"Brezrazredna" družba v komunističnih državah

Na očitke, da v Sovjetski zvezi in "ljudskih demokracij" ni politične demokracije, komunisti in njihovi sopotniki odgovarjajo: "Je pa tam ekonomska ali gospodarska demokracija, ki je važnejša?" Ampak kako naj se spravi to izjavo v sklad z dejstvom, da je v Sovjetski zvezi in v vseh "ljudskih demokracijah" mnogo večja razlika v osebnih dohodkih kakor v kateri koli demokratični deželi?

Ali moremo imenovati "komunistično" ali "socialistično" državo, kjer imajo delavci nizek življenjski standard, dočim imajo člani njene birokracije na razpolago posebne privilegije, vstevši luksuzne mestne apartemente, podeželske vile, drage avtomobile in osebno služinčad?

Kakšne vrste "socializem" je, ako je v dednem pravu, ki je bilo obnovljeno v Rusiji s posebnim zakonom dne 20. marca leta 1945, tako očitna neenakost, ki daje privilegije otrokom nove "proletarske" elite? Ali ne pomeni to razredne razlike?

V Sovjetski zvezi kakor tudi v vseh "ljudskih demokracijah" imajo vladni uradi ter industrijske naprave posebne jedilnice za uradnike in za delavce, v jedilnicah birokratov postrežejo seveda z mnogo boljšimi jedili kakor delavcem v njihovih jedilnicah.

Ali vzemimo za primer ogromno razliko med plačo po-ročnika Rdeče armade, ki ima tisoč rubljev na mesec, in plačo navadnega vojaka-prostaka, ki se mora zadovoljiti z 10 rublji na mesec... Ali je to socializem? V kapitalističnih Zed. državah ima poročnik manj kot trikrat toliko plače kot navaden vojak "private."

Sovjetsko armadno povelje z dne 23. junija 1940 je naredilo za obvezno pozdravljanje sovjetskih častnikov, tudi če slednji niso v službi, in častniki so bili obvezeni, da "pričnevanje masam Rdeče armade in prizadevanje od strani častnikov, da se tem masam pokaže demokratična občutja, nasprotuje službenim regulacijam."

"Novi pravilnik" z dne 12. oktobra 1940 pa daje častnikiom pravico, da v primerih nepokorščine "podvzamejo vse mere za uveljavljenje pokorščine, vključno sile in strelnega orožja," brez strahu pred vojaškim sodiščem in posledicami, ako se poškodbe končajo s smrtjo. S to odredbo je postala USSR edina moderna vojaška sila na svetu, kjer oficir lahko izvede smrtno kazen brez vsakega sodnega postopka.

Demokracija in svoboda v komunističnih državah.

Če bi Zed. države sledile zgledu Sovjetske zveze in "ljudskih demokracij" ter prevedale vse časopisje in publikacije, ki nasprotujejo stranki, katera je na oblasti, kaj bi rekli uredniki Prosvete in Enakopravnosti? Ali bi se tudi v tem primeru pojavila pri njih potreba zbiranja denarnih fondov za "svobodo tiska?"

Ali je ukaz potom dekreta, brez predhodne svobodne debate v zakonodaji — kar se prakticira v Sovjetski zvezi in vseh "ljudskih demokracijah" — vaša konsepacija o demokraciji?

Zakaj se v Sovjetski zvezi in "ljudskih demokracijah" ne trpi nobenega opozicijskega časopisa in zakaj ni v sovjetskem "parlamentu" ali v skupščinah "ljudskih demokracij" nikoli slišati nasprotuočega glasu?

Zakaj vi, uredniki Prosvete in Enakopravnosti, protestirate proti zatiranju tiska in govora v vseh deželah, ki jim ne vladajo komunisti, opravičujete pa in celo soglašate s tem zatiranjem v deželah, ki so pod komunistično dominacijo?

Ali nimajo ameriški komunisti in ostali nasprotniki ameriške vlade pravice tiskanja svojega časopisa, sklicavanja svojih shodov, napadanja administracije in organiziranja svojih vrst — dočim nimajo niti ene teh pravic nasprotniki sovjetske vlade in vlad "ljudskih demokracij?" Ker se tako zelo poganjate za svoje komunistične vzore in zdaj z gnevom javljate, da je ameriški kongres vrgel skozi okno Listino pravic, odgovorite na vprašanja, ki so vsebovana v gornjih stavkih! Saj se menda zavedate ali bi se morali zavedati, da ste v našem lastnem slovenskem obležju na važnem mestu, kjer ustvarjate, obliskujete in vplivate na javno mnenje, zato ste dolžni odgovoriti, če ste javno pozvani. In če boste odgovorili, ne odgovarjajte s komunističnimi šlagerji in podobnim krasnoslovjem, pa tudi ne v komunistični latovčini, kakršne se poslužuje "Slovenski poročevalci," ki "pojasnjuje," zakaj ni v Jugoslaviji vina in piva čeprav ga zdaj "ljudske" pivovarne zvarijo štirikrat več, kot so ga zvarile v predvojni gnili Jugoslaviji!

