Na otoku Saipan je več kot 1000 Japoncev umrlo od žeje. Amerikanci so jim namreč razlivali vodne rezervoarje, v katerih je nabirala voda od dežja. To bila edina voda, ki so jo imeli razpolago Japonci.

V zadnjih 25 mesecih je vlada dala 13.000.000 osebam več kot \$5.000.000.000. Te osebe so bile vojni vojak, ki služijo v ameriški vojni sili.

Podpredsednik Wallace, ki je nedavno v Sibiriji, pravi, da na Rusijo tam tolikšno vojaško moč, da se lahko zoperstavi vsakemu napadu Japoncev.

Ameriška in angleška vlada protivita dati v javnost vse pogoje mirovnih pogovorov z Italijo. Bojita se namreč reakcije do-ker bi ljudje videli, da mno-mirovnih pogovorov ni bilo sfor-miranih, ali pa so bili v praksi izšani.

V javnosti se je pisalo, da bo Italija okupirala vzhodni del Evrope, vključno Slezijo, kjer velika industrija in bogati premoga, dočim bo nad-ovala Anglija zapadni del Evrope, kjer so še večji indu-rijski okraj. To, zadnje pa ne-je tako, ker bo imel tukaj-ko besedo tudi Stric Sam.

Zavezniki imajo več vrst le-ki so zmogla dohiteti nem-leteče bombe, ki jih spušča-preko Rokavskega preliva na-Italijo. Ta letala so tipa: Tem-t, Typhoon, Spitfire, Mes-tos in Mustangs. Ta letala-aspuste za letelo bombo in jo-čijo v zraku. Toda kosi raz-leteče bombe dostikrat za-letajo tudi letalo.

Sedanja madžarska vlada, ki-tematično preganja žide po-iz Berlina, je vselej pri-ženjela zatistiti eno oko ali-oba, če se izplača. Tako si-izvidi žide lahko kupijo svobo-vo vizo za v Švico, če plačajo-na je navadno 2.500.000 švi-ških frankov.

Zadnja titularna vstaja v-ameriški ni spremenila stališča-zveznikov, da bodo zahtevali-izpogojno vda Rajha, pa naj-že takrat v rokah naciev ali-kerjev. Okupacijske armade-celo pripravljene naleteti v-ameriški na pravcato anarhijo,da bo posledica civilne vojne.

Washingtonu govore o dveh-ličnih pogojih za Nemčijo,ki se bodo naciji upirali do-čnega, bodo težji pogoji, ako-čjo bo na kaka prekucusa vlada-šla hitro, bodo pogoji milejši.

V zavezniških krogih nekaterepredlagajo, naj bi dali v ugod-nem trenutku nemškemu narodu-šmat s primeroma lahkiimi-pogoji, kar bi znalo dvigniti-čiste mase, da bi se uprle svo-vo vladi ter tako prihranili za-vezniki. Zadnji napad na živ-je Hitlerja kaže, da bo Nem-škmalu zrela za tak ultimati.

Japonci zanikajo, da bi pomorili ameriške ulete letalce

London.—Radio iz Tokia je včeraj zagotavljal, da ameriški letalci, ki so se spustili nad Japonsko na tla, niso bili in ne bodo pomorjeni. Radio je zagotavljal, da je japonska vlada topogledno obvestila ameriško vlado potom nevtralne Švice.

Ta uradna izjava japonske vlade se pa najbrže nanaša samo na letalce, ki so zadnje čase v zračnih trdnjavah B-29 bombardirali Japonsko. Ame-

riška vlada je namreč že prej objavila zadržila Tokia, da je bilo nekaj ameriških letalcev, ki so v aprilu 1942 napadli Japonsko, umorjenih.

Japonci pravijo, da so že pred tremi dnevi izročili Švici svojo izjavo, da nimajo name-nariti ameriških letalcev, ki so prisiljeni pristati na japon-skem ozemlju in da je taka tr-ditev samo "ameriška propa-ganda."

