JUGOSLAV VS. AMERICAN DIETS

By DR. A. L. GARBERS

It is often the contention of our parents that the average Jugoslav has better teeth than the average American for this reason I believe it would be interesting to compare the diets of the two peoples. We are aware of the fact that our parents have adopted not only American phrases like "goodby" and "that's all right," but have adopted also many articles of food which were unknown to them before their entrance into this melting pot of ours. Modification of both the Jugoslav languages and diets have resulted from the new contacts made in this country and it remains a question whether our parents have benefited from this amalgamated diet.

Salads comprise a large part of their diet. Leafy vegetables such as lettuce, cabbage, dandelions are used in their natural state and because of their high calcium content they serve excellently in the development and maintenance of sound teeth. Fruits are eaten freely by the Jugoslavs and by the inherent instinct to chew they generally satisfy a lingering hunger between meals with an apple, pear or some grapes.

The Jugoslav of Europe brought with him also the custom of slaughtering hogs in the fall season and making use of all its component parts except the squeal. Sausages, hams and lard were just a few of the products which they stored away for the winter months. Jugoslavs have thus kept away from cold storage foods as much as possible.

Even today many of the Jugoslavs resort to this, but the majority have come down to smaller game and now buy live poultry and kill it at home to insure fresh and wholesome meat. For this reason very few of the Jugoslav meat markets in the neighborhoods handle fowl that are already killed and dressed.

Butter, before our parents were Americanized, was considered a luxury, but today most every household deems it a necessity. It may and may not be an adjunct to the health of an individual, but on the other hand our parents all remained healthy without butter.

Another factor explaining the good dentition of the Jugoslavs is the fact that most of our parents in their original land were exposed more to the violet rays as given off by the sun. In America we spend a great deal of our time indoors, working in stuffy factories, stores and offices and so are denied the wholesome sun and air that nature provides for us and which would ameliorate our present dental health if partaken of liberally.

In summation, then, the diet of our parents originally was very laudable and reasonable. If our diets were balanced well and consisted of harder foods, plenty of vegetables and fewer sweets and sloppy foods, we would be taking a forward step in preventive dentistry.
