DROBNE VESTI IZ SLOVENIJE

(Došle preko Trsta)

NESREČA V ZABUKOVICI
— V ponedeljek 12. avgusta se je dogodila v premogovniku Zabukovici velika nesreča. Vsled eksplozije zemeljskega plina je bilo ubitih 14 rudarjev 9 pa težko ranjenih.

Zabukovica leži nekaj kilometrov južno od Zalcia v Savnjski dolini. Premog so tam začeli kopati že leta 1843. Zabukovski premog je imel visoke kalorije in malo žvepla. Vendar se rudnik ni nikoli posebno razvil. Med prvo vojsko je postal državna last in je tak ostal tudi v Jugoslaviji. Rudnik je bil precej zakopan. Novi komunistični gospodarji tudi niso ničesar storili za zboljšanje in tako je to nemarnost moralo plačati z življenjem 14 moških. Tole rudniške nesreče v Sloveniji že dolgo ni bilo. Priča komunističnega gospodarstva, ki mu je človek samo številka.

IZ UIVERZE SO ZAGNALI
— Dragoljub Jovanovič. Opičar sem vam že, kako je postal znan srbski radikalni politik Dragoljub Jovanovič sovražnik številka ena sedanjega režima. Njegov greh je, da si je upal kritizirati nekatere uredbe sedanje vlade, posebno zakon o kmetijskih delovnih zadrugah, ki naj bi bile nekatere predhodnice ruskih kolhozov. Jovanovič je imel tudi pogum povedati, da ni prav nič ljudsko in demokratično, če si ti maršal Tito in za njim drugi generali pripenjati odlikovanje za odlikovanjem namesto, da bi se pomagalo ubogemu ljudstvu. Jovanoviča so zagnali radi da se predzdrzne izpovedi resnice iz takozvane srbske kmečke

stranke in srbske narodne skupščine. Proglasi se bil po vseh listih za narodnega izdajalca in fašista.

Sedaj ga je zadela še obsodba belgrajske univerze. Univerzitetni svet te univerze je sklenil 5. avgusta, da se tega profesorja radi protiljudskega stališča odstavi kot predavatelja na univerzi. Dvakrat so ga že prej baje opozorili, da govori proti "ljudstvu," pa ni nič pomagalo. Jovanovič si je na primer drznil reči, da so tudi okupatorji napravili v deželi nekaj koristnih stvari. Tudi nekatere nove zakone Titovega režima je kritiziral in pokazal na nekatere napake. Tudi to je seveda v deželi svobode, kot je sedaj Jugoslavija, velik protiljudski greh. Kar Tito stori, je sveto in tudi profesor na visoki šoli ne sme reči, da je slabo. Bil je pa baje Jovanovič kot beremo v "Slovenskem poročevalcu" 14. avgusta celo tako prepreden, da je povedal svojemu srbskemu "ljudstvu" takele resnice: "Za Nemce smo narod, ki malo dela in ki ne pozna discipline." Najbrž je hotel Jovanovič mlade fante učiti več discipline, toda to je pod komunističnim greh. To sme k večjem Tito sam.

Tudi tale pripomba je naredil nesrečni profesor, ki je mislil, da sme v svobodni državi govoriti, kar misli: "Med Srbi in Slovenci obstoja največja razlika. Za Slovence smo Srbi nesramen narod, narod, ki mnogo zmerja in kolne. Za Hrvate smo preveč odkriti, — mi povemo vse! Za Makedonce so Srbi lenuhi in za iz takozvane srbske kmečke

Razne najnovejše svetovne vesti

ZAGREB — Ljudsko sodišče 3 moč je danes zjutraj ob 10 (ob 3 zjutraj ameriški čas) spoznalo zagrebskega nadškofa dr. Stepana krivim obtožbo ter ga obsodilo na 16 let prisilnega dela.

