Bondage in the Name of Liberty

In a discussion of the welfare state idea, Dean Russell of the Foundation For Economic Education observed, "The advocates of this compulsory 'security' honestly seem to believe that most Americans . . . are too ignorant, or lazy, or worthless to be trusted with their own destiny; that they will literally starve in the streets unless their welfare is guaranteed by a 'benevolent' government. However good their intentions may be, these disciples of a Relief State are demanding that they be given the power to force mankind to follow their plans. In the name of liberty they advocate bondage!"

The complete welfare state must be a slave state. In the early days of this country, when slavery of the Negro existed, Georgia passed laws that guaranteed to all slaves "the right to food and raiment, to kind attention when sick, to maintenance in old age . . ." The slaves thus were given "security." But they were slaves nonetheless, subject to the unchallengeable orders of their masters.

In modern times, we have seen "security" on a far wider scale. In Russia, for instance, everyone is given a place to live and a certain amount to eat and wear. They are given a minimum of state medical care. They are "guaranteed" employment, and, of course, the state determines where, when and for how long they shall work, and how much they shall be allowed to earn. But the people are slaves, just as the Negroes were in the America of a century ago. They do what they are told, or else.

The welfare state regards everyone as a ward of the government.

There are those in our own government who are now working hard to sow the seeds of the welfare state here thru public medicine, housing, banking, power development, farming etc.

**HOLY NAME PLFDE**

'Red' 9 Years, He Finally Reveals He Is FBI Agent

Pittsburgh. — Matt Cvetic, who for nine years was regarded as a bona fide Communist by the party, his family and his friends, revealed he had been an undercover man for the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

So well did Cvetic keep his secret that his two sons thought him a party member until he revealed his true role. His mother, who tried for years to reform his Communist thinking, died last October without knowing her son was working for the government. One sister, a nun, has been praying for his salvation.

As a confidante of top Communist figures Cvetic was a leader in many organizations set up here by the party. But now Cvetic is revealing the strategy of the party and its aims.

Cvetic, 41, said the Communists labelled Pittsburgh a "concentration area." He told his story in Washington to investigators for the House Un-American activities committee. He will testify publicly before the committee next week.

Earlier this month Cvetic testified in secret before Allegheny County Court Judge Blair F. Gunther, chairman of the committee to stop world communism and founder of the "Americans Battling Communism."

Asked what he thinks of communism, Cvetic said:

"I'd rather sit in the city dump, picking garbage, than live under communism."

This and That from Washington

KOREA. The leadership in the House rectified its mistake in the matter of Korean aid by bringing to the Floor and passing S. 2319. This Bill gives non-military aid of \$60,000,000 to South Korea, and \$10,500,000 to Formosa.

POSTAL PROMOTION. The House last week passed H. R. 6553, a Bill providing for the promotion of carriers in rural delivery service in recognition of longevity of service. Also H.R. 6603, which provides that certain services performed in custodial work and in mail equipment shops of the Post Office Department shall be credited towards promotion.

POSTAL RATES. The House last week passed H.R. 2495 raising postal rates \$131,000,000 annually. The increased rate would apply to twelve classes of postal services, ranging from a raise of one cent to two cents on postal cards, 15¢ to 20¢ on special deliveries, to a reduction in the size of most parcel post packages. These Bills now go to the Senate.

NATURAL GAS. Hearings before a Sub-committee of the House Interstate Commerce Committee are continuing on H.R. 5306, a Bill to amend the Natural Gas Act. Sec. Chairman Henry A. McDonald has testified that there is no intention to disturb state jurisdiction over the issuance of securities by local distribution companies, operating within state borders, rather is it the suggestion that the issuance of securities by Interstate natural pipe lines be made subject to Federal Power Commission regulation. The Independent Natural Gas Association of America testified in strong opposition.
