Ameriška slovanska federacija

Mr. Thomas L. Cotton, ki je imel službo pri znani new-yorkski agenciji "Foreign Language Information Service", je v glasilom slovanskih podpornih organizacij članek, v katerem propagira "Slovansko narodno federacijo".

Njegova sugestija je, da bi se Slovenci in vse slovenske narodnosti v Združenih državah Kanadi združile v federaciji s centralnim birojem — menda v Washingtonu — katera bi služila svojim organizacijam in vseh njihov skupnih interesov.

Cotton piše, da je v Ameriki 140 slovanskih centraliziranih podpornih organizacij, ki imajo preko milijon članov, sto milijonov dolarjev premoženja in milijardo dolarjev smrtninskih zavarovalnin v moči. To je ogromna zavarovalniška sila, ki jo je postavil v skupnosti, do zdaj nima nobene posamezne organizacije, kakršne so, ne šteje v primeri z nekaterimi oštejevalnimi ameriški bratskimi organizacijami, ki so glavna sila National Fraternal Congressu.

Da se mož, ki ni Slovan, potože za "slovansko federacijo", ni čudnega; podjeten Američan, kar je nedvomno, že ve, da se ne nanaša na viri dobrih spekulacij. Nihče ne sme biti tako naiven, da bi Cottona obtožili kakšnega gola — idealizma.

Kar se tiče naših organizacij, karlo povedano — dvomimo o učinkovitosti take federacije. To nam potrjuje petletno eksperimentiranje z Jugoslovansko bratsko federacijo. Pet let že "federaliziramo" (samo federaliziramo, ne—bognasvariti!—zdravimo) slovenske, hrvaške in srbske organizacije, pa še nismo nikoli nič konkretnega, dasi smo potrošili že precej tisočakov. In te organizacije so si vendar najbližje po narodnosti in jeziku! Če smo Jugoslovani tako "jedini", kaj se nam obeta, ko pridemo s Poljaki, Čehi, Slovaki in Ukrajinci?

Fakt je, da jugoslovanski ali slovenski idealizem pri takih federacijah je — prazna fraza. Niti katoliške niti ultra-narodne niti svobodnomiselne organizacije nimajo svojih federacij. Interesi, idealisti, ki so vsem podpornim organizacijam najbolj skupne, so — business. Gospodarski interesi! Vsaka organizacija je pa vedno teh interesov tako občutljiva — in po pravici v luči današnjih razmer — da ne da koncesij brez koncesij.

Najidealnejša federacija bi bila, če bi se povezale podporne organizacije enakih načel, predvsem one, ki izpovedujejo delavsko ideologijo. Vsaj iskrenosti bi ne manjkalo. A tudi pri teh mora biti praktična korist oziroma podlaga federacije. Ta korist bi se lahko našla v skupnem pravnem biroju, ki bi reševal legalne zadeve in reprezentiral organizacije v boju s sovražnimi načrti v zakonodajnih zbornicah.

Vse kaže, da prostovoljnega federativnega in še manj direktnega združenja podpornih organizacij v splošnem ne bo, dokler bodo obstale te ekonomske razmere v Ameriki, kakršne so danes. Ta združitev pride, ako pride, le na pritisk od zgoraj — od vlade, na primer, ko pride splošno socialno zavarovanje. Sistem tega zavarovanja bo morda tak, da bodo podporne organizacije le vladne agencije v notranjosti federalnega zavarovalnega trsta. Ampak vse to so daleč od gola ubijanja.

Anglija zmagala v letalski tekmi

Melbourne, Avstralija, 23. okt. — Letalska tekma od Londona do Melbournea je bila zaključena danes zjutraj, ko je angleško letalo Comet prvo dospelo semkaj in odneslo zmago. Pilota zmagovitelja letala, C. W. A. Scott in T. Campbell Black, sta deležna nagrade \$50,000. Preletela sta 11,300 milj v 70 urah. To je bila največja letalska tekma na svetu. Dvajset letal je prisostvovalo, toda eno je šlo na tla že v Franciji in večina drugih je ostala v Evropi, Mali Aziji in Indiji. Holandsko letalo je na drugem mestu in ameriško — piloti Roscoe Turner in Clyde Panghorn — na tretjem.

