Društvo "Sv. Janeza Krstnika," št. 37, v Clevelandu, Ohio, je na svoji redni seji dne 17. julija 1938 odobrilo sledeči

INICIATIVNI PREDLOG:

Sedanje besedilo točke 504 jednotinih pravil, ki se glasi: "Nobenemu društvenemu odborniku ali članu ni dovoljeno sprejeti denarja za asesmente od članov, ki so bili suspendirani več kot 30 dni, ako se sumi, da je suspendiran član v dobi suspendacije zbolel ali je bil telesno poškodovan," naj se črta in nadomesti s sledičim besedilom: "Točka 504. Nobenemu društvenemu odborniku ali posameznemu članu ni dovoljeno sprejeti denarja za asesmente od članov, ki so bili suspendirani več kot 30 dni, izvzemši društvenega tajnika."

Sedanje besedilo točke 505 jednotinih pravil, ki se glasi: "Član, ki je bil suspendiran nad 30 dni in do 90 dni, je lahko ponovno sprejet v Jednoto, če plača vse zaostale asesmente in asesment za tekoči mesec, toda podpisati mora izjavilo, da v dobi suspendacije ni dobil nobenih bolezni ali poškodb," naj se črta in nadomesti s sledičim besedilom: "Točka 505. Član, ki je bil suspendiran nad 30 dni in do 90 dni, je lahko ponovno sprejet v Jednoto, če plača vse zaostale asesmente in asesment za tekoči mesec."

Točka 506, ki se glasi: "Član, ki je v dobi njegove suspendacije zbolel, se ne more ponovno uvrstiti med dobrostoječe člane, dokler ni od bolezni popolnoma okrevl," naj se črta v celoti.

RAZLOG:

Ker v teh kritičnih časih se lahko pripeti, da bo zbolel ali telesno poškodovan 30 letni član Jednote in obenem bo suspendiran v mesecu, ko je zbolel ali bil poškodovan in ni upravičen do nobene podpore za bolezen ali poškodbo, kar se je pripetilo v mesecu suspendacije, in akoravno v dobi 30 letnega članstva ni prejel še nobene bolniške podpore. Društvo stavi gori navedene spremembne pravile edinole za blagor Jednote in dobrobit članstva v obči.

PREDSEDNIKOV GOVOR

Na Delavski dan je imel predsednik Roosevelt v državi Maryland govor, v katerem je med drugim poudaril, da je njegova želja obdržati demokratsko stranko progresivno, ker zaupanje ljudstva si bo obdržala le toliko časa, dokler bo progresivna.

Za izboljšanje splošnih razmer v deželi je potreba, da so delujejo vse skupine. Izkoriscanje delavcev pa ne bo prineslo izboljšanja razmer. Interesi delavcev in farmerjev so identični, kajti če industrialni delavci niso zaposleni ali ne prejemajo primernih plač, enostavno ne morejo kupovati farmerskih pridelkov.

SVETOVNA RAZSTAVA

Svetovna razstava v San Franciscu bo otvorjena 18. februarja 1939. Dosedaj so prijavile svojo udeležbo vse južnoameriške republike iz izjemo Colombije; vse srednjameriške republike iz izjemo Paname; vse pacifične države iz izjemo Rusije, Kitajske in Britiske Malezije. Razstava se bo vršila na "otoku zakladov," ki je bil ujetno zgrajen v zalivu San Francisco. Po zaključeni razstavi bo "otok zakladov" izpremenjen v municipalno letališče.

EVROPSKE ZMEDE

Civilna vojna na Španskem še vedno vrši svoj krvari posel, klub temu pa se zdi, da splošni položaj na bojišču zadnje čase ni bil doči izpremenjen. Rebeli so pričeli z novimi ofenzivami na nekaterih točkah in so, glasom poročili, tudi dosegli nekaj uspehov, toda novojeva poročila javljajo, da so lojalisti ustavili napredovanje rebelov in jih na nekaterih krajin celo vrgli nazaj. Kake važne odločitve na eno ali drugo stran po sedanjem situaciji ni z pričakovati v doglednem času.

