ZDA predložile v ZN izpuslitev političnih jetnikov povsod

Voditelj zastopstva ZDA pri ZN Moynihan je predložil v imenu ZDA resolucijo, ki poziva k izpustitvi vseh političnih jetnikov v vseh državah sveta.

ZDRUŽENI NARODI. N.Y.—Nekateri v Združenih narodih sodijo, da so ZDA predložile v sredo svojo resolucijo v skupščinskem odboru za socialne, humanitarne in kulturne zadeve s pozivom za izpust vseh političnih jetnikov v vseh državah sveta kot nekak odgovor na resolucijo z obsodbo sionizma, ki jo je ta odbor poslal skupščini in je bila pretekla ponedeljek izglasovana.

Resolucija, ki jo je predložil Daniel P. Moynihan, poslanik ZDA pri ZN, zahteva brezpostojno pomilostitev vseh oseb, ki so zaprte zaradi mirnega oporekanja politiki vlad svojih držav. Ker je takih jetnikov posebno veliko v komunističnih in drugih državah z avtoritarnimi režimi, katere so vse glasovale za obsodbo sionizma, hočejo nekateri videti v njej odgovor na to obsodbo, četudi je to Moynihan zanikal in trdil, da je bila njegova resolucija že dolgo v pravljjanju. Predložil jo je še po tednih posvetovanj z Washingtonom.

Poslanik D. P. Moynihan je v svoji predložiti resolucije obsoval "izbrano moralno Združenih narodov v vprašanju človekovih pravic". Pokazal je na enostransko skrb ZN za človeške pravice in vrednote v nekaterih delih sveta, pa njihovo popolno brezbrinost za te v drugih, predvsem v komunističnih državah, in državah Tretjega sveta. Opozoril je na pritožbe in skrb ZN o položaju v Čilu in Južni Afriki, ni pa navedel nobene druge, kjer po njegovem tudi zatirajo človekove pravice.

Guv. Wallace začel uradno kampanjo MONTGOMERY, Ala.—Guv. George C. Wallace je v sredo uradno objavil, da se poteguje za pridobitev imenovanja za demokratskega predsedstvenika dne 1976. Razprava o posebnih zunanjopolitičnih dejanjih in predlogih se bo in se naj bi nadaljevala, je dejal Schlesinger v svojem govoru v zvezi s svojimi kritičnimi pripombami k zunajpolitični Kissingherji, ki so bile delni vzrok njegove odslovitve iz vlade, pa nato ugotovil:

"Ce se nismo pripravljeni umakniti na severno-ameriško celino, je prispevek ZDA k sestovnemu ravnotežju oboroženih sil neobhoden. Četudi naj bi vrsto delali za detento, moramo to delati brez iluzij. Detenta potiča na temelju enakosti sil, na ohranjanju vojaškega ravnotežja.

Samo Združene države morejo služiti kot protitež moči Sovjetske zveze. Ne bo nobenega deus ex machina, ni nikogar, ki bi čkal v ozadju!"

V svojem govoru je odhajajoči obrambni tajnik ponovno svrnil pred zmanjševanjem in zamenjanim oboroženih sil ZDA v času, ko Sovjetska zveza povečuje vlogo v svoje oborožene sil. Posebej je opozoril na nevarnost sedanjega narodnega razpoloženja, "skeptizma, ki je šel predaleč". Potrebnia je "postroitev smisla za naše vrednote, treba je ponovno pričati zgodovinski smisel za to, kar pomeni ta narod, končno znova ustvariti smisel narodnega stvari na narodne usode, ki vzbujata edinstvo".

Politični krogi se med tem resno zavzemajo za to, da bi Izabelo pripravili k prostovoljnemu odstopu. Njena podpora tudi v peronistični stranki, ki se je razkrila, naglo peša.

Hanojska delegacija je prišla v Saigon

SAIGON, J. Viet.—Sem je prišla 25-članska delegacija Severnega Vietnamca na razgovore o združitvi obeh Vietnamov. Delegacijo vodi Truong Chinh, član politbiroja v Hanoiu, v njej pa je tudi Xuan Thuy, načredni partijski tajnik za mednarodne zadeve, ki je vodil razgovore z ZDA v Parizu o umiku teh iz Indokine.

