## Nevolja med senatorji zaradi molka generala Bradley-a o njegovem razgovoru s Trumanom

Senatorji pravijo, da tudi nimajo na razpolago dokumentov o zunanji politiki napram Aziji, kajti čim zahtevajo te dokumente, ki jih administracija ne da iz rok, jih označi za "strog tajne" in s tem je stvar končana.

WASHINGTON. — Demokratični senatorji, ki preiskujejo zadovo MacArthurjevega odpoklica, dolže zdaj republikane, da nameravajo slednji to zadovo potlačiti.

Spor je nastal zlasti zaradi vprašanja, ali se more generala Bradleya prisiliti, da pove, kakšen je bil smisel razgovora, ki ga je imel s predsednikom Trumonom. Bradley vztraja, da je upravičen do privatnosti in da bi njegova funkcija kot vojaški svetovalec predsednika prenehala v trenutku, ko bi bil prisiljen razglasiti vsebino tajnih razgovorov in posvetovanj.

V sredo je bil general Bradley spet pred odsekom, toda je malo pričal, ker so skoraj ves čas uporabili z vprašanjem o proceduri. Ko je general sedel pred senatnim odsekom dve uri, je bil končno oproščen, da je lahko odšel in bo nastopil zopet prihodnji teden.

Temu se zdaj ne da pomagati in danes so tukaj pri nas, v Angliji, v Južni Ameriki, v Avstraliji in povsod. Raztepeni so po vsem svetu, ti slovenski trpinji. Boge, če bodo kdaj vse še videli svojo in našo rojstno domovino! Vsi že ne, saj že legajo k počitku, da se spočijejo. Težko bo tam gori, ko smo zbirali in se iskali od vsepotovsod...

Nič! Kaj bi tarnali in si brisali solze nad bridko usodo. Pogum! Zdaj smo skupaj, stari in novi naseljeni. ### SAVING THE WOUNDED

Deaths from wounds in the Korean War have been at the lowest rate in history. This is a tribute to the magnificent work which the doctors, nurses and medical corpsmen attached to our fighting forces are doing under the most difficult and dangerous conditions.

But there is even more to it than that — and it is found in the high protein diet of American soldiers. Their rations include about a pound of meat a day, and meat is one of the best of the limited number of sources of whole protein. According to Dr. I. S. Ravdin, professor of surgery at the University of Pennsylvania, and formerly a brigadier general in the medical corps, the amazing success in saving the wounded has resulted in part from "the recognition that high grade animal protein in diets may be almost as important as anti-biotics (germ-killing medicines) in healing wounds faster."

This comes hard on the heels of the experience during World War II, when the enormous value of protein to troops was proven. Then, as now, military personnel received rations high in meat content. It was found, further, that protein has a definite beneficial effect on energy and morale, no less than in helping the sick and wounded to regain their health.

What is true of the soldier is true of the civilian. Research has firmly established the fact that large amounts of protein are needed by almost everyone. This is now strongly advocated by the leading medical authorities on dietetics. It marks a step forward on the march toward a stronger, healthier people — as the experience in Korea is demonstrating.

## This and That from Washington

By Congressman Frances P. Bolton

**T**HE field teams of the House Small Business Committee have returned to Washington and are conferring with the Senate Small Business Committee in an effort to get more clarity into government procurement policies . . . a point at which hardship has fallen on most small businesses. Secretary of Defense Marshall and Munitions Board Chairman John Small headed the list of those appearing before the committees, followed by officials of the Armed Services.

This snag in the procurement picture has been pointed up by Attorney General McGrath in his second report on the Defense Production Act. He warns that our national economy "faces erosion by the continuing loss of small firms who do not participate in the defense effort . . ." He concludes that: "If continued, the concentration of economic power through channeling government contracts into the hands of a few, may well eliminate a large part of our small manufacturing businesses."

It is a timely warning, although I am not so pessimistic, for I know the determination of several members of the House Small Business Committee to see that relief for this situation shall be arranged soon. Field hearings will be resumed after the joint meetings, and it is hoped that a subcommittee can come to Cleveland some time in May when it is planned to hold hearings in some of the larger Defense areas such as Cleveland, Pittsburgh, and Detroit at the same time.

The first round of the House Committee's field hearings produced a list of nine points of difficulty for the small businessman, most of which will not be news to him. However, there are four points on which the committee is hopeful that relief may be forthcoming: (1) A sensible allocation program for strategic and scarce materials; (2) federal financial support on defense contracts where local financing is difficult for small businesses; (3) modification of Ceiling Price Regulation 7 to ease bookkeeping headaches with which smaller firms find

## Now Is the Time to Check Furnace

The grates should be inspected. A flashlight will be handy for this. Any grate bars that are broken or damaged must be replaced.

The smoke pipe should be removed, brushed out, and set away in a dry place. If the pipe is thin and pitted with rust holes, bid it farewell and buy a new one.

## What You Should Know About the Atom Bomb

If the enemy starts splitting atoms over our cities, there will be no time to look in a book. It's all important to know what to do. Store away the following information in your head so it can come out FAST when you need it.

1. Seek cover immediately — a basement, subway, steel reinforced concrete building. If caught outside unexpectedly, drop down alongside a building or fall flat in a ditch or gutter. Flatten out! If caught in the upper part of your home, get under a bed or table or behind a davenport.

2. When you drop flat, bury your face in your arms. Shield the back of your neck with a hand. This will shield your eyes from the flash and flying objects and your face from flash burns.

3. If the bomb bursts above ground, wait a few minutes. Then go out and help fight fires. If it bursts underground or underwater, wait at least an hour. Dust clouds and mist from such explosions carry dangerous radioactivity.

4. To prevent radioactive poisoning or disease, avoid food and water which has been exposed. Use canned or bottled things.

5. Don't start rumors. In the confusion following a bombing, rumors might touch off a panic that could cost your life and many others.
