Ker se pomanjkanje premoga vedno bolj čuti, bo v pondeljek zaprtih kakih 300 šol v Clevelandu in okolici. Istočasno je vladni urad za vojno produkcijo ukazal, da se zapre dotok naravnega plina v državi Ohio in šestih drugih državah vsem glediščem, gostilnam, nočnim klubom in drugim zabaviščem. Odredba naj bo v veljavi, pravi vladni, od šestih zvečer v petek do šestih zvečer v pondeljek.

Te prostore so poklicali, da naj sami zaprejo plin, predno bodo o tem obveščeni od plinarne. Vladni urad je istočasno apeliral na šole, hišne gospodarje in druge odjemalce naravnega plina, naj kolikor mogoče varčujejo z njim.

Poleg države Ohio so s tem ukazom prizadete še države: New York, Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Kentucky, Maryland ter Virginia.

BOJ ZA BERLIN — Naciji poročajo, da so ruske patrulje prešle reko Odru 38 milj vzhodno od Berlina. Rusi pa poročajo, da so prebili nemško linijo Kustrin-Frankfurt 51 milj od Berlina in 36 milj od Stettina, ki je pristanišče za Berlin na Baltiku.

ZAPADNA FRONTA — Prva ameriška armada je napredovala tri milje skozi pas Siegfrieda črte; tudi tretja armada poroča o uspehih; na južnem delu zapadne fronte Nemci močno odjenjujejo.

FILIPINI — Ameriška armada drvi zdaj proti Manili, glavni mestu Filipinov, po lepih cestah; 37. obmojska divizija samo 38 milj še do cilja.

BOLGARSKI PRINC IN PREMIER STA BILA USMRČENA

London. — V četrtek večer sta plačala s življenjem za sodelovanje z Nemčijo bolgarski princ Ciril in bivši premier Filov. Ciril je bil brat pokojnega kralja Borisa in je vladal po njegovi smrti.

V času, ko so oblasti izvršile smrtno kazen, je demonstriralo po ulicah Sofije do 50.000 ljudi, ki so vpili: "Smrt fašistom, smrt morilcem našega naroda!"

Radio iz Sofije je že prej poročal, da je bilo obsojenih na smrt radi izdajstva 22 bivših ministrov, devet kraljevih svetovalcev in 66 poslancev prejšnje vlade. Bolgarija je zdaj pod okupacijo ruske armade.

Ameriški rangerji so ob sedmih zvečer obkolili vse taborišče, ne da bi Japonci to opazili. Natančno ob sedmih je dal poveljnik znamenje in vsi rangerji hkrati so planili po japonski straži. Tri minute pozneje je bil pobit slednji japonski stražnik in ob 7:05 so ženski rangerji na hrbtu iz taborišča prve ujetnike, ki niso mogli hoditi, na prosto. Par minut zatem so rangerji izginili kot kafa v temno noč.

Well, that's all the news I have for the present. One more honorable mention—I've really enjoyed the paper and wish to express my gratitude to the staff and hope that we can see a new world soon. I remain,

Somewhere in Belgium,
January 13, 1945.

I think this is the toughest outfit in the whole army. (I bet the Germans do, too!) Our campaign in Holland was a picnic compared to the present one. (Continued on page 3)

Wounded January 7 in Belgium, PVT. Frank A. Jesenovec is now recuperating in a hospital in France, his wife, Helen, reports. He is the father of two-year-old Kenneth. PVT. Jesenovec, 30, worked at Thompson Aircraft before entering service March 25, 1944. He was sent overseas last September. He is the son of the Jesenovec family, 5812 Prosser Ave., Pfc. John Bezek, 32, son of Mrs. Mary Bezek of 2260 Thurman Ave., has been reported missing since December 21 in Luxembourg. He was with the Ninth Army and was sent overseas last September.