Portugalska vlada padla

Lisabona, 23. okt. — Portugalska vlada, kateri je načeloval Sazazar in ki je bila v sedlu od aprila 1933, je večeraj padla.

Italija razkačila Srbo; izgodi v Belgradu

Noče izročiti dr. Pavelića Francozom. — Nova jugoslovanska vlada ne kaže izprijembe

Belgrad, 23. okt. — Vseučiliščni dijaki v Belgradu so večeraj inscenirali demonstracije proti Italiji, toda policaji so jih brž razporedili. Demonstracije so prišle, ko se je raznesla vest, da Italija ne bo izročila dr. Pavelića in Egonu Kvaterniku Franciji. Dijaki so vpili: "Dol z Mussolinijem! Dajte nam Pavelića!" Nikola Uzunović je že sestavil novo vlado in regentni svet, jo je potrdil. Hrvatje in srbski demokratje so razočarani nad novo vlado. General Živković je spet vojni minister in v vlado sta prišla tudi dr. Milan Srškić in Marcinović. Le oni voditelji starega kova, ki prisegajo na Aleksandrovo ustavo in strog centralizem, so prišli v vlado.

Vlada je podaljšala dobo žalovanja za mrtvim kraljem na eno leto.

Turin, Italija, 23. okt. — Iz dobro informiranih krogov se poroča, da Italija ne bo izročila dr. Ante Pavelića, voditelja hrvaške teroristične organizacije in Egonu Kvaterniku Franciji, ki ju zahteva kot glavna osnovevalca marseškega atentata. Italijanska policija, ki je oba zadržala v Turinu, ju ni mogla spraviti v zvezo z atentatom. Dr. Pavelić je rekel, da še nikdar ni bil v Marselju, v Franciji je pa bil zadnjič leta 1927 kot zagrebški delegat na nekem kongresu.

Hitler v škripelih zaradi cerkvene revolte

Rebelni protestanti ne bodo več plačevali cerkvenega davka

Berlin, 23. okt. — Hitlerjev fašistični režim je danes v velikih stiskah zaradi odprte revolte v protestantski cerkvi v Nemčiji. Uporniki v tej cerkvi so dobro izkoristili pasivnost vlade v zadnjih tednih in nastopajo vsak dan odločneje. Vodstvo upornega dela cerkve — ki trdi, da ima za seboj 80 odstotkov protestantov v Nemčiji — je večeraj pozvalo svoje pristaje, naj ne plačujejo več cerkvenega davka državi. Doslej je vlada podpirala ta cerkveni davek od protestantov.

Zdaj so se začeli gibati tudi katoliki, ko vidijo, da Hitler še vedno omahuje pred protestantskimi uporniki. Katoliški župniki so začeli čitati v cerkvah prepovedane dokumente in kardinal Faulhaber v Monakovem je zagrozil z interdiktom, če vlada nastopi proti njemu.

PREDSEDNIKOVI SESTANKI Z LORIDI AMERIKE

V Belo hišo prihajajo dnevno na posvetovanje o usodi dežele. Njih težnje bo spreminil v zakone prihodnji kongres

Washington. — (FP) — Dolga desetletja bi vzelo predsednika Roosevelta, če bi hotel izkazati slično naklonjenost vsem "suverenim" državljanom in volilec kakor jo izkazuje zastopnikom velebiznisa, ki ga že dalj časa obiskujejo v Beli hiši (prej v Hyde Parku). Prihajajo k njemu po dva, po tri na dan, ne sicer na prijateljske obiske, marveč po "opravkih".

Dasi prihajajo in odhajajo brez posebne publicitete, so te konference velikega pomena za usodo dežele. Na teh sestankih se predsednik posvetuje s praviimi gospodarji dežele o reorganiziranju NRA in drugi zakonodaji, ki bo predložena prihodnjemu kongresu, katerega izvolijo "suvereni" državljanje 6. novembra.

