

It was New Year's Day, 1863, a bright sunny day. Washington, D.C. was full of activity as diplomats from far and wide came to attend a reception and to view the signing of an important document in U.S. history.

As the group gathered around the desk of the President, he told them that, "I never in my life, felt more certain that I was doing right, than I do in signing this paper." Slowly and seriously he read again the lines of the famous document. With special emphasis he repeated these words:

". . . all persons held as slaves within any State or designated part of a State, the people whereof shall then be in rebellion against the United States, shall be then, henceforth, and forever free . . ."

He took a firmer grasp of the pen and with body and soul signed his name — "Abraham Lincoln".

President Lincoln had signed the famous "Emancipation Proclamation", the statement that all people of America were free regardless of race or color. This was the official end to all slavery! All people are now free!

As we begin a new year and a new decade — the 80's, let us sign our own "Emanicipation Proclamation". As Christians we have been freed from all sin and evil. St. Paul tells us that we are slaves no longer because we are in Christ. The Spirit of God living within us! We need to show through our daily living that no one nor anything holds us in chains and bondage. For some it maybe the chains of unkindnesses, gossip, jealousy, greed, slander, laziness or pride. We must work to break these chains of evil and sin and live in the freedom that God has so willed for us.

Christ Jesus through his life, death and resurrection has signed with his own blood our personal "Emanipation Proclamation"; therefore let us be slaves no longer.

CONSTITUTION, BY—LAWS AND REGULATIONS OF S.W.U.

Changes adopted at the 18the National Convention held at Duluth, Minnesota, May 20—23, 1979.

9.02 An assessment will be paid on or prior to the first day of the month covered by the payment. The regular monthly assessments are as follows:

a) Adult Dept. Class A: \$.80

b) Adult Dept. Class B: \$1.05

c) Adult Dept. Class A over 75 years of age: \$.45

d) Adult Dept. Class B over 75 years of age: \$.60

e) Associate Dept. Class A: \$.80

f) Associate Dept. Class B: \$1.05

g) Junior Dept.: \$.20 h) Social Dept.: \$.65

3.03 Change to 21st birthday as limit for junior membership. Delete second sentence from pp. 3.03 to read: Juniors: Children and young adults of either sex up to age 18.

4.09 First sentence change: Any Adult Dept. member is eligible to be a delegate or alternate to the National Convention if she is at least 18 years of age, a United States citizen, of the Catholic faith and a member in good standing. Fourth sentence change: To be elected as a delegate or alternate, an individual member must receive a majority of the votes cast during her branch's delegate and alternate elections.

7.01 Fifth sentence change: Auditors will be eligible to serve one term in each of the offices as 3rd, 2nd or 1st Auditor. No more than two terms will be served by any other elected officer except National Secretary, National Editor and Scholarship Committee Chairman.

13.01 First sentence change: An annual meeting must be held by each branch in the month of October or November or December for the purpose of electing branch officers.

The above reprint of the new By-laws is intended for those who wish to clip it out for the By-law book which has extra sheets for this purpose.



THE IMMIGRANT

Ivanka from Hotedršica

Part I

Seventy-five years ago sounds like such a long time, but when I look back on my life, it seems to have flown by so quickly — too quickly. I can hardly believe that I am now a "stara mama" (grandmother), because youthful days in my homeland of beautiful rolling hills and forests are just as vivid to me now as when they happened years ago.

Hotedršica, located near the large Slovenian cities of Ljubljana, Postojna, and Skofja Loka, was populated with about 3,000 people, mostly farmers, although there were some wood carvers that made fine furniture and also produced the big wooden tubs in which people

washed their clothes.

The village also claimed a shoemaker, one butcher, three food markets, and four gostlinas (tavernrestaurant). There was also a fire station and two policemen from Logatec who would come through once a day to break up fights, which seldom occurred.

The closest hospital was in Ljubljana, and the doctor was in Logatec, about a 45-minute drive by horse and wagon. The village midwife assisted at the birth of babies which relieved the dictor of such responsibilities. Most of the common sicknesses, such as coughing, headache, colds, cramps, etc., were treated within the home by mother who nursed us with her herbal teas. The magic of such medical practices was passed on by word of mouth through generations of families.


Flowers, leaves or roots, depending on the plant, were collected, washed, and then dried on the top of the litle stove in the corner of the kitchen. During the drying process, we were treated to the deficate fragrance of the herbs. When they were reduced in size after the moisture had evaporated, they were packed in glass jars and set on

the shelf for future use in the form of hot tea.

Hotedršica had only one school where youngsters were instructed in the rudiments of learning from grades one to eight. Hardly anyone continued beyond the point of an elementary education; therefore, a gymnasium (high school) was unnecessary. Students who were interested in furthering their education usually sought living accommodations and education in Ljubljana. Even though we attended a public school, a priest from one of the two Catholic churches in the village came to the school every Thursday to instruct us in catechism.

