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Odločilna bitka o industrijskem unionizmu v federaciji pride danes

Resolucija za industrijske unije je bila poražena v odseku samo z enim glasom večine in v sredo gre pred delegate na končno glasovanje. Konvencija se je soglasno izrekla za 30-urni delovnik brez znižanja mezde. McNutt, governor Indiane, dobil "ukor" kot diktator

Atlantic City, 15. okt. — Odsek za resolucije na konvenciji Ameriške delavske federacije je včeraj z osmimi glasovi proti sedmim zavrgel resolucijo petdesetih federalnih unij, ki zahtevajo formo industrijskega masnega produkcijske. Bil je eden najhujših bojev v tem odseku, toda reaktorji so komaj došli en glas večine za svojo resolucijo, ki bistveno predpisuje, da unije v industrijah masne produkcije obdrže pravo območje po "craftih" ali poklicih.

Manjšina odseka je takoj namnila, da bo vzela priziv na konvencijo in to vprašanje pride na dnevni red konvencije v sredo. Takrat bodo delegatje glasovali o poročilu večine in manjšine.

To vprašanje je velikega pomena za bodočnost Ameriške delavske federacije in za napredek organiziranega ameriškega delavstva sploh. Vprašanje pomeni, ali se bodo ameriški delavci organizirali po industrijah, tako da bodo vsi delavci ene industrije v eni sami uniji, ali bodo še nadalje razdeljeni v kopico unij po poklicih, na primer, da bo unija strojnikov imela območje nad strojniki v vseh industrijah.

Sporne unije v stavbni industriji so se včeraj dogovorile, da same poravnajo svoj spor, ki je zadnji teden povzročil Greenov poraz na konvenciji. "Velika trojica" — zidarji, tesarji in električarji — je ponudila ostalim dvanajstim stavbnim unijam, s katerimi se prepira zaradi jurisdikcije (območja), spravo pred razsodiščem in predlog je bil sprejet. Obenem stranki imenujeta po tri člane, ki postavijo nevtralnega predstavnika, ki bo odločil.

Konvencija je včeraj soglasno sprejela resolucijo za trideseturni delovnik brez znižanja mezde. Po glasovanju je predsednik Green izjavil: "Naloga ADF je, da priporoči delavcem Amerike trideseturnik brez znižanja mezde, bodisi z zakonom, bodisi s stavko."

Dalje je konvencija odglasovala za ukor governorju McNuttu v Indiani zaradi tega, kar je razglasil obsedeno stanje v okrožju Vigo, kjer je izbruhnila generalna stavka v Terre Haute zadnje poletje, in po polno državno milico nad stavkarje. Kopija ukorne resolucije se pošlje tudi Ameriški lektiki, katere bivši poveljnik je bil governor McNutt.

Konvencija je tudi obsodila Kohler Company v Kohlerju, Wis., katere noče priznati odločne unije ADF kot predstavne delavcev za kolektivno pogajanje. Ta družba pride zdaj na listo "unfair" in ekskutivna federacija mora do dejstva namigniti vsem krajevnim unijam ADF.

Rudarska stavka v Angliji se širi
London, 15. okt. — Spor, ki se je razvil v odseku rudarstva, ki so člani rudarske unije v South Walesu, grozi zapletiti vseh 1000 rudarjev v vseh rudnih podzemljih z izjavo, da ne gredo na površje, dokler ne bodo nezakonitih delavcev odlovljeni. Stavka je v formi pasivne rezistence.

Za enakopravnost nezakonskih otrok

Roditelji so morda nezakonski, ne pa otroci!

Milwaukee, Wis. — Na zborovanju Ameriške zveze za javno zdravje (American Public Health Association), ki se je vršilo zadnji teden, je bil odobren radikalni korak, da se izbrše legalna razlika med zakonskimi in nezakonskimi otroki ter da drugi kakor prvi imajo enake pravice pred zakonom.

Dr. J. V. Deporte, direktor odbora za vitalno statistiko, je poročal, da se vsako leto narodno približno 100.000 nezakonskih otrok v Združenih državah in velika krivica je, da otrok, ki ni odgovoren za svoje rojstvo, je pred zakonom zaznamovan za nekakšno nižje bitje, kar mu dela ovire pri iskanju svobode in sreče.

