Čaj je NRA? Jež, miš ali piščka?

Spor med pristaši raznih načinov o vprašanju, kaj je NRA in ves "new deal" in kam sploh pod Rooseveltov program Amerike, ni še končan.

Največji reakcionarji, katerih nasilo je Chicago Tribune in sodobna troliba, vztrajajo, da je "new deal" boljševski "strup" Moske.

"Father" Coughlin in njegova reda sta trdno prepričana, da je "new deal" zajet iz papeževe enciklike "Quadragesimo anno".

Mussolini je rekel zadnjo sočoto v italijanskem senatu, da je Roosevelt eksperiment NRA otrok "njegovih idej", torej vojni v fašizem.

(Vprašanje je, če Mussolini ne posnema papeža ali papeža Mussolinija, drugače Roosevelt ne more posnemati obeh!)

To so trije različni tabori, ki v marsičem strinjajo, v nekaterih rečeh si pa nasprotujejo — in vsak teh taborov ima drugačno mnenje o "new deal".

V Združenih državah je pa tudi nekaj socialistov, ki deloma dobrovajo Rooseveltov program in misijo, da "new deal" vodi Ameriko v socializem. Razume se, da to ni oficielno mnenje socialistične stranke in stranke ni odgovorna za mnenja svojih posameznih članov.

Mussolinijeva trditev, da Roosevelt posnema njega in uvaja socializem, je lahko predmet debata; o vprašanju, če "new deal" vodi v socializem, se tudi lahko razpravlja.

Danes se ne more nihče z govorstvo povedati, kam vodi "new deal", na desno ali levo. Ako sodimo po današnji situaciji in splošnih razmerah, karšne so dane v Ameriki, lahko rečemo, da "new deal" prej voditi v fašizem kakor kam drugam.

Važno je, kdo vodi in izvaja vse ta program reform. Dokler so na krmilu republike demokratije in republikanci — obaji zastopajo profitarske interese — toliko časa obstoji nevarnost, da "new deal" vozi v fašizem, in Mussolini ima nekoliko prav.

Washington, D. C., 16. jan. — Zadnji poziv na vse one, ki se skrivajo zlat denar ali zlate certifikate. Ves denar v zlatu in zlatih certifikatih mora biti izmenjan v federalnih rezervnih bankah do 17. januarja zvečer. Oseba, ki obdrži cekine čez sredo opolnoči, zapade za kazenski platišči.

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## KAJ JE SPODIRA-NJEM SLUMOV IN GRADNJO HIŠ?

Vlada naletela na velike ovire s strani špekulantov. Ves projekt bo ostal le na papirju

Washington. — (FP) — Dasi je splošno mnenje ekonomov, da bi prišlo najprej do gospodarske okrevanja, če bi vlada finančirala v velikem obsegu podiranje slumov in gradnjo cenenih delavskih stanovanj, zadnje čase vse bolj kaže, da s tem programom ne bo nič.

Ko je vlada pred nekako par meseci organizirala svojo stanovanjsko korporacijo z 200 milijoni kapitala, je bilo veliko govorjenja, da se bo navila na slumake predele industrijskih mest in jih spremeni v moderna stanovanjska okrožja po zgledu nekaterih evropskih mest.

Te možnosti pa so zadnje čase izginile radi velikih ovir, na katere je naletel ta projekt. Vlada je dosedaj odobrila le par posojil za gradnjo stanovanj. In dokler ne bodo odstranjene nastale ovire, ni nobenega upanja, da bi se kdo lotil slumov in graditi cenenega delavske stanovanja.

Glavna ovira so zemljiski špekulantni in lastniki slumov. Povsod, kjer so zvedeli, da se vlada ali pa privatne stanovanjske korporacije, ki bi dobile posojilo od vlade, nameravajo lotiti slumov, so cene zemljiskih takoj pognali kvišku mnogokrat več kakor so vredna. Na drugih stavbiščih pa je nemogoče graditi moderna stanovanja — tako stanarino, katero bi lahko zmoglo tiste družine, ki sedaj žive v slumih.