V tem je mogoče nekaj grotesknega: o določanju usode "suverenih" milijonov, ki naj pri volitvah izvolijo svoje "suverene" zastopnike, katerih naloga bo v Washingtonu (in drugih zbornicah), da priključijo in sprejmejo, kar jim bo predloženo. To je le toliko groteskno kakor je grotesken ves kapitalizem s svojo namišljeno demokracijo vred.

Politični in kongresni aspiranti kapitalističnih strank lahko še bolj rohnijo v kampanji in obljubljaajo volilec magari nebesa, končno bo obveljalo le to, kar žele in na kar so pripravljeni pristati tisti, ki kontrolirajo industrije in trgovine in banke. Pod sistemom, v katerem so dominantna sila močnejši industrialni kralji, trgovski principi in bankirji, sploh ne more biti drugače. In ta mala skupina bo dominantna sila toliko časa, dokler ostanejo produktivna in distributivna sredstva privatna in ne splošna svojina.

S temi avdiencami skuša predsednik doseči dvoje: zagurati velebiznis, da se mu s strani administracije ni treba ničesar bati, na drugi strani pa skuša na zaupnih sestankih dogmati njih želje, ki bodo, kakor že prej rečeno, transformirane v zakonske osnutke.

V tej skemi so državne volitve povsem incidentne, le nekaka formalnost. Demokrati se počutijo kakor bi imeli volitve že v žepu. In tudi če bi zmagali torijski republikanci, bi končno ne bilo posebne razlike, namreč kar se zakonodaje in kapitalizma samega tiče. Glas, ki govori v Washingtonu (ali v državnih zbornicah), ni glas suverenih državljanov, ampak suverenih kapitalistov in gospodarjev dežele.

Publikacija je v prvi vrsti namenjena delavskim funkcionarjem, katere bo zalagala z važnimi informacijami.

Madrid, 23. okt. — V provinci Asturiji je večeraj eksplodiral voz dinamita in 32 vojakov je bilo ubitih. Dinamit je bil uplenjen rebelnim rudarjem.

Gladovna stavka 150 mož v predoru

Buenos Aires, Arg., 23. okt. — Stopeneset delavcev, ki kopljejo predor za mestni vodovod, si je večeraj omislilo gladovno stavko 46 čevljev pod zemljo v znak protesta, ko je bilo sto drugih delavcev odslovljenih. Naznanili so, da ne bodo jedli niti zapustili predora, dokler se odslovljeni delavci ne vrnejo na delo. Stavkarji pričakujejo, da se jim pridruži 900 drugih delavcev v predorih.

Grški minister odstopil vsled sramote

Atene, 23. okt. — Minister notranjih zadev Jannopoulos je večeraj podal ostavko, ker ni mogel prenesti sramote zaradi ne-sposobnosti državne policije. Pred trinajstimi meseci je bil izvršen napad na bivšega ministrskega predsednika Venizelosa. Atentator Karathanasis je ranil njegovo ženo v avtu, ubil soferja, toda Venizelosu krogla ni zadela. Policija je ves ta čas iskala napadalca, a zaman. Tedaj je Venizelos sam s svojimi privatnimi stražniki šel na delo, prijel atentatorja in večeraj ga je izročil žandarmeriji. To je ministra tako poparilo, da je pustil službo. In šef žandarmerije najbrž pojde za njim.

Brezposelnost je spol za čela naraščala
V septembru je bila uposlenost skoraj 5% manjša ko v avgustu, mezdna izplačila so pa padla 6.8%. Vloga tektilne stavke

Washington. — (FP) — Na podlagi izkušenj v povojnih letih so gospodarski proučevalci pred meseci napovedovali večje ali manjše izboljšanje na jesen. Vsi pa so se zopet zmotili.

V septembru, ki navadno izkazuje pozitivno v industrijah in trgovini, ni bilo letos nobenega izboljšanja, ampak večje poslabšanje. V primeru z avgustom je uposlenost padla za 4.7%, izplačane mezde pa 6.8%, kar je dovolj slaba slika.

