- PREGLED NAJVAŽNEJSIH DOGODKOV -

Jedrski reaktor v Černobilu še vedno nevaren — Možnost nove eksplozije — Dolgoročne posledice lahko katastrofalne

KIJEV, ZSSR — Kriza, ki jo je za Sovjetsko zvezo povzročila nesreča v jedrske elektrarni v Černobilu, se nadaljuje in celo stopnjuje, menijo zahodni jedrski strokovnjaki. Po izjavah raznih sovjetskih znanstvenikov in politikov sklepajo na primer, da jedrski reaktor v černobilski elektrarni še vedno gori. Možno je, pravijo nekateri fiziki in drugi izvedenci, da se je uran v reaktorju zaradi izredne vročine požara celo utekočinil in da bo — če se že ni — prodrl skozi 6 čevljev debelo betonsko ploščo pod reaktorjem. V tem slučaju bi prišel utekočinjen uran v stik z zemljo in z vodo, kar bi lahko imelo katastrofalne posledice. Voda bi postala radioaktivna ne le v okolici Černobila, ampak v večjem delu Ukrajine. Možno je tudi, menijo jedrski strokovnjaki, da je v bližini še gorečega reaktorja velika količina vodika, ki je pod močnim pritiskom. Ako bi prišlo do eksplozije tega vodika, menijo strokovnjaki, bi lahko bilo podobno izbruhi vulkana.

V zadnjih dneh sovjetska sredstva javnega obveščanja veliko več poročajo o černobilski nesreči. Najnovejše izjave odgovornih sovjetskih funkcionarjev pa kažejo, da so bile prva poročila o nesreči v mnogih oziroma neresnična. Včeraj je v intervjuju z zahodnimi novinarji, ki so pod strogim nadzorstvom obiskali Kijev, priznal predsednik ukrajinske vlade Aleksander P. Ljaško, da je bilo evakuiranih 49.000 oseb, živečih v oddaljenosti do 6 milj od elektrarne, že 27. aprila, torej dan po eksploziji v elektrarni, da pa je bilo evakuiranih dodatnih 35.000 oseb, živečih do 18 milj od elektrarne, šele 2. maja. Vzrok temu je bil, da lokalne oblasti niso pravočasno obvestili nadrejene v Moskvi o resničnem obsegu nesreče.

Danes se bodo odločile države Evropske gospodarske skupnosti, naj ustavijo uvoz svežega sadja in povrtnin iz sedmih vzhodnoevropskih držav. Po še nepotrjenih veste, se sovjetski predstavniki zanimajo za nakup mlečnih izdelkov in žitaric pri državah EGS. Zanimajo se tudi za nakup krav. Zaradi černobilske nesreče so bili Sovjeti menda prisiljeni zaklati veliko glav živine v Ukrayini, ako se bodo posledice nesreče razširile na nova območja ZSSR, pa jih bodo morali zakoljevati še veliko več. Cene žitaric na svetovnih borzah so poskočile v zadnjih dneh, v pričakovanju veliko novih sovjetskih nakupov.

Vesti, ki prihajajo iz Moskve, poročajo o prihodu veliko otrok iz Ukrayine. Vsi vlaki iz Ukrayine so zasedeni, v Kijevu pa so pri železniški postaji dolge vrste. Kot kaže, poročajo zahodni novinarji in diplomati, so se začeli zavedati obsežnosti nesreče v Černobilu tudi navadni ljudje. Sinoč je sovjetska televizija namenila več časa poročilom o razmerah v Kijevu in Černobilu, ni pa povedala dosti novega.

Laburistična stranka napredovala na lokalnih volitvah v Angliji — Politični udarec premierki Margaret Thatcher

LONDON, V. Br. — Na včerajšnjih lokalnih volitvah v Angliji, Škotski in Walesu, je znatno napredovala opozicijska laburistična stranka. Politični analitiki menijo, da je izid volitev udarec premierki Margaret Thatcher in njeni konservativni vlad. Čeprav so bile volitve lokalnega značaja, jih politični opazovalci smatrajo delno tudi kot

referendum o dosedanji Thatcherjevi politiki. Sporno je predvsem očitna Thatcherjeva naklonjenost predsedniku Reagangu in ZDA. Laburistična stranka je trenutno v rokah levicostranske struje, ki nasprotuje tej politiki in celo zahteva angleško opustitev jedrskega orožja in izstop iz NATO pakta.