Guvernerja Avstrije so baje internirali, ker je deloval proti Hitlerju

London.—Baldur von Schirach, guverner Avstrije, je bil včeraj prijet in interniran na Dunaju na ukaz načelnika Gestape, Heinricha Himmlerja. Guverner je obdolžen, da je bil soudeležen pri zaroti proti Hitlerju in da je delal na separatnem miru za Avstrijo pri za-veznikih.

Kot poroča Reuterjeva depe-ša iz Švice, je Himmler obdol-žil von Schiracha, da ni poka-zal dovolj volje, da bi zatl de-monstracije za mir ter da je na sumu, da je bil v zvezi z av-strijskimi aristokrati pri nar-črtu, da se izvede s pomočjo cerkve revolucijo v Avstriji in doseže separaten mir.

Goebbels je ukazal iti na delo nemškim ženskam

London.—Prvi ukaz, ki ga je izdal dr. Goebbels, minister za delovno silo, je bil ta, da je pre-povedal vsake počitnice za žens-ke. Obenem je ukazal, da mora-odslej vojaštvo na frontah sa-mo graditi ceste in mostove, kar so poprej izvrševali delavski ba-talioni.

"Ako so ruske ženske in otro-ci delali v tovarnah Leningrada-tudi ob času topniškega ognja, tudi mi ne moremo dovoliti žens-kam počitnic, ko stoji sovražnik pred vrati Vzhodne Prusije," je rekel Goebbels.

"Ako so angleške žene poma-gale nakladati ladje za invazijo in če dela 18.000.000 ameriških žensk v tovarnah, tudi nemške ženske ne smejo zanemarjati de-lo," je dalje ukazoval Goebbels.

Vse zveze v Berlinu z zuna-njim svetom so bile v četrtek ponoči prekinjene. Glede tega niso dali Nemci nobenega poja-snila.

Nemci so Fincem ob-ljubili, da bodo branili linijo Narva-Peipus in finski časopi-sje je se v sredo trdilo, da je Hitler ukazal braniti Estoni-jo. Toda s padcem Narve je nemška fronta v Estoniji pre-sekana in Finska je osamlje-na. Finska vladna opozicija bo najbrže kmalu zahtevala, da se zopet vpraša v Moskvi za premirje.

Ankara.—Nemški diplomati govorijo kar javno, da bo v kratkem prišlo do preloma tr-govskih odnosov med Nemčijo in Turčijo in da bo takoj za-tem sledil diplomatski prelom med obema državama.

Silna suša škodi koruzi po vsej deželi, v Ohio pa celo do 50%

Washington.—Suša, ki pre-vladuje v nekaterih okrajih, kjer raste koruza, že od šest do osem tednov, se ne more več podcenje-vati. Zdaj že grozi močno škodovati koruzi, ki je glavna kma-za 86.000.000 glav goveje živi-ne, za 100.000.000 prašičev in za nekako en bilijon kokoši. Iz koruze pridelujejo tudi indu-strijski alkohol in pa razstrelji-ve snovi, kar vse je važno za voj-no.

Koruzna letina v Ohio je radi suše prizadeta za najmanj 25% do 50%. Enako se poroča tudi iz držav: Indiana, Iowa, Illinois in Missouri. Ako bo letina koru-ze za 35% manjša, kot se pričakuje, bo treba skrajšati program za krmljenje, toda če bo pa za 50% manjša, tedaj bo pa že ogromna škoda, ki bo prizadela zlasti živinorejce.

V mesecu juliju koruza naj-bolj raste, toda dobiti mora od časa do časa potrebno moč. Zaradi suše koruza še ni začela de-lati kaj prida storžev in tudi če bi dobili zdaj dež, bi se koruza ne popravila. Dež bi koristil sa-mo oni koruzi, ki so jo sejali poz-no in ki še ne cveta.

London.—Danes je radio iz Moskve govoril ruskim ar-madam: "Kmalu bomo v Ber-linu! Dozdaj smo prehodili že dobršen del pčta, ki vodi v Berlin in kmalu bomo dosegli zadnjo nemško trdnjavo. Naši tanki so nepremagljivi tako na česti kot na odprtem polju in kmalu bodo zapeljali na nem-ške ceste."