Delavska tajnica Frances Perkins pravi, če bi ne bilo velike tektilne stavke, bi slika dokaj drugače izgledala. Da je ta stavka v glavnem odgovorna za tako velik padec v uposlenosti in mezdah izplačanih, ni nobene dvoma, vendar je pa delavska tajnica na zadnji konferenci z novinarji priznala, da bi september tudi brez te stavke ne izkazoval prebitka, ampak splošno gospodarsko nazadovanje. Brez stavke bi bilo to le nekoliko manjše.

Glavni bolnik so namreč težke industrije, ki niso bile prizadete po nobeni stavki. V septembru se je delo v teh industrijah znižalo za 2.9%, mezdna izplačila pa celo za 8.8%.

Indeksi o uposlenosti v tovarnah je bil v letošnjem septembru 5.2% nižji od lanskega, mezdna izplačila pa dva odstotka manjša. Največje nazadovanje je bilo v jeklarski, avtni in čevljarški industriji. Od nemanufakturnih industrij jih je sedem nekoliko napredovalo, enajst pa nazadovalo. Največje izboljšanje izkazuje antracitna industrija in trgovina na drobno.

NRA poplavljen s pritožbami proti "čizlerjem"
Nad 17,000 delavskih pritožb čaka rešitve, z delom gre pa jako počasi

Washington. — (FP) — Divizija NRA za izvajanje pravilnikov je poplavljen s pritožbami proti "čizlerjem" z obeh strani. Na listi ima 17,668 delavskih pritožb, tikajočih se kršitve določb o minimalni plači in delovniku. S strani podjetnikov, oziroma državnih organov za izvajanje "novega deala", ima 3153 pritožb proti "nepošteni" konkurenci.

Z reševanjem delavskih pritožb gre izredno počasi, veliko počasneje kakor pa s pritožbami proti "nepošteni" konkurenci. Slednje je menda lažje izravnati, ker prvič niso tako številne, čeprav je "poštena" konkurenca kontradikcija sama na sebi, in drugič je mašinerija bolj organizirana za reševanje takih pritožb kakor pa za reševanje delavskih.

Delavska federacija izbrala šest "sovražnikov"
Washington. — William Green, predsednik Ameriške delavske federacije, je izluščil šest zveznih senatorjev, katere naj delavstvo "kaznuje" s tem, da jih pošlje v zaslužni pokoj. Prizade je Green proglasil za "sovražnike" in se na unije prizadetih držav obrnil z navodilom, naj skrbijo, da po volitvah ne pridejo več v Washington.

Ti senatorji so: Herbert iz Rhode Islanda, Fess iz Ohia, Reed iz Pennsylvanije, Hatfield iz West Virginije, Welcott iz Connecticuta in republikanski aspirant za zveznega senatorja George M. Bourquin iz Montane. Vsi ti senatorji so glasovali proti 30-urniku, za znižanje plač zveznim uslužbencem in za potrditev "yellow dog" sodnika Johna J. Parkerja za člana vrhovnega sodišča. Green menda izda še več takih list.

75 odstotkov vandrovcv si želi dela
Washington. — Med dvema do štirimi milijoni brezdomcev, ki se potepajo po deželi iz kraja v kraj, je okrog 75% takih, ki vandroja za delom in ne iz potepuškega nagona, pravi H. B. Myers, direktor raziskovalnega oddelka reliefne administracije.

"Naša preiskava pokazuje, da si velika večina vandrovcv ne želi ceste, ampak bi raje delali v industrijah," pravi Myers. Med ostalimi 25% je tudi dosti takih, katere so na pot pognale družinske in zdravstvene razmere. Le majhen odstotek mladih ljudi roma po deželi radi vandrovskega nagona.

Ameriški katoliški vodje zahtevajo prelom z Mehiko
Washington, D. C. — Voditelji katoliške cerkve v Združenih državah so zadnje dni pritiskali na predsednika Roosevelta, naj odpokliče ameriškega poslanca iz Mehike zaradi novega konflikta med mehiško vlado in cerkvijo.