Zadnjič sem bil v Barbertonu na banketu, ki je bil prirejen v proslavo 35-letnice tamkajšnega društva št. 44 JSKJ. Pa sem, po nevem kakšni zaslugi, zabredel v skupino, ki je bila odlikovana z redom žarnih vrtnic. To se pravi, lepa dekljica je vsakemu in vsaki v dotednici skupini prispela lepo svežo vrtinico. Jažim rad cvetlice in posebej še vrtnice torej sem bil s tem delom programu izredno zadovoljen. Ko so bile tudi druge točke pestreg programa izčrpane, smo tisti, ki smo se počutili nekako izčrpali, odšli k bari.

To tu je bilo vse dobro in tudi pri bari ni bilo slabo, dokler me niso neki nagajevci vzeli na piko. Eden me je vprašal, če verujem, da imajo nekateri ljudje srca na desni strani v psih. Jaz sem odgovoril, da bo najbrž res, ker učeni dohtari tako pišejo. Pa se drug nasmeje: "I bet, da ima on sam srce na desni, ker mu je dekljica, kateri je bila povrjenja cvetlične vloga, pripela vrtinico na desno, mesto na levo kot drugim!" Tretji pa je nagajivo primornil, da će je srce prej bilo na običajnem mestu, je muškalna desno stran, ko je začutilo vrtinico in posebljeno vesno na desni.

Men je bilo nekoliko nerodno, pa sem nagajevce posvaril, da pri bari se sicer lahko rešuje narod, ne spodobi pa se reševati srčnih zadov. In še sem jem rekel, da naj ne imenujejo po nepridnem lepih deklet. Besedna vojna pa je bila mahoma končana in premirje je bilo podpisano, ko je od drugega konca bare zdonelo povelje: Daj vsem pit!

Nekateri ameriški korespondenti v Evropi menijo, da škuša angleška vlada z zavlačevanjem doseči dvoje: V prvih vrstih prideobi Anglija na času, da se more boljše pripraviti na vojno; drugič pa upa, da će se izbruh v vojne za nekaj časa odloži, morda sploh ne bo prišlo do vojne, ker bi se mogla gospodarska struktura Nemčije preposede.

Kot stvari zdaj stope, je

Francija brez pogojno pripravljena pomagati Češkoslovaški, če bi bila ista napadena od Nemčije. In ako bo Francija držala svojo obljubo zaveznista, jo bo držala tudi Rusija in bo prišla Češkoslovaški na pomoč. Ako se še Anglia jasno izraziti, da bo stala za Francijo, če se slednja zaplete v vojno z Nemčijo, je verjetno, da bo Hitler odnehal in da do vojne ne bo prišlo, vsaj ne zdaj.

Vsem evropskim državnikom pa je znano, da je vojna neizogibna, ako ostane Hitler še za dogleden čas na krmilu Nemčije, brez ozira kakšne koncesije da Češkoslovaška sudetskim Nemcem. Tudi če bi češkoslovaška vlada nemške sudetske kraje naravnost odstopila Nemčiji, ne bo nevarnost vojne odstranjena. Hitler hoče vso Češkoslovaško, Madžarsko in Rumunsko in končno rusko Ukraino. On hoče dobiti v oblasti visoko razvito češko industrijo, rumunske oljne vrelce in bogate žitnice Ukraine. Tako razširjenja Nemčija bi postala odločilni faktor v srednji Evropi, kar bi bilo zelo nevarno za Francijo in Anglijo, da tudi za Poljsko, Rusijo in Italijo. Jugoslavija bi potem v doglednem času postale plen Nemčije.

Zdi se, da v dani situaciji more evropsko vojno preprečiti le odločen nastop Anglije, Francije in Rusije. Ako bo Hitler prepričan, da mu invazija Češkoslovaške napokipijo gotovo vojno s Francijo, Anglijo in Rusijo, se bo morda premisil in čakal. Tek časa pa morda izpremeni situacijo v Nemčiji sami in to bi znalo odvrniti vojno.

