Obiski v Jugoslaviji

Kaj so izletniki SNPJ videli in slišali na svojih potih po Sloveniji, Hrvaški in Balkanu in kaj zdaj pravijo

Večina izletnikov SNPJ je že doma v Ameriki ali na potu domov in Jugoslavija, v kateri so se najdlje mudili, je ostala daleč za njimi. Vtisi, ki smo jih dobili tamkaj, so zdaj večidel permanentni, to je, ne bodo se bistveno spremenili, dokler človek vnovič ne obišče istih krajev in doživi kaj drugega.

Nekaj izletnikov je že povedalo svoje misli v Prosveti in drugih listih; mnogi bodo še pisali. Seveda, vsak lahko sodi po svoje, kajti vsakdo ima svoje oči in svoje mogočane. Ako bi rekli, da je vse lepo in idealno, bi se zlagali; pretiral pa bi tudi, če bi slika vse črno. Priznati moram, da sem prišel v Jugoslavijo z mnogimi predsodki. Nekateri sem zavrgel, ko sem spoznal, da nisem utemeljeni, dočim so se drugi upravičeno utrdili. Podčrtati pa moram eno dejstvo: premalo časa sem bil tam in nisem videl vsega, da bi mogel narediti željeno sodbo o vsem. Opirati se moram torej le na to, kar sem sam videl, slišal in doživel, obenem pa moram upoštevati mnenje drugih izletnikov, ki so tudi imeli odprte oči in ušesa — in razgovori s temi so pokazali, da se večinoma strinjamo v naših sodbah. Vseled tega ne bo nič napakega, če rečem, da lepo številno naših izletnikov deli z menoj svoje vtise iz Jugoslavije.

Največ Jugoslavije smo videli v tednu od 28. julija do 5. avgusta, ko smo se vozili po Dolenjski, Hrvaški, Dalmaciji, po Jadriškem morju in po Črni gori do Cetinja in nazaj čez Hercegovino, Bosno, severno Srbijo in Slavonijo do Zagreba. To je bila slikovita pot, ki nas je vodila ob panorami najrazličnejših ljudstev, krajev in klime. Prišli smo iz hladne Slovenije v napol tropične kraje, kjer rastejo palme, smokve in ciprese in kjer razkrijajo svoj fini vonj čeli govori prekrasnih oleandrov. To je jadrska obala s svojimi letovišči, ki se skušajo modernizirati, kažejo pa še vedno rebra davne preteklosti. Del Hrvaške, ki smo je videli, ne kaže slabo na zunaj. Polja so lepa, letina bogata in gozdovi nabasani z bukovim in hrastovim lesom. Vasi so bolj zanemarjene in ljudje še bolj. Povedali so mi, da kmeti ne premakne. Treba ga je tako suniti, da se trikrat prekuene in še bo zaspan nazaj. V tem oziru ni dosti razlike med slovenskim, hrvaškim in srbskim kmetom. Prišli smo na moršak napredku, ker sam ne gojdi.

Severna Dalmacija nam je odkrila veliko bedo. Sam kamen. Hribi iz kamna, hišice iz golega kamna, ograje iz kamna in strma polja so kamen, izpod katerega štrli trta, koruzica in še kaj zelenega. Vse živi v kamnu. Velike črede rnih ovac lezejo po kamnitih stemenih in obirajo kar najdejo v kamnu. Ob progih postajajo Dalmatince v stari noši, v roki imajo preslico in predejo volno kar gredejo. Silno skromni ljudje, zagoreli od sonca in koščeni. In pa oslički. Nikdar v svojem življenju nisem še videl toliko oslev — četveronožnih, prosim — kot zdaj v Dalmaciji in kasneje v Črni gori. Vsa domača transportacija je na malih, rnih osličkih. Silno krotka in trepača na žival. Nese tak tovor senga, da ga ni nič videti, le tovor leze po grampavji stezi ali prašni cesti. Ni čuda, da dalmatinski kmet, ki odide v Ameriko, ne pride več nazaj.

Ko je naš vlak pihal med kamnitimi nasipi na eni in ožki ravnici na drugi strani, so prišli dalmatinski dečki, bosi in razcapani, in nas pozdravljali s prošnjami: "Hej, kume, dajte dinar, dajte!" Metali smo jim dinarčke in manjši jugoslovanski pleh skozi okna; metali

LEWIS ZANTEVA ODPOKLIC INJUNKCIJE

V peticiji pravi, da Ameriška delavska federacija ne priznava reorganizirane rudarske unije

Springfield, Ill., 2. sept.—John L. Lewis, predsednik stare rudarske unije, je na okrožnem sodišču okraja Sangamon vložil peticijo za odpoklic injunkcije, ki je bila izdana proti njemu in mu je prepovedala vmešavanje v poslovanje uradnikov dvanajstega rudarskega distrikta v Illinoisu.