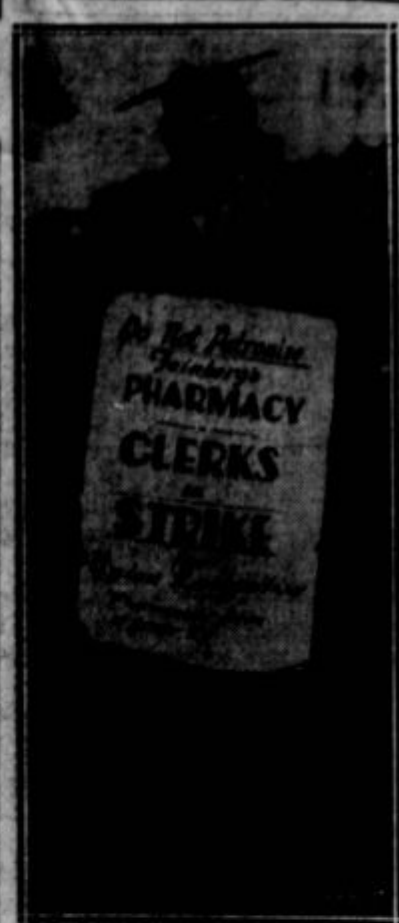

RUMENA MRZLICA PRE-MAGANA

Strašni morilki v tropskih deželah je odzvonilo

Ravnatelj Pasteurjevega zavoda v Tunisu dr. Nicolle je sporočil, da je odkril cepivo proti rumeni mrzlici. V francoski vzhodni Afriki so s tem cepivom v teku trih mesecev cepili preko 3000 ljudi in po uspehih tega cepjenja je generalni guverner proglasil to cepjenje za obvezno. Učinek cepiva traja vse življenje.

Nicollu odkritje je eno največjih v zgodovini medicinske vede. Desetletja je skušala moderna medicina odkriti vzroke in lek za strašno morilko tropskih krajev, rumeno mrzlico, ki zahteva še danes vsako leto tisoče in tisoče človeških življenj. More Chiselers

The cost of living has gone up steadily during the past six months. The necessities life cost more today than a week ago. Ten weeks hence they will be higher.

Yes the grocery manufacturing industry was unabashed a few days ago when it admitted a code to the NRA which provided a 56-hour week with wages as low as \$12 a week.

Here is concrete evidence of how one of most thoroughly organized industries in nation regards its obligation to assist in national recovery. The grocery manufacturing industry is organized in so far as the manufacturers are concerned; its Labor is the organized of all trades and crafts. It is an important division of the National Manufacturing association which recently advised its membership to disregard section 7-A of the National Industrial Recovery Act.

That over 10,000,000 willing workers out of employment through no fault of their own means nothing to the grocery manufacturing industry. That millions are on charity relief means nothing. That food prices are of constant increase while purchasing power gradually decreasing means nothing.

Whether its proposed code will meet the dign approval of General Johnson and President Roosevelt remains to be seen. General Johnson still has authority to approve industrial codes, and he may be depended upon to do all he can for his own kind before he retires as chief braggard of the NRA. But if President Roosevelt lends his approval to further destroying American standards of living, accepting this code he will be called to a full accounting in the Presidential election of 1936.

Spain Teaches a Lesson

Contradictory reports in the daily press lead no doubt that the revolt of the Spanish workers is far from at an end. Sympathetic reporters tell us why the spirit of the rebels has not been broken: They are fighting AGAINST the development of a rising Fascist movement which the landed aristocracy of that nation is attempting to fasten upon the nation as a means of preserving the profit system there.

To us the situation is both encouraging and gloomy. It is encouraging to know that the bodies of workers can be united AGAINST evil. But it is not so good to note the reluctance of the masses to act together FOR definite policy which will react to their advantage.