Ali odloča pri organizaciji, katere glasilo ste, volja manjše? Ali je manjšina demokracija? Ako ni, kako morete torej opraviti vladu komunističnih manjšin v Sovjetski zvezi, Jugoslaviji, Poljski Madžarski, Romuniji, Bolgariji, Albaniji in Češkoslovaški?

Kaj pravite, kaj bi se zgodilo, če bi ruski ljudje posneli ameriške komuniste, ki so leta 1940 demonstrirali pred Belo hišo ter zmerjali Roosevelta z vojnim hujškačem, če bi šli torej ruski ljudje demonstrirati pred Kremelj, kjer bi

protestirali proti zunanjim politiki premierja S. alina in nosili napise: "Molotov mora iti!" kakršne napisali so nosili komunisti v Washingtonu, s katerimi so zahtevali, da se mora državnega tajnika Byrnesa brčniti iz urada?

Torej odgovorite javnosti na ta vprašanja!

Christmas Mail for Armed Forces Overseas

The period of Oct. 15 to Nov. 15 has been designated for mailing of Christmas parcels for members of our Armed Forces serving overseas, to assure delivery before Xmas.

Packages must not weigh more than 70 lbs. and length and girth combined must not exceed 100 in. The only exception in weight concerns parcels for APO's 124 and 125, c/o Postmaster, N. Y., N.Y., where the limit is 50 lbs.

Containers must be of wood, metal or strong double-faced corrugated fiber-board wrapper in heavy paper and tied with four separate pieces of extra strong cord.

The contents should be carefully cushioned and tightly packed to prevent rattling or loosening. Unless securely packed and completely filled, boxes are likely to be crushed.

A complete and legible address showing full name of the serviceman, his rank, serial number, branch of service, A.P.O. number and postoffice, also name and address of the sender, should be printed in ink directly on the outside of the parcel rather than on labels pasted to the wrappers, since experience has shown that the labels frequently fall off when subjected to moisture.

It is highly desirable that a slip of paper containing the names and addresses of sender and addressee, together with a list of the contents, be enclosed in each parcel so as to provide identification in the event the address on the outside becomes defaced in transportation, or the parcel becomes broken open.

Matches and lighter fluid are prohibited in all overseas mail, while cigarettes and other tobacco products may not be sent to Armed Forces in certain sections of the European occupation service. Consult Postmaster.

Christmas greeting cards for Armed Forces overseas must be sent in sealed envelopes and prepaid at the first-class rates of postage.

It is recommended that postal money orders be used to transmit gifts of money to members of the Armed Forces outside the continental United States. Postal notes are payable only in the United States and should not be sent overseas.

Send no perishables. Pack securely. Address correctly. Mail early!



Slovenian Proves Hero in Seoul Drama

Tokyo. — Sept. 27. — The American Marines fought their way into Seoul, capital of Korea, while other forces whipped out a 125-mile Allied noose around many thousands of Reds in the South, and Gen. MacArthur announced the liberation of the Capitol.


FREEDOM OF INQUIRY

It is not the known communists and their followers who present the greatest threat to the United States. It is their dupes, those citizens who take pride in their alleged capacity to view all sides of a question with the impartial eye of a surgeon while managing to avoid the expression of personal conviction. These intellectual "drifters" are a threat to freedom that is difficult to measure, because in many instances their veneer of impartiality hides bitter animosity to the American system. In other words, they do have convictions—the wrong kind. And they espouse them subtly in "textbooks" on government and economics.

Raymond Moley, a well known commentator for Newsweek magazine, recently described a text of this nature. "The introduction," says Mr. Moley, "bears the presumptuous claim that the book provides students 'certain basic tools of analysis.' It is a compilation of articles accompanied by the authors interpretations. 'The net of all these articles,' declared Mr. Moley, 'is that competition is dying or dead, that a few corporations control economic life, that only the state must be allowed to save us, and that government planning is essential. This was and is the philosophy of British Socialism.' There was no effort to include the views of those who disagree with this thesis.

Open advocacy of ideas is one thing, but presenting those ideas while wearing a cloak of judicious impartiality is the height of hypocrisy and deserves nothing but contempt. Textbooks in schools and universities have become a favorite medium for weakening convictions, destroying faith in the individual and opening the door to mass coercion. Freedom of inquiry is a basic right. It should be exercised by parents as well as professors.

Our institutions of higher education which enjoy freedom of expression and action should be judged more critically on their textbooks and their teachers, with the thought of upholding instead of undermining American traditions.

SPIRITUAL RENEWAL

This and That from Washington

By Congressman Frances P. Bolton

THE Congress has adjourned as of Saturday, September 23. Under the adjournment resolution as passed, the President is authorized to call us back into session at any time. There were many of us in the House who voted against any adjournment until an excess profits tax should be passed. But, as usual, the will of the Majority prevailed.

The local result is that I am back in the District picking up the threads of the campaign. In the course of these next weeks I shall hope to see and talk with a great many of you.

