Kennedyjeva runda je postala dvomljiva

Čas za sporazum o znižanju carin se konferenci v Ženevi izteka, ko se Skupntrg in ZDA ne morejo zdiniti.

ŽENEVA, Šv. — Delegacije 53 držav, ki so članice ZN, sedijo že par let v Ženevi, da bi se sporazume o znižanju carin po carinskih skupinah in ne po posameznih postavkah. To je sistem, ki je bil uzakonjen v Ameriki l. 1961 in je znan pod imenom Kennedyjeva runda. Dotični ameriški zakon je veljaven le do 30. junija, zato morajo biti pogajanja zaključena že do konca tega meseca, maj in junij sta namreč potrebna za sporazumevanje o podrobnostih in o postopku.

Pogajanja so važna radi tega, ker je l. 1961 dal na Kongres federalni administraciji pooblaštito, da lahko popušča tudi do 50% višino posameznih carin, v nekaterih slučajih pa celo carine kar zbrise. Ako bi federacija ne izrabila pooblastila do 30. junija, bo pooblastilo propadlo in ni nobenega upanja, da bi ga sedanji Kongres obnovil in podaljšal.

Zato se naša delegacija tako trudi, da bi prišlo do dogovora o znižanju carin na podlagi ameriškega zakona. Še pred par meseci je kazalo, da bodo pogajanja lahko pravočasno zaključena. Pretekli teden je pa svet ministrov Evropske gospodarske skupnosti pokvaril račune. Pustil se je na stališče, da mora Amerika menjati svoj dosedanji način ugotavljanja vrednosti blaga, kar koristi le ameriškim producentom, pomeni pa oviro za uvoz tujega blaga. Ako ga ne menja, ne bi EGS mogla pristati na znižanje evropskih uvoznih carin za kemično blago. Naša delegacija pa ne more pristati na EGS zahtevo, ker za to nima od Kongresa pooblastila. Zato je nastopila nevarnost, da bodo pogajanja sploh propadla.

Je še malo upanje. Skandinavske države so že pripravile nov kompromisni predlog, ki ne bo tako dober kot tisti, ki je sedaj v debati. Morda bodo vse delegacije pristale nanj, da rešijo vsaj nekaj. Odločitev mora pasti tekom 10 dni.

Diplomatje ZN si bodo spet hudo belili glave

Glavni težavi izrednega zasedanja glavne skupščine ZN sta Jugozahodna Afrika in bodočnost mirovnih akcij ZN.

ZDRAUŽENI NARODI, N.Y. — Ta teden se začne izredno zasedanje generalne skupščine ZN, ki bo predvidoma trajalo nekaj tednov. Na dnevnih red pridejo vsi ostanki še iz lanskega leta, med njimi tudi par izredno kočljivih.

Afriške članice ZN bi radi videle, da ZN prevzamejo upravo in s silo prežene administracijo, ki jo je ustvarila Južna Afrika. ZN naj torej organizirajo novo vojaško akcijo v Afriki. Temu se pa upira Rusija. Iz čisto drugih razlogov misli pričilno isto naša diplomacija. Zato očitajo afriške delegacije pri ZN našim diplomatom "nacionalni egoizem" to je: Ameriki je le za njene denarne interese, kar bo pa le deloma res.

Amerika predložila širi razorozben pas

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Združene države so predložile razširitev razorozbenega pasu vzdolj 17. vzporednika med obema Vietnamoma na vsako stran za 10 milj, tako bi bil v celoti širok 26 milj. S tega področja naj bi obe strani umaknili svoje oborožene sile, nadzor nad njim pa naj bi prevzela mednarodna komisija. V kolikor bi Severni Vietnam ta predlog sprejel, bi bil to prvi korak k razgovorom o končanju vojskovjanja.

Združene države so stavile svoj predlog v zvezi z odgovorom na mirovni načrt, ki ga je predložila 11. aprila Kanada. Njen novi zastopnik v Mednarodni komisiji za nadziranje premirja v Vietnamu, ustanovljeni na temelju dogovora v Ženevi leta 1954, bo prihodnjem teden v Hanoju severnonjemske vladi pojasnil vse podrobnosti kanadskega predloga.