As Socialists we have been urging the workers to be positive in their actions. Socialists are urging people to do the thing which will make an armed and bloody revolution unnecessary. They are sounding the warning that unless the workers use their talents and and in an intelligent manner, they are likely to lose their power to act. And, with Capitalism crumbling and masters organizing, now was it so necessary for Socialists to give the message to the masses.

Public Ownership on the March

Public ownership of power plants continues to gain in popular favor. Voters of Los Angeles recently approved charter amendments which make it possible for the city to take over the properties of the Los Angeles Gas and Electric Corporation without the formality of a bond issue.

At the same time they emphatically reject proposals to extend the franchises of privately owned light plants.

Seattle, with one of the finest municipal power plants in the world, is considering a suggestion to purchase the entire system of the Puget Sound Power & Light Company at a cost of approximately \$95,000,000. The "book value" of the concern is about \$129,000,000.

By making this acquisition Seattle will not only eliminate more than \$30,000,000 of "water" on which consumers have been paying dividends, but will make it possible for the city plant to take over the vast territory now served by the private company.

Progress of Labor

He told of how in the olden days the workers' children were getting no education, that only those of wealthy parents who were able to afford a tutor got any education; the workers organized and demanded schools for their children, and in that way came the public schools. He mentioned different industries throughout the nation, of how they treated the workers and that only by unionism can the worker of to-day demand higher wages.

He mentioned the 1,200 miners who remained in the black depths of the mine in order to receive higher wages. Not too soon did the men bring to a close their self-imposed imprisonment. The semi-conscious men were suffering from gas poisoning and exposure after 116 hours in the pits. Even the most robust were haggard, but joyful, for they had come back victorious in their suicide strike. All their demands were not met, but the strikers got their main objectives: They will be given Fall and Winter raises, more days of work, and the company agreed not to discriminate against them. Shortly before the mine owners capitulated, the 1,200 self-prisoners sent up a final ultimatum, which ended with the words: "Rather than suffer the slow pangs of death by starvation we will commit suicide by smothering ourselves."

That goes to show that as an individual you cannot accomplish much, but as a body of workers demanding to receive a portion of the fruit of your labor you can win in the end. Mr. Thurber also mentioned the need of labor classes for in that way the younger generation of today can learn to understand the need of labor unions and workers' organizations.

A class has been organized to meet in the Socialist Club Room under the tutelage of Mr. Louis Pickett. We hope to see members of the Comrade lodge who are interested in economics and what is happening around us today to join this class and during the open discussion give your opinion. The class meets every Wednesday at 8:00. We enjoyed the talk Mr. Thurber gave and hope we have more such interesting speakers at our meetings.

You will probably recall that the Editor aptly entitled it, "A Discourse with Indifferent Members."

I know for a fact that it did some good, attendance since then has swelled to almost double the previous meetings. Indifference is one of the most favorite attitudes that some members take upon themselves to display. They seem to back in its entirety. They absorb a certain amount of pleasure by this practice. Indifference is likely to cause serious internal agitation. There is really no excuse for this unnecessary absence from lodge meetings. As long as things progress and travel the usual road they are satisfied to let a few do their work. But let these few stray from the usual rut and they are up and at them. After all the more active minds are not content in following in the same footsteps year in and year out. They are the ambitious ones who are always striving to broaden and increase the membership of the SNPJ. Theirs is not the desire to travel on foot all the time, they like to ride on to a bigger and better organization as their active minds dictate. This can not be done unless every one puts his shoulder to the plow and does his share of work. In this particular instance the work is to attend meetings regularly.

I personally believe that the non-attending members are in the minority. There is no doubt that the majority can swing this minority to the right path. Is this minority to be the evidence to prove that our local officers do not co-operate? Rather to the contrary.—There is not one officer who does not at some time or other comment at length at the decreasing attendance at meetings. It is grueling to note the scant interest accorded this our organization which is striving to keep us, Slovenians, in contact with one another.