Dr. Thomas F. Parran, ki je bil izvoljen za predsednika zveze, se je docela strinjal s tem stališčem in pripomnil je, če je izraz "nezakonski" sploh na mestu, tedaj velja bolj za roditelje kakor za otroke. Starši so morda nezakonski v smislu današnjih moralnih kodeksov, če niso postavno poročeni, ne pa otroci!

Spor v poljski jed-noti pred sodiščem

Poraženi kandidatje tožijo

Chicago. — Oster notranji boj v Poljski narodni zvezi, podporni organizaciji, je bil te dni prenešen pred čikaško sodišče. Pet kandidatov, ki so propadli pri volitvah gl. odbornikov na konvenciji v Baltimoru zadnji mesec, je 14. oktobra vložilo tožbo za razveljavitev volitev. Obtožnica se glasi, da so bile volitve sleparske in sploh vsi sklepi konvencije so neveljavni. Tožitelji zahtevajo, da sodišče odredi novo izredno konvencijo Poljske narodne zveze. Glavni tožitelji so: Maks Hencel, kandidat za gl. blagajnika, Mary Milewski, bivša podpredsednica, Jakob Twardzik, dr. Kalish in G. Piwoarczyk.

Poljska narodna zveza je že stara organizacija, ki šteje 280.000 članov in članke in njene zavarnovalnine za smrtnino znašajo čez 124 milijonov dolarjev.

Kampanja tekstilnih delavcev

Providence, R. I. — United Textile Workers of America, unija tekstilnih delavcev, je otvorila kampanjo z namenom, da organizira vse delavce v tekstilni industriji, zaeno pa je naznanila, da bo pritiskala na kongres, ko se ponovno sestane v zasedanju, da uveljavi nov zakon obnove za tekstilno industrijo.

Casopisni delavci za združitev z ADF

New York. — Tukajšnje krajevne unije časopisnih delavcev so z veliko večino odglasovale za pridružitve k Ameriški delavski federaciji. Na zadnji konvenciji Ameriške zveze reporterjev je bil sprejet predlog, da se organizacija pridruži ADF, ako se za to izrecno dve tretjini članstva.

V soboto zvečer na banketu tamburaši bratje Vrbanič, v nedeljo Paul Smith's CBC Orchestra, na popoldanskem programu pa Keith Beecherjev orkester za mlade in Puceljev trio za stare. Baritonist Anton Šubelj bo pel na banketu in pri nedeljskem programu.

Delavstvo na zapadu za novo stranko

Velik sentiment za program produkcije za rabo

St. Paul, Minn. — Med delavstvom v zapadnih državah se po izjavi H. Y. Williamsa, organizatorja Farmarsko-delavske politične federacije, naglo širi sentiment za ustanovitev nove stranke in za program produkcije za potrebo in ne za profit. On se je vrnil z daljše organizatorične ture.

Ugoden sentiment za novo politično gibanje je našel v Montani, Idahu, Oregonu, Utahu, Wyomingu in Nebraski. Zadnji konvenciji državnih delavskih federacij v Oregonu in Idahu sta se izrekli za delavsko stranko s striktno antikapitalistično platformo. Stranka naj bazira na unijah, farmarskih organizacijah in progresivnem elementu.

Reprezentativne konference so se vršile tudi v drugih navdanih državah, na katerih so razpravljali o vprašanju nove stranke. Vse konference so se izrekle za njeno ustanovitev, poroča Williams. Za novo stranko posebno delujejo vodje delavske federacije v Idahu.

Williams pravi, da je "new deal" izgubil vso privlačnost po zapadnih državah. Nekateri farmarski voditelji celo napovedujejo poraz Roosevelta. Bolj privlačen med delavstvom in farmarji pa postaja program produkcije za rabo, ki pomeni odpravo-profitnega sistema.

Če bo prišlo do ustanovitve nove stranke za prihodnje leto, Williams računa, da bo njen predsedniški kandidat potegnil od pet do deset milijonov glasov, stranka pa bo dobila od 40 do 100 kongresnikov. On tudi napoveduje popolno zmago nove stranke pri predsedniških volitvah leta 1940.