Lewis pravi v peticiji, da Harry Fishwick in drugi uradniki dvanajstega distrikta ne morejo več biti deložni sodnjake peticije, ker so ustanovili v mesecu marcu dualno unijo. Nadalje Lewis naglašuje, da Ameriška delavska federacija ne priznava reorganizirane rudarske unije.

Strahovlada v Venezueli

Diktator Gomez in nekaj sto posameznikov vlada in izkorišča tri milijone ljudi, ki živijo v veliki revščini. Trpijenje v Gomezovih ječah

Washington, (F. P.) — James E. Welch, Amerikaneec, ki napada venezuelskega diktatorja Gomeza, ker ga je vrzel v ječo in ker je mu bila njegova mla hčerka ukradena, je prejel od predsednika federacije izgnanih venezuelskih študentov 75 funtov težke okove za na noge, kakršne uporabljajo v Gomezovih ternočah za politične kaznjence. Welch je te okove razkazoval v državnem departmantu in v Bell hiši, da so washingtonski politiki lahko videli, kako postopa diktator Gomez, katerega zagovarjajo s tistimi, ki zahtevajo svobodo in ustavno vlado. Washingtonski podpiri Gomeza samo zato, da Standard Oil Co. in Mellonovi interesi lahko izkoriščajo venezuelska petrolejska ležišča.

Gomez je absolutni gospodar Venezuele in vlada s pomočjo dobro oborožene armade in s pomočjo nekaj sto posameznikov, ki imajo moč v svojih rokah, s katerimi deli svoj letni "zaslužek", ki znaša \$20,000,000. Ostali prebivalci Venezuele, tri milijone po številu, so zelo revni in žive v največjem pomanjkanju. V ječah se nahaja mnogo dijakov, ki so se upali kritizirati diktatorja in zahtevati ustavne pravice in več delavskih voditeljev, ki val nosijo na nogah silne okove, kot jih je dobil Welch in kateri postavijo na nogah nezbrisa znamjenja. Vsako, ki se upa organizirati delavce, je takoj vržen v ječo. Okrog 30,000 Venezuelčanov se nahaja v izgnanstvu. Posedovanje orožja je zločin, ki se hudo kaznuje. Prav tako je zločin obratovanje radio oddajnih postaj ali pa izdajanje neodvisnih časopisov.

Deset milijonov mezdskih delavk

Vaska četrta ženska v Združenih državah je uposlena v industriji. To so dogivali pri letošnjem ljudskem štetju

Washington, D. C.—William M. Stuart, direktor cenaznega biroja, poroča, da so pri letošnjem popisovanju prebivalstva v Združenih državah našli do sedaj 37 milijonov žensk v starosti od 16 do 64 let in od teh je okrog deset milijonov mezdskih delavk, ki so uposlene v industriji, trgovini, pisarnah itd. Poleg tega je 23 milijonov žensk, ki se ukvarjajo s gospodinjstvom. To znači, da je 90 odstotkov vseh žensk v Združenih državah uposlenih pri tem ali onem delu ali percentualno toliko kot moških.

"Vaska četrta ženska v Ameriki od 16 do 64. leta starosti si služi svoj kruh ali ga pomaga služiti svojem z mesdnim delom," pravi Stuart v svojem poročilu in dostavlja, da kaj takega še ni bilo v zgodovini Amerike.

V poročilu je rečeno, da je bilo naštetih 75 milijonov oseb med letoma omenjene starosti; od teh je 33 milijonov moških in 27 milijonov žensk. Devetdeset odstotkov moških se živi od dela svojih rok ali možganov. Največ moških prebivalcev omenjene kategorije je uposlenih pri delu na farmah, namreč okrog smajst milijonov. Samo tri odstotke vseh mezdskih delavk je uposlenih v rudarstvu, sedem odstotkov pri transportaciji, deset odstotkov v trgovini in pet odstotkov v profesionalnih službah. Številka še niso popolne.