Severnovenjamski radio je že preteklo nedeljo kanadski predlog označil za "izdelek ameriških imperialistov", zato diplomatske pričakujejo veliko ne od kanadskega ne od ameriškega predloga. Severni Vietnam je zato očitajo afriške delegacije pri ZN našim diplomatom "nacionalni egoizem" to je: Ameriki je

le za njene denarne interese, kar bo pa le deloma res.

SVOBODE IZRAZA, KI BI PODIRALA SISTEM, -- NI!

To je povedal jasno in odločno predsednik okrožnega sodišča Dušan Lukic v Beogradu, ko je razglasil odsodbo Mihajlova na 4 leta in pol ječe. — V Zagrebu 15 izključenih iz Komunistične partije. Znani Miroslav Krleža, osebni, tesni prijatelj Tita, je sam stopil iz nje.

CLEVELAND, O. — Včerajšnji New York Times prinaša podrobno poročilo svojega beograjskega sodelavca R. Ederja z zaključka sodne razprave in objava odsode prof. Mihajla Mihajlova preteklo sredo. Ta je bil obojen na 4 leta in pol ječe, pa bo moral odsedeti le še 3 leta in 11 mesecov, ker so mu od nje odšeli 7 mesecov, ki jih je preživel v ječi od lanske jeseni na temelju lanske odsobe. Tokrat je bil obojen zaradi "širjenja sovražne propagande" z lastnim pisanjem proti Komunistični partiji in s kazanjem letakov, ki so jih tiskali jugoslovanski emigranti, prijateljem.

Ko je predsednik sodišča Dušan Lukic razglasil sodbo, ki prepoveduje Mihajlovu tudi vso javno delovanje še štiri leta po odsluženi kazni, je takole oznail svobodo v Jugoslaviji: "Misli so v naši deželi svobodo izražane, toda tistim, ki izražajo sovraščino in protiustavna stališča, svoboda ne more biti dovoljena. Mi vzdržujemo svobodo tiska, toda varujemo tudi pred zlorabo tiska, da bi preprečili spodkopavanje našega sistema!"

Besede so jasne in najboljši odgovor vsem tistim, ki imajo vedno polna usta hvale o "liberalizaciji" razmer in življenja v Jugoslaviji. Svobodo izražanja uživajo le Komunistična partija in njeni podporniki, ni pa dovoljena kritikom komunističnega sistema in njegovega režima.

R. Eder poroča tudi o kregu na hodniku sodišča po objavi razsode med pristaši Mihajlova in med njegovimi nasprotniki. Ko so partijski pristaši zmerali Mihajlova s "tujim agentom", jim je neka ženska vrgla v obraz: "In vi niste nič drugega kot peta kolona!" Ko je nekdo vprašal zakaj, je dobil odgovor:

LONDON, Vel. Brit. — Vojaška radio postaja v Atenah je objavila, da je bila danes opolnoma ukinjena s kraljevim manifestom, ki ga je podpisal tudi predsednik vlade Canellopoulos, ustanova in imenovana vojaška skupščina. Kralj Konstantin je kot diktator prevzel polno odgovornost za deželo.

Vse zvezce z Atenami so prekinjene in za sedaj še ni bilo mogoče dobiti o poteku dogodka nobenega podrobnega poročila.

Edini vir vesti je za sedaj vojaška radio postaja, ki je objavila,

da je vojska prevzela nadzor nad vso deželo in vso javno upravo.



Pa ti pride neke sobote popoldne, ko je bila prodajalna polna ljudi, neko zješče notri. Gleda podobo, potem pa ostro spregovori: "Tegale bi bilo treba živega obesiti na kljuko." Vse je osupnilo in strme gledalo predzneža. Ali se mu meša? On je pa nadaljeval: "Ta je kriv vojske! Ta nas duši. Ta nam kraje svoboda!"

Nihče mu ni pritrjeval, samo spogledovali so se, kaj je in kaj hoče.

Ko je videl, da ga ne razumejo in mu ne pritrjujejo, je šel, ne da bi kaj kupil.

"Je že kakšen 'fraigajst'?" je rekel nekdo potem.

Vsi so pa zrli Metternicha, katerega sicer niso opazovali in se niso brigali zanj.

"Kaj mu je naredil Metternich?"