Vladi je bilo sicer predloženih že več projektov v svrhu posojila, ampak bi bila najemnina previsoka za družine nizko plačalnih delavcev. Notranji tajnik Perkins, načelnika vladne stanovanjske korporacije, sta zavzela stališče, da najemnina v novih stanovanjih ne sme značiti več ko šest do sedem dolarjev mesечно od sobe.

Radi kvišku nagnanih zemljiskih cen v slumskih predelih pa je nemogoče graditi modernih stanovanj, v katerih bi bila najemnina od sobe pod deset dolarjev na mesec. Kdor pa zmore to najemnino, mu danes ni treba živeti v slumihi; še celo v New Yorku in Washingtonu se danes dobi že edenkratno stanovanje za takoj stanarino.

Na slične zaprte sta Ickes in Perkinsova naletela na obronki predmestij, kjer je povsod dosti prazne zemlje. Špekulantni so tudi tukaj pokazali svojo glavo in nagnali cene kvišku. Poleg tega pa imajo kontraktorji mnogo praznih stanovanj v predmestjih in so proti vsaki nadaljnji gradnji novih stanovanj. Tudi lastniki apartmantskih stanovanj so proti, češ, da bi jih taki projekti uničili.

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Edini izhod bi bil, da bi zvezna vlada začela s podiranjem slumov in gradnjo modernih, vendar pa cenenih stanovanj za delavske družine z nizkimi plačami, bi lahko oživila ne le gradbeno industrijo, ampak tudi tudi cementno, jeklarsko, lesno in mizarško — splet vse, ki so posredno in neposredno pri tem prizadete. Milijone delavec bi bilo zaposlenih skozi daljšo dobo.

Ce bi to storila in obenem dočakila na primer okrog deset milijard za uničenje slumov in gradnjo modernih, vendar pa cenenih stanovanj za delavske družine z nizkimi plačami, bi lahko oživila ne le gradbeno industrijo, ampak tudi tudi cementno, jeklarsko, lesno in mizarško — splet vse, ki so posredno in neposredno pri tem prizadete. Milijone delavec bi bilo zaposlenih skozi daljšo dobo.

Ickes je bil zadnjič v Ameriki sovjetski zunanjji komisar Litvinov, je s hotelu v New Yorku, kjer so mu kapitalistični veljaki priredili banket, vihrala poleg ameriške tudi rdeča zastava. Ničko pa ni bil prijet radi tega. Sploh je ameriška vlada po priznanju Sovjetske Rusije naročila večje število rdečih zastav, kar meče se posebno čudno, jucena na newyorkski zakon iz dobe velike histerije. Enake postave ima tudi več drugih držav.

Eksistence vladne finančne korporacije podaljšana eno leto

Washington, D. C. — Kongres je podaljšal življenje federalnih korporacij, za rekonstrukcijo finančne za nadaljnje leto in ji dovolil 850 milijonov dolarjev novih glavnice za posojevanje.

# Ob tridesetletnici društva Slavije in SNPJ

DOKUMENTARNI PODATKI K ZGODOVINI RAZVOJA NAŠIH PRVIH DRUŠTEV IN NASE JEDNOTE

Iz podatkov, ki sem jih navepel v prejšnjem članku, čitatelj razvidi, da je bil Frank Klobučar zelo energičen, vrzen in vztrajen ter v bojih nepomirljiv. Zavzel se je, da ne odneha, in če že mora biti poražen, ne bo brez boja. V aferi glede znakov je bil on, kot razvidno iz njegovega pisma Zavertniku, veliko manj kritik, kakor ostala dva. Njegov prestopek je bil, da ni manipuliranja z naročili razkril takoj, ko je izvedel o tem, in pa, ker je premišljeval, ali naj stvar sploh razkrije. To njegovo obotavljanje je izrabila nasprotna struja in tako je bil Klobučar potisnjen v obrambni boj med krvicami.

Frank Klobučar je bil močna osebnost. Bil je dober predsednik in spremem v argumentiranju. Zavertnik je moral nemakrat napeti vse svoje sile, da je pridobil večino proti njemu — in pridobil jo je šele, ko se je Klobučar preveč opril na svojega prijatelja Fr. Bernika, kar ga je še najbolj pokopalo.

