### Prebivalstvo Palomaresa bi rado še 2.5 milijonov

MADRID, Šp. — Lani 17. januarja sta trčili nad Palomaresom v južni Španiji v zraku dve ameriški letali, bombnik B-52 s štirimi hidrogenskimi bombami in tankersko letalo K-135. Tri vodikove bombe so naglo odkrili in odstranili, četrta je padla v morje in so jo iskali in končno našli ter potegnili z morske globine.

Ker je bila ena od bomb nekoliko poškodovana in je bilo nekaj zemlje okužene z radiacijo, so ameriške vojaške oblasti vse to odstranile in prizadetim posestnikom dale odškodnino. Skupaj je bilo v zvezi s tem izplačano 475 osebam \$558,104. Posestniki Palomaresa in drugih sosednjih naselij bi radi dobili od Združenih držav na račun "škode" še 2.5 milijona dolarjev.

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

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


### Project Heartbeat '67 Set For Jan. 25

January 25th is the day, 11,000 volunteers is the goal, TO 1-8800 is the number to call. The event is "Project Heartbeat '67," conducted by WKYC Radio 1100 to recruit 11,000 volunteers to march on Heart Sunday, February 26th.

Spearheading the all-day marathon recruitment will be Charlie Brown and Irving Harrigan, new morning team on WKYC Radio.

Beginning at 6 a.m. operators in "Project Heartbeat" headquarters in the Sheraton-Cleveland Hotel will begin receiving calls from listeners in the eight counties served by the Heart Association. The counties are Cuyahoga, Ashtabula, Erie, Geauga, Huron, Lake, Lorain and Medina.

All of those volunteering will be asked to march in their own communities as assigned on Heart Sunday, February 26th.

Heart Sunday is the culmination of the month-long Heart Fund campaign sponsored annually by the Heart Association of Northeastern Ohio to raise funds to support year-round programs of research, education and community service. Included among the programs are the Rheumatic Fever Prevention Program utilizing mail-in throat swabs for cultures, and the Work Classification Clinic which evaluates the work capacity of persons who have suffered heart attacks.

### Professional Jobs Open In Social Security

The Social Security Administration is seeking qualified persons who are interested in jobs as interviewers in Social Security district offices throughout Ohio and Michigan. The jobs involve interviewing persons who are applying for benefits payable under the Social Security laws. Also, you will be helping persons seeking information under the new Medicare law.

The entrance positions start at \$5331 per year or \$6451 per year and are based on written examinations. For those entering at \$5133 per year the requirements are that they must have either (1) completed or expect to complete (within nine months) a four-year course leading to a Bachelor's Degree, or (2) have three years of experience in administrative, professional, investigative or other responsible work, or (3) a combination of the above education and experience.



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



**THE 90TH CONGRESS.** Section 2 of the 20th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution states: "The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall begin at noon on the 3rd day of January, unless they shall by law appoint a different day." By law, the 2nd Session of the old 89th Congress appointed January 10, 1967, as the day on which the first session of the 90th Congress would meet. Thus, at 12 noon on Tuesday the House of Representatives and the Senate of the United States were called to order signifying the official opening of the 90th Congress. There is always a certain excitement over the reconvening of the Congress. This year was certainly no exception! The session was opened by the Clerk of the House who called upon the Chaplain for prayer. Then the roll was called alphabetically by States, with all Members-elect included who had been duly certified by State officials. The Conference Chairman of the two parties nominated the respective candidates for Speaker chosen by the Party Conference held prior to the session. Speaker John McCormack for the Democrats and the Minority Leader, Gerald Ford of the Republicans. The roll was then called and the Democrats being in the majority elected Speaker McCormack. Mr. Ford made a short speech introducing the Speaker, who then followed with a speech welcoming the new members and calling for unity and support in getting the legislative work done in the 90th Congress. Speaker McCormack was administered the oath of office by the senior House Member, Representative Emanuel Celler of New York.

Prior to administering the oath to the House membership in a body, the Speaker recognized members who wished to challenge the seating of any Member-elect. At this point, Representative Van Deerlin (D-Calif.) asked that Representative-elect Adam Clayton Powell of New York stand aside, and Representative-elect Benjamin Blackburn of Georgia was asked to stand aside also because of technicalities involving certain election ballots in his election. Mr. Blackburn was subsequently administered the oath and permitted to take his seat, although the Committee on Elections will continue to look into that matter until it is finally resolved. However, as you will have read, after considerable debate Mr. Powell was not permitted to take his seat pending the outcome of an investigation by a Select Committee of 9 Members — 5 Democrats and 4 Republicans — appointed by the Speaker. This Committee must report their findings within five weeks. In the meantime, Mr. Powell will be on the House payroll but he will not be permitted to vote or participate in proceedings. His chairmanship of the House Committee on Education and Labor had previously been taken away as a result of action by the Democratic caucus.