Reaganova vlada razmišlja o novih ukrepih zoper Libijo — Analiza o učinkovitosti bombnega napada pretekli mesec

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Reaganova vlada razmišlja o novih gospodarskih ukrepih zoper Libijo. Med drugim naj bi ZDA prepovedale uvoz naftnih izdelkov, proizvajanih v drugih državah od libijske nafte. Tisti, ki naftne izdelke izvajajo v ZDA, bi morali s posebno izjavo potrditi, da omenjeni izdelki ne izvirajo iz libijske nafte. Želja Reaganova vlada je, da bi tak ukrep omejeval nakupovanje libijske nafte pri evropskih in drugih državah.

Včeraj je obrambno tajništvo objavilo analizo o učinkovitosti bombnega napada na Libijo, do katerega je prišlo pretekli mesec. Zadeti v napadu so bili vsi cilji, trdi analiza, ki pa priznava tudi, da je bilo po pomoti zadev tudi nekaj nevojaških objektov. Med drugim naj bi ameriški bombariki uničili dve transportni letali IL-76, tri druge pa poškodovali. Uničena so bila tudi tri lovska letala tipa MiG-23, morda tudi četrtri tovrstni MiG.

Libijska poročevalna sredstva trdijo, da je bila najdeno truplo enega od dveh ameriških letalcev, ki jih ZDA pogrešajo po napadu. Bila sta v sestreljenem F-111 letalu.

George S. Shultz na obisku v Filipinih — ZDA ne bodo finančna zlata jama — Nova vlada si bo morala tudi sama pomagati

MANILA, Fil. — Državni sekretar George S. Shultz je na uradnem obisku v Filipinih. Srečal se bo z najvišjimi filipinski predstavniki. V intervjuju z novinarji je pa Shultz dal vedeti, da ZDA ne bodo služile kot nekakšna finančna zlata jama za novo vlado predsednice Corazon Aquino. ZDA so pripravljene povečati raven gospodarske pomoći, je dejal Shultz, glavni ukrepi za oživitev gospodarstva pa morajo podvzeti Filipinci sami. Shultz in drugi člani Reaganove vlade so nejevoljni, ker so dobili vtis, da Aquino pričakuje, da bodo ZDA namenile več milijard dolarjev nove podpore. Tega pa ne bo, je dal vedeti Shultz.

Washington, D.C. — Oba domova zveznega kongresa sta glasovala zoper pobudo predsednika Reagana, da bi ZDA prodale sodobno orožje Saudski Arabiji.

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Amerika in Evropa

Že večkrat se je v teh desetletjih odkar obstaja Severnoatlantska zveza, ki jo poznamo po angleških začetnih črkah kot NATO, primerilo, da so evropski partnerji Amerike pustili jo v važnih problemih na cedilu. V zadnjih mesecih je ta resnica zelo vidno udarila na dan, ko je šlo za to, da se svetovnemu terorizmu postavi v bran enotna fronta Amerike in Evrope, katera je posebno boleče izpostavljena terorističnim zločinom. Doživeli smo, da je celotna zavezniška Evropa na naše veliko začudjenje (z izjemo Anglije) reagirala na povračilni bombni napad Amerike na Libijo apatično in celo sovražno, ko je bilo nesporno dokazano, da teroristične napade na povsem nedolžne ljudi vodi libijski diktator Kadafi.

Negativno obnašanje evropskih NATO držav, ko gre za enoten nastop in sodelovanje z Ameriko, se ni izkazalo šele ob ameriškem bombnem napadu na Libijo sredi aprila. Jasno in očividno se je odkrilo že pri terorističnem napadu na italijansko ladjo Achille Lauro v Sredozemlju, ki nam je v podrobnosti v živem spominu. Ameriška bojna letala so prestregla egiptovsko letalo, v katerem so se vozili napadalci in njihov mojster Mohamed Abbas, in letalo prisilila k pristanku na Siciliji. Italijani so dobili v roke vse zločince z Abbasom na čelu. Kljub ameriškemu posredovanju, naj tega nevarnega človeka italijanska oblast obdrži pod svojo kontrolo, da bi se z njim sodno postopalo, so ga izpustili, da je pobegnil v Jugoslavijo, kjer je seveda našel popolno zaščito in odprt pot v neznan kraj.