Papež Pij XII. zahteva pravico za Poljake

Rim.—Papež Pij XII. je sprejel v avdienci poljsko de-legacijo ter izjavil upanje, da bodo narodi priznali pravice zahteve Poljske.

Papež Pij je rekel: "Čeprav je vaša rojstna zemlja danes rdeča krvi, so vaše pravice tako gotove, da imamo trdno upanje, da se bodo vsi narodi zavedali svojega dolga do Poljske, ki je bila že preveč-krat prizorišče njih sporov. Vsak, ki ima le še iskrico pravih človeških in krščanskih sentimentov v svojem srcu, bo priznal Poljski pravico do pro-stora, ki ji gre na principih pravice in pravega miru."

V avdienci je bil tudi gene-ral Kazimir Sosnkowski, po-veljnik poljskih čet v Italiji s svojim štabom, mnogo vojakov in duhovnikov.

TA SE JE OPRAVIL GOTOVO ZA FRONTO

Los Angeles.—Nekdo je vzel iz izlizenega okna neke trgov-ine kompletno uniformo, čelado, puško in nož. Uzmovič hoče biti najbrže pripravljen za prihod-njo invazijo, kadar bo napveda-na.

V Normandiji so Amerikanci pritisnili 70.000 Nemcev ob morje. Včeraj je bil za Nemčijo najbolj porazen dan v tej vojni.

Moskva, 28. julija.—Ruske armade so danes strle tri nemške utrjene postojanke—Brest Litovsk, Przemysl in Jaroslav. To je bil najbolj porazen dan za nemško armado v vsej tej vojni. S tem so dosegle ruske armade 11 velikih zmag v zadnjih 24 urah v svojem pohodu na Baltik, Poljsko in proti Vzhodni Prusiji, proti Nemčiji in proti Čehoslova-ški.

NI TI V SVOJEM BLITZKRIEGU NI SO MOGLI NEMCI KAJ TAKEGA POKAZATI, KOT SO DOSEGLI ZDAJ RUSI.

Ruske čete so samo 30 milj oddaljene še od Varšave, glav-nega mesta Poljske in 340 milj od Berlina. Do nemške Slezije imajo Rusi samo 128 milj še.

Reuterjeve depeše tudi poro-čajo, da so Nemci izpraznili Kaunas, glavno mesto Litve. Rusi ne omenjajo ničesar o tem.

Za znano trdnjavo Przemysl, ki je bila v prvi svetovni vojni avstrijska, so se vršili takrat boji skoro šest mesecev, predno so jo vzeli Rusi. Danes so jo Rusi vzeli z lahkoto potem, ko so udarili preko reke San. Ob-enem so Rusi vzeli poljsko me-sto Jaroslav.

Premier Stalin je izjavil, da je zdaj Rusom odprta pot do poljskega mesta Krakowa, 120 milj zapadno.

Nemška linija od Baltika do Karpatov, 1.000 milj dolga, se je popolnoma zrušila pred rus-kim navalom, ki so ga pričeli 22. junija. Severno in južno od Varšave se vale ruske armade naravnost proti Rajhu, kjer ni-majo nobene prave ovire.

Ko so Kozaki udarili na Nemce, so ti zbežali prav do predmestij Varšave.

Nemške divizije, ki so še v baltiških provincinah, se ne more-jejo več umakniti domov po su-hem, ker so Rusi zasedli zadnjo železniško progo, ki vodi iz Latvije in Estonije.

Ameriški tanki so pritisnili 70.000 Nemcev ob morje v zapadni Normandiji.

Normandija, 28. jul.—Ame-riški tanki so se danes pririli v predmestje Coutances potem, ko so napredovali 15 milj od St. Lo. Skozi Coutances vodi edina cesta ob obrežju in vsi Nemci, ki so še severno od tu-ka, so zasedli v past, ako se jim ne bo poročilo pred Ameri-kanecem od tukaj. Poročila tr-dijo, da je severno od tukaj ves 84. nemški armadni zbor. Mno-ga Nemcev je pravzaprav ušlo iz pasti, toda sodi se, da je tu-kaj še vedno od 50.000 do 70.000 Nemcev, katere so ameriški tanki pritisnili ob obrežje.