After an all-day session devoted to procedural matters and seating of Members-elect, the House returned for a joint session with the Senate to hear the President's address on the State-of-the-Union. The content of the speech which draws most comment is his proposal for a tax increase — a 6% tax on

These days people don't wait for a great event as an excuse to have a party. The young way to entertain is an informal get-together of family and friends for no other reason than enjoyment of the company and good food.

## Party Green Bean Casserole

1 package (9 oz.) French green beans with sautéed mushrooms  
1/2 cup sliced water chestnuts  
2 tablespoons water  
1 tablespoon butter  
1 can (10-1/2 oz.) condensed cream of celery soup  
1 cup cooked French fried onion rings

Place green beans with mushrooms in a 1-1/2 quart casserole. Add water, chestnuts, water, and butter. Cover with condensed soup. Bake, covered, at 350° for 15 minutes. Remove from oven. Stir, then bake, covered, for 30 minutes longer. Remove cover and spread onion rings over top. Bake, uncovered, for 5 minutes longer. Makes 6 servings.

Try adding a few tender young spinach leaves, celery tops, or mustard greens to a green salad.

## CUTTING THE WEDDING CAKE

In Anglo-Saxon times, each guest was required to bring a sweet bun to the wedding, and all the buns were piled high. If the bride and groom were able to kiss over the top, they were assured of lifelong prosperity. Eventually, a traveling French chef entered the picture and applied ingenuity — and icing — to the mass of buns. This creation, though doubtless lumpy, was nevertheless a culinary milestone, for it became the precursor of the many-jointed wedding cake.

The cutting of the wedding cake has always been an occasion for ceremony. During medieval times, it was performed with great flourish, by means of the bridegroom's sword — and this swashbuckling gesture is still observed at military weddings. (It also made headlines following the White House reception of Alice Roosevelt Longworth in 1918, when Theodore Roosevelt's daughter snatched the saber of a military aide, brandished it aloft, and sliced away gleefully.)

A sterling silver cake knife, preferably one that matches the bride's sterling, has replaced the sword at most of today's wedding receptions. Some sterling patterns include a special "wedding cake knife" which is larger than the usual cake knife and sometimes has a slightly curved and sword-like blade. The blade may be engraved with the initials of the bride and groom and the wedding date, to serve as a happy memento when the knife is used later for anniversaries and other festive occasions.

Traditionally, the wedding cake knife is decorated with white satin ribbon or a small cluster of white flowers. The bride holds the knife in her right hand, and the groom, standing back and slightly to the right, places his right hand over her right hand. The first slice is cut from the first or bottom layer. After the bride and groom have shared it, the cutting is turned over to the caterer, a waiter or friend, and all guests are served.

For a long time, convention called for two cakes — the bride's white cake, which was cut and served at the reception, and the groom's dark fruitcake. The fruitcake was cut into squares, put into small white boxes and stacked on a table near the bride's cake for guests to take home as souvenirs and to "dream on." The usual procedure today is to serve only the bride's cake. Sometimes the top layer is dark fruitcake, which can be sealed in aluminum foil before it's iced and saved for the first anniversary.

Wedding cakes turned out by caterers are usually elaborate creations, but it's entirely possible to prepare a lovely wedding cake in your own kitchen. Using packaged white cake mix, bake two each of 12-inch, 9-inch and 6-inch layers. Spread frosting or jam between identical-sized layers, then place together in tiers. Frost cake and decorate. The following recipe is ideal for decorating, for the frosting stays smooth and creamy and will not crust over.

## Wedding Cake Frosting

2 cups sifted cake flour  
3 1-pound packages confectioners' sugar  
4 cups vegetable shortening (white)  
1 cup egg whites, unbeaten  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 tablespoon vanilla lemon or almond flavoring


Combine all ingredients in large bowl of electric mixer and mix until smooth and creamy. Cover sides and top of each tier of cake with an even layer of frosting, and spoon remaining frosting into pastry bag

for decorating. If you'd rather not attempt anything more ambitious than frosting garlands or edgings, Gumdrop Roses are lovely decorations for a wedding cake, and are surprisingly easy to make.

## Gumdrop Roses

Use large pastel-colored or white gumdrops. Place gumdrop on side then dip sharp knife into hot water, and cut gumdrop vertically into five or six equal slices. Holding smallest slice between thumb and finger (rounded part at top), squeeze base together firmly so that gummy part adheres. Place this

## Eye Of A Needle



Today's modern ball-point pen is one of the most precisely made of the utilitarian items taken for granted the world over. For example, these tungsten carbide pellets, shown magnified eight times their actual size, are so minute that three of them, with the aid of tweezers, can be placed on the eye of a needle. They are used as the writing tip for the more than one million ball-points manufactured daily in Milford, Conn. Each pellet measures seven-tenths of one millimeter and can squeeze into the thimble shown.

pinched edge against center base of next-largest slice and press base of second slice around base of first slice, pinching firmly as before. Repeat with remaining slices, building up from smaller to larger "petals." Fan tops out, and dip base of finished rose in granulated sugar. To make stems and leaves, roll out gumdrop on sugared board and cut with sharp knife.