Ustanovitve nemških in ogrskih žol v kraljevini

Belgrad, — Zagrebški časopis Novosti, poluradno glasilo vlade, je objavil vest, ki pravi, da bodo nemške in ogrske manjšine dobile od vlade kulturno avtonomijo. Ustanovitve se bodo šele za nemške in ogrske otroke, v katerih se jih bo poučevalo v njihovem materinskem jeziku. Koncesija, ki jo je vlada dala Nemcem glede šolstva, je nekaka nagrada za njihovo lojalnost napram jugoslovanski vladi, piše omenjeni list. Pouk srbskega in hrvaškega jezika v šolah, katere pohajajo otroci nemških staršev, se bo začel šele v tretjem razredu, v prvih dveh pa se bo poučevalo otroke le v nemščini. Starši bodo imeli tudi pravico odločitve, dali njihovi otroci pohajajo v nemške ali srbske in hrvaške šole. Ako se starši, če je eden jugoslovan, drugi Nemec, ne bodo mogli zediniti glede otrok, katero šolo naj obiskujejo, se bo tako vprašanje rešilo s posredovanjem šolskih oblasti.

Seattle, Wash., 2. sept.—Deset ribičev, ki so se nahajali na ribiški ladji Orient, je večer utonilo, ko se je pripetila kolizija s tovornim parnikom Admiral Nelson. Nesreča se je zgodila v bližini zaliva Seymour.

STAVKA V BESSEMERJU SE NADALJUJE

Ko so stavarji zvedeli, da kompanija ne bo ponovno upoštevali nekaterih delavcev, so sklenili, da se ne povrnejo na delo.

Bessemer City, N. C.—(F. P.) — Stavke v Bessemer Cityju še ne bo konec, kakor so domnevali lokalni trgovski krogi, ki so skušali pregovoriti delavce, naj se vrnejo na delo in skrupozni nekaj kompromis. Tako so odločili delavci, ki so se zbrali na masnem zborovanju, ko so isvedeli, da American Mills kompanija ne bo sprejela nazaj na delo nekaterih delavcev. Stavarji dolže družbo, da je prelomila svojo obljubo, da bo sprejela nazaj vse stavarje in jim plačevala mezde, ki so bile v veljavi pred zadnjimi mesdnimi znižanji, zaradi katerih so delavci odšli na stavko. Družba je garantirala delavcem dva tedna dela, da bi mogla izvršiti večje naročilo, istočasno pa so je delavce nagovarjali, naj opustijo svoje zahteve po mesdnem zvišanju, znižanju stanarine in preamstitvi Spenserja, katerega delajo odgovornim za mesdno znižanje.

Kompanija je poskušala nadaljevati s obratom, izjavljajoča da se je večina delavcev vrnila na delo, kar pa ne odgovarja resnici, kot trdijo voditelji stavarjev. Lokalni trgovci skušajo dobiti delavce pod svoj vpliv ter jih nagovarjajo, naj pristopijo k njihovi novoustalovljeni organizaciji "Victory Club", ki je objavila izjavo, da se ne bo združila z nobeno unijo, in katera je sestavljena iz lokalnih trgovcev in tudi tamošnjih tovarniških namestencev. Vprašanje pa je, če bodo delavci pripravljene vstopiti v to skupneno "delavsko" organizacijo, katero kontrolirajo tamošnji biznismeni.

Samomor radi brezposelnosti

Omaha, Neb., 2. sept.—Julius Helling in njegova žena sta bila večer najdena mrtva v njenem stanovanju. Zadušila sta se s plinom. Helling je pred nekaj tedni izgubil delo, kar ga je poglavo v obup in tako sta se zakonec dogovorila, da končata življenje s samomorom.

Sole spet odprte

Chicago, — Večraj je bilo odprto šolsko leto 1930-31. Približno 800,000 dečkov in deklic bo letos pohajalo osnovne in srednje šole v Chicagu, javne in privatne, okrog 10,000 več kot prejšnje. Brezposelnost je povzročila, da se je na tisoče učencev in učenk vpisalo v srednje šole, ker ne morejo dobiti dela.

Resolution for the Release of Tom Mooney and Warren K. Billings

Luzerne, Pa., Aug. 3, 1930.

