U.S. Internal Revenue Law.

Publication 557 (obtain the most recent revision titled "Tax Exempt Status of your Organization) has complete instructions pertaining to the Internal Revenue Service requirements for tax exemption.

There are 22 different 501(c) Sections. Only the 501(c)(3) allows the donor a tax deduction. Some sections are design-

ed to meet civic leagues, social welfare organizations, business leagues, social and recreation clubs. Your attorney should be consulted and the purpose clause will usually determine under what section the application should be made.

At the time of an audit by the Internal Revenue, a checklist is submitted by Internal Revenue requesting all or some of the items listed below:

- Copy of your Exemption Letter
- A copy of your Constitution, Articles of Incorporation, or other organization documents including lists of Trustees, Officers and Members
- Copy of Forms 990 and 990A for the year ending
- Minutes of all meetings of Trustees, Members and other Boards for the period (usually stated).
- Employment Tax Returns
- Check Register, Cancelled Checks, and Checking Account Statements
- Books and Records of Financial Operations
- Passbooks for any Savings Accounts
- Any Contracts and Leases entered into by the organiza-

tion

- Newsletters, Promotional Brochures, Pamphlets, and other publications

- Verification of Title to Assets
- Verification of Notes and Loans Payable
- Other Membership Rosters

The checklist referred to above is only partial and many other records and documents may be requested.

Payments made to any professional where the fees are in excess of \$600.00, a Form 1099 must be completed and filed with the IRS. In paying fees for professional services, it is important that you obtain either the Social Security number of the Federal Identification number and the full name, address and Social Security and/or Federal Identification number must be shown on each 1099. The form 1099 must be mailed to the payee on or before January 31. Copies of all the forms mentioned in this article are available from the Internal Revenue Service.



Slovene Home for the Aged Offers Share Living Option

The Slovene Home for the Aged, a 150-bed nursing home located at 18621 Neff Road in Cleveland, Ohio, announces that a new option is available for elderly residents of our community who do not require 24 hour supervision, but for whom living alone in a house or apartment is no longer possible or desirable. Such persons do not require institutional care of the kind provided by the Slovene Home for the Aged and similar facilities; yet they need or desire a more protected environment.

This concept of caring for the elderly, which is fairly new but growing rapidly, is most often referred to as "Shared Living". It involves a small group of elderly persons residing together for the purposes of social contact, mutual support and assistance. This lifestyle provides greater safety and security, offers privacy combined with companionship and a sense of independence, with the availability of immediate help if problems arise.

The Board of Trustees of the SHA has been exploring the feasibility of providing the Shared Living concept to a small number of individuals who would be desirous of it and who would meet the eligibility requirements. Last year the SHA acquired the residential property on Neff Road immediately north of the main driveway entrance to the facility. Surveys by SHA personnel, the Board of Trustees, architects, social workers and others knowledgeable in the

field determined that this residence is readily adaptable for two persons who would participate in the Shared Living concept.

Eligibility

As indicated above, the Shared Living option is for the frail elderly who do not require institutional care. The residents may have some physical handicap but must be alert enough to be on their own. They must, for example, be able to take care of their personal needs, including eating, bathing, dressing, grooming and toileting. They are responsible for taking their own medication. Also, they must have adequate income to sustain themselves and a willingness to share the home with other adults.

It is important to remember that the state and federal governments do not subsidize this kind of care, as they do for those who do not have enough resources to cover the cost of their residing in the SHA itself. Most of the 150 SHA residents now are on Medicare or other assistance. Persons or couples who would take part in the Shared Living option via the SHA would thus have to establish in advance that they could meet the costs on their own.

What Kind of Lifestyle Will Shared Living Provide?

The residence, or home, would be informal and home-like. The casual atmosphere is enhanced by a lack of set wake-up time and curfews. Each resident decides which

comfortable chair is preferred, where to sit at meals, what to eat for breakfast and when to eat it. Most residents will want to do familiar chores such as making their own beds, straightening their bedrooms, setting the table, washing and drying dishes, watering plants, folding laundry, etc.

From this it is clear that the Shared Living idea will not involve institutionalization of the kind offered by the SHA in its facility.

Persons will themselves decide after a thorough look at what is involved whether or not they wish to reside in such a home. Nor will they be required to stay if they find it is not suited to their needs. The SHA will make particular arrangements in each case. Thus, for example, it is likely most residents would want to prepare their own meals. If not, the SHA would provide meals at a reasonable cost.

Admission Procedures

The first step is for a prospective resident to come to the SHA for an application form, complete it and return it. The application will be reviewed by an admissions committee. The applicant will then be asked to visit the home where he or she would be residing, to meet with the admissions committee for an interview, at which all necessary information would be provided and questions answered.

If the applicant is still interested, the references listed in the application would be contacted, the admissions

committee would meet and a final determination of eligibility would be made. If favorable, the applicant would be invited to reside in the home, with a trial residency lasting from one to four weeks. Following this period, a lease would be signed.

Other Important Points

Shared Living assumes that the residents of such a home are compatible with each other and that none of them have major behavioral or health problems that would compromise the concept. For this reason, the Shared Living home can not accept persons with drug or alcohol abuse problems, severe health problems, and will not accept anyone via involuntary placement

or who is unable to establish that he or she can assume the costs of residing in the home.

Of course, there is not enough space here to discuss all aspects of the Shared Living concept as it will apply to the residence adjacent to the SHA building on Neff Road. Persons interested in learning more are encouraged to contact:
