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- PREGLED NAJAVAŽNEJŠIH DOGODKOV -

Predstavniki obih kongresnih domov se intenzivno pogajajo o temeljiti reformi zveznega davčnega sistema

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Ustanovljen je bil poseben 22-članski kongresni odbor, v katerem je 11 kongresnikov in 11 senatorjev. V naslednjih tednih bodo ti predstavniki Kongresa razpravljalji o končni obliki temeljite reforme zveznega davčnega sistema. Vsak dom zveznega kongresa je že odobril zakonski osnutek za tako reformo, vendar se osnutek spodnjega doma razlikuje od senatnega. Poseben odbor ima nalogu, obe verziji usklajevati. Ko bo odbor z usklajevanjem končal, bo vsak dom Kongresa glasoval o tem usklajenem zakonskem osnutku. Če bo od obih domov odobren, bo poslan naprej predsedniku Reagangu za njegov podpis oz. potrdilo.

Zakonska osnutka sta zelo komplikirana in je med člani usklajevalnega odbora precej neenotnosti, napovedujejo opazovalci razmer na kapitolskem hribu, da bo usklajevanje vzel dobra dva meseca. Od Kongresa odobrene reforme davčnega sistema tako naj ne bo prišla na predsednikovo pisarno do konca septembra. Vsi pa soglašajo, da do reforme sistema bo res prišlo, le da vse oblike reforme še niso znane.

Ameriški vojaki v Boliviji, kjer bodo sodelovali v napadih na trgovce z mamilimi

LA PAZ, Bo. — V zadnjih dneh je došlo v Bolivijo do 160 ameriških vojakov, ki bodo sodelovali z bolivijskimi policijskimi enotami v napadih na številne trgovce z mamilimi. Bolivijska vlada je soglašala s prihodom Američanov, čeprav je opozicija proti. Vojaki ZDA ne bodo neposredno sodelovali v napadih, pač pa bodo imeli pravico, odgovoriti z ognjem, ako bodo napadeni. Zadnje mesece ZDA močno pritiskajo na Bolivijo, ker iz Bolivije izvira do polovice vsega kokaina, ki prihaja v ZDA in zahodno Evropo. Po podatkih bolivijskega notranjega ministrstva, je s to rastljino posejanih do 300.000 akrov zemlje, z njo se baje ukvarja do 300.000 kmetov. Trgovanje s kokainom prinaša bolivijskemu gospodarstvu do pol milijarde dolarjev letno.

Zvezni senat ratificiral pogodbo z Veliko Britanijo, ki predvideva izročitev teroristov IRA Angliji — Razprava trajala leto dni

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Včeraj je zvezni senat z večino 87:10 ratificiral pogodbo z Veliko Britanijo, po kateri bo poenostavljen proces za izročitev teroristov prepovedane Irske republiške vojske Angliji. Reaganova administracija je močno podprla pogodbo kot pomemben korak v mednarodni vojni proti terorizmu. V ZDA se baje nahajajo širje pripadniki IRA, ki bi lahko bili prizadeti zaradi nove pogodbe.

Proti pogodbi v ZDA so irske organizacije in tudi mnogi drugi. V teku so pogajanja za podobne pogodbe s številnimi drugimi državami, med njimi Zahodno Nemčijo, Francijo, Italijo in Izraelom. Proti so tudi nekateri konservativci, ki trdijo, da bi lahko take pogodbe vodile do zahtev držav, kot so Afganistan in Nikaragua ali Sovjetska zveza za izročitev političnih disidentov.

Včeraj ratificirana pogodba z Veliko Britanijo je že veljavna. Po ameriški ustavi ima zvezni senat izključno pravico glede ratificiranja pogodb s tujimi državami. Vlada Margaret Thatcher je izrazila hvaležnost za ratifikacijo pogodbe.

Challengerjevi astronauti niso nič vedeli o okvari na raketi pred eksplozijo — NASA analizirala magnetofonske trakove

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Včeraj je NASA objavila poročilo, v katerem trdi, da astronauti, ki so potovali s šutljem Challengerjem 28. januarja letos, niso prav nič vedeli, da je nekaj narobe z raketo in da bo nastala eksplozija. Inženirji firme IBM je uspeло pripraviti magnetofonske trakove, na katerih so glasovi Challengerjevih astronautov, za temeljito analizo. Trakove so našli med razbitine Challengerjeve kabine na dnu Atlantskega morja in so bili zelo poškodovani. Strokovnjaki NASA so trakove analizirali in ugotovili, da do trenutka eksplozije, astronauti v svojih izjavah med seboj niso slutili, da je kaj narobe.

Pri NASA se še niso odločili, ali bodo objavili trakove oziroma jih posredovali javnosti. O tem se bodo odločili prihodnji teden. Vdova Michaela J. Smitha, pilota Challengerja, je že vložila tožbo zoper NASA, v kateri zahteva odškodnino 15,1 milijona dolarjev. Med drugim trdi tožba, da je Smith veliko trpel v sekundah po eksploziji in da je vedel, da bo umrl. Trakovi NASA ne pojasnjujejo, ali so astronauti bili še živi v sekundah po eksploziji, kjer so magnetofoni utihnili v trenutku eksplozije.

- Kratke vesti -

New York, N.Y. — Včeraj je LTV Corp. prišla pod stečaj zaradi hude finančne stiske. Med drugim je LTV druga največja proizvajalka jekla v ZDA in zaposluje 9.000 delavcev samo v Clevelandu. Jeklarne in druge oddelke te družbe bodo še obratovali, vendar bo LTV reorganizirana in najbrž bodo nedonosni obrati čez čas ukinjeni ali zaprti.

Washington, D.C. — ZDA je podpisala sporazum s Pakistanom, po katerem bodo Pakistanci lahko dobavili sodobne računalnike in drugo tehnologijo. V sporazumu pa Pakistanci obljudljajo, da omenjena tehnologija ne bo služila programu za izdelavo jedrske bombe.

Washington, D.C. — V ZDA na obisku je angleški zunanjki sekretar Howe, ki se je srečal z državnim sekretarjem Shultzom. Med drugim sta državnika govorila o stališču do Južne Afrike, ki jo bo Howe prihodnji teden obiskal. Prihodnji teden bo o Južni Afriki govoril predsednik Reagan. V govoru bo menda ne bo začrtal bistvene spremembe v dosedanji ameriški politiki do Južne Afrike.

Atlanta, Ga. — Države jugovzhodnega ZDA trpijo zaradi suše, ki traja vse od novembra lani. Sušo v zadnjih tednih spremišča izredna vročina. Predvsem so prizadeti farmarji. Vremenarji pravijo, da se bosta tako suša kot vročina nadaljevala.

Philadelphia, Pa. — Zadnjih 17 dni štrajkajo v tem mestu pobiralci smeti. Štrajk je povzročil velike težave za mesto. Štrajkajoči delavci so ignorirali odločbo sodnika, naj se vrnejo na delo. Radi tega grozi župan mesta, da bo štrajkajoče odpustil iz službe, če se ne bodo kmalu vrnili na delo.

Manila, Fi. — Uporniki so izpustili 10 filipinskih katoliških redovnic, ugrabljenih pred dnevi. Redovnice pravijo, da so uporniki dostenjno ravnali z njimi. Danes je bil izpuščen ugrabljeni protestantski misijonar, ameriški državljan.

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Avstria in naši koroški rojaki

Z ozirom na stanje republike Avstrie in njen položaj v mednarodnem svetu, ter stanje in položaj slovenske narodne manjšine na Koroškem, se zdi umestno in potrebno nekaj več reči o teh dveh zadevah.

Točasna mednarodna podoba Avstrie

Trdno nam je v spominu povojna Avstria vse do Waldheimove »afere«. Kot ptič feniks je zletela iz pepela in ruševin, vsa čista in brez vsakega madeža in postala svetel vzor svobodoljubne, pravične in vzorne dežele. Iz vojaških in političnih razlogov je bila že pred koncem vojne proglašena kot prva žrtev (da, žrtev!) Hitlerjeve nacistične agresije. Kdo se je pozneje zmenil, ko je ta plemeniti in blagi nemški ostanek bivše habsburške monarhije po nacističnih metodah do današnjega dne načrtno zatiral soderžavljane druge narodnosti in jezika na Koroškem? Kdo je v svetovni javnosti prisluhnih klicem na pomoč, da bi bil krepko opozoril Avstriju na dolžnost izpolnitve pogodbenih obveznosti, katerih ena je čl. 7 državne pogodbe iz I. 1955? Koroški Slovenci so ostali prepričeni samim sebi v deviško čisti in pravični Avstriji. Še Slovenija in Jugoslavija sta ravnali s to deželo v svilenih rokavicah, med tem ko so Slovenci v pokrajini »N'mav črieg izaro« v množicah narodno umirali.

Danes ni več venca nedolžnosti in pravičnosti na glavi republike Avstrie. Waldheimova odločitev, da bo postati predsednik republike, je venec odpihnila na smetišče, kamor je spadal. Svetovno zasnovani napad na njegovo kandidaturo ni toliko škodoval Waldheimu osebno kot je škodoval Avstrijiji. Je pa ta mož v resnici nekak simbol ali prispevka vseh Avstrijev kot ljudske skupine. Kakor Waldheim, ki je odklanjal obtožbo, da je bil nacist in aktiven sodelavec v hitlerjanski mašineriji, pa je hkrati kontraktorno zagotavljal, da je »vršil le svojo dolžnost«, prav tako se avstrijsko nemško ljudstvo brani očitka aktivnega sodelovanja z nacizmom, češ da je bil triumfalni sprejem Hitlerja v Avstriji I. 1938 le izhod iz dolžnega položaja. Kot je Waldheim načrtno zamolčal svojo nekoliko dvomljivo vojaško službo na Balkanu, tako Avstrije molčijo kot grob o svojih nacističnih podvigih na okupiranih ozemljih (npr. v Sloveniji) in se proglašajo kot prve nedolžne žrtve diaboličnega sistema.

V tej zvezi velja omeniti oceno avstrijske inteligence, kot jo je objavila *The New York Times*-u ugledna kolumnistka Flora Lewis. Tam piše, da so v Avstriji zelo redki ljudje, ki bi bili voljni in sposobni oceniti preteklost in jo predočiti svojim sorokom v premislek. Intelektualci, še bolj kot politiki, so se odeli v molk, da bi prikrali svetu resnico. V Nemčiji je bilo drugače: oglasili so se pisatelji, filmarji in umetniki ter narodu odgrnili strahotno preteklost. Waldheimova predsedniška kandidatura in izvolitev je napravila temu prikrivanju za Avstrijijo neprijeten konec. Molk je pretegnan in razpravljanje o nacistični vlogi Avstrie med vojno in po njej še dolgo ne bo konec.

Položaj Slovencev na Koroškem

Kaj so prestali pod nacisti naši slovenski rojaki na Koroškem, je bilo že obširno popisano in je zatorej ponavljajanje nepotrebno. Omeniti je treba le to, da Slovenci v okupirani Gorenjski in Štajerski niso nič manj trpeli. Vsi s Korošči vred so padli pod teroristično knuto pretežno avstrijskih zagrizenih nacistov, ki so ene in druge masovno izseljevali, streljali talce, plenili premoženje, nedolžne ljudi pošljali umirat v taborišča smerti. Dolga, strahotno dolga je lista grozodejstev avstrijskih nacistov nad vsemi Slovenci, vključno onimi v bivši Ljubljanski pokrajini, in ne more biti nikoli pozabljenega. Zdaj, ko je molk s svetovno akcijo proti Waldheimu prekinjen, je čas, da javno povemo svojo zgodbo pod nacisti tudi Slovenci povsod, doma in na tujem.

Zlasti nam to dolžnost nalaga dejstvo, da nacistične metode narodnega zatiranja prizadevajo naše brate in sestre na Koroškem še današnji dan in jih ni konec. Akcije nacistično orientiranih avstrijskih organizacij, kakršnih ena je zloglasni Heimatdienst, s tiho podporo uradne Avstrie, grozijo del našega narodnega telesa na Koroškem dokončno in popolnoma uničiti. Po nikakih, ne človeških ne božjih postavah se ne sme dopustiti, da bi Avstria, ki je pod sedanjem lupo svetovnega opazovanja in ocenjevanja o svojem zadranjem pod nacizmom, bila odvezana raziskave o nadaljevanju nacističnih metod v sedanjem času znotraj svojih meja, kakor te metode uporablajo koroški Nemci pri zatiranju slovenske avtohtone manjšine.

More se predvidevati, da bo morda avstrijskim oblastem z Waldheimom na čelu na tem, da poskušajo izbrisati nacistični madež iz dobe služenja Tretjemu rajhu tudi s tem, da ustavijo raznarodovanje manjšine na Koroškem in da izpolnijo do zadnje pike določbe č. 7 državne pogodbe. Toda bilo bi umestno, ko bi bili na to opozorjeni od strani krogov, političnih in drugih, katerih beseda nekaj velja, in katerih opomin zaleže.

Priložnost, da se to izpelje, ni nikoli bila tako velika kot je danes, in verjetno nikoli več ne bo.

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Early Pioneers and the Birth of the Movies

Few persons today realize that the birth and success of the movie industry was due in large part to the overwhelming acceptance of the "flicks" by the new immigrants in the early 1900's.

Arriving in America from eastern and southern Europe, the new citizens were unable to understand English, therefore they shunned the live stage entertainment of that day.

Instead the early settlers turned to the new novelty - silent motion pictures. The new citizens learned much about American life and social processes and at the same time increased their English vocabulary by relating the subtitles to the action on the silver screen.

The admission price was only five cents and the films, regrettably were not of high artistic quality. Numerous theaters or "nickelodeons" as they were called, sprang up overnight in every city and town in the U.S.A.

The St. Clair area also shared in the excitement of this thriving new enterprise. Our early pioneers flocked in great numbers to view an hour or more of films that flickered and jiggled because the projection equipment was not perfected and the film quality

left a lot to be desired. Also they shot the movie at 24 frames per second and showed it at 16 frames.

Every theater would provide musical accompaniment to the silent films, usually a live piano player who would supply background music and also sound effects when required by the action in the film.

In the absence of a pianist, a nickelodeon, an early form of juke-box would be employed.

How well the early silent movies were received in our St. Clair area can be readily attested to because there were 19 movie theaters in the St. Clair locality from 1909 to 1915. They were:

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On the road with Eleanor

We are returning to London so that those who have purchased tickets for the Cockney Club can enjoy dinner, the cabaret and music hall entertainment.

Thursday, Windsor Castle and the Royalty and Empire Exhibition and Hampton Court Palace

Bertie is again our guide for the day and here are his comments as we proceed to Windsor Castle: The Kings and Queens lived in the Tower of London right up to the 16th century. Queen Elizabeth rides her horse everyday except Sunday because she wants to give her groom a day off. Two of the towers have been flattened because during the war they had guns on them. New Lloyds of London building has "guts" (steel framework) on the outside of it; architects are enthusiastic about design but not ordinary Londoners.

Joke by Bertie: A brother had written such enthusiastic letters about America that the recipient of the letters thought that the streets of America were paved with gold. When he came upon a ten-pound note, he was undecided what to do, then decided: "No way, leave it. I won't start working until tomorrow."

As we are crossing a bridge, we see droves of people coming our way on the bridge. They had just come off the mainline railroad on the other side of the bridge.