Preden se je predsednik Reagan odločil glede napada na Libijo, dokazani center terorizma, je s posebnim odposlancem obvestil evropske zaveznike o svojem načrtu in plediral za njihovo primerno sodelovanje. Odzvala se je samo ženska predsednica vlade v Angliji, vsi drugi so stisnili rep med noge in Reagana pustili na cedilu. Francozi niso dovolili niti preleta bombnikov prek njihovega ozemlja. Nemški premier Kohl, ki mnogo dolguje Reagangu za njegov obisk Bitburga, se je enostavno potuhnil, prav tako italijanski vladni predsednik Craxi.

Ta izredni pojav evropskega obnašanja spričo mednarodne in svetovne važnosti skupne borbe zoper svetovno nevarnost terorizma, ki ga dokazano vodi libijski predsednik Kadafi in mu botruje Sovjetska zveza, je zbudil široke komentarje v svetovnem tisku in televiziji. In se obširno ugiblje o tem, kaj nagiba Evropece do takšnega negativnega stališča v tej zadevi.

Pojavlja se mnenje, da njihovo zadržanje ne more biti samo političnega, ampak tudi, in morda predvsem, psihološkega značaja. Zanimivo in poučno storijo sem v tej zvezi bral in jo bom tu na kratko ponovil.

Napadalec je pred leti stockholmski banki ugrabil žensko in jo držal kot talko. Preden se je posrečilo rešiti jo, se je emocionalno spoprijaznila z ugrabiteljem, pretrgala razmerje s svojim zaročencem in ostala zvesta ugrabitelju ves čas njegovega zapora. Ženska je pač začutila, da je njen življenje v nevarnosti, pa se je vdala, sprejela napadalčeve norme in vrednote, da s tem prepreči njegovo maščevanje in kaznovanje — z eno besedo, iskala je preživetje za vsako ceno.

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RECIPES

OATMEAL BREAD


2 cupfuls of oatmeal
2 teaspoonfuls of salt
1 tablespoonful of sugar
1 teaspoonful of fat
1 quart of boiling water
1/2 of a yeast cake
1/4 cupful of lukewarm water

8 cupfuls of flour or more

Grease three 9x5-inch loaf pans. First measure the oatmeal, salt, sugar and fat, and pour the boiling water over them. Let stand until lukewarm; dissolve the yeast in lukewarm water, and add it to the other mixture. Stir in the flour, and knead until smooth and elastic; let rise until double its bulk, form into loaves and let rise again. Bake in hot oven (about 400° F.) 30 to 35 minutes. This is delicious toasted. Makes 3 loaves.

BREAD PAN TIP

Do not waste your time scouring bread pans; bread never bakes well in a bright tin.



NEW ENGLAND CORN BREAD

Sift together 1 1/3 cups flour and 2/3 cup fine cornmeal, 4 teaspoons baking powder and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Add 2/3 cup milk, 1/3 cup maple syrup, 1/4 cup melted butter or margarine and 2 beaten eggs. Mix just until ingredients are smooth and nice. Pour into a greased 9-inch square pan, and bake 25 to 30 minutes in a moderately hot oven, 375° F. Cut into squares. Serve hot with plenty of butter or margarine.

CHERRY DREAM SQUARES

1 pkg. Pillsbury Plus White Cake Mix
1 1/4 cups rolled oats
1/2 cup margarine or butter, softened
1 egg


21-oz. can cherry fruit pie filling

1/2 cup chopped nuts
1/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar

2 ribs of celery, cut in 1-inch pieces
3 carrots, cut in 2-inch pieces
1/2 large green pepper, cut in 1-inch squares
1 can (14-1/2 to 16 ounces) tomatoes (about 2 cups)
1 clove garlic, crushed
1/2 teaspoon thyme
2 teaspoons salt
Dash of cayenne pepper
1 bay leaf
1-1/2 tablespoons cornstarch
3 cups hot cooked rice

Season chicken with salt and pepper. Brown on all sides with butter. Add onion, celery, carrots, green pepper, tomatoes and seasonings. Bring to a boil, cover, and simmer for 30 to 40 minutes or until chicken is tender. Blend a little water into the cornstarch. Stir into chicken-vegetable mixture. Cook about 2 minutes longer. Remove bay leaf. Serve over beds of fluffy rice. Makes 6 servings.