Delegacijo Hanoia je pozdravil na letališču v Saigonu Pham Hung, dejanski vodnik Narodne osvobodilne fronte Južne in Vietnamca, ki je na čelu saigonske delegacije za razgovore s Hanojem. Poleg njega so v delegaciji še Nguyen Huu Tho in načelnik NOF Huyun Tan Phat.

Razgovori naj bi uredili vprašanje narodnih volitev v skupno ljudsko zastopstvo Severnega in Južnega Vietnamca, ki naj bi nato izbralo vse potrebne skupne organe z vlogo vred. Zedinjenje naj bi bilo predvidoma proglašeno v začetku prihodnjega leta.

CHICAGO, Ill.—Ralph G. Newman, literarni ocenjevalec in strokovnjak za pisane dokumente za Abrahama Lincolna, je bil pred zveznim sodiščem spoznan za krivega laži o svojem deležu pri pripravi dokumentov, ki jih je predsednik R. M. Nixon izročil Narodnemu arhivu, da bi dosegel \$450,000 odpisa od svojega dohodninskega davka.

Sodnik McGarr je po prečitalju odločitve porote objavil, da bo sodbo izrekel 6. januarja. Obsojeni je lahko kaznovan do 8 let zapora in do \$15,000 globe.

Zagovornik 65 let starega znanstvenika R. G. Newmana je izjavil, da bo vložil priziv.

R. G. Newman je bil v preteklem februarju otočen od velike zvezne porote v Washingtonu skupno z F. DeMarco Jr., Nixonovim bivšim odvetnikom, zarot datiranja dokumenta, o izročitvi Nixonovih papirjev Narodnemu arhivu nazaj, da bi bil Nixon opravičen odpisa njihove vrednosti od zveznega dohodninskega davka.

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Izabela Peron izgubila podporo v javnosti

BUENOS AIRES, Arg.—Predsednica republike Izabela Peron je izjavila pretekli teden v govoru preko radija in televizije, da ne bo odstopila. To je storila, ker oborožene sile za enkrat še nimajo namena poseči v razvoju.

Politični krogi se med tem resno zavzemajo za to, da bi Izabelo pripravili k prostovoljnemu odstopu. Njena podpora tudi v peronistični stranki, ki se je razkrila, naglo peša.

OB RAZBURJANJU ZARADI GLASOVANJA V GLAVNI SKUPŠČINI ZDRAŽENIH NARODOV

Ko je glavna skupščina Združenih narodov pretekli ponedeljek izglasovala resolucijo, ki označuje sionizem za "obliko rasizma in rasnegozapostavljanja", je zastopnik ZDA to obsodil in izjavil, da ZDA ne marajo nikdar imeti nič s to sramoto. Kongres je bil v svoji obsodbi prav tako oster, pozval pa je zaradi tega glasovanja tudi k preoceni stališča ZDA do Združenih narodov. Nekateri so se kar začeli glasno zavzemati za izstop ZDA iz Združenih narodov.

Predsednik ZDA je glasovanje obsodil, napovedal nanj odgovor ZDA, pa poudaril, da bodo ZDA ostale v ZN. Slično stališče je zavezalo tudi državni tajnik, ki pa je Kongres in javnost ZDA svaril pred prehitrimi ukrepi proti ZN zaradi tega glasovanja, ker bi to moglo škodovati dolgoročnim obveznostim in dolžnostim ZDA.

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Nejedvola zaradi glasovanja je upravičena, kajti obsooba sionizma je v nasprotju z načeli, na katerih so bili Združeni narodi ustanovljeni,

Samo ZDA se morejo postaviti proti ZSSR

James R. Schlesinger je ob svojem slovesu od obrambnega tajništva poudaril, da se morejo postaviti proti ZSSR samo ZDA.

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Oboževanje sile so se v ponedeljek slavnostno poslovile od Jamesa R. DJAKARTA, Indonez. — In-donezija je ustavila koncem ted-nave sedajšnjem promet z Avstralijo, ko so pristaniški delavci v Sydneyu zadržali indonezijsko ladjo Garsa Dua in zahtevali od vlade v Djakarti, da pove, kaj se je zgodilo s 5 avstralskimi novinarji, ki so izgnani v bližini mesteca Balibo na otoku Timorju. Mesto je v bližini meje Indonezije na otoku.