A large hall for community events was also an important part of our village. At one end of the spacious room was a raised stage which accommodated singing, theatrical, and Tamburitza (dance orchestra using ethnic stringed instruments) groups who either rehearsed or performed for concerts, dances, or plays during the year. I belonged to all of these groups, and it was such a wonderful part of my youthful life in Hotedršica.

I was born August 29, 1903. My parents, Alois and Marija Brus, owed one of the four gostlinas in town. At that time, the gostlina was a combination restaurant, tavern, and local gathering place for the residents of Hotedrsica and the nearby villages. Nearly everyone in this small town was a farmer, and on weekends people from miles around would gather at our gostlina for a night of socializing and dancing with music provided by a

local buttonbox musician. Oh, those were happy times for myself, my four brothers and four sisters. But there was also "delo" (work) for all of us because owning a business was quite demanding, in addition to taking care of the chickens, pigs, cows, and the garden which supplied our family with food the year round. The season for growing crops was longer than in the State of Wisconsin. Crops, such as potatoes, cabbage, and beans, were planted in March, and with the dry pleasant weather, which lasted until October, we were able to eat vegetables from the garden a good six months. Quite a bit of snow fell in winter, but November to February was not as harsh or bitter as at my Wisconsin home.

Gobe (mushrooms) abounded in the woods surrounding our village. The brown skinned mushrooms were gathered in the fall, cleaned, sliced, dried, and then stored in jars for the winter. We also ate them fresh. As the mushrooms crinkled from lack of moisture, the pleasing aroma filled the air and wetted our appetites for the soups and gravies which would be savored by these tasty strips. The Slovenian mushrooms were so much more flavourful than the ones we bought in American stores.

Holydays and holidays were very special times for our family because of the traditional customs which were observed on each occasion. I recall a good number of them. Let's start with Christmas when my brothers would go into a nearby forest and select a tree of just the right proportions for our house; then they would chop it down and haul it home with our horse and wagon. What excitement there was when the boys proudly displayed the tree after taking it off the cart. Sometimes they had to shake all the snow or drops of ice from the branches before bringing it inside. Aroma of sweet pine filled the

warm room and brought excitement to all of us especially my sisters and me who had prepared apples, cookies, and paper flowers for decorations. My brothers secured the tree in its wooden frame and we began to trim the limbs, placing each decoration in just the right spot. Then for days we enjoyed the colorful tree on display and helped ourselves to the edible decorations which tasted so good.

The Easter season boasted its own special customs. The day before Ash Wednesday was called "Pust," a time for celebration before each long Lenten fast, and the last opportunity to eat meat until Easter Sunday. These festivities, similar to Mardi Gras, were highlighted by music, dancing, and tasty food such as krofe (donuts), potica (nut roll), and ham. The time between Ash Wednesday and Easter was one of prayer, penance, and fasting, and was in no way interrupted by celebration in any form. This time of mortification heightened the arrival of Easter Sunday with all its unique customs; let me tell you about some of them. The "Butara" was made in a bush-like fashion from pussywillows and other branches; oranges were hung from the limbs. On Holy Saturday, the Butara would be taken to church and blessed by the priest who sprinkled holy water over its branches. When we returned home, our Butara was ignited and burned, filling the house with "Holy Smoke."

We girls were assigned the task of preparing a large basket fileld with ham, "zelodec" (a spicy thick sausage), and "potica" (nut roll), which was also taken to church for a blessing. When the Lenten fast was over, my mother cut a piece of each of the blessed foods for everyone in the family. This was the manner in which we began our celebration of the Easter holyday.

May 1st, the day set aside to pay tribute to Slovenian workers, was similar to the American "Labor Day," and observed with a picnic which was attended by people from nearby countries. Large horse-drawn wagons would travel throughout nearby villages, pick people up and

transport them to the picnic grounds. A pine tree was placed in each corner of the wagon. To this day I have never heard of the significance of this custom, other than for decorative purposes. This occasion provided men and women the opportunity to wear their native dress. It wasn't nesessary to ask a stranger, "From where do you come, friend?" because the native outfit reflected his

What a time this was for festivities. I always looked forward to hearing the harmonika (button box accordion) and to participate in the folk dancing. The picnicers could always rely on tasting certain foods, like "walnut potica" (nut roll) filled with sugar, spices, and ground walnuts, along with "spehova potica" which was made in a similar fashion, but filled with bits of bacon or pork crumblings. Another specialty was "flancete" or crisp and flaky fried pastries. Of course, there was plenty of "vino and pivo" (wine and beer), and for those who didn't indulge in alcoholic beverages, "Malinen Sok" a concentrated raspberry juice diluted with seltzer or

September was wine festival time and, following the harvesting of grapes, there was merriment which lasted three days and nights. Črnomelj usually had a very large festival because of the many vineyards.

November 1st was another special day, even though rather sad by nature. It was similar to the American Memorial Day on May 30th. The graves of friends and relatives, along with soldiers who had died for their country, were weeded and arranged attractively with wreaths and flowers. A candle which burned through the night was placed on the grade. It was a beautiful picture in the evening to see the many illuminated candles case their glow on the stone markers and flicker with the rustle of the wind in the trees. This was the honor and respect that we paid to those who were dear, departed but not forgotten.