Ce se to Williamsovo prerokovanje že izpolni ali ne, sentiment za ustanovitev nove antikapitalistične stranke vsakekor narašča v deželi. Širi se ne samo na zapadu, marveč tudi na vzhodu in srednjem zapadu. O skupni politični akciji se je zadnje dni vršila konferenca v Wisconsinu med predstavniki državne delavske federacije, progresivne stranke (Amlejevega krila), organizacije brezposelnih, Farmarske unije in socialistične stranke. Zastopniki so na tem sestanku izmenjali mnenja ter izvolili posebni odbor, ki bo stvar nadalje pretrčeval.

Amerika mora nositi bakljo miru

Pokazati mora staremu svetu pot civilizacije, pravi Hull

Washington, D. C., 15. okt. — Ameriške države morajo dvigniti bakljo miru v imenu vsega sveta, je rekel državni tajnik Cordell Hull pred delegati Panameriškega inštituta zemljepisja in zgodovine, ki so se tu sešli na drugem splošnem zborovanju svoje organizacije.

Hull je poudarjal, da napeta situacija v drugih državah je resno svarilo za dežele zapadne hemisfere. On ni omenil sedanjega italijanske - abesinskega konflikta, izrekel pa je upanje, da bodo vse države zavrgle barbarško institucijo vojne, sumničjenja, nezaupanja ter sebične ambicije.

"Uverjen sem, da govorim v imenu vseh 21 držav na ameriškem kontinentu, če pravim, da smo vse za ohranitev miru," je rekel Hull. "Is tega razloga pozivam vse ostale države, da se nam pridružijo."

Hull je dalje rekel, da so ameriške države dale ostalemu svetu nauk prijateljske kooperacije in da je sedaj njihova dolžnost, da dvignejo bakljo miru in kažejo pot v civilizaciji.

"Mi moramo vzdržati občestvo narodov, ki se ne boji činov agresije in se ne pripravlja nanje, na podlagi politike nevtralnosti, katero je zavzela ameriška vlada," je dejal Hull. "S tem bomo zagotovili ostalemu svetu koristi civilizacije in pospešili splošen napredek ter ga dvignili na najvišjo stopnjo. Pogoji so tu, da ameriške države postavijo temelje civilizaciji, kakršne svet do danes še ni imel."

Japonska izkorišča evropsko krizo

Razširila bo svojo oblast nad Kitajsko

Singhaj, 15. okt. — Japonskim militaristom je zelo prav prišla sedanja kriza v Evropi zaradi Mussolinijeve vojne v Afriki. Očitno pravijo, da evropske velenile imajo zdaj polne roke dela doma in oni imajo lepo priliko, da "konsolidirajo" svojo oblast na Kitajskem ter odgriznejo še kak kos kitajskega teritorija.

Te dni so bile sklicane razne konference japonskih militaristov in diplomatov, ki so bile v Dairenu, Tientsinu, Peipingu in Singhaju in na katerih so razpravljali o "novi japonski politiki" na Kitajskem.

Stavka oljnih delavcev v Texasu

Zahtevajo zaprto delavnico in zvišanje mezde

Burkburnett, Tex. — (FP) — Okrog tisoč delavcev, članov Oil Field, Gas Well & Refinery Workers unije, je zastavkalo na oljnem polju ob meji te države in Oklahome. Njih zahteve vključujejo zvišanje mezde dvajset odstotkov, zaprto delavnico in izboljšanje delovnih pogojev.

Delavci so odglasovali za oklic stavke pred nekaj tedni, ko je potekla stara pogodba, a so jo odgodili v poskusu, da dosežejo dogovor z lastniki o enakosti. Vrhlo se je več konferenc in ko so oljne kompanije odklonile zahteve delavcev, so slednji zastavkali. V stavki je prišlo do številnih izredov, nakar je federalni departament za notranje zadeve napoznil, da bo odredil preiskavo. Pomožni tajnik notranjega departamenta je bil informiran, da so stavkarji zasigeli večjo zaogodinanja in zagrozili, da bodo pogonali oljnake v zrak, če ne bodo oljni magnati pristali na zahteve stavkarjev.

DVA TABORA NA KONVENCIJI FEDERACIJE

Vprašanje industrijskega unionizma v ospredju

BOJEVITOST DELEGATOV

Atlantic City. — (FP) — Takoj po otvoritvi konvencije Ameriške delavske federacije se je pokazalo, da se bo vrtil ljut boj o važnih vprašanjih, katere bodo morali rešiti delegatje ta teden.