WHEREAS, Tom Mooney and Warren K. Billings, labor organizers, have now been in prison for 14 years since their imprisonment in California in 1916, and

WHEREAS, we are absolutely convinced that these martyrs to the cause of labor are innocent of the crime for which they were convicted, their conviction having been brought about as a result of their activities on behalf of the workers, thru bribery, perjury and intimidation, and

WHEREAS, the innocence of these two men has further been proven by the recent confession of John McDonald, the star witness against them in the original trial, that he was paid to give false evidence against Mooney and Billings, and

WHEREAS, this confession by McDonald is not alone, but stands together with the statements of 11 of the 12 jurors who convicted Mooney and Billings that they now believe that the men are innocent; the declaration by Judge Griffin, the trial judge in the case says that "The Mooney job is one of the dirtiest jobs put over"; the exposure of Oxman, witness for the prosecution as a perjurer, and other numerous facts.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That this branch 204 of the Slovene National Benefit Society, Luzerne, Pa., goes on record demanding the immediate and unconditional release of Tom Mooney and Warren K. Billings, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That we call upon all workers and labor organizations to pass similar resolutions and do all in their power to secure the release of these two labor champions, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That we go on record condemning the Governor and the Supreme court of the State of California for their continual refusal to release the two men, and we believe that this proves justice in the United States is administered in the interests of the bosses and against workers, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That we are in favor and will cooperate in every move to establish a united labor front to secure the release of Mooney and Billings and we instruct our officers to take all necessary measures in that direction.

Socialism

Canonsburg, Pa.—I am endeavoring to explain to Bro. Schemnitzter of Lodge 709 that which he does not understand; probably due to religious fanaticism which has blinded many.

I define socialism as an economic order under which the means of production (factories, mines, utilities, etc.) and distribution would be owned not by individuals, but by the community as a whole. At present all means of production and distribution, that is, all capital, are the private property of some people; hence the name—capitalistic regime. Under socialism all capital would be owned by society collectively; hence the name—socialism. The personal wealth that one requires for his own consumption such as his hat or hatched would still remain his private property. Only capital would be owned collectively.

The economic relationship between people would be altered; no more landlords and tenants; no lender and no borrower, or employer and employee. Rents, profit and trust would be eliminated. Every one would be employed by the State at a certain fixed salary from the very lowest manual labor to the very highest manager. All selling would be done by the State directly to the consumer eliminating wholesalers, retailers, jobbers, commission merchants and all other middlemen.

The capitalist system is wasteful; it is based on competition which means duplication of materials and effort. One man in the business serving his community satisfactorily, another man opens up a similar business competing with him; two plants are thus erected and both must be operated. Is this efficient? The billions of dollars spent on advertising and selling or rather the efforts of the men employed in those occupations and the tons of material consumed by them are thus wasted. Socialism would eliminate competition. Every plant would work to capacity. A new plant would not be put up unless the old plant would not meet the demand. No advertising or publishing of sales would be attempted. The public would only be informed of the articles available and their uses.

Under the present system, most of the efforts of lawyers and judges are directed to settle disputes between businessmen. When private business is eliminated their efforts will be unnecessary. The work of bankers, stockbrokers and financial manipulators, will be eliminated under socialism. In short, the work of the ablest men and of the millions who today execute their plans will be dispensed with under socialism. They will then be put to useful work and more wealth will be produced or the working day will be cut for ALL, and not only for capitalists as today.

The present system is ugly in that it permits poverty to flourish while all its attendant suffering while the rich have more than they can possibly use. Under socialism there will be no poverty or no great wealth owned by any individual. The wealth saved by eliminating competition and distributed among the producers will enable them to live in comfort. The idle rich now living on rent, interest and inherited wealth will be put to work, thus increasing the product to be divided among ALL.

There is a great injustice in the wage system of capitalism. Rents, profits and interest are tributes labor must surrender to get the opportunity to produce. Land and the other resources of nature as well as capital are passive. Labor is the only producer. Wage earners are thus to a partial extent slaves of the owners of capital. Under socialism every man will receive only the fruits of his own muscle and brain. Every worker will be economically free.

Now, my dear friend Bro. Schemnitzter, don't you think that under socialism divorce courts would also be affected? Will women sue for divorce with expectations of reaping millions when the defendant will not possess such an amount? Won't the lives of the overwhelming masses be enriched by the socialistic order? Yes!

In conclusion I ask Bro. Schemnitzter if he is one of the wage earners who still dreams of becoming an employer? Does he feel that some day he will be a man of millions excluding his fellowmen? If he has that feeling he may never get to the gateway of heaven, which, undoubtedly, he has been told of when a mere child.

Socialist agitation has changed the minds of people so much that some proposals denounced as socialistic years ago and, therefore to be feared, are now accepted as just and human. Fraternally, John F. Kutch.