THE confusion in draft regulations is increasingly serious. Especially is this so in the farm and food production field. Workers are being called up regardless of what their going means to production. No unit system has been set up as existed during the war years. No farm owner or farm worker knows what may happen to him. No program exists. A farm worker, a vegetable greenhouse man, is a specialist not easily come by.

I have contacted the Department of Labor. Finding Secretary Tobin in Miami, I talked with Under Secretary Galvin. I told him briefly that farmers and growers cannot understand and resent the fact that in listing critical jobs no consideration was given such work—and that some action must be taken to resolve the confusion that exists, which is beginning to result in actual abandonment of some of the farms.

At the Secretary's suggestion I have talked with Frank Collopy, head of the Bureau of Employment and Security in Columbus, as well as with Walter A. Scheid of Napoleon, Ohio, who is the Ohio Advisor in these matters to the Secretary of Labor. In addition, Mr. Grayson of our Cleveland Employment Office has con-

fided with me as has the field man, Mr. Taft. Let us hope that something will be worked out quickly that will leave the trained men in the food producing areas of our economy.

THE Public Health Service has announced that it has \$3,600,000 available to non-federal institutions and scientists for research with the new drugs, cortisone and ACTH (Adrenocorticotropic hormone). Grants will be made for research in the fields of arthritis and cancer, mental, Neurological, metabolic and cardiovascular diseases, as well as for basic laboratory studies in the general biological effect of the compounds.

MOSCOW has refused to return two lend-lease ice-breakers: excuse, "icebound somewhere near Tiski." But it is known that Moscow has been developing a northern sea route from the Baltic and the Great Stalin Canal all the way to Vladivostok. Normally the route is frozen in by October 1st, but with enough ice-breakers it might be kept open a good month more. With luck a lot of supplies could be shipped through Russia's own territorial waters. Even a part of the Soviet Navy, including submarines, could be transferred to East Asia.

THESE are days of decision for the people of this great free nation of ours—days when no man has any right to set aside his personal responsibility towards the future. What we need on Capitol Hill is a Congress made up of people who are not afraid to think and know how to do so; people who are experienced not only in living, but also in government; people who have demonstrated their interest in human problems, human needs, human aspirations, and who have a proven record of practical achievement upon which free Americans can put their trust.

Such a Congress can be voted in on November 7th—if every registered voter takes his responsibilities seriously and votes for the best interests of his country rather than for the special interests of any group.

A county-wide campaign to reduce the rising pedestrian traffic toll has been launched by the Mayors Traffic Safety Education Committee.

Promotion materials announcing the pedestrian campaign slogan, "Stop, Look, Walk" will be on display during the next three months on street poles, billboards and car cards throughout Greater Cleveland.

Chairman Jesse T. Smith of the Mayors Committee warned that the campaign will be stressed for 3 months because of the sharp increase in pedestrian deaths in October, which reaches its peak in November and December. There are already 40 deaths this year, compared to 52 fatalities for the entire year of 1949.

Two-thirds of all pedestrian traffic accidents are 50 years of age or older, and statistics reveal that a fairly static percentage of the population each year makes the same foolish, fatal mistakes.

Most common actions of pedestrians resulting in deaths and injuries; the Committee stated, are caused by crossing at intersections, crossing between intersections, jaywalking, children playing in the street, people working on roads coming from behind parked cars and others.

Five fundamental pedestrian rules were outlined for the three month campaign:

1. Obey traffic signals. Look all ways, then go directly across. Observe barriers and police directions.

2. Don't walk into the roadway from behind parked cars.

3. Step off buses or street cars with caution.

4. Walk on sidewalks wherever available.

5. Wear or carry something white at night.

Great progress has been made

were 1528 cases of diphtheria as compared with 8 in 1949 and there

were 134 cases of smallpox as compared with none for the past 6 years. Vaccination against smallpox is a safe and simple procedure. Children can be protected against diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough and other diseases by measures so simple that it would seem criminal to deprive them of the protection. Take your child to the family doctor for vaccination and immunization, or if the services of a private physician cannot be secured, to a Division of Health Child Welfare Clinic.

STRAIGHT FROM WASHINGTON

Washington. — In 1945, as Military Governor of the Province of Reggio Emilia, Italy, the writer frequently came into headlong conflict with Russian Communists. In fact, the hammer and sickle was much in evidence throughout that Province. Of 31 municipalities, the 29 largest including Reggio Emilia, a city of more than one hundred thousand, were governed by Communist sindaci (mayors). Communists fomented riots, broke into jails and murdered many persons. They fired upon American soldiers. The writer came to despise and fear Communists and Communism.

In the closing days of this session, both branches of Congress passed by overwhelming vote, over the Presidential veto, a bill aimed to control Communists and subversives. All Communists must register. They are forbidden to hold Federal jobs, restrictions on immigrants and aliens have been tightened and in event of a national emergency, authority is given for confinement of Communists in concentration camps. In this grave period, with murder, oppression and tyranny stalking across the world, stern measures seem necessary in order to combat Communists who would destroy free institutions.

It may be noted that at the outset of the Civil War, President Lincoln suspended the writ of habeas corpus, which is a right dear to all Americans.