PRIPRAVE ZA POMLAD

Važno je, da se čebulic ne saditi prelitvo niti pregloboko. Prelitvo posajene čebulice lahko dež spravi na površje, preglboko posajene pa vzame preveč časa, da pririjejo s eventjem na površje, in zaradi tega bolj pozno cveto. V splošnem velja pravilo, da naj se čebulice posade tako globoko kot znaša trikratna ali štirikratna debelost istih. Drobne čebulice se morajo vsled tega saditi bolj plitvo, debelejše pa bolj globoko. Ako je čebulica, recimo, en palec debela v premeru, se jo posadi tri ali štiri palec globoko, debelejše primeroma bolj globoko, drobnejše pa v istem razmerju bolj plitvo.

Nekateri domači vrtnarji uređijo svojo gredo za zgodnjem pomladnem cvetje tako, da imajo vso procesijo pomladnega cvetja na isti gredi. V to svrhu odstranijo šest ali sedem palcev vrhnje prsti z grede, spodaj ostalo prsto pa prerahljajo. Na to prerahljano zemljo postavijo v primernih razdaljah čebulice dafodilov in tulipanov, ki so najdebelejše. Prostor čebulic je dobro označiti s tankimi palčicami, nākar se nasuje nanje nekaj palcev prsti. Na to se posadi drobnejše čebulice, kot so scilla, snowdrops in crocus. Palčice kažejo prostor spodaj posajenih čebulic, da niso drobnejše posajene vrhu istih. Ko so vse čebulice posajene, naj se palčice odstrani. Kjer je nevarnost, da bi miši prišle do čebulic, naj se okoli njih natrosi neke kemikalije, ki se imenuje "naphthalene," ki se dobija v lekarnah. Duh te kemikalije je mišim zoprn. Ko je končano, naj se greda do vrha zemljo zasuje. Pri tem je treba vedno upoštevati, da posajene čebulice ne smijo priti niti preglobko niti prelitvo. Posajena greda je nadavno nekoliko višja od ostale okolice, toda zemlja se tekmo žime kolikor toliko posede.

S tem je delo opravljeno in ni treba drugega kot čakati, da se zmeni v občutno zavlačevanje. Uredništvo Nove Dobe, želi, da vse vrednosti vrednost, ki je bila v časih konvenciji bratske S. D. Zvezde, je bila mišljena v plodonosno zborovanje. Posluje samo v državi Ohio, njen sedež je v Clevelandu. Konvencija sestoji iz 17 glavnih odbornikov, izvoljen Krist Stokel.

Initiative Motion

LODGE "SV. JANEZA KRSTNIKA", No. 37,
CLEVELAND, OHIO

Lodge "Sv. Janeza Krstnika", No. 37, of Cleveland, Ohio, at regular meeting held July 17, 1938, adopted the following:

INITIATIVE MOTION

The present wording of section 504 of the Union's by-laws, which reads: "No officer of the lodge or individual member shall except assessments from a member who had been suspended more than thirty days, if it is suspected that such suspended member, during his suspension, became ill or physically injured", should be crossed out and in its place the following wording inserted: Section 504. No officer of the lodge or individual member shall except assessments from a member who had been suspended more than thirty days, except the secretary of the lodge."

The present wording of section 505 of the Union's by-laws, which reads: "Any member suspended more than thirty days and to ninety days may be reinstated by the Union upon payment of delinquent assessments and upon signing a certificate that during suspension he has not become ill or injured", should be crossed out and in its place the following wording inserted: Section 505. Any member suspended more than thirty days and to ninety days may be reinstated by the Union upon payment of delinquent assessments and that of the current month."

Section 506, which reads: "A member who during his suspension is taken ill cannot be reinstated until he has completely recovered from his illness", should be crossed out entirely.

EXPLANATION:

In these critical times it is possible for a member of 30 years' standing to become ill or suffer bodily injury and at the same time be suspended in the month when he becomes ill or suffers bodily injury. As such he is entitled to no benefits for the illness if incurred during the month of suspension, although during his thirty years of membership he has not received any benefits. The lodge proposes the foregoing mentioned changes both for the good of the Union and for the benefit of membership in general.