During the war there were no candy bars available; therefore, those persons who were children then, now still have their teeth today because sweets were put on a rationing basis. It's a disgrace that men were put out of hostels and hotels were made out of them. See a sign: "Part used Tyres." Three million four hundred people are out of work now. During the war, England needed workers to work on the transportation systems so she

opened quotas to members of the Commonwealth. Now in the 70's, they passed a quota system again because of the unemployment situation. About 53 percent of Great Britain's budget is spent on war systems; only about 12 percent spent for defense. Doctor's are referral agencies. If you have something wrong that the doctor can't do anything about, he gives you a letter to go to a hospital and when you are discharged, the hospital gives you a letter to give to your doctor. On Windsor Castle if Queen's flag is on pole, it means the Queen is officially in residence, which is the case today, and we are unable to visit the Castle. Instead we are to tour the grounds and other buildings and then proceed to Hampton Court Palace.

Windsor Castle dominates the town and looks over the Thames. It is the largest inhabited castle in the world. English kings have lived here since Henry I (and possibly before). During the turbulent reign of Henry II, nineteen rectangular watch towers were erected. The Round Tower, as it is known today, is not actually circular. It rises above the walls to a height of 230 feet, dividing the structure of the castle into two wards—the upper ward with the royal apartment and the lower ward, containing St. George's Chapel, the deanery, and cloisters.

The main entrance to the castle is through Henry VIII's Gate. We are proceeding to St. George's Chapel but there is a special function going on at this time and we are changing our plans to visit the Albert Memorial Chapel which had been renovated by Queen Victoria in memory of her beloved husband, Albert. She was often referred to as "the widow of Windsor" or "the widow of Windsor."

We return to St. George's Chapel but are detained in the Horseshoe Cloisters until a

parade of church dignitaries, including the Archbishop of Canterbury, pass us going into the Chapel. It seems that once a year there is a gathering of women's church organizations from all over the world and today is their day.

St. George's Chapel and College with its bell tower and cloisters is a community within the castle. In 1384 Edward III founded the Royal Free College of St. George. It is not an educational college but a community of priests belonging to the Chapel. The Deanery and Dean's Cloister were built on the north side of the Chapel and much of the 14th century buildings survive. This area for over six hundred years has continued to be a thriving separate community within the castle.

The Order of the Garter was founded by Edward III. The honor of knighthood is a personal gift of the monarch and can be given for service to the country. Each knight has a banner displaying his coat-of-arms, a crest, mantle and helm over his stall in the Garter Room. There is also a wooden sword to signify peace. On the back of each stall is a metal plate engraved with the knight's name and coat-of-arms. When a knight dies, everything is taken down except the stall plate.

The Chapel became a shrine for pilgrims. Close to the tomb of Henry IV is an almsbox for the pilgrims who visited this shrine. It has 24 slits for money and four separate locks. As an added precaution, there was also a peephole in the roof above the aisle through which the pilgrims could be watched. Pilgrimages and the veneration of shrines and relics came to an end with the Reformation in the 16th century.

It was the custom in the Middle Ages for wealthy men to endow a chapel within a church or cathedral with money or land so that a priest could be appointed to say prayers daily to speed the soul of the donor through the cleansing fires of Purgatory. There are nine such chantry chapels in St. George's and each is still used at some time for prayer.

The walls of the castle itself enclose only 13 acres of land, but beyond it are nearly 1,800 acres of Windsor Great Park.

From the battlements of Windsor Castle we get a good view of Eton College—only a short walk over the Thames from the center of Windsor. Eton is an ancient institution founded by Henry VI. Today children must have their names put down for a place at birth.

We are given some free time to explore whatever buildings we can in the limited time.

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6 Signs of the Time Reveal Way of Life

The advancement of the medical profession has eliminated the signs that were nailed on the front doors of homes in the first quarter part of the century such as quarantined, diphtheria, measles, chicken pox whooping cough, scarlet fever, etc.