This non-attendance most certainly must have reached the danger point, when Lodges seek to make rules and regulations for this one particular group—non-attenders. This group must be made to understand the seriousness of attending meetings. But how? Fines in terms of dollars and cents? It hardly seems advisable that we go to such drastic measures to bring them to heel. Perhaps a suspension for one month for every three successive absences from meetings would be the proper way for us to cope with these members. It seems that kind words make no impression. Pleading and reasoning have also gone for naught. Talks, discourses and columns of advice have also chalked up a zero. There must be a way somewhere, something to cure or even check this non-attendance. Perhaps sometime, someone more intellectually inclined than the writer will conceive and achieve a practical solution. It must be mild, yet stern enough to make these laggards come to their senses. Let's present a united front to them, maybe when they realize we mean business they may come clean.

What Chance Have the Young?

What chance has the young people of today. We are not pessimists but optimists, but when optimists bump up against a stone wall, common sense tells them that there is something in the way. We all know that millions of young people all over America find no jobs, no employment, no opportunity for them to make a living. Who shut the door of opportunity in the face of humanity, old and young? There is a challenge in this young man's letter that will not down. The older ones are more conservative, more used to hardship, better disciplined. But the younger men and women are asking what it is all about. Who is responsible for this condition of things? The young people, like this man, who voices the protest of millions, are going to make our politicians and our statesmen stutter in trying to answer these living, pointed, vital questions which are fired at them by the young who have been beat out of a chance. Youth must be served and youth will not be denied. To this young man, who has felt the pinch of hunger and distress, the irony of the Wallace program of destruction of human food is like putting cayenne pepper into a raw wound. These days they are all asking the question of the immortal poet, Bobbie Burns:

If I'm designed your lordling's slave
By nature's law designed,
Why was an independent wish
Ere planted in my mind?
If not, why am I subject to
His cruelty and scorn?
Or, why has man the will and power
To make his fellows mourn?

Somebody has got to answer these questions some day, and we believe that the day is not far off. Those who sat idly by while the riches of the earth were garnered into the hands of the few will be called to account. One per cent of the people hold 60 per cent of the country's wealth. Why? Unless the political parties of the future can answer with practical legislation this young man's questions, they will be as chaff before a strong wind. "America is an other name for opportunity," said Emerson not so long ago. With 10 million idle and 3,000 farms foreclosed daily for several years past, what a cruel joke that statement is now!

The way the money trust has bribed our leading public men by selling them securities below the market value is a matter of public record. The manner in which the international bankers have gipped the confiding investors of the nation out of untold billions of good, honest money by trading them worthless securities is also a matter of public record. This story is told in the news columns of conservative papers. It makes Dillinger by comparison look like a bad boy robbing the contribution box in a Sunday school. How will the masters and rulers of things, answer this young man's questions as to why he and millions like him are denied the right to live and to labor? Why has opportunity flown from the land which was once its second name? Here is the young man's story:

To the People of America:

Should I continue my struggle for existence, or should I quit? That is my problem. That is the question thousands of young men are trying to answer for themselves today.

You Americans, who read this, cannot fully realize and appreciate the seriousness of the predicament in which we find ourselves at the present time.

We, the uneducated, we, the inexperienced, we, the tramps of America and your sons, no longer know how to face life. Our confidence in ourselves and in you, the builders of civilization, is lost. Is it wise to continue or should we quit? That is my foremost thought as I write this letter to you. That is the question you, my friend, must decide for me.

To give you a mental picture of our position and of our state of mind I shall write a brief history of my life. There are thousands of men whose position is similar to mine, or perhaps worse. I know my own story better than I do anyone else's and I shall give it only as an example.

I was born on a farm 24 years ago. In the early years of my life I was taught to believe in God and to be honest above all things. Since that time I have tried to be honest in all my work.

When I was 16 years old I graduated from a small country school. At that time I decided to attend high school. The desire to attend high school was against my father's wishes and naturally I had to earn my own expenses. It was very hard

to work without the confidence and interest of my father, but I always liked to work and study and I felt that some day I would be rewarded for my work with success. In 1931 I finished my high school career as an honor student. At that time I did and I still want to continue my education. In 1931 I felt confident that I could earn my way through college. My ambition was to become a structural engineer. Being serious-minded, I made a goal for myself to work for. That goal was a reasonably successful career as an engineer and a happy home. Because I am a human being, I am not immune to the desire for companionship that every person feels. To reach the goal I had pictured in my mind, it was necessary to attend an engineering school.