Cpl. Peter Predovic, 31, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gabriel Predovic, 29310 Lorain Rd., North Olmsted, is reported missing in Belgium since December 22. Before entering service in March 1942, he was employed at the Otis Steel Co.

Mrs. Ann Bayt, 5416 Homer Ave., received notification from the War Department that her husband, Pfc. Anthony Bayt, was seriously wounded during infantry action in France December 9.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Anthony Bayt, 1432 E. 52 St., Pfc. Bayt, 34, was employed by the U. S. Postoffice before entering service in November, 1942. Overseas since last May, he is the father of a three-year-old son, Robert.

Pvt. Michael Dimc, 32, has been missing since December 28 on the European battlefield, according to information received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Kerch, 1034 E. 72 St. Michael is married and has a two-year-old daughter. Entering service in November 1942, he was sent overseas in November of last year. He attended St. Vitus School.

Mrs. Frances Kozely of 4886 W. 130 St. (West Park), was notified that her son, Sgt. William C. Kozely, 30, was killed in action December 28 on the island of Morotai. He leaves a wife, Stella, and a daughter, Karen Lee, living at the same address. The Infantryman was inducted in October 1942 and was sent overseas 18 months ago. He worked in the family hardware store, which he took over after the death of his father. His brother, Philip, is in the Navy. Also surviving is another brother, Joseph, three sisters: Frances of Akron, Mrs. Mollie Wozniak of Detroit, and Mrs. Helen Conkey in Cleveland. Memorial Mass was offered for him Monday at the Church of the Annunciation. May he rest in peace in the distant land and our sympathy to the bereaved family.

Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Korosec of 1067 E. 68 St., have been notified by the War Department that their son, T/Sgt. Joseph J., is a war prisoner in Germany. He was reported missing since December 26, 1944.

Mrs. Frances Petrovic of 1091 E. 67 St., received a telegram notifying her that her son, T/Sgt. Jim F. Petrovic, was seriously wounded in action in Belgium. He is 33 years old and will be in the army three years in March. He was sent overseas in September 1944. Teamwork, Speed Gives Allies Sky Slovene Colonel Says

work and superior planes are the decisive factors in aerial victories over the Japs," according to Marine Colonel Max J. Volcansek, one of the highest ranked officers in the service, who has returned here from the west Pacific where he earned the Air Medal for downing enemy plane.

The 29-year-old fighter squadron commander, a veteran of 22 months of overseas flying, emphasized his teamwork theory in aerial warfare by pointing out his own squadron's record. Within a single six-week tour of combat action in the Solomons, his hard-hitting "Flying Deuces" shot down 22 Zeros.

"Since the squadron fought like a good football team, the 22 Jap planes were bagged by 16 different pilots," said the son of Mr. and Mrs. Max Volcansek of Eveleville, Minn. "The Japs scattered in dogfights, but we held together to offset terrific odds."

Lt. Col. Volcansek, still hale despite numerous flights through swarms of Zeros, anti-aircraft fire and attacks of malaria, is credited with downing a Jap plane over Bougainville in a scorching air battle he described as his most exciting combat experience. Twenty-five Zeros cornered his seven-plane division of Leatherneck pilots.

"My plane's superior speed certainly came in handy when two Zeros dove for my tail," he stated in the interview here. "I managed to shoot one down. The other was eliminated by my wingman."

When his squadron was sent to Bougainville, Lt. Col. Volcansek became a fighter commander, helping to pilot aerial attacks on the Jap strongholds of New Britain.

From that post he was sent to Hawaii as an air liaison officer, helping to plan aerial attacks on the Japs' invasions of Palau, and Tinian.

Admiral William F. Friedman recommended him for the Medal of Honor.

A graduate of Eveleville High and Macalester College, Minn., where he starred in basketball, winning the 1936, Lt. Col. Volcansek was promoted to his present rank in December.

As Eveleville's city assessor, Max Volcansek, is a Slovene lodge and commander of the "Iron range" of Minnesota.