SUPREME SECRETARY'S EXPLANATION

The supreme board does not support the foregoing initiative motion, although it has been approved for publication in the right of section 65 of the Union's by-laws. Discussions on the motion shall begin September 14, 1938 and terminate on November 14, 1938.

Lodges, who shall support this motion, should report their decisions to the home office not later than November, 21, 1938. Reports submitted later shall not be considered and neither will reports published in the Nova Doba be considered unless they are forwarded to the home office. Each report must be signed by the lodge president and lodge secretary, and bear the lodge seal. Lodges, who do not support the motion, need not report their results to the home office, but they have the right to make known their decision by means of the Nova Doba. If the motion shall be seconded by one third of the lodges who number in the adult members at least one third of the entire membership in the adult department, then the motion shall be submitted to the membership by referendum.

COMMENT OF SUPREME SECRETARY

The supreme board sees no need for the proposed changes in by-laws. No member as yet has been effected by the sections which Lodge No. 37 wishes to amend or eliminate. These sections have been a great help to our lodge secretaries who now already are burdened with collection of assessments. Correct these sections as proposed by Lodge No. 37 and there shall be ten times as many suspensions as there have been until the present. The member instead of paying assessments each month shall pay his assessments once every three months. Lodge secretaries shall take many a trip in vain, and once they shall tire of it, resignations will be pouring into the lodges. Federal, State and Municipal would be ineffective without penalties for violations. The holds good for the by-laws of the fraternal benefit organizations. A member who fails to pay his assessment to the designated authority is guilty of a violation, and the penalty for this violation is severe and felt more if the member becomes ill during suspension, for under such circumstances he is entitled to no benefits. The average member is not afraid of suspensions, but he is afraid of becoming ill during the period of suspension, and therefore all of us are concerned over the payment of assessments on time. Take away these requirements from the by-laws and there shall be chaos. I have written this with a sincere and undiscriminating intent, and let no one feel offended. The membership is privileged to read my opinion and those of the other supreme officers, who have expressed them with me against the foregoing motion.

Can Cleveland Continue To Have Good Schools?

Editor's note: The following article is one of a series submitted by American Federation of Teachers local 279, with Theresa Dudas, Chairman, Foreign Language Newspaper Committee.

What makes good schools? Adequate equipment, intelligent supervision, clean, comfortable rooms, and last and most important, ambitious and well-trained teachers.

Does Cleveland have good schools? How do the schools of this country compare with those of other cities of comparable size in the country, and with those of near-by wealthier suburbs?

A series of articles in the future numbers of this paper will answer these questions. For just a preview, let us present briefly the following facts:

The amount of tax money used for education in Cleveland has steadily reduced, while at the same time the amount of money used in carrying on the county and city government has steadily increased at the expense of the schools.

There are more pupils in each class in Cleveland schools than in other cities, excepting only a few.

As a result, no teacher is able to give to the individual pupil the time he needs for the satisfactory completion of his work.

The benefits that the pupil can derive in his class room depend largely on the amount of time that the teacher can give the pupil. There are few places in the United States where educational conditions are worse than in Cleveland in this respect.

Not only has economy been carried on whereby the number of pupils per teacher had been greatly increased, but the budget for equipment has been so drastically reduced that the teacher is set in the class room with practically no tools with which to do the job.

Cleveland schools offer business courses, but to train typists and stenographers properly, there must be adequate equipment.

Supplies are no longer adequate to meet needs. The millions taken from the annual budget are responsible for this and for other shortcomings.

The schools are operating today on a budget that is \$4,000,000 less than was allowed for the operating of the schools in 1930.

The economies that have been effected represent a lowering of educational opportunities offered to the Cleveland Public School student.

You can't continue to get something for nothing. You can't get a 1930 kind of education today on a 1937 budget. If you pay \$4,000,000 less for education, you get \$4,000,000 less education.