Zavezniška letala, ki poleta-vajo nad nemško linijo, poro-čajo, da je med nemško arma-do prav tak nered, kot je bil v Afriki pred enim letom, ko je bežal Rommel proti Tuniziji.

Zdaj pričakujejo, da bo kmalu napovedal general Mont-gomery glavni napad na Neme-ce v smeri proti Parizu.

V Londonu sodijo, da vodi ameriške tanke, ki so razbili nemško linijo, general Patton, ki je prej poveljeval 7. armadi v Italiji. Uradno se ne poroča, kje se Patton nahaja, toda Nemci trdijo, da je v Franciji.

POŠTA OD DOMA MU JE REŠILA ŽIVLJENJE

Barberton, O.—Poročnik Albert Litwak, katerega starši stanujejo na 409 Wooster Road, sporoča, da so mu pisma od doma rešila življenje. Bil je z invazijsko armado v Franciji in kmalu potem je prejel od doma 43 pisem, vse hkrati, ker se je bila pošta nekje zamudila.

Poročnik je vsa pisma pre-bral, potem jih je pa shranil v zavoju na prsih, kjer ima sprav-ljeno plinsko masko. Kmalu za-tem sta ga zadeli dve nemški krogli. Ena ga je zadela v ste-gno, druga je pa udarila nara-vnost v pripravo za plinsko ma-sko. Predrla je vseh 43 pisem, toda pri tem je že izgubila toli-ko na svoji moči, da je vojaka le lahko ranila.

La Salle, Ill.—Frances Ger-dovich je prejela žalostno vest od vojnega departamenta, da je padel v invaziji Francije njen mož John, star 26 let. Padel je 10. junija. Poleg mlade žene za-puška hčerko, starše, tri brate, od katerih sta dva pri vojaki, in sestro.—Poročano je bilo da je Frank Martinjak ml. pogre-šan od 19. maja. Starši so zdaj prejeli obvestilo od vojnega departamenta, da je njih sin v nemškem ujetništvu.—Dne 14. ju-lija je nagloma umrl Sebastian Anžlovar, star 77 let. Bil je menda prvi slovenski naseljene-c v La Sallu. Zapuška več otrok in vnukov.

Emleton, Pa.—Dne 12. juni-ja je tukaj umrla Rose Kozuh, roj. Pence, stara 56 let in doma iz Malih Vodenic, fara Kostanje-vica na Dolenjskem. V Ameriki je bila od leta 1912, zadnjih 25 let na farmi. Zapuška moža, si-na, ki je v vojni na Novi Gvine-ji, brata v Wyomingu, sestro Jo-sephine Dolinar v Chicagu in štiri sestre v stari domovini.

Duluth, Minn.—Tukaj je po daljši bolezni v bolnišnici umrl George Splehar, star 65 let, ro-jen v Jugoslaviji. V tem mestu je živel 30 let. Tukaj zapuška brata, v Keewateenu sestro, po-ročeno Jugovih, v Calumetu, Mich., pa drugo sestro, poroče-no Sterk.—V Virginiji je umrla v bolnišnici Mary Bobentz, ki zapuška štiri hčere in tri sinove (dva pri vojaki). V mestni bolnišnici v Virginiji je umrla tudi Margaret Bohinc iz McComber-ja. Na Elyju in okolici je živel a čez 30 let.—Mary Mhelich iz Soudana je od sina Joeva preje-la telegram, da je bil pri inva-ziji Francije 15. junija resno ran-jen, zdaj pa je bil pripeljan z letalom iz Anglije v New York. Kako resne so poškodbe, druž-i ni znano, toda sodi se, da bo mo-ral ostati dalj časa v bolnišnici.

