In many cases commercial classes have been the dumping ground for girls who fail to make good in academic courses. Then, too, a large percentage of students select commercial courses because they are easier. As a result office workers have become so numerous that employment agencies are advising young girls to train for other fields. They suggest sales positions in stores and factory work as alternatives to office careers. They also point out that there is a wide variety of opportunities available to girls who have had adequate training in domestic science.

DISCUSS RACIAL SUPERIORITY

Emphasizing the necessity of freeing one's mind from preconceived notions based upon the idea of racial superiority and a "double standard of international morality," Dr. Taraknath Das, special lecturer on the Far Eastern affairs at the Catholic University of America at Washington, D. C., spoke on "The Background of International Policy in the Far East" in the first of a series of Tuesday lectures held in the Music Building Auditorium at the university.

Dr. Das summarized his remarks by saying: "I wish to make the following observations: Britain from her Indian Empire has expanded politically and economically in the Far East at the expense of China and other nations. France has founded an empire in the Southeastern Asia and from this base she is pursuing quietly a policy of economic and political penetration into China. The tsarist Russia, through diplomatic intrigue, military and political pressure managed to build up a vast Far Eastern empire menacing sovereignty of China, in the north as well as Korea.

"Japan was plucky enough to put a check on Russian expansion and has taken place in the same region, yet today Soviet Russia is controlling Mongolia with an area of a million square miles. Soviet Russia is intent upon maintaining its influence in Sinkiang. Germany came late on the scene of empire building in the Far East and also founded a colonial empire at the cost of China; but she was permanently eliminated from the Far East by Japan's deliberate and delicate operations, supported by Germany's enemies.

"The United States, until the latter part of the 19th century, was too busy in empire building in the American continent and also checking the western powers which were intent upon challenging American political and economic supremacy in the New World. The United States was satisfied with gaining equal opportunity for trade in the Far East and did not start in the policy of imperial expansion in Asia until the acquisition of the Philippines, after the Spanish-American War. She is now ready to accord independence to the Philippines, which will demonstrate that she has no ambition for acquiring any territory at the cost of any nation in the Far East.

Japan after making her own position secure against foreign intervention has also entered into a program of empire building by annexing Korea and creating Manchukuo, as a Japanese dependency. Italy, under Mussolini, has entered the arena of the Far East to expand her commercial interests in co-operation with China. In spite of all kinds of diplomatic engagements and promises, the great powers of the world except the United States are still keen in empire building in the Far East at the expense of weak nations. In spite of this fact, a spirit of new nationalism is sweeping through all countries of the Far East, especially China and India, the object of which is to recover the sovereign rights of the peoples of these countries.

"In the background of what is happening in certain regions of the Far East—such as Japanese expansion, eliminating

western expansion in the Far East—there is the application of the philosophy of 'Macht Politik'—Might makes right—as practiced by western powers upon the people of the East. It seems to me that there is an indication that in the Far East sooner or later national imperialism of the West will be ousted by the reassertion of the peoples of the Far East. It is to be hoped that in spite of the unsavory background of international politics in the Far East, the inevitable readjustment will be a peaceful one and result in the vindication of sovereign rights of all peoples, on the basis of justice and liberty and serve as the surest foundation for co-operation between the East and the West on the basis of equality."

CIVILIZATION AT CROSSROADS

Modern civilization is today standing at the crossroads of indecision. Social, economic, and political problems have given birth to an universal unrest that is rocking the structure of civilization to its very foundations. False prophets have arisen on all sides; a bewildering array of solutions has overshadowed the problems themselves and in this welter of conflicting ideas a drowning civilization is grasping at every idea that might strengthen the tumbling towers of our social, economic and political structure.

The crying need in this present-day crisis is leadership. The time-old law of nature holds the key to the solution. Survey the vast sweep of nature from the non-identity of inanimate being up through the plant and animal kingdoms until you reach the court of the lord of creation—man. There is a hierarchy of nature that guides your every step. And in each individual organism you encounter some center of activity. A vital force, a nervous system, a brain—there is always some immediate guiding genius for every dynamic act in nature's drama.

In the universal phenomenon of human society, we once more detect nature's hierarchical stamp. The individual enters life in the arena of the family. The family ramifies into the patriarchal tribe. The tribe grows to the stature of a nation. Political organization establishes the nation as a state. The one essential in all these various developments is leadership. Organization among men means leadership.

The Church, a spiritual society, universal in its membership and its functioning, bases its organization of the hierarchical principles and looks to its head and center in the person of Our Holy Father, the Bishop of Rome.

The general principle vitalizing this law of nature is that no organism can co-ordinate and direct the functioning the various individual parts. The Pope has recognized this general principle in the important field of Catholic education—it is not enough to have separate units working in diverse fields. The work of those various institutions is noteworthy and heroic, but it is not—from the circumstance of the case, cannot be self-sufficient. There must be some center where the varied impulses of our numerous Catholic educational units are received and integrated; where the resources of Catholic learning might be pooled; where the voice of Catholic culture might speak forth with assurance and high scholarship. This necessity has been supplied, and leadership has become a reality in American Catholic scholarship. The Catholic University at Washington has been set up as the focal point of American Catholic intellectual life.

In its role as leader of Catholic learning and interpreter of Catholic principles, it rises head and shoulders above the turmoil of our present unrest. Its teaching on God, its apologetic for religion, and its insistent defense of the dignity of the human personality stamp it as a great moral and intellectual force in our national life. Social justice, respect for authority, regard for law, the brotherhood of man, the very principles of our democracy flow from its Catholic teaching on
