Vsled nenačnega visokega porastka v premoženju mora North American banka zvišali kapital

Slovenska banka, The North American Bank Co., sklicuje izredno sejo delničarjev za dan 18. septembra 1945 v SND na St. Clair Ave., začetek ob osmih zvečer.

Namen te izredne seje je, da se zviša osnovna glavnica banke od 5,000 delnic na 10,000 delnic. Sedanje delnice so se kupile po \$20 vsaka, nove se bodo pa ponudile delničarjem po \$27.50 vsaka in sicer po eno novo delnico na vsako staro. Ne-delničarji bodo morali plačati \$30 za delnico.

Namen je, da se dvigne osnovna glavnica na \$200,000, razdeljena na 10,000 delnic, računano osnovno po \$20 vsaka.

Vse to morajo delničarji odobriti na gori omenjeni izredni seji. Zato je pa važno, da se vsak delničar udeleži, ali pa podpiše proxy, ki jo bo dobil po pošti ter jo gotovo izroči enemu izmed sledčih: Anton Grdini, Matt Grdini ali Ray Breskvarju.

Banka je zadnje čase zelo narasla, zato mora pa zvišati svojo osnovno glavnico, kot določa postava. Tako je imela banka na 31. decembra 1940 premoženje v vsoti \$1,498,083.11, na 31. julija 1945 pa že \$7,808,365.65.

Bančni superintendent države Ohio je že povedal, ko so mu predložili ta načrt za povisanje glavnice, da bo to odobril, čim bodo delničarji to potrdili. Zato je važno, da se vsak delničar udeleži seje, ali izroči poverilnico (proxy).

Kot znano je pri preosnovi banke posodila vladna organizacija RFC banki \$100,000. Od tega se je že toliko odpalačalo, da je zdaj vladnega dolga samo še \$65,800.00 in še za to je v rezervi pripravljenega \$12,771.00.

Z dodatno glavnico se bo takoj odpalačal ves dolg vladni in banki bo potem last samo delničarjev. Vladi je treba plačevati obresti, katere bodo potem dobili delničarji.

BRUTALNOST BODO OSTRO KAZNOVALI

Com. Harold Stassen bo preiskal trpinčenje vojnih ujetnikov.

Tokijski zaliv. — Commander Harold Stassen, bivši guverner Minnesota, zbira zdaj dokaze o trpinčenju vojnih ujetnikov na Japonskem. Dokazi o bestialni brutalnosti Japoncev do ujetnikov se vedno bolj kupičijo.

Stassen je postavil za preiskovalca admiral Halsey. Stassen je rekel, da niso bile dozdaj izvršene še nobene aretacije, ker je treba najprej osvoboditi vseh 35,000 ujetnikov.

Reševalci so dozdaj izpraznili sedem ujetniških taborišč v okolici Tokia. Dozdaj so prenesli na ladje 1,494 sestranih, strpinčenih in stepenih zavezniških ujetnikov.

Kot trdijo poročila, so Japonci zlasti strahovito mučili ujetne letalce in mornarje s podmorinic. Vsak ujetnik zapise na kartu ime japonskega častnika ali vojaka, ki je trpinčil ujetnika. Ko bodo vsi ujetniki oproščeni in vsi dokazi zbrani, so bo pričela obravnavna proti ostudem barbarom.

Pametno je, da se je obdržalo cesarja, pravi Nimitz

Tokio Bay. — Admiral Nimitz je izjavil, da so zavezniki v Potsdamu zelo pametno ukrenili, ko so obdržali cesarja Hirohitu. To se je pokazalo ob invaziji Japonske, ki se je izvršila brez vsakega prelivanja krvi.

Admiral Nimitz je tudi povedal, da je prišla zmaga nad Japonskim prej, kot se je pa pričakovano. On sam je pred dvema letoma zapisal na kos papirja in zapečatil v kuverta, da bo konec vojne z Japonci 31. decembra 1945.

WASHINGTON — Predsednik Truman je ukazal, da neha z delom urad za vojne informacije do 15. septembra. Inozemske informacije bo uradoval poslej državni oddelek.

TRUMAN BO RAZGLASIL V-J DAN

Govori se, da bo to izvršeno nocoj še pred enajsto zvečer. Ako bodo pa kaki začrki in kapitulacija ne bo podpisana nocoj, bo predsednik namanil V-J dan jutri.

To se razume tako, da bo kapitulacija podpisana faktično na Japonskem v nedeljo po japonskem času, toda po ameriškem času bo to še danes.

GLEDE NAGRAD!

Ko je Ameriška Domovina razpisala tri nagrade za one, ki bodo najblizu uganili konec vojne z Japonci, smo rekli, da bo to računano po času, ko bo predsednik Truman to razglasil.