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Rusija se vrača

Naslednji članek smo brali v vodilnem katoliškem tedniku "America," ki ga izdajajo v New Yorku ameriški jezuitje. Podajamo ga našim čitateljem v prostem prevodu, ker se nam zdi važen za katoliško stališče do takih in podobnih dogodkov, ki jih je videti več in več. Takole piše "America":

Sovjetska vlada je tekom zadnjih 25 let že v mnogem spremenila svojo prvotno zamisel o tem, kako naj bo urejena nova država. Prvotne njene zamisli se po večini niso ozirale na resnično življenje. Toda življenje je šlo naprej svojo pot. V teku let se je pokazalo, da se mora vlada ravnati po življenju, ne pa življenje po zamislih vlade.

V prvih letih nove ruske ali sovjetske države je šlo marsikaj med "staro šaro," češ, da je samo ostanek iz buržujskih časov. Med staro šaro je šla tudi družina ali obitelj. Prvotna sovjetska država ni bila pozidana na temelju družine, kakor bi bilo pričakovati, zakaj družina je nekaj tako naravnega, da si je težko misliti, kako in zakaj naj jo sukša kdo odpraviti.

Toda ustanova družine ali obitelji, kakor jo pozna svet že od začetka zgodovine, ni šla v račune revolucionarnim boljševikom. Če naj bo družina tista samostojna in neodvisna naravna ustanova, v čije pravice nima nikdo posegati, kako naj se ustanovi na podlagi družinske celice kakšna totalitarna in diktatorska vrsta družba, na primer boljševiška država? Zato si je revolucionarna boljševiška država družino mislila kot nekako fabriko za pridobivanje novih državljanov. Da je družina samostojna družba v okviru države, to misel so boljševiki zavrgli. Da je družina najboljša podlaga za stalnost državne vladavine, tega boljševiki niso hoteli verjeti. Družine kot samostojno veljavne družbe ali organizacije so se bali.

Zakaj? Če bi bili družino priznali, bi ji morali tudi priznati njene pravice. In ena med pravicami družine je, da ima za se lastnino. Brez te osebne lastnine družina ne more ohraniti svoje svobode. Druga taka neoddatna pravica družine je, da sama vzgaja svoje člane — otroke. Brez te pravice je v družini nemogoča sloga, nemogoč enoten duh, nemogoča skupnost. Ravno tega pa revolucionarni boljševiki niso marali, ker so hoteli imeti vsakega posameznega človeka le zase, le za svojo novo državo. In so hoteli imeti vsakega človeka celega, ki naj ne bo podvržen prav nobeni drugi oblasti kot državi. Urejeno družinsko življenje novih državljanov torej ni bilo zaželeno.

Najbolj pa ruši družinsko življenje razporoka (divorce). V začetku nove ruske države je bila razporoka v Rusiji lažja reč kot je danes v znanem Renu pri nas v Ameriki. Vsak razlog je bil dober, da se je kateri koli zakon "postavno" ločil. Toda v teku časa so tudi ruski vladarji spoznali, da ima še vedno veljavo star pregovor: kar ima korenine v človeški naravi, se tudi z gnojnimi vilami ne da izkoreniniti. Niti s strojnimi puškami in koncentracijskimi taborišči se ne da pregnati. Narava pride prej ali slej spet do svojih pravic.

Najnovejša odredbe ruske vlade so razporoko zelo otežkočile. Torej je spet v veljavi urejeno družinsko življenje! Že samo taksa za razporoko je zdaj štirikrat večja kot je bila v zadnjih časih. Tudi razlog za razporoko mora biti zelo tehten. Ne zadostuje več, da dva rečeta, da sta se naveličala drug drugega in zato iščeta razporoko. Sodnije imajo točna navodila, kako naj poravnajo razpore med zakonci, da ne bodo silili narazen.

Istotako je ruska vlada razpisala mnogo večje nagrade za večje število otrok kot je veljalo do sedaj. Za vsakega otroka se dobi nagrada, dočim je veljalo do doslej šele za sedmega. Matere številnih družin dobijo posebno medaljo in tako dalje.

What's New
in Baseball

Jim Bagby's debut last Thursday, pitching for the Indians against the A's was very auspicious, with a fancy five-hit victory over them at 4 to 1. It was his first appearance on a professional baseball diamond since the closing day of the 1943 season, when he helped the tribe to defeat these same Athletics and to clinch third place. Bagby entered the Merchant Marine last spring, but got his release this month to take Army exams. He was rejected, and so is now back in baseball harness. In order to make room on the Indians' roster for Jim, General Manager Roger Peckinpaugh released Catcher Jim McDonnell to the Louisville Club of the American Association on a 24-hour recall option.