An Explanation

Cleveland, O.—After reading brother Louis Schemnitzter's contribution in previous week's Prosveta I believe that no Socialist in the world can convince him that he is wrong. Louis will always be right; we Socialists always wrong. This is my last answer to him. He wants to know: (1) What is a Socialist? (A.) One who believes in Socialism. (2) Why does he believe in Socialism? (A.) Because the wealth of the nation is not equitably distributed. Therefore, the Socialists want this:

First: That the means of production and distribution of wealth which are social and public in nature, should be publicly owned. This would include the coal, oil and iron lands, the rivers, forests, and other natural resources. It would also include all the great public utilities, such as railroads, telegraph, express companies, and, in short, all the great trusts and monopolies.

Second: That all social utilities, being collectively owned, shall be under democratic control for the benefit of all who work, in order that profit-making, whereby one person exploits another, shall be abolished.

Third: That all who are able shall be given opportunity to labor in the collectively owned industries, and each shall receive the full social value of the product of his labor.

Fourth: That each shall have for his own private property all that his labor earns of food and clothing, shelter, house and home—books, music, education, and culture.

Fifth: That the government, municipal, state and national shall be made truly democratic, so that the will and wish of the people may be the law of the land. This will be accomplished by means of the initiative, referendum, recall and other measures making for popular government.

I can go down the street and meet hundreds of Democrats and Republicans, asking them: "What is a Republican? What is a Democrat? What is the difference between the two?" They will say, "Go and ask Hoover; he is a Republican president." You see, if you want to know Socialism, you have to read about it, and study it.

How would the Socialists deal with the unemployment problem? In the first place it is no fault of Socialists that there is unemployment. The trouble lies with your good Republican and Democratic government. The way in which they solve this problem could be done by any Socialist. So, before answering this question, Louis should tell us why we have in this God's country unemployment periods? Such as the crises in 1907, 1921, and 1930? Overproduction. We produce more than those who employ us can sell. Goods are piled in warehouses; there are no markets for the product; we have to wait till we buy back what we produced in the long hours of hard work. When the warehouses will be empty and we demand more goods, then will we go back to work. This is capitalism.

Under socialism you would not work 12 hours a day and overtime. This is what they did at the Fisher Auto Body Co., Cleveland, and Fricke Coal Co., Tayety County, Pa. At the Fricke coal mines, miners went to work at 4 and 5 in the morning and worked till 6 at night. This is what gives us over-production, so, in the first place, we must reduce working hours to 6 and 8 hours a day, and less if necessary. Second, we should have unemployment insurance like some countries have. This would help somewhat. Third, to relieve the present unemployment situation the government should start building highways, and buildings; municipal government build hospitals, public utility plants, etc. This would furnish jobs for unemployed workers.

But to relieve unemployment properly we must have public ownership and a Socialist government administration. Socialism is all right for the one who doesn't work. I have worked steady now for 13 years. I also know other Socialists who are employed, some of them business men. We Socialists want to see that everybody works. Radicals—oh yes, unions are radical. They, too, demand shorter hours and an increase in wages. I guess miners' unions were not waster because they were radical. That's why they were broken up by the Pittsburgh Coal Co. and Pennsylvania coals. If Pennsylvania had a Socialist government the miners would have their unions and the state would have no coals.

Brothers and Sisters of the SNPJ, you are robbed by a meat trust, coal trust, bread trust, railroad trust, light and power trust, etc., so what chance will we allied Socialists have to swindle you, after you are robbed by all the trusts?

Unemployment and Chain Stores

If there were one thousand cases of diphtheria in the City of Detroit, everyone would be up in arms and condemning our Health Department and our sanitary system, our doctors and our hospitals, for allowing an epidemic gain such headway. Some years ago, there was an epidemic of typhoid fever in New Orleans and every morning the newspapers would publish the list of those who had died and at the top there was a sentence to this effect, "God has seen fit in his infinite wisdom to call to their eternal rest, the following." Finally some engineer published a letter in which he said he thought it was about time that the newspapers and people of New Orleans stopped blaming God for the deaths from typhoid fever and looked after their sewer system. They had an investigation. They discovered the pollution of their water. They took care of it and people ceased to enter the pearly gates through the medium of typhoid fever.