Dr. F. J. Kern piše v "Ameriški domovini" z dne 14. oktobra 1933 v svojih "Spominih" med drugim, da so bili v sporih zaradi vprašanja oddaje blagajne vsi dokazi proti Klobučarju.

"Igral je s prijateljem Bernikom klaverno vlogo in neposredno pomagal Zavertniku do odločilnega vodstva pri SNPJ do Zavertnikove smrti."

Dalje piše dr. Kern:

"Klobučar je bil pristaš takozvane liberalne (Kondove) ali prostomiselne narodne stranke. Zdi se mi, da so po njegovi krvidi in po krvidi njegovih prijateljev izgubili pozneje pri SNPJ vpliv in ugled tudi drugi predstavniki narodno liberalne skupine kot so bili Zalokar, Fr. Kerže, Frank Korče, Jože Kalar, Frank Černe, Primož Kogoj, John Verderbar, Jože Ambrožič, Anton J. Terbovec v drugi, ki so bili od časa do časa v glavnem odboru SNPJ. Kontrolo, so dobili v roke Zavertnik in njegovi sodrugi tovarši, člani socialističnih klubov. — Priznati pa moramo Zavertniku in njegovim pristašem, da so prepričali dnarino korupcijo pri jednoti in so delali med časom prospireto za majhen denar, medtem ko so odborniki tujih organizacij vleki tisočake v plačah in potovnih stroških, katere je moralo plačati celstvo z višjimi asesmenti."

Dr. Kern je v pravem, ko priznava socialistom zasluge v boju za poštenje v SNPJ. Tudi marsikdaj pozneje so morali stopiti na prste lakomnosti in sebičnosti, ki se je skušala ugnezditi v glavnem uradu.

V SNPJ je danes in je bilo v prošlosti mnogo odbornikov in dobrih delavnih članov, ki niso bili socialisti, toda so socialistom v boju za poštenje in proti koristolovcem radi pomagali.

Frank Klobučar vzlč svojemu postopanju z blagajno, katero je končno izročil, kamor je spadal in klub sabotiranju sklepov konvencij, ni brez zaslug v Slaviji in SNPJ. Ali bolje in pravičneje: v agitacijskem delu prvih par let društva in jednote so njegova zasluge velike.

Omenil sem že v prejšnjih člankih, da je bila SNPJ najprvo inkorporirana v državi Ohio (v Clevelandu). Vzrok je bil, ker za inkorporiranje v Illinoisu ni imela še zadosti članov, medtem ko so bile v Ohiu dobročše za inkorporiranje podpornih organizacij manj stroge. Proti inkorporiranju izven Illinoisa je nastala velika opozicija. Odborniki so osebno pojaznivali, da so jednoti nekje morali uzakoniti, ker so jih nasproti grozili s tožbami za razpust — češ, da ni inkorporirana.

Ko je dosegla zadostno število članov, kolikor jih je zahteval Illinoiski zakon, je glavni odbor na svoji seji to vprašanje spet resetal. Bilo je to l. 1907 pred III. (illasalsko) konvencijo.

Sklenili so inkorporiranje v Ohiu razveljaviti in ga izvesti v Illinois, kar so storili 17. junija 1907. Ampak kdo naj razveljavlja inkorporiranje v Ohiu? O tem so odborniki rekli marsikaj, ne da bi prišlo v zapisnik. Končno se je ponudil Klobučar, kajti treba je bilo "uničiti" tudi inkorporacijski čarter, dobljen

je Klobučar prepozno spoznal, priznal pa ni javno nobenkrat.

Glavni odbor se je večkrat pečal z Bernikom in njegovo takto. Na svoji seji 8. aprila 1909 je razpravljal o obremelih činih nadzornika Bernika in o njegovi krividi ali nekrividi. Ker je bil Fr. Bernik sposobna in privlačna osebnost, so nekateri odborniki priporočali, naj se na njegove prestope pozabi, kajti blagajna je vrnjena in Klobučar je izključen. Drugi so zahvalili, da se izobči tudi Bernik, ker je ravno toliko kriv.

Končno so se sporazumeli, da predloži ves obtožilni material četrtek redni konvenciji v Clevelandu, ki se je vrnila isto leto. 60 članov konvencije je glasovalo, da je Bernik kriv, in 12 proti. Nato so glasovali o kazni. 39 članov je glasovalo za 3 mesečno suspenzijo od bojničke podpore in 34 za izključenje.

