Iz Ljubljane je pisal te dni župan dr. Juro Adlešič. V pismu sporoča, da odpotuje iz Ljubljane 6. maja s parnikom Normandie in dospe v New York 12. maja. Obenem sporoča veselo vest, da pripelje s seboj tudi svojo soprogo.

Viscnega gosta bo čakal v New Yorku posebni sprejemni odbor, katerega organizira operni pevec g. Anton Šubelj. Poleg slovenskega sprejemnega odbora bo tudi posebni odbor mestne vlade v New Yorku.

V Clevelandu bo predstavnik slovenske prestolice stanoval v hotelu zaeno s svojo soprogo. Pričakuje se, da bo imel mnogo obiskov od strani ameriških državnikov in drugih predstavnikov vlade.

Ko bo dr. Adlešič došel v Cleveland ga bo na kolodvoru uradno sprejel župan mesta Clevelanda Mr. Harold Burton zaeno z nekaterimi mestnimi odborniki. Navzoč bo seveda tudi odbor Jugoslovanskega kulturnega vrta.

V Clevelandu samem bomo imeli gospoda župana trikrat na razpolago. V soboto, 14. maja se vrši v S. N. Domu krasna narodna predstava, sloveče Finžgarjevo delo "Naša kri." Režija igre je pod vodstvom Rev. Jagra, kar jamči, da bo predstava prve vrste. Vstopnina k tej predstavi je samo 25c, tako da ima sleherni priliko in možnost se udeležiti.

V nedeljo okoli 1. ure bo gospod župan dr. Adlešič govoril potom radia, ki bo ponesel njegov glas širom Amerike potom 109 radio postaj Columbia Broadcasting Co. Obenem je narejena zveza z domovino potom kratkih valov, tako da bodo slišali njegov govor v domovini.

Ob 2:30 popoldne je slavnostna otvoritev Jugoslovanskega kulturnega vrta. Tam se bodo zbrali vsi naši ljudje, potem ko bo končana slavnostna parada. Številni govorniki, med njimi predstavniki ameriške zvezne, državne in mestne vlade bodo nastopili v kratkih, jedrnatih govorih.

Zvečer v nedeljo 15. maja se vrši slavnostni koncert v Slov. narodnem domu na St. Clair Ave. Nastopili bod zbrani pevski zbori. Tudi h temu koncertu je vstopnina samo 25 centov.

Žal, da ne bomo imeli prilike, da bi visokemu gostu razkazali naše slovenske naselbine po Ameriki. Dr. Adlešič bo odpotoval že 1. junija nazaj proti domovini, kamor ga kličejo nujni opravki.

Poskrbelo se bo, da si ogleda g. župan Washington, kjer bo najbrž gost senatorja Robert J. Bulkleya, v katerega spremstvu obišče predsednika Roosevelta in si ogleda naš kongres, kongresno knjižnico in druge zanimivosti glavne mesta.

Najbrž pride tudi v Pittsburgh in ogledal si bo največjo ameriško zanimivost — niagarske slapove. V Clevelandu bodo dr. Adlešiču izročeni zlati ključ mesta Cleveland.

Veliki business obljubuje, da bo pomagal odpraviti brezposelnost

Washington, 27. aprila. V sredo se je vršila med predsednikom Rooseveltom in avtnim magnatom Henry Fordom veljavna konferenca, katerega smatralo gotovi krogi kot za nekaj sprazum med administracijo in businessom v Zed. državah.

Obenem je predsednik Roosevelt dobil včeraj od šestnajstih največjih industrij, zavarovalnih družb in bank zagotovilo, da je industrija pripravljena popolnoma sodelovati z administracijo, da se v deželo čimprej vrnejo normalni časi.

Med onimi, ki so podpisali to izjavo je predsednik Chase National banke v New Yorku, ki je ena največjih bank na svetu in Owen D. Young, predsednik General Electric korporacije, ki ima zaposlenih 70.000 delavcev.

Obenem je kongres včeraj odobril proračun za fiskalno leto 1938-1939 in sicer v svoti \$5.200.000.000. Proračun je tako prirejen, da se je industriji znatno olajšalo nekatere davke in ne bo industrija več imela

vzroka pritoževati se.

Ford, ki se je v sredo mudil pri predsedniku, je izjavil, da je govoril z Rooseveltom o splošnem gospodarskem položaju v deželi, toda predsedniku ni podal nobenih nasvetov, pač pa samo svoje mnenje.

Ford je bil že takoj od začetka, ko je bil predsednik izvoljen, velik nasprotnik njegovih idej in je v letu 1933 očitno se upiral administrativnim odredbam. Govori se, da je Ford sedaj mnogo bolj spravljiv in da želi, da se vrnejo normalne razmere.