Opozicija, ki zahteva revizijo oficijelne politike federacije, ima veliko pristašev med delegati. Novi člani, ki so prišli v federacijo v zadnjih dveh letih, zahtevajo organiziranje delavcev v industrijah masne produkcije v industrijskih unijah. V tem boju jih podpira John J. Lewis, predsednik rudarske unije UMWA, in nekatere druge grupe, ki pri sedanjih sestavi eksekutivnega odbora ADF nimajo odločilne besede.

Prvo polmensko glasovanje je odkrilo možnost poraza stališča, ki ga zavzema eksekutiva. McDonoughova grupa gradbenih unij, ki predstavlja sama na sebi neznatno manjšino med stavnimi unijami, je dobila podporo bloka industrijskih unij, ki je bil dan na glasovanje predlog, da se odgodi akcija, ali naj dobi sedež na konvenciji J. W. Williams, vodja nasprotnih grup gradbenih unij, katerega podpira Green, predsednik federacije.

Analiza 250 resolucij, ki so bile predložene konvenciji, kaže militantnost delegatov, kakršne ni bilo opaziti na prejšnjih konvencijah. Med temi resolucijami jih je okrog trideset, ki zagovarjajo načelo industrijskega unionizma. Nekatere mednarodne unije, med temi International Ladies Garment Workers, so se izrekle za ustanovitev delavske stranke.

Delegatje, ki zborujejo v času, ko je Italija pričela z invazijo Abesinije, so prepričani, da sta fašizem in vojna dve vprašanji, katerima se ne morejo izogniti. Green je v svojem otvoritvenem govoru zavzel stališče stroge nevtralnosti, kljub temu pa je bilo predloženo več resolucij, da ameriško delavstvo podpira Abesinijo in da Amerika sodeluje pri izvajanju sankcij proti fašistični Italiji. J. A. Haydon, brataški delegat iz Kanade, je dejal, da bo kanadsko organizirano delavstvo podpiralo Britski kongres strokovnih unij, ki se je izrekel za izvajanje sankcij proti Italiji.

Javnopravna družba v škripih

El Paso, Tex. — El Paso Electric Co. se je ujela v past, katero je sama nastavila. Ne-unijski delavci so namreč zapretili s stavko, ako ne bo odpuštila unionistov. Slednji so bili ponovno upošteni, ko je moral družba priznati unijo po stavki, ki je pred nekaj meseci ustavila obrat elektrarne. Stavkarji pa niso izvojevali zaprte delavnice in kompanija je začela najemati nove moči z namenom, da udari unioniste, ko pride ugoden moment. Pred nekaj dnevi je kompanija krčila dogovor, nakar je unija zapretila s stavko. M. C. Smith, predsednik kompanije, se je grožnje ustrašil in pristal na pogajanja. Ta akcija pa je razburila neunioniste, ki se bojijo, da bodo ostali osamljeni, in iz tega razloga so tudi oni zapretili s stavko.

Liberalci v Kanadi zmagali pri volitvah

Dobili so večino v federalni zbornici

Ottawa, Ont., Kanada, 15. okt. — Sedem socialistov je bilo večraj izvoljenih v kanadski parlament.

Ottawa, Ont., Kanada, 15. okt. — Včeraj so bile splošne volitve po vsej Kanadi in liberalna stranka, katero vodi Mackenzie King, je odnesla zmago. Konservativci s premierjem Richardom B. Bennettom na čelu so ostali v veliki manjšini.

Volilni rezultat o polnoči je stal takole: liberalci 158 mandator, konservativci 38, Liga socialnega kredita 12 in ostale stranke 11. Vseh sedežev v federalni zbornici je 245. V prejšnji zbornici so konservativci imeli 132 poslancev.

Konservativna vlada pod Bennettom, ki je bila v sedlu od leta 1930, je do neke meje posnemala Rooseveltov "New Deal".

(Rezultat volitev v Kanadi pomeni, da se je vrnila reakcija na krmilo. Kanadski liberalci so v resnici največji reaktorji.)