Note: If dish is to be held an hour or longer before serving, turn chicken mixture and rice into separate containers. Cover and place in a 140° to 160° oven for 1 to 3 hours. Or prepare and refrigerate until ready to serve. Reheat.

Closing of joints can lead to painful headaches

Headaches, muscle tenderness, and difficulty opening and closing the mouth are the most common symptoms associated with a problem called myofacial pain dysfunction (MPD) syndrome. This is a term used by dentists to describe some disorders of the temporomandibular joint (TMJ) in the jaw and its supporting structure of muscles and ligaments.

Millions of Americans suffer from TMJ disorders. Because there are many structures about the face that are capable of causing pain, and because pain may be "referred" to nearby or even more general parts of the body, there is a great deal of confusion concerning the source of facial pain in connection to TMJ disorders.

To understand why TMJ disorders often result in headaches and other painful conditions, it is necessary to know how the temporomandibular joints function. These joints, located below the right and left temples, connect the lower jaw, or mandible, to the upper part of the skull. The mandible is the only mobile bone in the skull, and it moves often during the day, both horizontally and vertically, when we chew and talk.

Primates clench or gnash their teeth as a defense mechanism when the need to exhibit strength or anger arises. Humans resort to grimacing and gritting in moments of stress and anxiety. This anxiety, which may be expressed as night-time teeth grinding, overtaxes the temporomandibular joint's supporting muscles, and myofacial pain dysfunction results. In many cases, such facial ab-

normalities as a poor bite can lead to TMJ disorders, because the jaw muscles must function in an abnormal position. This results in spasms in the jaw muscles and anxiety, which may take the form of headaches, dizziness, stuffiness in the ears and pain in the face.

Sometimes, the joint may have sustained damage, in which case pain, tenderness, and mandibular movement disturbance are involved. In addition, joint sounds, clicking and grinding are noticeable.

Treatment for myofacial pain-dysfunction syndrome and temporomandibular joint damage includes reducing anxiety, especially if night-time

teeth grinding is involved. Behavior modification has become an important aspect of treatment when teeth clenching and grinding have been shown to be the primary cause of the pain.

Use of a plastic splint will temporarily alleviate some problems with poor bite that results in pain; however, proper closure of the mouth may require further forms of dental treatment. For TMJ damage, a temporary plastic splint may also be helpful for short-term relief of painful symptoms. But if the internal joint structures fail to re-establish a normal position, more extensive work may be necessary, including surgery to prevent permanent damage and arthritis.

Nutritious foods are a must for elderly

As the group of Americans over the age of 75 increases, there is growing concern among doctors and nutritionists that many elderly people may not be eating a nutritious diet. Poor nutrition among the elderly appears to be a major cause of the physiological decline previously blamed on the aging process.

The lack of good nutrition among the elderly crosses all social and economic groups in the population. While much of the nutrition problem is confined to the desperately ill or poor patient, financially secure elderly can also be affected as a result of drugs that they may be taking, or a loss of taste, among other reasons.

Nearly half of all people over 65 years old in this country

consume insufficient amounts of calories or nutrients such as calcium, iron, B vitamins or vitamin C. Some researchers believe that by assuring proper amount of these vitamins and minerals and calories, the decline in health that accompanies aging may be slowed.

A common problem that is difficult to control is the loss of taste and smell among the elderly which can lead to poor nutrition. Nerves that carry taste sensation and the taste buds decline. The smell center in the brain also degenerates, and some believe there may be a connection between the loss of smell and depression among the elderly because of the close proximity of the smell center and the centers of emotion. Often, adding flavor enhancers to foods encourages

better eating and improves spirits.

Drugs taken for various chronic ailments can also affect appetite and taste. This is a widespread problem. Doctors estimate that more than 80 percent of people over 60 years of age take one or more drugs for chronic ailments. Aside from altering taste, drugs — alone or in combination — can decrease the body's

ability to absorb nutrients.

Some form of exercise is also considered by doctors and nutritionists to be important in reducing malnutrition among the elderly. A sedentary lifestyle may lead to lowered food intake and therefore less of the crucial nutrients are being consumed.