No. 20, shares her delightful and colorful PINEAPPLE FLUFF which doubles as a salad or dessert. The unique SPINACH BALLS from Rosemary Orenchuk, Br. 59, Burgettstown, Pa., provide good conversation because they are different and delicious. (My husband enjoyed them). These can be served as a vegetable or as an hors d'oeuvre.

LAZYMAN'S BEEF STROGANOFF

No water or seasoning added. Serve on noodles.

2 1/2 pounds beef stew meat (chuck or ground steak cut into stripes).

I can cream of mushroom soup I can cream of onion soup

I can cream of celery soup

Thoroughly blend the soups together. Pour over beef in a baking pan. Bake 2 hours at 350 degrees, covered, or until tender.

CROCK POT METHOD:

Pour in crock pot. Cook 8 to 12 hours, slow. Excellent. serves 8.

PINEAPPLE FLUFF

DELICIOUS!

1 20-ounce can crushed pineapple 1 3-3/4 ounce pistachio instant pudding (use in powdered form) 3/4 cup colored miniature marshmallows

1 4-oz. size carton Cool Whip.

EASY BEEF STEW

No last minute preparations. Make its own gravy.

2 pounds beef stew meat

I teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon pepper

1 tablespoon sugar 1 onion, sliced thin

About 5 carrots, cut up

4 or 5 potatoes, diced 3 tablespoons tapioca

2 . /2 cups V8 juice

Put meat one layer high in bottom of casserole or flat pan (roasting pan). Sprinkle with salt, pepper and sugar. Top with vegetables. Sprinkle with tapioca. Pour V8 Juice over all. Cover with lid or use aluminum foil pressed on tightly. Bake in 250 degree oven for 4 hours. Do not stir. Serves 8.

SPINACH BALLS

If you serve these as a vegetable you may want the balls a little larger than for an hors d'oeuvre - (about an inch in size; serve warm.)

2 10-once packages frozen chopped spinach, thawed

I large onion, finely chopped

4 eggs, beaten 3/4 cup melted shortening

2 cups Peppridge Farms Stuffing

1/2 cup Parmesan cheese

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon garlic salt Stir well as you add each

ingredient. Chill 1/2 hour. Shape into balls. Bake on greased cookie sheet at 350 degrees for 20 to 25 minutes.

(I have already given this recipe to several women who enjoyed these at a cocktail party and didn't have the recipe).

BREAKFAST CASSEROLE

1/2 cup chopped onion 1/4 cup chopped green pepper 4 tablespoons butter I pound pork sausage or patties 12 ounce frozen Hash Browns 6 eggs beaten 1/4 cup milk I teaspoon salt or as desired

1/4 teaspoon pepper or as desired (probably some in sausage) 1/3 cup grated cheddar cheese

Saute the onion and green pepper in the butter. In another pan brown the sausage. Add the potatoes. Mix sausage and potatoes with the onion and green pepper. Beat eggs, milk,

In large bowl mix thoroughly the pineapple with juice and pistachio pudding. Add the marshmallows and fold in the Cool Whip. Put into a 9 x 13 size pan and refrigerate overnight.

salt and pepper. Stir into meat mixture. Pour into a deep 9 x 10 pan and sprinkle with the grated cheese. Bake in a 350 degree oven for 30 minutes (be sure center is cooked). Set for 5 minutes. Serve, if desired, with heated Cheddar Cheese Soup over top. Serves 6.

WOULD YOU LIKE TO MAKE A DRESS?




Fig. 1-Patterns come in many different types as well as sizes.

Whatever your reasons for sewing, you'll enjoy it more and save money if you learn to sew well. It's practice and attention to details and techniques that makes the expert seamstress.

Choose your pattern with care. Will the design be becoming to you? Will it be comfortable to wear? Should the material be soft or crisp?

How many pieces are there in the blouse, the skirt? Pick out a pattern that is the right size for your type of figure and you will have fewer fitting problems.

Patterns come in many different types as well as sizes. You may find such listings as "teen size, junior, half size, misses size and petite". (See figure 1)


Ask the saleslady to explain the differences in these types of patterns.

To get your correct pattern size: 1) Take snug measurements around your bust and waistline. 2) Take a fairly loose hip measurement, 7 inches to 9 inches below the waist. 3) Take back waist length measurement from the prominent bone at the base of your neck to the waistline. (Figure 2)

Compare these measurements with the ones on the pattern envelope. If the measurements do not exactly match those of any pattern size, choose the size that will give you the best fit in the blouse, since it is usually easier to adjust the skirt pattern than the blouse pattern. If your size pattern usually involves changes at the neckline, organization set forth by our pioneers. shoulder width, armhole and sleeve.

Next month: Checking your pattern pieces for size, cutting and marking your fabric.