Na Timorju divja državljanska vojna, v katero posega Indo-nezija. Avstralci so se razburili, ko je prišlo poročilo, da so v bližini mesta Balibo našli trupla petih tujcev, četudi ni bilo nič rečeno, da bi to mogli biti pogrešani Avstralci.

Mednarodna delavska organizacija v krizi ob napovedi izstopa ZD

ZENEVA, Šv. — Mednarodna delavska organizacija — ILO je dosti mirno, toda s skrbjo spremlja objavo ZDA o nameri izstopa, ki bo veljavna dve leti po tej objavi. ZDA so ILO pretekli teden obvestile, da bodo orga-nizacijo zapustile, "ker se vedno bolj nepotrebitno mešano v politična vprašanja".

ZDA, ki plačujejo 25% celotnega proračuna ILO, so se odločile za izstop, ko je večina gla-sovala za sprejem Palestinske osvobodilne organizacije kot opa-zovalca, četudi je članstvo in u-deležba vsake vrste pri delu o-mejena na države.

Indija pazljivo sledi spremembam v Bangladešu

NEW DELHI, Ind. — Predsednica vlade Indira Gandhi je članom vlade dejala, da mora biti Indija zaskrbljena, kadar je v nevarnosti stalnost vlade v Bangladešu, kot je bilo to pre-tekl teden.

Indira Gandhi je imela namen obiskati državnik Sikkim v Himalaji, pa je obisk odložila, ko je prišlo do zmed v Daki, je pov-vedal v Londonu sikkimski princ Vončuk Namgyal.

Poljska začela izpuščati svoje Nemce v ZR Nemčijo

BONN, ZRN. — Pretekli mesec je prišlo iz Poljske nad 600 Nemcev, prva skupina izmed 125.000 Nemcev, ki jim je Poljska dovolila, da se preselijo v Zahodno Nemčijo za blizu 1 bilijon dolarjev gospodarske po-moči, ki jo bo Poljska dobila v zameno iz Zahodne Nemčije.

Poljska je pristala na preseliti 125.000 Nemcev, ko trdi konservativna opozicija v Bonnu, da jih je na Poljskem poleg teh vsaj še 150.000.

LOS ANGELES, Kalif. — Roy Innis, direktor Kongresa rasne enakosti je označil poslanika ZDA pri ZN Daniela P. Moynihanu za "rasno svinjo", ker je napadel ugandskega predsednika Idi Amina.

"Kadar ti lakaji in rasne svinje kot Moynihan, ki ni nikdar prijatelj črnega ljudstva, napa-dajo in žalijo poglavarje držav, mora črno ljudstvo teh držav odgovoriti na isti način kot Jude ali katerokoli drugo zdravo ljudstvo," je dejal Roy Innis.

BEIRUT, Lib. — Predsednik vlade Rašid Karami je bojkotiral zadnjo sejo vlade pod predsedstvom predsednika republike, ker vojska ni kljub njegovemu zahtevu preprečila izkladjanja orožja za desničarsko Falango z ladje v enem od severnih prista-niš.

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

LAUSCHE LEGEND

By DR. JOZE FELICIJAN

Frank Lausche — a symbol of an era

Lausche legend began in Slovenian neighborhood on St. Clair and along the shores of Lake Erie. Frank Lausche was husky and active, an intelligent student who mastered all subjects with ease. He loved outdoor life, was an accomplished baseball player, a strapping young man who could swim a mile into Lake Erie and back. A young man who excelled at everything, he faced the future squarely in the eye. Frank Lausche became a symbol of an era.

He loved his mother most tenderly.

His mother, Frances Lausche, took him to St. Vitus, a Slovenian Church. She never spoke English to him; she played, sang, and spoke in Slovenian only. Nevertheless, son Frank Lausche became one of the greatest orators in the United States.

On July 4, 1934, he had some speaking engagement. Before he left his dearly beloved mother she was holding his hands for a few moments, she looked into his eyes and said: "Frank do a good job." "Frank dej da boš dobro opravil." Frank departed full of dark foreboding. When he returned his mother had departed to her God to receive the reward for her good deeds. Frank je bil tako rad pri mami.