When people cease looking at unemployment as something which is given to them by the almighty in order to test their character and look at it just as they would typhoid fever, diphtheria, scarlet fever, or any other disease of the physical body, they will take a long step in advance towards curing it. Nothing simply happens. There is always a cause for everything that is. There is a germ for every disease. There is a fundamental weakness in the economic system where about six million men are suffering from lack of unemployment in a land which is naturally richer and fuller of opportunity than any nation in the world. There is something wrong with the economic system which allows man and woman and children to go hungry and unclothed. Certainly every man and woman who is able and anxious to work should not be denied his right to earn a decent living. In order to be really human, every man and woman must be free from the haunting fear of hunger and want. They must feel secure without making themselves objects of charity.

Ever since the introduction of machinery into our modern life, we have had periods of unemployment and financial depression. We blamed the period of 1893 on Grover Cleveland and his Democratic party. We considered the period of 1907 as inevitable. We were just drifting in to another period in 1913 when the World War broke out. In 1921 there was a period when our excuse was that "We are getting back to normalcy." This period 1929 and 1930 has absolutely no excuse and we must face the facts and get rid of the germ. Our leading financial and industrial men admit that cutting wages is not the solution. To cut wages simply reduces the purchasing power of the people and when you cannot sell things which are produced in your factory, mines, and mills, you must shut them down and that means unemployment and depression. It is a vicious circle. The only solution is to pay men so that they may buy back things which they produce by their labor, but along with our efficient machine production which has increased the producing power of man more than one hundred fold in the past five years, there has grown up a false theory that the public was benefited when they could buy things cheap. In order to sell things cheap, they have cut wages of those who produced and as they cut wages, they have killed the "Goose that laid the Golden Egg," because they have destroyed the market for the very goods they produced so cheaply.

The whole group that is in back of the chain store system, who are favoring mergers of every kind, see nothing at all but this one false way of getting goods to the public cheaply. Every man who works in a store or factory is looked upon as a liability rather than an asset. If his place can be taken by a machine, a dumb-waiter, or any mechanical device, he is immediately discharged. When they discharge him, they have cut off a customer because dumb-waiters and machines do not buy goods. It is equally true that if there are one hundred thousand men working in a factory and they receive an average of \$1800 per year and two or three men at the head of the system divide seventy-five to one hundred million dollars per year, that there is involved not only a question of justice but a question of economics. It is apparent on the face of it that these two or three men cannot possibly spend their millions on merchandise. They cannot use any more homes than they have at present; they do not need any more clothing;

they cannot eat but a certain amount and they cannot but use so many yachts. On the other hand, those who are receiving the wages can very readily use more than they are able to provide with the money they receive. In other words, the millions which are given to the owners of the factories if distributed in wages would be kept in circulation, goods would be purchased, houses would be built and prosperity would begin to return to the nation.

The chain store system boosts of the fact that they have eliminated over one hundred thousand traveling salesmen by their efficiency system. Economically this means that one hundred thousand less men are buying clothing, automobiles, groceries, meats, drugs, hardware, and everything else that they need. They have been added to the vast army of the unemployed and under the guise of efficiency. When you stop the circulation of blood in the human body, the life of the man is snuffed out; and when you stop circulation of money by either putting it into the hands of a few or let it lie idle in the banks, you have stopped circulation of the life blood of the nation, and the nation is in real danger for its very existence.

This stagnation of life came to a crisis in Italy, and the Fascist under Mussolini set up a political dictatorship and along with it, an industrial and commercial dictatorship. In Russia, when the crisis was reached, they overthrew the dictatorship of the czar and established the Soviet government with its promotion of communism, and although they have compromised a great deal during the past four or five years, they still have a form of government leading towards communism. The political life of the country always reveals its economic and industrial life.

In America, we have boasted of our political democracy. We are proud of Abraham Lincoln because he abolished chattel slavery. He is the one that made the statement: "No nation can long endure half free and half in slavery." In we allow a few chain store systems to gain control of our own distribution of food; if we allow one radio corporation to control the dissemination of information to the public; if we allow the means of production to become concentrated into the hands of a few; it will only be a question of time before these men who become captains of industry and the captains of merchandising, will want to be the captains of our political life. As a matter of fact, they cannot be the dictators of our commercial and industrial life unless they also become our political dictators.

The American people will have to choose within the next few years as to whether they want their nation to be ruled by a dictator similar to that of Mussolini in Italy, or be ruled by Soviets similar to those in Russia, or are the going to maintain that freedom and independence of which they have boasted since the birth of the nation. It is high time that we faced the problem of unemployment in the same manner in which we would attack an epidemic of contagious disease, like diphtheria. Frank Botala, Young Americans 564.