Federacija obso-dila religne mezde

"Demoraliziranje življenjskega standarda"

Lansing, Mich. — (FP) — John Reid, tajnik-blagajnik državne delavske federacije, je pozval organizirano delavstvo, naj energično protestira proti niskim mezdam, ki jih je federalna administracija relignih del določila pri relignih projektih.

"Vzdržitev ali restavriranje dostojnih mezd v tem času je fundamentalnega pomena ne samo za ameriškega delavca, temveč tudi za gospodarsko okrevanje dežele," pravi Reid v svojem pozivu.

"Mezde, ki jih je določila federalna administracija relignih del, bodo rezultirale v demoralizaciji meznega standarda delavcev, ki so sedaj upošteni v privatnih industrijah. Delovne ure pri relignih projektih je treba znižati in zvišati mezde, da se doseže sorazmerje z mezdami, ki jih plačujejo privatne industrije za slična dela."

Pred nekaj tedni so imeli predstavniki stavbinskih unij konferenco v Lansingu, na kateri so protestirali proti relignim mezdam. Frank B. Wade, komisar državnega delavskega departamenta, je bil izvoljen za predsednika konference kot uradni krajevne gradbene unije.

Mesto prevzelo vse javne naprave

Austin, Minn. — S tem, ko je to mesto prevzelo pod svojo kontrolo distribucijo naravnega plina, je postalo lastnik vseh javnih naprav v svojem področju. Voda, razsvetljava, električna sila in sedaj plin — vse to je lastnina občine. Mesto je plačalo \$162.500 privatnim interesom, ki so imele kontrolo nad razpčevanjem plina, iz dobička, katerega mu je prineslo dosedanje obratovanje mestne elektrarne in drugih javnih naprav.

Francoška vlada zatira italijanski sentiment

Pariz, 15. okt. — Francoška vlada je včeraj pritiskala na reakcionarne, fašistične in napol fašistične časopise, ki slavijo Mussolinija in strahovito napadajo sankcije in Anglijo. Danes se je že opazila velika razlika v tonu pisanja teh listov. Norčevanje iz Abesincev in napadi na Anglijo so precej omiljeni.

LIGA NARODOV PREPOVEDALA KREDITE ITALIJI

Zeneva se pripravlja na izvajanje ekonomskih sankcij

ABESINSKA "SVETA VOJNA"

Zeneva, 15. okt. — Zeneva je bila včeraj priča intenzivnih diplomatskih aktivnosti, izvirajočih iz spora med zagovorniki dveh različnih filozofij — ali naj Liga narodov deluje kot mirovna mašinerija ali pa naj se po stari evropski navadi pripravi za odločen boj.

Na videz izgleda, da bo Liga narodov v kratkem času pričela izvajati ekonomske sankcije proti Italiji, da prisili Mussolinija na umik in ustavi njegovo militaristično kampanjo v Afriki. To je pokazalo glasovanje, ko je Ligin komitej za izvajanje sankcij, katerega tvorijo reprezentanti 50 držav, odobril resolucijo, da se ustavijo vsi krediti Italiji.

Ta resolucija je vsebovala tudi klavzulo, nanašajočo se na bančne in vse druge kredite, ki prepuščejo tudi običajne trgovske kredite Italiji, ki so bistvenega pomena za mednarodno trgovino.

Komitej je sprejel nadaljnji resoluciji, ki ju je predložila britska delegacija. Prva določa, da države, veljane v Ligi narodov, prične izvajati ekonomske sankcije najpozneje 31. oktobra.

Druga resolucija se nanaša na tretji odstavek XVI. člena Liginega konvencanta, ki določa medsebojno pomoč članice Lige narodov pri izvajanju ekonomskih sankcij. S sprejetjem te resolucije je bilo dano zagotovilo Rumuniji in drugim malim državam, katerih gospodarstvo bi trpelo veliko škodo v slučaju preloma trgovinskih odnosov z Italijo, da bodo prejeli nekakšno odškodnino.