Elderly people should do their best to get as much fresh food as possible, including fresh vegetables and fruits.

More thoughts on age 21 drinking law

Iowa's state legislature passed legislation last week raising the state's minimum drinking age to 21. The bill now goes to the governor who is expected to sign it.

"Ohio is one of only eight states that have not taken the life-saving step," said Representative Ronald Suster (D-Euclid), sponsor of House Bill 779, which seeks to restore the drinking age to 21 in Ohio.

Wisconsin's legislature is expected to act on similar legislation in May.

"Conformity is important to prevent young people from crossing borders to neighboring states that have a lower drinking age," said Suster. "All states bordering Ohio have a drinking age of 21. Yet their young people can still cross into Ohio, drink freely, and return to terrorize the streets of their home state."

Suster introduced House Bill 779 on January 6 following growing concern for decreasing alcohol-related fatalities.

Victim's Bill Becomes Law

State Sen. Lee I. Fisher (D-Shaker Heights) announced this week that Senate Bill 151 has been signed by Governor Richard F. Celeste and becomes law on July 9.

The bill, introduced by Sen. Fisher and co-sponsored by Rep. Ron Suster (D-Euclid), will make it easier for crime victims to collect restitution from convicted criminals by expanding a victim's right to sue a criminal in the civil courts. Under S.B. 151, the statute of limitations for starting a civil action will not begin until a criminal finishes serving his or her prison sentence.

"Under the old law," Fisher explained, "crime victims have failed to get the restitution to which they are entitled because the statute of limitations has run out on them. But this legislation will help change that by lengthening the period during which suits can be filed."

Fisher pointed out that the old statute of limitations provisions have acted to deter civil suits against convicted criminals, because at the time of the conviction of a crime and shortly thereafter, an incarcerated person typically has little funds from which a judgement could be drawn.

"In the event the perpetrator of the crime has no assets even after his release from prison," Fisher added, "the bill works no harm. But if some individuals do acquire those assets, then the victim, under this new law, will have a greater opportunity to be made whole through civil damages."

Senate Bill 151 is Senator Fisher's second victim's rights bill to become law. In 1984, he sponsored S.B. 1195, which created a State Victim Assistance Advisory Board to allocate funding for victim assistance programs.

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
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Slovenian Statue in City Hall



More than anyone else, the mother who cares for both home and her children is destined to influence the character and future of the country. And often this responsibility is combined with a back-breaking and steady ordeal of sewing, washing, mending, cleaning and teaching.

It is to this mother, who dedicates her life to her home, her family and children, that the country owes a debt of gratitude. This mother represents the finest in our civilization.



Night Terrors will haunt you with rude awakening

During the past several months my four-year-old child has occasionally woken from his sleep, screaming at the top of his lungs. Strangely, he doesn't remember anything about it in the morning. Is there anything I can do for him?

Your son is probably having what neurologists refer to as night terrors, one of a number of so-called parasomnias that also include sleepwalking and nightmares.

Night terror and sleepwalking tend to be more of a problem for the parents or family than for the person experiencing them. Frequently, as in the case of your son, he or she does not even know there is something wrong.

Night terror or sleep terror are different from nightmares in a number of important ways. Nightmares, or dream anxiety attacks, occur during REM (Rapid Eye Movement) sleep, and wake the child or adult. The person often recalls the frightening, anxiety-filled dream, and remembers waking.

Night terror, on the other hand, is seen primarily in children and occurs during deeper stage 4, or slow-wave sleep. There is absolutely no memory of the event even though the child appears to be extremely frightened and agitated. However, there is usually no evidence that night terror in children is associated with any psychological problems.

Sleepwalking is similar to night terrors in that it occurs during the deepest part of sleep, and is an abnormal type of arousal. Neurologists who specialize in sleep dysfunction report that during sleepwalking, only part of a person's brain is awake, while the rest — including the memory areas — is still asleep. The person has no recollection of having gotten out of bed.

As many as 15 percent of the population recalls having walked in their sleep at sometime in their lives, and some 4 million people regular-

ly sleepwalk.

