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"Do or Die" is the Battle Cry; "Doodlebug" Drafts Camp Chum; \$14,000,000,000—Why? Where?; Conscription a Contradiction of Our Democracy?

Readers' Note: This article is the sixth and concluding installment of a series on military life at Fort Benjamin Harrison, Ind.

"Don't think so! And remember as a soldier, that there's only one way to do something in Uncle Sam's army and that's the right way," shouted the sole-headed "sarge."

Where could one better apply this question: "Your's is to do or die!" than in this military life? Immediately upon entering the service of the army your freedom is cut short. The individual means absolutely nothing. After all, what's one soldier more or less? Rules, regulations, commands—they're important and they're to be respected and moreover obeyed. Never ask questions, obey blindly. Maybe the "top kicks" know what goes on, why should you worry, that's their headache even though it'll be your head if someone bungles. Regardless whether logic indicates differently, plans must be followed to the "T." Here's an example of the system. On the drill field one morning, during actual war maneuvers, an infantry man lay down into the prone firing position with his feet dangling—a military mortal sin.

Fuming and blue in the face from cussing, an army sergeant all but court martialed this innocent fellow: "... (censored) ... get them stinkin' feet parallel to the ground, bud, or I'll bury 'em." Curious, the doughboy asked the fatal question, "Why?" Adding fuel to the flame the sergeant flew into a rage. "Who in the heck gives a --- if you get shot through your thick skull. The army can always use the uniform over again, but when a man gets shot in the shin it means hospital care and a lot of extra trouble. We'd much rather dig a grave." That incident illustrates the point well.

PHYSICAL BENEFITS VALUABLE; CHARACTER TRAINING... WELL

Daily exercise, organized athletic programs and other factors develop the body of any growing young man. Wholesome food in generous quantities consumed by boys with enormous appetites builds powerful physiques. Fresh Hoosier atmosphere and the sultry Indiana sunshine both have effect on the muscle side of all the boys at the C. M. T. C.

But the moral angle presents an altogether different story. Thrown in with boys of all kinds, Liths, Poles, Dagoes, Greeks, Bohunks, Shinnies, oldsticks and real Americans (Indians) and, cops, I almost forgot, Grinders (Slovenians) from Cleveland's four colonies, St. Clair, Nottingham, Newburgh and Collinwood, also were represented at Fort "Benn." and these various kinds did have an effect on the boys. In need of a flag pole the captain asked a cadet to find him a pole. Imagine the surprise of the commander when the kid came back after the frantic search. "Couldn't find a Pole, sir will this Lithuanian do?"

A vast assembly of religions might be an effective factor. Still no matter what your belief may be, the cadets had mutual understanding on that score. Everybody respected the other's religion. There we notice the democratic spirit inherent in these widely different boys.

Unpleasant, yes, however to be realistic and include the entire picture, this narrative includes a discussion on the vulgar rather than vile lingo of the army personnel. It must be admitted that the language used by the Fort's population is unfit for a lady's ears. Drumming your ears every minute those words do affect you. Before long, probably unconsciously you accumulate a questionable vocabulary too. Officers, non-coms, and privates are all victims of this verbal malady. What's noticeable is the fact that no attempt is made to curb the speech. Like other military idiosyncrasies, some peculiar problems result from this torrid trend. A delicate looking boy with horn rimmed glasses approached me one evening. Now, I'd sworn this "little Lord Fancleroy" appearing kid wouldn't recite anything stronger than Shakespeare. But, boy, oh boy! His line of lingo would positively make a saltwater sailor blush with shame. On the other extreme, some "Dead End" looking guys could slay you with that Park Avenue style. Luckily, when the boys hand in their uniforms and leave the Fort, they forget their acquired vocabulary. It seems as though this strong lingo is really simply a habit of soldier life.

Smoking? It's prevalent. The only thing bad about it, claim the boys, are the cheap guys who go bumming butts.

HOW WOULD YOU ACCOUNT FOR STRANGE ATTITUDE... INTUITION?

Robert Orem was a regular fellow. Agile, clear faced, genial, blue eyed—typical American youth. Hailing from the rubber city—Akron—"Bob," as we called him, just graduated from high school. See, folks, I knew Robert Orem well—I should have. Alphabetically, he was right behind me. Number 148 was my number; his was 146. For thirty days we slept, ate, played and as a corporal, I even drilled him in squad movements. . . . we lived together. He came from fine Irish folk and he was as green for dear old Ireland as St. Patrick himself. And he had a bouquet of those "Wild Irish Roses," because he got a gang of letters from feminine admirers which we read aloud according to tradition and we even threw him in the shower for getting three letters in one day—that's another age-old rule.