With utmost confidence and hopefulness I began my search for the job that would afford me an education. In the fall of 1931 I received employment at 10 cents an hour, but the job was of short duration. The following year I had a job for two weeks at six and two-thirds (6 2-3) cents an hour. It was now over a year since I left high school and I had made no progress. I was not discouraged, however, because Franklin Delano Roosevelt promised a new deal. Assured that Roosevelt's election would check the depression, I voted for him. When the NRA came I went to one of the larger cities of the United States in search of work. Through a friend I received employment at a place of business that had signed the NRA code. I was paid at the rate of six and one-third (6 1-3) cents an hour. After complaining to the state industrial commission I was discharged by my employer. Since then I have had no work.

For the period from June 1 in 1931 to the present time my total cash income has been \$32, an average of 87 cents per month or two and nine-tenths cents a day.

My friend, could you buy all the clothes and personal necessities you needed for 86 cents a month and have money to spare for medical attention? Neither could I. The result is that today my teeth and eyes are in very poor condition. I have a few clothes, one or two friends, and no chance to gain employment.

You might wonder why I and the thousands of men, who are in the same position I am, feel that we have no chance. Perhaps you are inclined to believe that we, who have accomplished nothing, are unambitious, lazy, or even cowards.

Not long ago I read several stories in a daily paper under the title Think You're Handicapped. Perhaps you sympathize with the general thought in these stories. To us it is a sarcastic inference that we do not try to get ahead.

Recently I also read an account of the rise of Walter P. Chrysler from a poor young man to one of the greatest and most powerful leaders of modern industry. I respect Mr. Chrysler for what he is and admire him for the courage he has shown in climbing the ladder of success. He was handicapped, but he had a chance. However—this is 1934.

Let us suppose that you or anyone of the leaders of industry were young men today. Men from 20 to 30 years of age. Men without money, without practical experience, but with a great deal of confidence and courage. Suppose you went to apply for a job and the employer asked you, "Are you experienced?" You would say "No," would you not? That ends interview number one. Then you decide to try for a job that does not require experience, like shoveling sand. You ask for the job but the employer does not know you. His questions are: "Are you a local man?" "Are you married?" "My friend, you will not get a job. Now you decide to fight from a different angle. You go to the superintendent of a factory that specializes in the line of business you desire to learn. You say to this superintendent, "Mr. Jones, I want to become a mechanical engineer. I am a high school graduate, but I have no money to continue my education. Could you give me a job as an apprentice?" Mr. Jones' answer is, "I'm sorry, Mr. Smith, but we cannot afford to take on a new man now. Maybe a little later, but I can't promise anything."

That is your cue to get out of the office. Suppose this fruitless search for a job had gone on for several years. Long enough for you to learn the true meaning of the word "No." Suppose that in the meantime your clothes were getting ragged, your health began to fail because of a lack of proper food, and your teeth were rotting out of your mouth. Suppose finally, that you had lost all your friends because they do not want to be seen with a tramp.

Would you, my friend, still have the courage and confidence you once had? Would you know how to face life? Would you still be optimistic? I have tried. Maybe in the wrong way, but I have tried to get ahead. I have experienced the heartache of being a social outcast. I have seen the hell in which a tramp—once an American boy, lives. I shall give you a picture of that a little later. In order to exist I have tried in every conceivable manner to get a job in stores, factories, road, CWA, and CCC. But there is one thing I have not tried. That is crime. It might become inevitable, for the thousands of men, who are in the same position

I am, to resort to crime for theistence. Or should we find a ble bridge and jump off?

It must be remembered that hopelessly handicapped men want to become criminals. They been shown by their past a reasonable livelihood through n that the prohibition amendment augured, these men remained est and endured extreme mental physical pain. It was only c that enabled them to remain h. How much longer will it last?