Ford je sprejel tudi predsednikovo vabilo na kosilo, katerega se je tudi udeležil njegov sin Edsel Ford, W. J. Cameron, ki najema delavce pri Fordu in Mariner Eccles, načelnik Federalnega rezervnega odbora, ki kontrolira denar v Zed. državah.

Zlasti je bil včeraj Roosevelt vesel izjave šestnajstih največjih industrijskih podjetij v deželi. Izjavil se je, da je obljuba industrije sijajna in da pričakuje,

da bodo obljubo tudi držali.

Predsednik je zadnje čase neprestano ponavljal, da je potrebna ko-operacija med vlado in privatnimi industrijami, da se vrnejo normalne razmere. Brez tega sodelovanja je napredek nemogoč.

Obenem je predsednik zagrozil, da če privatne korporacije niso v stanu dati delo milijonom brezposelnih, da bo vlada prisiljena samostojno nastopiti in sicer v škodo industrij, ki bodo morale potom davkov prispevati v sklad, da se dobijo sredstva za podpiranje brezposelnih.

Napram časnikarskim poročevalcem se je predsednik včeraj izjavil tekom redne tedenske konference, da je prepričan, da sedaj industrije mislijo resno in da bodo sodelovale z vlado.

Kakor hitro se to zgodi, se vrnejo normalni časi. Predsednik je bil včeraj ves dan nenavadno dobro razpoložen in so vsi, ki so prišli z njim v dotik, čutili, da se nekaj ugodnega pripravlja za deželo.

Obupni boji na kitajski fronti

Taipej, 27. aprila. Vrhovni poveljnik kitajske armade Kajšek je poslal izbrane čete iz vseh delov Kitajske na fronto ob Lunghai železnici, da zaustavi napredujočo japonsko armado. Kitajski poveljniki so priznali, da je položaj obupen. Ako Japonci zasedejo Lunghai železnico, tedaj imajo svobodno pot do kitajskega začasnega glavnega mesta Hankova. Kitajci so na popolnem umiku ob Lunghai železnici. Japonci so dobili nove divizije na bojišče, ki so pravkar dospeli iz Japonske. Tudi doli proti jugu so Japonci včeraj močno napredovali. Močna kitajska obrambena črta pri Hsiowangu se je morala podati japonskemu pritisku. Nad 5.000 kitajskih vojakov je obležalo mrtvih na bojišču, dočim so ostali pobegnili. Japonci znajo v kratkem, zasedi nad vse važno mesto, Sučow, radi katerega se boji vršijo že štiri mesece.

Unijski brivci v Clevelandu so pristali na zahtevo, da bo veljalo striženje las otrok ob sobotah samo 50 centov in ne 65 centov. Striženje las otrok je bilo doslej 50c med tednom, ob sobotah pa 65. Nova cena stopi takoj v veljavo.

Vlada je odredila, da morajo odpuščeni delavci tudi dobiti plačo za nazaj, za ves čas, ko so bili brez dela. To je napotilo razne odvetnike, da so šli okoli delavcev in se jim ponujali, da jim dobijo delo in zaostalo plačo, ako jim obljubijo, da bodo delavci z odvetniki delili. Stvar je prišla na dan in postala pravi škandal. Mnogo odvetnikov se bo moralo zagovarjati na sodniji, ker so hoteli izkoristiti delavce. Delavci se lahko poslužijo vladnega posredovalnega urada, ne da bi bilo treba odvetnikom kaj plačati.

Volitve v juniju odločijo usodo čehoslovaške

Berlin, 27. aprila. Konrad Henlein, vodja Nemcev, ki se nahajajo pod vlado čehoslovaške republike, je zahteval, da se dovoli v juniju mesecu Nemcem na Češkem, da odglasujejo, ali naj ostanejo še naprej pod vlado čehoslovaške republike ali naj se pridružio Nemčiji. Maja meseča se vršijo občinske volitve po Češki, in takoj za tem se bodo vršile volitve glede pripadnosti k Nemčiji. Henlein je nameraval že zadnje nedeljo proglasiti Nemce v Češki kot pripadnike in podanike Nemčije in ga je moral sam Hitler pregovoriti, da tega ni takoj storil.

Mestni proračun

Toda mestni direktor postav je sedaj izjavil, da je proračun nepostaven in da mora zbornica ponovno glasovati o njem. Proračun je nepostaven, ker je councilman Pucel iz 10. varde pridelal proračunu \$9.600.00 za mestna igrališča. Councilman Pucel je to storil, ne da bi navedel vir, odkod se bo denar vzel, pravi direktor Clum in zbornica bo morala ponovno glasovati.