Ward Leader:

Frank Lausche was a humanitarian who learned to be kind to his neighbors at his mother's knee and who learned the lesson of service watching his mother helping the poor.

There were the times of depression — there were a lot of men without work. Frank Lausche lined up many jobs more than any one else.

Judge:

As a judge he became known for his fair and impartial decisions, his stern sense of justice and independence. But his, was also justice tempered with mercy. From the bench Judge Lausche handed the decisions that made law. In a series of rulings on foreclosures he has made it as hard as possible for powerful finance companies to fleece their clients, he pioneered in the field of labor laws. His anti-gambling campaign saved the happiness of numerous families and made him known all over Ohio.

Mayor:

The first big city ethnic mayor, he sacrificed his personal ambitions and accepted the dignity of Mayor's office, as a call of duty and service to the country, which faced the most critical times in its history.

He made a single promise: "I shall try to be a good influence. I shall not falter in my purpose. I shall not deviate regardless of consequences. I shall render judgement in every matter as my conscience dictates, let the consequences be what they may be."

The Prophesy for the Future: Common Pleas Judge George Baer, as he completed solemn oath taken at the second installation, he uttered a Biblical quotation that was both a compliment and a promise: "Well done thou good and faithful servant, thou has been faithful over few, I shall make you ruler over many."

His remarks were interpreted by many as a prophesy of mayor's political future: governor or senator.

Governor:

The first Catholic and the first immigrant's son to be a governor of Ohio. He was the only American to serve five terms as Ohio governor. In his ten years as governor he compiled a truly outstanding record. Without asking help from anyone, he cleaned up state's racquets. He pushed through a law requiring stripminers to repair the damage they did to the coal lands by planting trees or grass. He built the \$325,000 Ohio Turnpike. He imposed a special tax to compel the trucking companies to contribute their share for the construction and repair of the highways. He strengthened workers' compensation and fair-employment practices. He strengthened union security by refusing to swing state power in labor disputes.

He left a surplus of \$36,000,000 in the state treasury when he quit governorship.

Senator: Who always voted his convictions.

Frank Lausche served in the senate twelve years altogether. His second senatorial campaign was possibly the shortest state wide campaign in the history of the United States when chest pains compelled him to withdraw to the Bethesda Hospital.

As a senator, he refused to accept an increase in salary. Lausche used the money from pay rise in order to establish a scholarship at Muskingum College as well as another scholarship at St. Vitus in memory of his beloved mother, Frances Lausche.

Principles:

A) He would continue to follow a course that will best secure the future life of the United States and promote general welfare of its inhabitants, having in mind a program of expenditures consistent with a program of taxation capable of being born by taxpayers.

B) "I will exercise my mind and my conscience and vote accordingly."

C) "I will do my duty first and surrender to them never. At the risk of being condemned — they may all go to hell."

D) "No one has collar on my neck. I have only one dictator, the people of Ohio."

E) November 13, 1965 — on the eve of his seventieth birthday: he expressed his own political philosophy in a Shakespearean quotation: This above all: to thine own self be true, and it must follow as the night the day, thou canst not be false to any man."

Both President Eisenhower in 1960 and General MacArthur before him have suggested Lausche as a worthy presidential candidate. President Eisenhower exclaimed: "I had like to run on a ticket as vice president with him as president."

Senator Frank J. Lausche honored his father and tenderly loved his mother. God gave him a long and happy life.

Lausche Helped Many Slovenian Immigrants

(Speech given by Mr. Joseph Melaher at Lausche's birthday banquet Sunday at St. Vitus Auditorium.)

I wish to bring to light certain characteristics of Senator Lausche which are in some respects unknown — even to his close friends — and forgotten by many.

This anniversary party was first intended to be a small gathering of Slovenians who owe so much to Senator Lausche — we who came to this country after the second world war. We are happy, however, it turned out this way, because it is appropriate that we have a chance to express our feelings to a much wider audience.

Terrible suffering fell upon the Slovenian people in our native country in the last war. The enemy occupation forces ruthlessly worked to exterminate the Slovenian nation from our land. The only help could have come from the Allied powers. But right at the beginning the hope for help and liberation turned into two opposite directions which so tragically divided our nation.