Sunday's double-header which the Indians swept from the Nats, 4 to 3 and 9 to 5, was marked by Jeff Heath's first appearance in a game since June 11. This appearance may prove his last for several weeks more, as he re-injured his knee breaking away from the plate and had to limp off the field. In the second game, the Indians clicked off their 100th double play of the season and added three more before it was over. In all they made six. They are second to Detroit in the manufacture of twin killings.

On Tuesday night, the Yanks and the Indians opened the second-place battle before a crowd of 26,970. Steve Gromek, the Indians' right-hander, pitched brilliant ball for the Indians as he struck out 10 and allowed only six hits, while Ken Keltner smashed a 4-run homer. Although the Tribe is in fourth place, they were only one game behind the second place New York Yankees and one-half game behind the third-place Boston Red Sox.

The score was: Indians 10, Yanks 6. The Wednesday night game between the Indians and the Yankees was played for the exclusive benefit of the Baseball War Fund, a special agency set up to disburse the money which the clubs make available to Army and Navy Relief, the U. S. O. and similar organizations which depend on such generosity for effective operation. In this benefit game everybody pays—the players, the umpires, the coaches, the news-writers and the ushers—even the owners. The score was New York 6, Cleveland 3.

The Allies are shortening the distance between them and Berlin as follows as of this week: Russian front: 395 miles, which is 70 miles nearer since last week.

Italian front: 610 miles from Acona, 620 miles from Pisa, French front: 630 miles from Troarn near Caen, France.

Mayor Lausche has raised a sharp protest, because federal agencies sent 1,000 tons of coal to Wisconsin, intended for the Municipal Light Plant and the Municipal Water Plant of Cleveland. The Wisconsin Plant stated that they could not use inferior coal and Mayor Lausche declared that the two plants here cannot use inferior coal either.

Of the 98 registered distilleries, 91 will produce alcohol for liquor during the entire month of August. In addition, ten firms which make alcohol, promised to give 50 percent of 1 for liquor. (Na zdravje!)

Pope Pius and Archbishop Spellman of New York held a private conference Saturday from 4:45 p. m. until 8, working on a program to end the war as soon as possible. It is said that the Pope is better informed on the inside situation of Germany than anyone else and for that reason could be the "go-between" for the Allies and the Germans.

The OPA has \$3,000,000 ready to help elect Roosevelt for a fourth term, according to Sidney Hillman. The CIO campaign committee will meet August 5 in New York to make plans for the campaign.

Enjoying a hard-earned vacation at Leskovac's farm on Hubbard Rd., Madison, O., is Rev. Matt Jager of Barberton, Ohio.

Finance Director Joseph Sweeney has issued a financial report for the fiscal year ending in 1943, from which it is evident, that never in Cleveland's history, have the city's finances been as healthy as they are now, during Mayor Lausche's administration. The report shows that the city will have \$15,000,000 to spend for postwar improvements at the end of this year.

The War Department announces that the crew of a four-motor Douglas transport plane made a flight from London to Washington without stops. The distance is 3,800 miles and the flight was made in eleven hours.

The OPA will allow a higher price on cigarette tobacco raised this year, but for the present, the price of cigarettes will not be any higher.

Reports from Berlin state that in last Thursday's revolt in Germany, Hitler was bruised and burned in a bombing attack on his life. Three of his military staff were dangerously hurt, while others received lesser injuries.

There is a possibility that liquor will be taken off the ration list in Ohio in September, or at least the restrictions will be eased up somewhat, since the government will allow the alcohol made in August to be used for liquor.

Injured at work on Sunday, July 16, was Martin Pernush of 713 E. 155 St. He is recuperating at Glenville Hospital.

Summer Welles, former Assistant Secretary of State, predicts that the German General Staff will turn to communism in its most revolutionary form, after the fall of Germany.