Wreaths were put on doors when someone in the family passed away. Before the advent of the present funeral homes, the deceased was laid out at home, generally for 3 days. About 11 o'clock in the evening some of the professional mourners would start to make their appearance.

It was the custom to serve the neighbors and friends sandwiches, coffee, (shpaga) or wine at midnight. That was the reason for the visit of the professional mourners.

During the flu epidemic of 1918-19 the deceased were not even laid out at home.

I remember walking past Zele's funeral home on Addison and St. Clair there were ten bodies laid out in simple gray coffins in front of the garage.

Not too many people remember the black building on the SE corner of East 9th

and St. Clair. The rumor was not to go past it for fear someone would grab you and drag you inside so they would cut you up and learn about your body.

Actually it was a school for embalming and next door was the Morgue. Up to about 1917 or 18 I remember some of the horse troughs. One was at E 40th and St. Clair, one at E. 55th and St. Clair, one in front of the blacksmith shop next to the present building west of the Bath House, one at E 79th and St. Clair and one at East 105 and St. Clair, but West to 40th St. and East to 105 St. was the farthest I ventured in my teens.

Soon as the warm weather came, about the middle of May, we had to take off our shoes as soon as we came home from school. We went barefoot till fall.

When school let out in June most of the kids got a (moonshine) bald headed hair cut.

Almost every day in summer we would go swimming down at the foot of E 65th St. by the Salt Works. It was also known as BA beach. We all swam in the nude. Who had a swimming suit in those days.

U.S.S. Band Ready for Minnesota Trip in August

All the kids, boys and girls wore gatches when the cold weather set in. The first day the legs were very snug, but after the second day they got stretched and you tried to fit them smoothed under the long black stockings.

Most times it didn't work out very well. You could see the lumps sticking out from under the stockings. How we tried to even out the lumps but to no avail.

It was tough, but we grew up

anyway.

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California Slovenians honor Blessed Mother Mary

Slovenians in Southern California gathered again on the third Sunday of May in honor of our Blessed Mother at the Sacred Heart Church in Etiwanda. This traditional Sunday for Slovenians for hundreds of years is called Smarnice (pronounced Shmar-nitsa), meaning St. Mary's Flower (Lily-of-the-Valley). In Slovenia it was customary for our ancestors in the Middle Ages to make a pilgrimage to Rome if at all possible. In more recent years pilgrimages in Slovenia are to the Shrine of

Our Lady Marija Pomagai at Brezje. Just as pilgrimages now are made to the Shrine of Our Lady Chapel at the Immaculate Conception Shrine in Washington, DC and to the Franciscan Convent in Lemont, Illinois, we Slovenians in California make our pilgrimage to Marija Pomagai here in Etiwanda at Sacred Heart Church in Her honor.

The Smarnice took place on 18 May 1986 with the mass beginning at 1:00 p.m. followed by the Litany of the Blessed Mother and Benedic-

tion. The women's choir sang beautifully in Slovenian. Father Stanley Jasbec was the celebrant of the Mass, assisted by other Slovenian priests, including the "young in heart" Fathers Joseph Horvath, the founding pastor, and his successor Joseph Snoj, both retired pastors of Sacred Heart Church.

Fr. Francis A. Frankovich, pastor of Our Lady of Soledad Parish in Coachella, California gave the homily in English. Being Pentecost Sunday, Father Frankovich spoke about the Holy Spirit. He said that truly to have the Spirit active in our lives we need to know what He comes to do and to thirst for this action in our lives. Father reminded us that the Holy Spirit, the source of new life, comes firstly to remind us of sin, not to discourage us but to bring us to repent and to turn to Jesus (John 16:8,13) - the same message that Mary in her apparitions (in Fatima and Medugorje) keeps reaffirming as the first and most vital step to obtain the life of Jesus. The Holy Spirit comes secondly,

Father Frankovich said, to reveal the bond of love that we have with God so that we would grow in praise of God and grow with a great sense of dignity and service (John 15:26,16,17). In this we are called to become a people of prayer and sacrifices for the conversion of others (another message of Mary). Father then concluded, saying that the Holy Spirit comes thirdly to build us as the Body of Christ, the Church (1 Cor. 12:13) but the world keeps trying to separate us from the Church by saying

that it does not matter if we participate in the Church life or not. We were invited to set aside this May 22 as a vigil of prayer for our Slovenian brothers and sisters, especially for those who have left Slovenia, that through Mary, Help of Christians, they may stay close to the Church to receive strength in the faith-life and to help others come to Jesus. For him who thirsts, let him drink of this Holy Spirit.