Da bo Liga narodov naletela na velike poteškoče pri izvajanju sankcij, se je pokazalo včeraj, ko so predstavniki Argentine izjavili, da ne bodo sodelovali z Ligo narodov v tem oziru, ker v Argentini živi veliko številu Italijanov. Iz tega razloga je moral komitej za sankcije revidirati točko v resoluciji, ki se sedaj glasi, da bo morala Argentina usoglasiti zakonodajo glede sankcij z določbami svoje ustave. Kar dela preglatve zagovornikom sankcij, je možnost, da se bodo Argentini pridružile druge države Južne Amerike — Čile, Peru, Venezuela in Urugvaj. Avstrija, Ogrska in Albanija so že prej izjavile, da ne bodo sodelovale pri izvajanju ekonomskih sankcij proti Italiji.

Svica je tudi ugotovila, da bi sodelovanje v izvajanju sankcij bilo v nasprotju z njeno ustavo. Iz tega razloga je komitej osemnajstotice imenoval pododsek, kateremu je poveril proučevanje legalnih in ustavnih vprašanj, da pridobi države, ki se upirajo izvajanju sankcij proti Italiji, na svojo stran.

Se večje preglatve dela Lige narodov nespornost med Anglijo in Francijo, ki ga je izzvalo vprašanje embarga na izvoz italijanskega blaga. Tak embargo bi bil v resnici učinkovita ekonomska sankcija proti Italiji, toda tej akciji se Francija upira.

Resolucija, ki prepoveduje finančne kredite Italiji, je važnega zgodovinskega pomena, da si prevladuje mnenje, da ne bo imela velikega učinka na obstoječo situacijo.

Washington, D. C. — (FP) — Tri do štiri milijone brezdomskih Američanov se kladi po deželi brez vsakega cilja. Od vseh tragedij, ki so posledica dolge depresije, je ta najbolj najbolj žalostna. Depresija jih je poglajala na cesto, ko so izgubili svoje domove v Pennsylvaniji, New Yorku, Ohiju, Illinoisu in drugih industrijskih državah. Postali so žrtve ekonomskega sistema in se sedaj kladijo po deželi.

Na vsakem tovornem vlaku in na cestah človek naleti na grupe mladih in starejših ljudi, katerim življenje ne nudi tistih priložnosti, ki so jih pričakovali. Tako se vozijo ali tavajo od mesta do mesta brez cilja. Celotno glad in začasno bivanje v zaporih ne naredita "domov", ki so jih zapustili, bolj vabljivih. Ceste, po katerih potujejo, jim nudijo vsaj vedno nove prizore.

Federalna vlada je ustanovila večje število taborišč in zavodov, v katerih najdejo brezdomci začasno zavetje, toda s tem še ni rešila problema. Iz tega razloga je naznanila, da bo zaprla te zavode, brezdomce pa izročila v oskrbo krajevnim dobrodelnim organizacijam, ki se doslej še niso bavile s tem problemom in je gotovo, da ga ne bodo mogle rešiti.

Formalne deklaracije ni bilo iz razloga, ker je ni bilo treba. Trgovinski odbor je samo razveljavil embargo glede pošiljanja orožja Abesiniji, zaeno pa je namignil, da trgovci z orožjem in municijo ne bodo dobili dovoljenja za pošiljanje orožja Italiji.

Resolucija, da se ustavijo krediti Italiji, ki je bila sprejeta v Zenevi, ni imela nobenega učinka na poslovanje angleške borze. Sprejeta je bila mirno na znanje, kajti Italija je bila že pred nekaj meseci informirana, da ne bo dobila finančnih kreditov v Angliji.

Addis Ababa, 15. okt. — Cesar Selassie se je jokal, ko je bil informiran, da so Italijani včeraj okupirali Aksum, "sveto mesto" Abesinije. Takoj je pozval v avdienco škofa abesinske cerkve in mu poveril nalogo, naj okliče "sveto vojno" ter organizira veliko armado, ki naj iztra Aksum iz rok italijanskega vojaštva.

Conference Comments

On Saturday, Nov. 2, the first conference of the English speaking lodges of the Slovene National Benefit Society will meet in Chicago at the Society's Head Office, in what promises to be the most momentous session in the history of our ten year old Youth Movement.

The conference has been called by the Supreme board last August, (1) to fittingly commemorate the Tenth Anniversary of the English speaking movement of the SNPJ, and (2), to appropriately observe the tenth milestone of the Society's first English speaking lodge—the Pioneers of Chicago.