Ker je Bernik uvidel, da bi bila nadaljnja obramba brez uspeha, vrhutega je par njegovih prijateljev že izključenih, je boj opustil ter prenehalt biti član SNPJ. Kmalu po ustanovitvi društva Delavec št. 8 v So. Chicagu je prestopil od Slavije k Delavecu, kjer je bil eden vodilnih članov do IV. konvencije. Zdaj živi Bernik v Californiji. Njegova glavna zasluga za SNPJ je, da je aktivno sodeloval pri ustanavljanju društva Slavije in Delaveca.

Louis Skubic je eden najstarejših slovenskih priseljencev v Chicagu, ako ne najstarejši. V Ameriko je prišel l. 1883, torej biva tu že nad 50 let. Za ustanovitev slovenske nečrkvene podporne organizacije je sodeloval še v društvu Slovenij. Ker pa se z rojaki, ki so prišli na svetovno razstavo v Chicago leta 1893 niso mogli domeniti o možnosti za ustanovitev in obstaj takje jednote, so v Chicagu idejo opustili in svoje društvo (Slovenijo) pridružili češki podporni organizaciji. Louis Skubic je v tem času odstopil od Slovenije.

Bil je član Slovenije, ki je podružni češke jednote ČSBPJ. Zastopal je parkrat tudi na konvencijah omenjene jednote. Bil je zvest član strokovne organizacije. Pred par leti je bil zastopnik na njenem občnem zboru.

Zadnja leta je soglašal s socialisti, da si bili član socialistične organizacije. France Klobučar je imel tudi svoje napake, kajti jih ima vsak človek. Bili bi surovost in brezobjektost, če bi pisali o njih zdaj, ko se Klobučar več braniti ne more.

Svoje vrline je uporabljal ne le za sace, marče tudi za druge, ker je organiziral delave v podpornih društvin in uniji . . ."

V času konflikta, ko sta bila Zavertnik in Klobučar v ospredju borbe drug proti drugemu, je bil v Proletarju proti Klobučarju marsikak neškak dopis. On je odgovarjal v Glasu Svobode.

Itu citiranega poročila v Proletarju je razvidno, da so se od njega poslovili človeško tudi nasprotniki. Bil je pač oster načelen in osebni boj, v katerim niso poznali prizanašanj. Kadar pa je kdo izmed teh, ki so stali v bitkah v prvih vrstah, umrl, so prišli k rakvi vsi in vse sovrašči in vse pikre besede so bile pozabiljene.

Frank Bernik je bil intelektualni vodja Klobučarjeve struje in svetovalec F. Klobučarja v njegovem boju proti gl. odboru, kateri je bil izvoljen na III. (illasalski) konvenciji. Bernik je bil član pripravljalnega odbora za ustanovitev društva (Slavija) in predsedoval je tudi prvi seji. Rojen je bil v Kraintownu, Minn. Govori precej dobro slovensko. Po poklicu je učitelj, tod v Chicagu tega posla ni izvrševal, pač pa je vodil salun (v So. Chicagu). V času najljutjejših bojev med obema strujama so se pri njem zbirali njegovi ter Klobučarjevi pristaši ter kovali svoje načrte.

## The New Deal in 1934

At home 1934 will determine whether the New Deal is to move definitely to the left or right. After earlier predictions to the contrary the newspapers now agree that the President will dominate Congress. I am writing before his message is made public, but whatever he says, his New Deal is moving to the right. Mr. Peck may have been taken out of AAA, but his ideas and not Tugwell's went in the codes. It is bad news that General Johnson is given unrestricted power to approve codes in small industries. The General does all he can do to "crack down" with his mouth. In reality he is becoming more and more conservative in action, NRA is more and more manned by business interests. It has no good research department. When I was in Washington I learned that the chief statistical or economic advisor since Professor Sachs left it is a man the borrowed from General Motors. NRA is even working at a comprehensive plan for integration of industry.