Father Frankovich will be in residence at the University of Steubenville in Steubenville,

Ohio starting this fall for one year.

After the services a delicious Slovenian dinner, including wine, was served in the spacious new Parish Hall, built and paid for by one of the local vineyard owners a few years ago and worth today about a million dollars. He was grateful for the excellent education his four children received at the Bishop Anton Martin Slomšek School (on the grounds of Sacred Heart Church) by Slovenian nuns from Lemont, Illinois.

Pensioners visit 'Palace of Gold'

In planning an event, such as a bus tour, one wonders and worries about the weather. Mainly, will it be a clear sunny day, or, will we have a cloudy, rainy day. A shower or two is not too bad, but who is to guarantee against a day-long downpour or unending drizzle? Thursday, June 26th, the day of our scheduled tour arrived, and lo and behold, we were greeted with the beginning of a perfect day, and perfect it remained throughout the day.

When I arrived at the SND, our boarding area, our travelers were already seated on the bus, and soon we were on our way.

Our destination, the Palace of Gold, in West Virginia, is some 200 miles away, a trip too long to endure without an occasional stop. Our first, was a breakfast stop at a

McDonalds in Dover, Ohio. Having satisfied our morning needs, we moved on to Cambridge, Ohio and visited and browsed through several glass outlet stores. Our next stop was for a hearty luncheon at Mehlmans in St. Clairsville. Here one could pick and choose (cafeteria style) from the many tempting items. With trays filled, we leisurely enjoyed our delectable selections. Our hunger pangs satisfied, we boarded our bus, and were again on our way, this, our final leg of the journey.

So, across the Ohio river, into the state of West Virginia; twisting, turning, and climbing, along the miles and miles of winding, hilly country roads of the Appalachian foothills. The trees and vegetation were dressed in the full splendor of Summer Green.

As our bus wound its way along the final miles, all stretched in search of a first glimpse of the object of our journey. What would our first impressions be? Would we be disappointed? Suddenly, around the next bend of the road...There it was!!...Magnificently perched on a high rise in a clearing...Glistening in the sunlight...THE PALACE OF GOLD!! Truly a breathtaking sight!!

Started in 1973, the Palace was built entirely by Hare Krisna volunteers, we are told, and is now a memorial, and also has become an international place of pilgrimage. At the walled gateway, we were greeted and welcomed by a Krisna tour guide. We approached the palace, and before entering, were informed that shoes are not permitted on the marble floors. Shoes must be removed, or covered with provided cloth booties.

As we moved through the corridors and the ten elaborately decorated rooms, one marvels at the beautiful works of art in various forms. There were intricate stained glass windows of multi-colors and hues, crystal chandeliers, mirrored ceilings, intricate marble floors, highly polished inlaid wall, and throughout, 8000 square feet of gold leaf was used. The furniture, doors, and woodwork, all artistically carved teakwood.

The Palace is surrounded with terraced floral garden. One such garden contains over 3000 rose bushes with flowers of all color and variety.

As we moved along, our guide filled us on the history and background of the Krisna movement, its entry into North America, the decision

to build its center in West Virginia, and their planned ongoing work of expanding of the total complex, which, we were told, will cost many millions of dollars and countless hours of dedicated labor.

The New York Times classified the Palace of Gold as "America's Taj Mahal".

Our next tour, Chautauqua Lake, tentatively planned for July 22, had to be rescheduled and is set for July 29th. Members please note the date change.
