**Brezdomci naraščajo v Ameriki**

**Federalna vlada je opustila reševanje tega problema**

Washington, D. C. — (FP) — Tri do štiri milijone brezdomskih Američanov se klati po deželi brez vsakega cilja. Od vseh tragedij, ki so posledica dolge depresije, je ta najbrž najbolj žalostna. Depresija jih

je pognila na cesto, ko so izgubili svoje domove v Pensilvaniji, New Yorku, Ohiu, Illinoisu in drugih industrijskih državah. Postali so žrtve ekonomskega sistema in se sedaj klatijo po deželi.

Na vsakem tovornem vlaku in na cestah človek naleti na grupe mladih in starejših ljudi, katerim življenje ne nudi tistih priložnosti, ki so jih pričakovali. Tako se vozijo ali tavaajo od mesta do mesta brez cilja. Celo glad in začasno bivanje v zapori ne naredita "domov", ki so jih zapustili, bolj vabilivih. Česte, po katerih potujejo, jim nudijo vsaj vedno nove prizore.

Federalna vlada je ustavnova večje število taborišč in zavodov, v katerih najdejo brezdomci začasno zavetje, toda s tem ne je rešila problema. Iz tega razloga je naznanila, da bo zaprla te zavode, brezdomce pa izročila v oskrbo krajevnim dobrodelnim organizacijam, ki se doslej še niso bavile s tem problemom in je gotovo, da ga ne bodo mogle rešiti.

**Nemški kapitalisti  
grmadijo profite**

Berlin. — Kapitalizem dobro uspeva v Hitlerjevem tretjem rajhu, kar kažejo davčna poročila, katera je objavila nacistična ekonomika služba. Plače, ki so jih prejeli preteklo leto direktorji in drugi vodilni uradniki industrijskih koncernov v Nemčiji, so bili pretekla leta 30 odstotkov višje nego l. 1933. Ta porast je dosegel že višjo točko v prvi polovici tega leta. Profiti nemških korporacij so narastli 50 odstotkov l. 1934, dočim je kupna sila delavstva padla zaradi stalnega naraščanja cen živilskih potrebi. To je dokaz, da nemški kapitalisti grmadijo profite na račun delavstva.

Sprejeto, da se od gl. predsednika zahteva pojasnilo, zakaj zadržuje iniciativu društva Badgers 584, ker po tolikem času ni prišla v javnost.

## Liga narodov prepovedala kredit Italiji

včeraj v veljavu, ko je vladni trgovinski odbor naznani, da trgovci, ki hočejo pošiljati orožje in municijo Abesiniji, to lahko storje in jim ni treba vprašati za dovoljenje.

Formalne deklaracije ni bilo iz razloga, ker je ni bilo treba. Trgovinski odbor je samo razveljavil embargo glede pošiljanja orožja Abesiniji, zaeno pa je namignil, da trgovci z orožjem in municijo ne bodo dobili dovoljenja za pošiljanje orožja Italiji.

Resolucija, da se ustavijo krediti Italiji, ki je bila sprejeta v Zenevi, ni imela nobenega učinka na poslovanje angleške borze. Sprejeta je bila mirno na znanje, kajti Italija je bila že pred nekaj meseci informirana, da ne bo dobila finančnih kreditov v Angliji.

Addis Abeba, 15. okt. — Cesar Selassie se je jokal, ko je bil informiran, da so Italijani včeraj okupirali Aksum, "sveto mesto" Abesinije. Takoj je pozval v avdijenco škofa abessinske cerkve in mu poveril nalog, naj okliče "sveto vojno" ter organizira veliko armado, ki naj iztrga Aksum iz rok italijanskega vojaštva.

Skof, ki se je tudi razjokal, je objuhil, da bo razširil vest o okupaciji "svetega mesta" po vseh deželi in pozval vernike, naj naprej vse sile, da pride do spet pod kontrolo Abesinije. Ta poziv bo nedvomno podprt verski fanatizem in povzročil velik armado, ki naj iztrga Aksum iz rok italijanskega vojaštva.

Izdaja svoje publikacije in še posebno list Prosveva za karisti, ter po tevno agitacijo svojih društev in za propagando sive in bele. Nikakor pa ne za propagando drugih podprtih organizacij. Vsaka organizacija ima običajno svoje glasilo. Torej agitatorjeni depisi in naznania drugih podprtih organizacij in njih društev naj se ne pošiljajo listu Prosveva.

## Problem naših mladih

Spored prve konference delegatov angleško poslujočih društev SNPJ, vršeče se v soboto, 2. novembra, v dvorani SNPJ v Chicagu, kot je bil sprejet po gl. upravnem odseku, vsebuje sledeče točke:

1. Splošen pregled dela v zadnjih desetih letih.
2. Problemi, ki izvirajo iz pridobivanja novih članov.
3. Zgodovina in načela SNPJ.
4. Nasveti društvenim tajnikom.
5. Kako privabiti članstvo na seje.
6. Atletika — ali nam je potrebna?
7. Priporočila za masne aktivnosti in dolžnosti gl. odbornikov v tem oziru.
8. Vprašanje publicitete.
9. Ali naj imajo federacije več moći?
10. Ekonomski vprašanja, kako vplivajo na posovanje in aktivnosti naših jednot.