Parasomnias usually resolve themselves during childhood. However, in cases where they either persist or begin in adulthood, especially night terrors, there may be reason to suspect a psychological component. Night terrors and sleepwalking can be side effects of certain over-the-counter and prescription medications, especially sedatives. Your doctor will ask about the use of these medications and for other details to establish a diagnosis.

Because sleepwalking and night terrors most commonly afflict children, doctors are reluctant to treat them with medications. Instead, parents

should take precautions to make the home and bedroom as safe as possible. For example, putting up gates at the top of staircases are important if your child is a sleepwalker. Doctors recommend that a sleepwalking child should be led back to bed without attempt at communication. The same goes for dealing with night terrors; you should com-

fort the child, but there seems to be little need to wake him or her up.

Nixon On Aid.

Is It Too Late?

WASHINGTON, D.C. --

Many members of Congress believe the result in Nicaragua is certain to be determined by the sentiment of the people.

And the Marxist regime's popularity may be greater than usually admitted in the U.S. There is a growing belief in Washington--noted by President Nixon recently--that \$100,000,000 in aid is not enough to win in Nicaragua.

Classified reports in Washington reveal the Contras are in a bad way, that unless they get major aid from Washington, they are likely to be reduced to a minor force in 1986.

In Northern Nicaragua rebels numbered some 4,000 last year this time and are said now to be reduced to about fifty. In the south, the Contras (led by Eden Pastora Gomez) have lost their main base camps near the Costa Rican border.

The last remaining sizable force of Contras still in Nicaragua, estimated at about 1,500 men, are in the provinces of Boaco and Chontales.

They are said to be hard-pressed. The Marxist regime feels Congress' refusal last year to grant the Contras military aid doomed their chances.

The Marxist government is now much stronger militarily than in 1985, with a considerable force of MI-24 attack helicopters, plus troop transport helicopters (both Russian supplied). Their forces are better trained, and loyal.

Even among some strong backers of Contra aid, the conviction is growing that to defeat the Sandinistas, much training for the Contras is a prerequisite--for they now face a much harder task.

The effort in the U.S. by some churches, including the Catholic, United Methodist, Presbyterian, United Church of Christ and others, in successfully opposing military aid in 1985, might have contributed to an inevitable Marxist victory in Nicaragua.

The same process took place in Cuba over 20 years ago.

Cleveland Plain Dealer columnist **Bob Dolgan** was named one of the ten best sports columnists in the nation in the prestigious Associated Press Sports Editors contest recently.

Dolgan was honored for his columns on Indiana University basketball coach Bobby Knight, who threw a chair across the court in a rage, on former football star Jim Brown, who was accused of rape, and on Keith Lee, Cavaliers basketball player.



Jim's Journal

Now that we are entering into the vacation season we can count on more and more persons taking movie cameras along to capture their exciting trip. And with the new popularity of video tape cameras, these forms of recording moving action will also be in wider use.

However, before using the motion picture camera the photographer should bear one thought in mind: THE MOVIE CAMERA IS NOT A COMPUTER.

This cannot be stressed enough. The biggest mistake movie takers make is trying to get everything into the camera as if it were some sort of a storage device to preserve what is before it for all times sake. They think everyone who views it later will be thrilled to death.

NOTHING COULD BE FURTHER FROM THE TRUTH. The camera is a device by which one tells a story. The photographer should plan way ahead what he is going to shoot and how he is going to take the pictures and follow some simple instructions.

1. Do not pan. No matter how tempting to move the camera, don't do it. Let the action being filmed do the moving. If you have to take a wide shot of a mountain, for instance, have someone walk across the screen, and the mountain comes in the background by itself. Let the human subjects do the walking.

2. Take photos of the persons

on the vacation. In five, ten or 25 years the mountains, rivers, beach will be the same, but the persons will change. Get the photos of the people. One vacation movie I saw (for a very few minutes before I left) kept showing a cow. I inquired about the significance of the cow. They said every morning when they walked past their cottage in Jamaica they would see this cow, so they took all kinds of pictures of it. I said, "It would have been better to take movies of each other walking out of your cottage and into the ocean." Now 20 years later, they have this great picture of the cow eating grass, but NONE in the entire movie of themselves. What a waste.

Then there are those who bought a movie camera and purchased a zoom lens. The best advice I can offer here is throw the zoom lens in the garbage can and set it on the curb and forget it forever. There is nothing that will give the viewer a bigger headache than zooming in and out, in and out, in and out, ad nauseum.