A more fitting and appropriate name could not have been selected for the first youth group organized under the banner of the Slovene National Benefit Society than the name "Pioneers" which the initial lodge bears and so loyally lives up to its meaning. It was the Pioneers, who more than any other single group of the Order, so courageously led the way and showed the rest of the English speaking units that nothing is impossible, that every obstacle can be surmounted and new records can be made. Their indomitable will to achieve new records is synonymous with their name.

Advocating an additional page in our proposed Anniversary Number of the Prosveta last week, we had in mind the many phases of our fraternal endeavors which should be justly treated on occasion of this type—the tenth anniversary of our united efforts embracing the entire Youth Movement in general and the tenth anniversary of the first youth local in particular. For it was this local's untiring preparations for their celebration that prompted the calling of a conference. The two aspects—the conference and celebration—of our two day commemoration in November, deserve the most earnest, loyal and undivided cooperation of every member of the organization, young and old alike.

At the first conference of the English speaking locals, problems of vital importance to youth and the organization will be discussed and considered by delegates from all parts of the organization's jurisdiction. Ways and means of promoting the organization of the Slovene progressive workers and spreading its message among our young people on a greater scale than ever before will be among the problems on the conference's program.

The entire membership of the SNPJ as well as the entire Slovene fraternal world will watch the results of our conference with the greatest interest. Therefore, let us work and build unitedly and constructively for the advancement of our movement and the organization.

To Our English Speaking Delegate

NOVEMBER SECOND, the day on which the conference of delegates representing English speaking lodges is to be held in Chicago, is rapidly approaching. No doubt, many of the delegates can hardly wait for this great event which shall be the first of its kind in the history of the Slovene National Benefit Society.

In order to eliminate unnecessary arguments and devote all available time to the discussion of vital problems of the Society, it should be understood that this body will have no legal authority to make any changes of the by-laws; this will not be a convention but a conference. Nevertheless, through this gathering, we may anticipate that many important features will be discussed which will be beneficial to the future development of our Society, and, therefore, it is our duty to give this venture all our moral support.

If you—Brother and Sister Delegate—will comprehend the importance of this meeting and utilize this enterprise for the general benefit of our Society, then you will fulfill your duty, and money spent for this purpose shall be well invested.

Our organization has outgrown all other Slovene fraternal societies, because we have among us conscientious agitators believing in our principles and willing to do their share for the Society. It is hoped that our youth shall follow the same road, which is the right road, and which shall surely lead to success.

Let us dedicate this gathering to the Youth Movement with a solemn pledge to protect the principles upon which this Society has endured for over thirty years, and let us also preserve personal freedom within our organization in the future as well as in the past.

Detroit, Mich.—Being elected delegate to the E. S. Lodge Conference in Chicago on November 2 and 3, I will endeavor to do all that I can to help make the conference a success, whether this be by means of participating in active discussions and listening and recording those points which are important and should be brought back to the lodge members, or, as is the best policy in some cases, by just listening and recording.

Bro. Vincent A. Straus was elected as alternate.

The conference program should, in my opinion, be discussed in the following order based on their successive merits:

1. History of the SNPJ. This report would serve as a base, and naturally should come first, because it is a means of presenting to the delegates the original background of the founding of the SNPJ. Some of the founders' main problems and their solutions should be included in the delegates' report on this subject.

2. A general review of the work of the past ten years. This report should contain the various ways and means that have been used, whether successfully or unsuccessfully, to bring the SNPJ where it is today.

3. How to attract members to our meetings. This subject is one about which all the others center. Without members at the meetings, our plans, irrespective of their qualities, would be useless. A sufficient group of members must be attracted to the meeting in order to give proper consideration to any plans or matters that may arise. Some of the various methods of attracting members to the meetings that have been tried are: debates between lodge members on important questions of the day; door prizes; and, free dancing and refreshments following the meeting.

4. How to conduct dignified meetings. This point is a natural successor to the former and depends almost entirely upon the officers and especially the chairman.

5. Athletics, do we need them? Do we need them? And how! Athletics seem to be in most lodges one of the best means of securing members. Athletics serve to bring members into a closer bond of friendship; to work and fight for one another, in other words, it breeds fraternalism which is one of the main purposes of the lodge.