Teh deset točk, o katerih vsaka pomeni referat zase, obsegata toliko važnega materiala, toliko važnih problemov za vse članstvo SNPJ in ne samo za mladinska društva, da jih je nemogoče obdelati v enem dnevu, če bi jih hoteli poročevalci korenito izčrpali. Samo prva točka o splošnem pregledu dela v zadnjih desetih letih bi vzela najmanj dve uri časa, če bi hotel govornik podrobno naslikati vso natrpanost kolosalnega dela, ki je bilo izvršeno samo pri nekaterih društvenih načih jednot.

Prav tako, kakor prva, so važne vse ostale točke programa. Na primer priporočila za nove aktivnosti, problem novega članstva, kako storiti seje atraktivne in splošni ekonomski problemi ter njih vplivi na nadaljnji razvoj SNPJ; ali atletika, ki se je pri večini naše mladine, kakor pri ameriški mladini v splošnem, vseplila v meso in kri. Enako važna je točka o zgodovini in principih SNPJ. Ali ve naša mladina, koliko dela, truda, boja in požrtvovanja je stala SNPJ nje očete in matere predno je bila postavljena na trdne noge zdravega razvoja in napredka? Kdor še ne ve, bi—moral vedeti. Kajti kdor ne pozna zgodovine in načela SNPJ, ta ne pozna svoje jednot.

Z ozirom na veliko važnost vseh teh točk in na omejen čas konference ne preostaja nič drugača kakor to, da se referentje omeje le na jedra predloženih vprašanj. Vsako nepotrebno in ponavljano besediljenje mora izostati in pred očmi je treba imeti le fakte. Upam, da se bodo mladi referenti zavedali tega in povoljno izvršili svoje naloge.

Namen tega članka je, opozoriti članstvo v splošnem na veliko važnost problemov, ki čakajo naše mlade. Čeprav bo novembrska konferenca le posvetovalnega značaja, smo že poučili in zdaj ponovno poudarjam, da je lahko velikega pomena za našo prihodnjo konvencijo in bodoča zborovanja, na katerih se bodo spreminjala pravila in določale smernice poslovanja in gospodarstva SNPJ. Velika večina delegatov se bo tudi zavedala tega dejstva in predložila na konferenco z resno voljo in trdno determinacijo, ne pa kar tako tja v en dan, kakor da gredo na sportno zabavo.

Casi, v katerih danes živimo, so resni. Vse človeštvo je v kolosalnem konfliktu s seboj, z načinom starega življenja. Amerika, katera del smo, je danes silen laboratorij ekonomskega in socialnega presnavljanja. Kdor ne vidi ali nečo videti tega laboratorija, je z njim nekaj narobe.

In nam, ki smo organizirani v SNPJ, ne morebiti vseeno, kako bo to veliko presnavljanje ameriške družbe prizadelo nas in našo organizacijo. Mi se ne moremo izključiti iz sistema ameriške družbe; notri smo, v osrčju ameriških razmer, ki nas vrte in vlečejo s seboj — kam? To je vprašanje!

To vprašanje se bolj tiče naših mladih—kakor nas-starih. Jutri ali pojutrišnjem bomo mi starci doigrati svoje vloge, ampak teater življenja s tem ne bo odigran. Življenje, Amerika, boj za obstanek pojde naprej.

Nova generacija ima lahko svoje ideje in načrte, ki bodo bolj od naših, toda nekaj nam mora priznati. Mi imamo izkušnje. Zato je pravilno in potrebno, da se mladi uči iz naših izkušenj. Na ta način se bodo bolje usposobili za velike probleme, ki jih čakajo in lažo bodo rešili veliko vprašanje: Kam?

Cikaška konferenca je lahko mogočen korak do tega usposobljenja.

## Conference Comments

On Saturday, Nov. 2, the first conference of the English speaking lodges of the Slovene National Benefit Society will meet in Chicago at the Society's Head Office, in what promises to be the most momentous session in the history of our ten year old Youth Movement.

The conference has been called by the Supreme board last August, (1) to fittingly commemorate the Tenth Anniversary of the English speaking movement of the SNPJ, and (2), to appropriately observe the tenth milestone of the Society's first English speaking lodge—the Pioneers of Chicago.

A more fitting and appropriate name could not have been selected for the first youth group organized under the banner of the Slovene National Benefit Society than the name "Pioneers" which the initial lodge bears and so loyally lives up to its meaning. It was the Pioneers, who more than any other single group of the Order, so courageously led the way and showed the rest of the English speaking units that nothing is impossible, that every obstacle can be surmounted and new records can be made. Their indomitable will to achieve new records is synonymous with their name.

Advocating an additional page in our proposed Anniversary Number of the Prosvesha last week, we had in mind the many phases of our fraternal endeavors which should be justly treated on occasion of this type—the tenth anniversary of our united efforts embracing the entire Youth Movement in general and the tenth anniversary of the first youth local in particular. For it was this local's untiring preparations for their celebration that prompted the calling of a conference. The two aspects—the conference and celebration—of our two day commemoration in November, deserve the most earnest, loyal and undivided cooperation of every member of the organization, young and old alike.

