

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### Short History of Slovene Literature

By F. T. SUHADOLNIK

### Josip Jurcic. Manhood.

In opposition to Stritar's romantic circle and in opposition to Stritar's romantic idealism was opposed the circle of Ljubljana writers composed of Levstik, Levec and Jurcic who were strong supporters of realism.

Josip Jurcie had been active in the novel for a long time and had been successful in it even in his school days. In fact the days he spent at the University of Vienna were spent as an income of his literary work. It was during these years that he had already published the most famous of his novels: 'Deseti Brat' and some other of his novels which have taken the popular fancy because of their simplicity and free use of the peasant language. The support which he received from the stories was given him from the papers to which he contributed. Among them the "Slovenski Glasnik" edited and published by Janezic was the foremost. But when that could not stand the financial crisis and ceased publication Jurcic was forced to leave his Vienna studies and find livelihood elsewhere. From his student days remain the begining of "Cvet in Sad" which he was forced to suspent writing because pressure on his forces to secure his daily bread was too strong. It was only later that he had a chance to complete it.

For three years Jurcic tried his hand at various pursuits in Vienna in a desperate effort to complete his studies but to no avail, it was impossible for him to succeed. In 1868 he gave it up as a bad job and said farewell to the university city as a student. He secured a position at the newly established "Slovenski Narod" (Slovene Nation). In 1870 he was again in Vienna not as a student, but, as helper to Stritar at

the "Zvon" and if possible to continue his studies. The latter he never realized. In the fall of the same year his condition financially was so poor that he was forced again to leave Vienna and apply for the position of co-editor of the "Sudslawische Zeitung" which began to appear in the beginning of 1871. When the editor of the Slovenski Narod suddenly died in May of 1871 Jurcic was chosen to succeed him. In the middle of July, Jurcic came to Maribor, in the following year he moved with the paper to Ljubljana.

Through all of the time it took Jurcic to find a place for himself the literary work rested. Especially after the time his effort with the Slovenski Glasnik failed in 1869 and the "Zvon" ceased publication in 1870. Practically all of his narrative work of this time is written in a hurried style and has the form of individual contributions. This is also noticed in the longer novels of the time. "Sin kmetskega cesarja" (Son of the peasant emperor) written in 1869 and "Ivan Erazem Tatenbach" written in 1873 have signs of the hurried and forced work.

### Slovene Library

When in 1876, the "Zvon" began to appear again in Vienna, Jurcic established the Slovene Library publications in Ljubljana. In the series that came from its presses are found in the same year two of Jurcic's novels: "Doktor Zober" "Med dvema stolama" (Between two chairs) and the tragedy "Tugomir". "Doktor Zober" is constructed on the style of Deseti Brat and, in fact, has the name of one of the characters who plays an important part in the subplot and furnished the background to the main plot and love theme. There is more artistry expressed in the novel "Med dvema stolama" a realistic picture of the life of the educated few among the peasant class. The basis for the dramatic "Tugomir" is taken from the history of the struggle of the ancient Slavs with the Franks in Sasa. Jurcic began to write the play in 1870 with the trochee but completed it first in prose. Upon the advice of Levstik and with his help he changed the meter to the jambic and succeeded in making the whole much more finished and rounded both in the construction and in character delineation.

### Renewed work

In 1877 the Series and the Slovene Library ceased to function and Jurcic's "Lepa Vida" was published in the same year in Stritar's "Zvon". Lepa Vida was written in the style of the folk tales and he succeeded in showing his artistry in the fine character pictures and in the description of the locale which is laid in the shores of the Adriatic near and about the city of Devin. In the meantime Jurcic completed the "Cvet in sad" (Blossom and Fruit) which he laid aside more than nine years previously. It appeared in the last volume of "Slovenska knjižnica" series. Originally he had planned to close the story with a tragic end but upon advice and recommendations of his friends he changed it to a "happy ending" without changing anything of the style or changing the action of the play in anyway. In the meanwhile he was busy with gathering material for the ensuing works which he had intended to complete. The outline for the comedy "Olikani Slovenec" was ready and he was getting the details for the novel, "Nemški naseljenec" (The German Immigrant) and the novel, "Baron Paravic" all the time he was busy with a "triple decker" historical novel "Slovenski svetec in učitelj" of which he finished only the first part. For the Mohor Society he wrote the humorous monograph "Kako je Kotarjev Peter pokoro delal, ko je krompir kradel" (How Peter did his Penance for Stealing Potatoes) and the educational story, "Ponarejeni bankovci" (Forged Money).

### His sickness

In 1879, Jurcic, who was never of the most robust health, became seriously sick. As a result of a cold he was also attached with pleurisy. In March of 1880 he was sufficiently well to take a trip to a warmer climate. He visited Goritza and Venice and soon was well enough to actively take up his duties.

Slevene literary conditions of this time began to develop so fast that Stritar's "Zvon" though a first class literary paper of the time soon could not keep up with the rapid strides in literature and soon became "old fashioned". Stritar's own literary ideals and ideas were soon discarded by the new set of literary

men. Stritar noticed this and with oncoming of felt that he would discontinue the publication "Zvon" in 1880. As soon as this was discovered decided that he, with the company of Kersnik, and Tavcar would establish a literary paper in bljana. With the New Year 1881 the first edi the "Ljubljanski Zvon" made its first appearance corporating the ideals of the Vienna Zvon more modern style. Fran Levec its editor soon the quality of the paper to such high standards it was the leading literary paper in Slovenija for time. ### Answer to the Call

In December, 1880 Jurcic again became se sick as a result of a cold and in spite of the condition he worked unceasingly and without crease in his work.