The majority of the Slovenian people directed their hopes for liberation to the West, the others insisted it should come only from the East. Being at that time pro-American — for the Western democracies, was branded as treason — selling out the country to the American imperialists — marked for death.

Some may still say it is not true — but 30 years after that tragic time in Slovenia, the pro-American Vietnamese met the same fate.

Why do I speak about these events, which seemingly do not fit in with today's occasion? It surely does, because it involved the then governor Frank Lausche in one of the biggest humanitarian actions to help his fellow countrymen in their desperate distress. At that time, governor Lausche stood amid the confusion of the international politics with a far reaching foresight — I would say — he stood almost alone. And as time proved, he had foreseen correctly. America today would be in a much better position if it would have followed his example.

At the end of the war, thousands upon thousands had to flee their native country to escape certain death. Refugee camps were packed — babies, children, families — no shelter, no food, hostile surroundings — people nobody wanted.

Senator Lausche, believe me, it is beyond description how these people felt when some word came that in the faraway land of America, in the unknown State of Ohio, there is a Slovenian governor named Lausche, who has sympathy to our plight and is doing something to help us find a new home and start a new life in America.

In 1949 the first families arrived here in Cleveland. The newcomers flocked around the Slovenian parishes and settled in the Slovenian neighborhoods which had been at that time on the verge of disbandment.

In no time the old Slovenian parishes and neighborhoods became active and alive again. Almost 30 years has passed — the Slovenian parishes and the old Slovenian neighborhoods have survived for another generation.

There were few Slovenians in the area those days. He would not socialize with them or even loan them one cent. While others were respective of each other, he continued to be estranged from them.

There were no Fraternals, cultural, or social organizations in the Chicago area those days. No places where the young immigrants could meet; so they gathered at each other's home where they discussed the needs which would aid them in time of need. Also discussed was the need for a newspaper which would bring them news from well as from their homeland, other Slovenian settlements as Slovenia. Their idea was realized some years later, and many of them became charter members of our early benefit societies as well as first subscribers to the first Slovenian newspapers in America.

Janez Gorse did not socialize with his fellow countrymen, seldom he ever met them, even in church where they worshiped. Customarily he seldom showed up.

Gorse raised four sons, two of whom passed on in their early youth. The other two could not be located, and perhaps live somewhere in the Chicago area, descendants of a Slovenian and an Indian. They do not know they are of Slovenian blood.

One of the deceased sons studied in Lemont, on 12th St. now known as Roosevelt Road, Chicago.

Gorse was never naturalized as an American. He remained independent as he was when he came to this country. In Europe they had the traditional habit the father held some fields or part of the products raised for his personal family use when he hands his holdings over to his children. The same was done by Janez Gorse, he transferred his property to his two sons and wife, but kept the sum of \$100,000.00 on his own name. The surprised bank official asked him what that means. Laughingly, he replied in case his family would disown him in later years.

SUNDAY MORNING MASSACRE EXPLAINED

PACEMAKER HELPS HEART WORK NORMALLY

The artificial pacemaker, a fairly recent surgical advance, works much the same way as the body's natural pacemaker, according to the American Heart Association.

This natural pacemaker, located in the upper right portion of the heart, sends electrical impulses down a certain path along the muscle walls, causing the heart to contract and pump blood. As long as these impulses flow down the heart walls at regular intervals, the heart pumps at a steady pace.

If something happens to prevent the impulses from traveling as they should, the natural pacemaker can't do its job well, causing the heart to pump irregularly. When this occurs, the heart can't send as much blood throughout the body so not enough nourishment and oxygen get to the cells.

An artificial pacemaker, placed under the skin and powered by batteries, produces the impulses needed to make the heart pump. The impulses flow thru tiny wires to the heart and are timed at a certain pace. With the help of an artificial pacemaker, the heart should pump as well as it once did, says the Heart Association.

Like any mechanical device, the pacemaker will need care. Batteries and other parts will have to be replaced from time to time, requiring a minor surgical procedure.

Persons with pacemakers should keep all appointments with their physician and notify him if they experience chest