At the first conference of the English speaking locals, problems of vital importance to youth and the organization will be discussed and considered by delegates from all parts of the organization's jurisdiction. Ways and means of promoting the organization of the Slovene progressive workers and spreading its message among our young people on a greater scale than ever before will be among the problems on the conference's program.

The entire membership of the SNPJ as well as the entire Slovene fraternal world will watch the results of our conference with the greatest interest. Therefore, let us work and build unitedly and constructively for the advancement of our movement and the organization.

## To Our English Speaking Delegate

NOVEMBER SECOND, the day on which the conference of delegates representing English speaking lodges is to be held in Chicago, is rapidly approaching. No doubt, many of the delegates can hardly wait for this great event which shall be the first of its kind in the history of the Slovene National Benefit Society.

In order to eliminate unnecessary arguments and devote all available time to the discussion of vital problems of the Society, it should be understood that this body will have no legal authority to make any changes of the by-laws; this will not be a convention but a conference. Nevertheless, through this gathering, we may anticipate that many important features will be discussed which will be beneficial to the future development of our Society, and, therefore, it is our duty to give this venture all our moral support.

If you—Brother and Sister Delegate—will comprehend the importance of this meeting and utilize this enterprise for the general benefit of our Society, then you will fulfill your duty, and money spent for this purpose shall be well invested.

Our organization has outgrown all other Slovene fraternal societies, because we have among us conscientious agitators believing in our principles and willing to do their share for the Society. It is hoped that our youth shall follow the same road, which is the right road, and which shall surely lead to success.

Let us dedicate this gathering to the Youth Movement with a solemn pledge to protect the principles upon which this Society has endured for over thirty years, and let us also preserve personal freedom within our organization in the future as well as in the past.

## Wolverine News

Detroit, Mich.—Being elected delegate to the E. S. Lodge Conference in Chicago on November 2 and 3, I will endeavor to do all that I can to help make the conference a success, whether this be by means of participating in active discussions and listening and recording those points which are important and should be brought back to the lodge members, or, as is the best policy in some cases, by just listening and recording.

Bro. Vincent A. Straus was elected as alternate.

The conference program should, in my opinion, be discussed in the following order based on their successive merits:

1. History of the SNPJ. This report would serve as a base, and naturally should come first, because it is a means of presenting to the delegates the original background of the founding of the SNPJ. Some of the founders' main problems and their solutions should be included in the delegates' report on this subject.

2. A general review of the work of the past ten years. This report should contain the various ways and means that have been used, whether successfully or unsuccessfully, to bring the SNPJ where it is today.

3. How to attract members to our meetings. This subject is one about which all the others center. Without members at the meetings, our plans, irrespective of their qualities, would be useless. A sufficient group of members must be attracted to the meeting in order to give proper consideration to any plans or matters that may arise. Some of the various methods of attracting members to the meetings that have been tried are: debates between lodge members on important questions of the day; door prizes; and, free dancing and refreshments following the meeting.

4. How to conduct dignified meetings. This point is a natural successor to the former and depends almost entirely upon the officers and especially the chairman.

5. Athletics, do we need them? Do we need them? And how! Athletics seem to be in most lodges one of the best means of securing members. Athletics serve to bring members into a closer bond of friendship; to work and fight for one another, in other words, it breeds fraternalism which is one of the main purposes of the lodge.

6. Proposals for concerted group activities and the part the Head Office should take in them. Concerted group activities would greatly tend to bring members of different cities into closer contact with each other.

and would make the SNPJ a more compact body of fraternalism. A governing body would be necessary whether it be the Head Office itself or one appointed by it and subject to the approval of the majority of the lodges.

7. Problems arising in the solicitation of new members. Members intending to join the SNPJ naturally wish to know what benefits they can derive from the lodge, outside of fraternalism, which they could not better for the same price from the insurance companies. Members and secretaries, especially, should be shown just what advantages the SNPJ policy has over that of the insurance company. Arguments in favor of the SNPJ policies should be printed in the Prosvesha so that members and secretaries can have additional matter to induce prospective members to join. With the exception of special campaigns, are our initiation fees too high?

8. Mapping a new campaign.

9. Do we need reorganization of our forces.

10. Advice to secretaries. As a rule, most secretaries are ignorant of the majority of the matter contained in the By-Laws. Secretaries, after being elected, should be subjected to some sort of a test that would make them better acquainted with the By-Laws.

11. What about publicity? Our activities in the field of sports will take care of the greater part of our publicizing as it has been done in the past. Such affairs as dances and picnics also are a great asset in attracting members to our lodges.

12. Summer school education.

13. How to shorten conventions.

14. Should federations have more authority?

Bro. Andrew Grum's suggestion that all delegates to the convention contribute twenty-five cents to place a complimentary ad in the Pioneer's Anniversary Booklet is very appropriate and I am sure that all the other delegates will agree to it.