Naturally, you'd be stunned, as was I, if you looked down the list of forty-three dead on August 1st, who were killed on the "Doodlebug" on July 31st. (Robert Orem, 17, C. M. T. C. cadet, Akron, Ohio). Check, double check! Chez, it's him. Death came instantly to "Bob." Once more you'll hear the

much related story. I hesitate repeating it. Coincidence, circumstance, aftermath, how? I hope one of those scientific theories would explain the situation. They don't.

Full of fun and the "blarney" at all times, Bob impressed me strangely that morning when we broke camp. While waiting for final inspection and discharge papers, I finally broke the silence. "Sorry to leave the old penitentiary, Bob?" I asked. He mumbled some inaudible reply. His eyes still sparkled, yet a ah, ah, gee I dunno, a curtain separated them from the existing world. You feel it, then it's an unearthly, inexplicable emotion. You have simply gotta do something, but what? That's prayer. Even an atheist could feel that somehow that boy isn't gone. He must be somewhere. When you pray it's like communicating with that exhilarating spirit again. Mystifying how death can startle persons into the realization of a Supreme Commander. "He went West," is what they said in France whenever anyone died. Bobo went . . . went where all the good soldiers go . . . heaven.

Nevertheless, death is a natural occurrence. Don't pity Robert Orem. Maybe we should envy him. He's attained the ultimate end. We struggle on . . . worry, fight. Armies rumble forward, headlines produce insomnia. Hitler, Mussolini scare us into rash movements. Conscription, taxes, defense, war, war, war, is our "Doodlebug."

FOURTEEN BILLIONS: HOW MUCH DOES IT COST YOU IN DOLLARS AND CENTS?

Before you go and get yourself all tangled up in zeros, figuring just how much you'd dig into your pocket to pay the National Defense bill, be prepared to lay out approximately one hundred greenbacks for the Army and Navy. (That's computed at a population of 13,000,000. It's not exact but what's a few pennies when there's billions to be spent?) You'll pay it too in entertainment tax, cigarette tax, etc.

Since the good old American public is standing the bill, it's got a right to know where the hard earned money goes. Ships, tanks, airplanes, guns . . . instruments of death . . . are constructed out of part of the money. Over and above the graft, the rest of the billions is put into funds and maintenance appropriations.

D'ya ever wonder how many real things could be done with that money? Couldn't our youth be trained in churches and schools, built by this money, the principles of JUSTICE and CHARITY instead of those of GREED AND HATE? Certainly. But barracks are being built, guns take the place of the cross.

COMPARISON PROVES NECESSITY

Beyond a doubt, our country is in dire need of military defense. Germany has an army which scorns the United States' meager troops and equipment. 3,500,000 soldiers are at Adolf's command. U. S. has 220,000.

Eight thousand modern tanks form the Nazi blitzkrieg force, 350 old World War tanks are in our service. Germany has 25,000 airplanes compared to the 6,000 of the United States. You can readily see if it were a matter of military technique, the Nazis could destroy us quickly.

Right now the army is attempting to reach a peace time limit which is 400,000 soldiers. However, the new bills want to shoot the army up to 1,000,000 men in a period of eighteen months.

NATIONAL LEECH OR PARASITE DEFTLY DESCRIBES ARMY

Living off the fat of the land. The army just exists. Never contributing anything of practical value to the welfare of the nation. It cost us \$435,634,219 to maintain the U. S. Army last year. Did it produce anything?

Like anything else, the control of the army has been placed into the hands of a selected few. Generations of a few families mostly, comparable to the European aristocracies, rule the military machine of the country.

Officers send their sons to West Point and they come out officers and so on down the line. You see, a man who enlists in the army cannot become an officer. His highest goal is a sergeantship. This ruling chaste or class is exclusive.

To account for some of the expenditures, here are the various grades of pay to the non-coms. Figures for the officers' pay weren't available, Buck private, \$21; private first class, \$26; corporal, \$42; master sergeant, \$157.

Remember that includes food, clothing, board and all other needs. So a soldier has a clear profit pay.

CONSCRIPTION PLAN...

Take it for granted that some form of military expansion is going to take place. It's all a cleverly calculated scheme. First they asked for money to build and build. "Arms without men is as bad as men without arms," they, the capitalists, holler. Every gun must belong to a man, each plane takes fifteen men to operate (mechanics, ground crew, radio, etc.) and the barracks being built with terrific speed at Fort Benjamin Harrison must be occupied. No fools, these manufacturers. After all it's them that are yelling for drafts and conscriptions that someone's got to make use of his innovations so he can collect his profit.

The above is only one reason against the conscription. Now the army is filled with depression-ridden men who took army life as a last resort. They despise the life they live. What'll be the case if men are forced to take the army life?