Henry Ford and the PRT in Philadelphia, as a host of others, will manage to defy the Labor Board. The heads of the Federal Relief and Civil Works Administration are doing as good a job as they can under an unsatisfactory method of unemployment relief. But the local authorities are pretty bad. In cities as far apart as New York and New Orleans workers under CWA have lost their jobs as "agitators" for no crime at all except that they insist that the workers had a right to belong to organizations. In many cases in New York and elsewhere men have been arrested for the crime of trying to organize CWA workers.

Meanwhile prosperity has not come back. A. F. of L. figures of unemployment in November showed that unemployment increased to over 300,000. 1934 will be judged not whether it has moved to hasten the new day of the cooperative commonwealth.—N. Thomas.

## Laugh This Off

The hypocrite who publicly advertises his virtue but who is privately a crook or a scoundrel or both, is familiar to all. He will accuse others of offenses of which he himself is guilty. That hypocrite is abroad today in the form of capitalistic programs.

An example is the old accusation against Socialists that we would reduce all workers to a dull level of uniform life. Now look at the tens of millions of toilers who look as though they came out of a mechanical mold, they are so much alike in their misery.

Fascism, the looney creed of a dying capitalism, will even openly approve this policy. In Germany the Nazi bosses have ordered that all the members of the German Labor Front shall be dressed alike from head to foot. When this job is completed the workers will all look like sawdust dolls.

Let our enemies laugh that off—if they can.

An item in New York dailies this week is doubt being repeated with some variations in many other cities. Readers are informed that 400,000 pounds of pork and butter and more than 200,000 loaves of bread have been distributed to families in Brooklyn and Queens in December. The supplies were provided by the Federal Surplus Corporation.

Where are the capitalist dandies who once recoiled with horror when they forecast a Socialist State where government would feed large sections of the population? Where are the gentlemen who were frightened at the prospect of Socialists reducing human beings to "dull dead level"? Where are those who chanted their dull sing-song against "destroying human incentive"? Where . . .?

But it isn't necessary to continue. We are inclined to the view that if some informed Socialist were to consult the books and pamphlets circulated against us down to the beginning of the World War and simply selected the predictions of what would happen with the abolition of capitalism, he would make a very effective pamphlet. By merely citing the predictions the author point out that they have come true because capitalism beat us to it!

## HOW "GRANISH" ORIGINATED

Auburn, Ill.—Since we do not have an English speaking lodge here in Auburn, I have never taken the opportunity to contribute any articles to the Prosvesa. But even though this is my first contribution to this wonderful English Section, I have always taken great interest in the articles written by our SNPJ members. Some of the scribes certainly deserve praise for their educational articles which appear weekly in the Prosvesa. Keep up your good work!

As John Aynik of Cleveland asks for opinions of his article, "Our Granish Peepul," and since I have also had experience with the word "Granish," I might be able to give a short write-up on that topic.

The first time I had ever heard the word "Granish" was two years ago while visiting relatives in Pennsylvania. I visited there for two months, but during all that time I never heard the word "Slovene"—only "Granish." One day I was talking to a group of girls who were not Slovenes. After discussing different topics, one of them asked, "Are you Granish?" "No," I said, "I am Slovene." After I had given her my answer she looked amazed, as I suppose she hadn't heard of the word "Slovene" before. I then briefly explained that the Slovenes were called "Granish" in Pennsylvania. I really think it is not right that the people of different nationalities in Pennsylvania, and elsewhere, because of the word "Granish," do not know who the Slovene people are.

I suppose many of us may say, "Well, where did this word come from?" I really believe it originated from the word "Krainer." A group of early Slovene pioneers who came to America, organized the "Kranjska Slovenska Katolička Jednota." These people began to call themselves "Kranjci." Then they also placed signs in front of their halls, such as "Kranjski Slovenski Dom." People who couldn't speak the Slovene tongue pronounced "Kranjski" a hundred different ways, pronouncing it "Kranish" and then "Granish." Of course, I don't know how true the above said is, but it's my way of trying to find the origination of the word "Granish."

In my opinion the propagation of "I'm a Slovene" campaign, mentioned by John Aynik in his article, "Our Granish Peepul," should work out splendidly, with the co-operation of all the Slovenes. Come on, you Pennsy folks! Get behind this campaign and back it 100%.