Norman Thomas

Washington, 27. aprila. Že zgodaj lansko leto je predsednik Roosevelt poslal kongresu predlog glede delavskih plač in delovnih ur. Nasprotnikom predloga se je dosedaj posrečilo zadrževati ta predlog, da ni o njem prišlo do glasovanja.

Sedaj pa vse kaže, da predlog tudi tekom tega zasedanja ne bo prišel na glasovanje, pač pa so nasprotniki dobili tako veliko moč, da so ga definitivno zadržali pri tozadevnem kongresnem odboru.

Delavski odsek poslanske zbornice kongresa je sicer predlog odobril, da se ga predloži zbornici v debato in glasovanje, toda nasprotniki znajo tako spretno nastopati, da se predlog še vedno drži odseka za pravila.

Španskim lojalistom zna zmanjkati živeža

Hendaye, Francija, 26. aprila. Gen. Francova armada vedno bolj potiska lojalistične čete proti Sredozemskemu morju. Ni čuda, da je bilo pred kratkim v Clevelandu obsojenih 5 unijskih organizatorjev, katerim se je dokazal graft in raketirstvo. Vodstvo American Federation of Labor namerava narediti konec raketirstvu v delavskih vrstah.

Edino upanje, da bo predlog sprejet, je, če slučajno predsednik Roosevelt gre pred narod in moralno prisili kongres, da glasuje o predlogu.

Delavci so pripravljeni za znižanje plač

Akron, Ohio, 27. aprila. Delavci, ki so zaposleni v kavčukasti industriji v tem mestu, so potom zveznih posredovalcev pristali na to, da dovolijo, da se jim plače znižajo za 6 centov na uro, in to začasno, dokler nevtalna komisija ne pronajde v resnici pravno vrednost proizvajanja kavčuka. Velike kavčukaste industrije v Akronu so grozile, da se izselijo iz Akrona, ako delavci ne pristanejo v znižanje cen, rekoč, da je produkcija kavčuka predraga in da kompanije ne morejo več tekmovali na javnem trgu. Mesto Akron bi bilo uničeno, ako bi se kompanije izselile na jug, ker skoro štiri petine Akrona je odvisnega od kavčukaste industrije. Kompanije so prvotno zahtevale 12 odstotno znižanje plač, tuda so sprejele unijsko pogodbo za 10 odstotno znižanje.

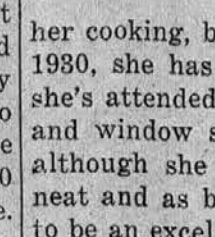
Josephine Orazem

All Fraternals Observe

Fraternal Week May 2-8

About five and one-half billion dollars has been paid out in benefits by fraternal benefit societies of this country since organization, officials of the National Fraternal Congress of America, Chicago, and member societies announce, with the opening of Fraternal Week, May 2 to 8. This sum, if distributed now, would provide every person and child in the United States nearly \$42.

Fraternal Week is an annual observance during which fraternal members throughout the country hold special lodge meetings, parades, pageants, drills and juvenile member demonstrations. The institution for a great many years has provided not only necessary life insurance protection, but has gone far to relieve public distress and ill-health through building and maintaining fine sanatoria and homes for the juvenile and aged. It has contributed much to the community social life through the years by reason of its unique lodge system which is a medium for developing better friendship and understanding between individuals.

Approximately one in every 14 persons in this country, adults and children, is a member of a fraternal benefit society, there being in all some 8,000,000 members. There stands behind this vast protective and beneficial activity approximately \$1,000,000,000 of assets. The institution last year had an income of nearly \$186,000,000 and the fraternal insurance in force totals about \$6,000,000,000.

Fraternal Week is being celebrated in every city, community and hamlet in the United States under the auspices of the National Fraternal Congress of America in line with the proclamation by Mrs. Dora Alexander Talley, president, who is head of the Woodmen Circle, Omaha, Neb.

Its purpose is to publicize the unusual benefits of the fraternal system, which include inexpensive life insurance, the lodge system, which stimulates neighborhood activities and good will; its tuberculosis sanatoria, homes where orphans of deceased members are raised to be good citizens, and the other homes for the aged whose incomes have ceased. The fraternal officials emphasize that their system is not for profit.

All prize winners are urged to attend, so that they may receive their prizes. If you bowled in two events and did not finish in the money, you will be eligible for a cash award that will be given away to fifty-two bowlers. Fifty-four have qualified for these prizes, and you have fifty-two out of fifty-four possible chances of receiving cash in the amounts of ten dollars to one dollar. Over \$400.00 shall be distributed.

Banquet tickets will be obtainable at the door and will sell for fifty cents. This ticket will entitle the holder to the tasty meal and also an evening of dancing and fun. Prize winners will have to be at the banquet in order to win any of the prizes. You are welcome to the affair and your friends may also attend, by purchasing a ticket for the same price. There shall be no additional charge for your friends.