6. Proposals for concerted group activities and the part the Head Office should take in them. Concerted group activities would greatly tend to bring members of different cities into closer contact with each other.

and would make the SNPJ a more compact body of fraternalism. A governing body would be necessary whether it be the Head Office itself or one appointed by it and subject to the approval of the majority of the lodges.

7. Problems arising in the solicitation of new members. Members intending to join the SNPJ naturally wish to know what benefits they can derive from the lodge, outside of fraternalism, which they could not better for the same price from the insurance companies. Members and secretaries, especially, should be shown just what advantages the SNPJ policy has over that of the insurance company. Arguments in favor of the SNPJ policies should be printed in the Prosveta so that members and secretaries can have additional matter to induce prospective members to join. With the exception of special campaigns, are our initiation fees too high?

8. Mapping a new campaign.

9. Do we need reorganization of our forces.

10. Advice to secretaries. As a rule, most secretaries are ignorant of the majority of the matter contained in the By-Laws. Secretaries, after being elected, should be subjected to some sort of a test that would make them better acquainted with the By-Laws.

11. What about publicity? Our activities in the field of sports will take care of the greater part of our publicizing as it has been done in the past. Such affairs as dances and picnics also are a great asset in attracting members to our lodges.

12. Summer school education.

13. How to shorten conventions.

14. Should federations have more authority?

Bro. Andrew Gram's suggestion that all delegates to the convention contribute twenty-five cents to placing a complimentary ad in the Pioneer's Anniversary Booklet is very appropriate and I am sure that all the other delegates will agree to it.

4. "Advice to Secretaries"—by Andrew Gram.
5. "How to Attract Members to Our Meetings"—by John Matekovich.
6. "Athletics—Do We Need Them?"—by John Lokar.
7. "Proposals for Concerted Group Activities and the Part Supreme Officers Should Take in Them"—by Marion Konchan.
8. "What About Publicity?"—by John Spiller.
9. "Federations—Should They Have More Authority?"—by Frank Kress.
10. "Economic Problems—How they Affect Administration and Activities of our Organization"—by Oscar Godina.

From some of the delegates selected to prepare reports on the above topics we have no confirmation of acceptance. It may be that some are not in position to accept, and in that case it will be necessary to make some changes.

Originally, there were fourteen topics proposed for discussion. Cause and Cure of Depressions

(Continued)

The wages were—and are—in barely sufficient quantities, only enough that the people could work, marry and reproduce. Their off-springs then went through the same "educational mill" and became "faithful, loyal workers" to take their parents' places on the jobs when they were discarded to the scrap heap.

In order to obtain these needs it was necessary for the people to have jobs. In order for the people to have jobs with any degree of regularity, it was necessary for the Capitalist to somehow dispose of the Surplus—what the workers produced and didn't get. The Surplus—in this country for example, was used in the building up of the West, in building railroads, factories, buildings, etc. Later on, the electrification and trustification of industry, the waste of the Spanish-American War, automobile and radio industries, mergers, etc.—all at various times helped to pull America out of depressions—or panics as they were called in the "good old days." This country was experiencing a slump in 1914 when the World War began and the huge market there helped to pull it out of the slump. In addition—the United States as well as other foreign capitalist countries—disposed of their surplus in new undeveloped lands, the East and South America. It is now a well known fact that the Spanish-American and the World Wars were simply the culmination of continuous struggles for favored trade concessions and trade routes of competing capitalists of various countries. The irony of it is that countries which were previously the dumping grounds for the surplus of other countries, now have built up their capital structure, produce a surplus themselves, and are giving healthy competition to the other producing countries. Japan is a good example of this. If one thinks that Japanese Capitalists aren't thorns in the sides of other Capitalists, he should watch the daily papers in this country for about six months. He will note how many industries are being hurt by Japanese competition not only in this country, but they are stealing the show in South America and elsewhere. You see Japan's trade union movement is very weak!

Now obviously, from what has been said before, the solution to the problem lies in the elimination of the Surplus. That is, workers must receive the full value of their labor in order to buy back what they produce. It is just as obvious that it cannot be expected under the present set-up, which is called Capitalism. No private or corporate enterprise will function without profit, because that is the incentive under which operates. It therefore follows that democratic ownership and management of such enterprises must be transferred to those from whom the profits are wrung, the workers, because it is to their interest that it be done.