Another misconception 99% of the movie takers is to shoot the camera for one or two seconds, stop, shoot another

one or two seconds. When the movie is show, the entire scene is nothing but a bunch of jumping nonsense. Remember — the movie camera is not a computer. The computer stores all sorts of information and it can be reassembled when the right buttons are punched. But what a movie camera takes must flow through the projector or television.

Another hint is to focus on one object during the entire vacation. A fantastic vacation movie my nephew, California lawyer, Carl Debevec, made in his younger years centered around a ketchup bottle. The bottle was seen being passed around at a picnic, so all present were accounted for. The bottle floated down a stream to bring in the scenery, it was found later and repacked in the picnic basket, used to put on hamburgers eaten between innings of a baseball game, and so it went for the 20 minutes of delightful entertainment. The film was a masterpiece. A clear example of this is on one of the Budweiser commercials that begins with a scene of a Dalmatian dog nudging the door of a barn with his nose to open the door and look around. The dog sees his friends the Clydesdale horses. Then the dog views the drivers putting the harnesses on the horses. The entire commercial is seen through the eyes of the Dalmatian who in the end is proudly sitting on top of the Budweiser truck which is taking the beer to the customers. That commercial deserves an award for its excellent artistic value.

Another important item to take with you when filming is a tripod. Put the movie camera on the tripod which will make the camera still so the scenes don't jump around.

I have recently seen a travelogue movie that sponsors paid tens of thousands of dollars to have done, and the scenes jumped all over the place, the cameraman went nuts with his zoom lens, and the entire thing was so poor no one in his right mind could stand to watch it for more than one minute. Even that minute was too much.

Another way to get an idea of how to take good movies is to go to a theater and look how the director did it. The director of "Out of Africa" did an excellent job of getting the scenery in, closeups notched, and medium shots in without disturbing the audience.

Eastman Kodak puts out a book entitled, "How to Make Good Movies." It used to cost \$1, what the price now is, I don't know but it is the bible that EVERYONE who takes even one foot of film should read ten times before taking one movie. Read it and give the rest of us a break.

If you don't PLEASE don't ask me to watch your vacation

movies. I'll either sneak out to the kitchen and out the back door, or suddenly remember I left the lights on in the car (even if it's daylight) and never come back.

Tell Dr. Brown to get his eyes examined and take a look at what the citizens of Cleveland (not just the diehard baseball fans) but just about everyone is doing about the team. We're talking about them, and we're putting our money where our mouth is, at the ballpark gate. And we're not ashamed. We're astounded. We're winning.

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Great music anchors Korotan for 35 years

When the Slovenian choral ensemble Korotan, under the direction of Rudy Knez, presented its annual spring concert April 26, it marked the group's 35th anniversary.

Any time such an organization reaches that kind of milestone, one has to wonder what it is that has kept the group going all those years.

Often those who are part of a group from its early years stay with it because it gives them something to hang on to — a living nostalgia, as it were. Certainly this is not the case with Korotan. Most of the singers at this last concert had not yet been born when the chorus first performed in 1951.

In other situations it is the director who maintains continuity. For some 17 years, Frank Gorensek provided strong leadership for the ensemble. But when he retired in 1983, Rudy Knez took over the reins and the group today is as strong as ever.

No, the underlying force that gives meaning to the group is none other than the music itself.

We Slovenian-Americans of European ancestry are noted for our traditionalism. This characteristic is apparent to anyone who attends Korotan performances.

Throughout the program we heard numerous folk songs, some of which no doubt could have been heard at the first concert in 1951 or many years before that. Like they tell me in my college music classes: These are the songs of "lasting value," that have stood the test of time and become an integral part of the culture.

This is the music that has been the constant through the years when the names, faces and audiences of Korotan have changed.

Of course, for variety, several more recently composed songs were interspersed with the traditional. The separate men's and women's choirs, as well as solos, a duet and an octet (with piano accompani-

ment), provided a beautiful contrast to the powerful sound of the full chorus.

A public congratulations is in order for Mr. Knez and the singers of Korotan.

And if you are at all interested in the Slovenian musical tradition, take note the next time you have a chance to take in a Korotan performance. Some of the faces may be different, but the music will always be there.