Mnogi so ugibali, kaj bi bil prvi minister žalega storil temu človeku, ki je sedaj tako poln žolča.

svobodo. V spominu so prezvljali francosko revolucijo, ki je bila petdeset let prej zenačila ljudske pravice na Francosko. Sicer je tekla takrat kri na debelo, a nekoliko krv bi se tudi svobode žejni Ljubljanci ne bili ustrašili takrat, ako bi se bili mogli igrati revolucijo.

Sicer pa niso imeli kaj prida somišljenev. Ljudem so v takih barvah prikazovali francosko revolucijo in jim prekučevali naslikali v tako zoprn postavi, da kar nič niso marali ne za revolucijo ne za prekuču.

Tako so vpili norci. Pošteni in miroljubni meščani so pa odgovarjali:

"Jej in pij! To je svoboda!"

Glasbena Matica Presents Spring Concert


It's Spring again and birds on the wing again (lyrically speaking), which also means it is time for Glasbena Matica's annual spring concert.

Are Fans Getting Blase About Domed Stadiums?

Could it be that the Houston Astrodome no longer is a novelty? The big bubble attracted 481,190 tourists from April, 1965, through April, 1966. Latest figures show that for April, 1966, through March, 1967, the guided tours fell off by some 30,000 admissions. Maybe Judge Roy Hofheinz could get Leo Durocher to run a few guided tours featuring the new and revolutionary AstroTurf floor which could be used for a pool table if it doesn't make it as a baseball field.

There's A New Kid on the Block Until 1967, Americans were too busy enjoying their own version of football to pay much attention to the variety played in the rest of the world — soccer. U.S. fans may not give soccer a tumble this year, either, but some well-heeled promoters think otherwise. They are importing players from South America and Europe to man 22 clubs in two new pro soccer leagues. . . . Some big names from major league baseball and football are backing their belief in soccer with heavy financial outlays. Sowers are easy to find — they always are when something different is tried. Architects Propose a Giant Umbrella for Atlanta Park Atlanta, Ga. — A giant "umbrella" costing at least \$4,000,000 has been proposed for Atlanta Stadium. Mayor Ivan Allen, Jr., of Atlanta heard of a group of architects describing the air-supported covering at a conference on April 10.

The vinyl plastic roof, which could be raised and lowered as needed, would be stored in a missile-type silo. The plastic roof would be raised into place by a 300-foot telescoping mast, which would retract into the silo.

Total cost would be \$4,000,000 to \$5,000,000, the architects said, as compared with \$15,000,000 to \$18,000,000 for a permanent dome.

Stu Says Adieu to Dodgers To Accept Japanese Offer

Los Angeles, Calif.—Dick Stuart, one of the most popular, controversial and colorful players, will cast his lot with the Japanese brand of baseball in the twilight of his career.

The 34-year-old slugger was signed by the Tokyo Whales.

Stuart had not actually signed with the Dodgers, but had a verbal agreement to play for \$35,000. He made his decision to go to Japan on April 4, when the Dodgers were in Oklahoma City.

"I couldn't be sure how long I would be with the Dodgers," said Stu. "When the Japanese kept after me with this two-year contract, I just had to take it, as much as I regretted being forced to make the move. Believe me, I gave the matter plenty of thought."

Stu joined the Dodgers from the Mets last season.

Thurgood Marshall Is Speaker At Law Day Luncheon

The Honorable Thurgood Marshall, Solicitor General of the United States, will be the main speaker at the annual Law Day luncheon to be held May 1, at 12:00 noon, in the Main Ball Room of the Sheraton-Cleveland Hotel.

Thurgood Marshall first attracted national attention by his work as Chief Legal Officer of the NAACP from 1938 to 1962. He argued many cases before the U.S. Supreme Court. Most noteworthy was his participation in the famous 1954 school desegregation decision.

President Kennedy appointed him as a Judge for the Second United States Circuit Court of Appeals in 1962. However, Thurgood Marshall gave up this lifetime appointment in 1965 when President Johnson appointed him as Solicitor General of the United States, the third ranking officer in the Department of Justice.

There have been rumors that Thurgood Marshall will become the first negro in the history of the United States to serve as a Justice on the Supreme Court of the United States.

MEDICAL EXPENSE DEDUCTIONS FOR PERSONS OVER 65. This week I introduced a bill (H.R. 8270) to allow persons 65 years of age and older to deduct all medical expenses from their income tax. The bill is designed to restore a provision that the elderly enjoyed before 1967.

