Once again the same officers will be at the helm of the North American Trust Co. That was decided at the meeting of the board of directors Thursday night. The officers are: Dr. J. M. Seliskar, president; Frank Paulin, vice president; John Gornik, vice president; M. J. Grdina, assistant vice president; F. M. Jaksic, secretary; J. J. Grdina, treasurer; F. V. Venic, assistant treasurer; F. T. Culitan, counsel.

At the annual stockholders meeting Wednesday night, the same board of directors and advisory board were elected. The directors are 21 in number, while 13 men make up the advisory board.