Before January 1, 1967, persons over 65 were allowed to deduct all medical expenses. But the Social Security Amendments of 1965 eliminated this provision and stated that the elderly could deduct only medical expenses which amounted to more than three percent of their income. Therefore, if someone spent six percent of his income on medical expenses, he would be allowed to deduct only three percent of that on his income tax returns.

The 1965 amendments also charged the deduction for money spent on drugs — allowing only that amount which exceeds one percent of the individual's income. Based on figures compiled between July 1964 and June 1965, the average individual 65 or over pays \$41 a year for prescription drugs. These are only "prescribed" drugs, and not the ones — such as aspirin — picked off the shelf in the drug store. The average income for a person that age is approximately \$1300 a year. Therefore, these people spend about three percent of their income on prescription drugs. Sometimes it is much more than this.

The revenue loss for allowing these persons to continue deducting all medical expenses would be very small. However, the few dollars they would save on income tax would mean a great deal to them. I am hopeful the Committee on Ways and Means will consider my bill and give it early approval.

LAW DAY, U.S.A. Our American history has been marked by a valiant struggle for equal justice under law and the preservation of individual liberty and dignity. Law is based to the idea of American democracy; it provides us with both order and liberty. But it is effective only to the extent that it is continuously and faithfully observed by all. It is fitting, therefore, that we set aside one day each year to focus our attention on the importance of law to all Americans. The Congress by joint resolution wisely designated the first day of May each year as Law Day, U.S.A. This year marks the tenth anniversary of this observance. The theme of Law Day, 1967 is, in the words of Theodore Roosevelt: "No man is above the law and no man is below it". Again we remind ourselves that law, and respect for law, is central to the idea of American democracy. Free government could not exist without ready obedience of the law.

The observance of Law Day, U.S.A., on May 1, 1967, will serve to focus attention on the need for every individual to do his part to help strengthen our national commitment to the rule of law.

HEARINGS ON POLLUTION ABATEMENT SLOW-DOWN. The House Public Works Committee has announced that hearings will begin April 25th on the progress of water pollution abatement. Lead-off witness for the inquiry into the slow-up in cleaning up the nation's waters will be John Charles Daly, who has appeared for many years on the TV show, "What's My Line". Mr. Daly has been very active in the fight for clean water.

Among the chief concerns of the inquiry will be the effect of the proposed budget cut of over \$200 million in the current effort to clean up our waterways. While it has been necessary to cut many programs because of the Vietnam

Missing Medicare Numbers

Reports from Medical Mutual, the carrier which handles medicare doctor bills claims for the Cleveland area indicate that payment of some claims is being slowed up because medicare identification numbers are not shown on the request for payment form.

J. R. Pederson, social security district manager at the east side office at 10613 Euclid Avenue said the problem of missing medicare numbers has been most frequent on claims submitted by beneficiaries.

"Even though the number may seem like a very simple item, it is very important to the medicare carrier," he said. "Without the medicare identification number, it is very difficult for the carrier to find out if you are actually signed up for doctor bill insurance or if you have met your \$50 deductible for the year."

When the number is not shown on the request for payment form, Pederson said, Medical Mutual must write to the social security district office or the beneficiary to get it. Naturally, time is lost and the payment is not made as quickly as it could be.

Pederson advised beneficiaries to be sure that they copy the number from their red, white, and blue

medicare card in the blank at the upper right-hand corner of the request for payment form before sending it to Medical Mutual.

While the missing medicare identification number has been noted as one of the most frequent errors on the claims forms, signatures, addresses and other items have also been reported missing from some forms.

"There are a couple of important things for beneficiaries who pay their doctor bills and send in their own request for payment forms to remember," Pederson said. "Be careful to fill in all blanks on the top half of the form and be sure to either have your doctor complete his itemized receipt bill."

Pederson reminded beneficiaries that he was talking only about doctor bill claims where the "payment to the patient" method was used. Under the "assignment" or "payment to the doctor" method, the doctor sends the bill to the medicare carrier and bills the patient only for the part not covered by medicare.

"We are inviting American Home subscribers who are making a doctor bill claim for the first time, to bring their request for payment forms into our office and let us check them," Pederson said.