BERLIN — Zavezniški kontrolni koncil je zavrnil prošnje obsojenih nacistov za pomiloščenje. Hermann Goering in 10 njegovih tovarišev bo prihodnjo sredo obsojenih. Koncil je tudi zavrnil prošnje Goeringa, feldmaršala Keitla in generala Jodla, da bi bili usmrčeni s kroglo in ne obešeni. Vseh 11 bo viselo, kakor so bili obsojeni od mednarodnega tribunala v Nuernbergu.

Rusija je ustavila vse zrakoplove nad Češko in Ogrsko

Ta ukaz je v veljavi do 15. oktobra, pa nihče ne ve, zakaj

Praga. — Češki zunanji minister je včeraj naznanil, da so ruske vojaške oblasti prepovedale vsako zrakoplovbo nad Češko, Ogrsko in Romunijo in da velja ta odredba do 15. oktobra. Pojasnil pa ni vzroka tega ukaza.

Ameriška letala, ki so bila namenjena iz Dunaja v Prago, so polet prekinila. Ameriški poslanik v Pragi je obvestil ameriške zračne črte, da ne smejo leteti nad Češko, Ogrsko in Romunijo, dokler ne pride drugačna odredba.

Sovjetski generalni štab v Budimpešti je prepovedal vsak zračni polet nad Ogrsko za štiri dni, ruski generalni štab pa Dunaj je pa isto prepovedal za Češko. Ameriška letala ki so bila namenjena v Prago, so morala ostati na Dunaju.

Nekateri sodijo, do je Rusija to ukazala radi vojaških manevrov, ki jih ima ali ki jih bo imela po tem ozemlju in ne mara, da bi te mavere kdo opazoval z zrakom.

Agentje zakladniškega urada preiskujejo v Clevelandu kupce z gostilnami. Vlada ve, da se prodajajo in kupujejo gostilne vse od \$15,000 do \$40,000 za gostilniške licence, katere se sicer dajo od države za vsoto \$1,000. Z agentji od zakladniškega urada so tudi agentje od davčnega urada.

Vlada ve, na primer, nek slučaj, ko je nekdo, ki ni imel pred par leti nobenega centa, kupil v teku poldruga leta štiri gostilniške licence, za vsako je pa plačal \$35,000. Ti vladni agentje hočejo zdaj dognati dvojce: 1), če je tak kupec pri plačilu zadnjega davka navedel, da ima toliko denarja in če je plačal od njega dohodninski davek in 2), če je tisti, ki je napravil tako dobro kupčijo s prodajo gostilniške licence, na davčni polji prijavil ta dobiček.

Na borzi so padle delnice avtne industrije, ker odstavljajo delavce

New York. — Na newyorški borzi so močno padle delnice avtne industrije. Vzrok je, pravijo, ker avtne družbe močno odstavljajo delavce, zato se lastniki delnic boje, da ne bodo dosti služile za delničarje.

Tri avtne družbe v Detroitu so naznanile, da bodo poslane delavce domov in sicer Ford Motor Co. 100,000 delavcev, Chrysler in Briggs pa 25,000. Kompanije pravijo, da nimajo dovolj jekla na razpolago, dalje jim primanjkuje svinca, bakra in kositra.

NAK, TEGA PA ŽE NE VERJAMEMO OB TEM ČASU

Vladni vremenski urad napoveduje za noč ali pa za soboto zjutraj dež in mrzlo in da je celo mogoče, pravi, da dobimo sneg v prihodnjih 36 urah. Od zapa-da se nam bliža mrzlo vreme in za jutri napovedujejo po vsej državi Illinois močno slano. Od tam pride mrašč s sem, trdi urad. Verjamemo, da bo dež in tudi slana lahko popari, ampak po snegu pa še prav nič ne diši.

Anglija ne bo podpisala pogodbe z Romunijo, če Donava ne bo prosta

Pariz. — Zahtevi Zed. držav, da naj bo reka Donava pristopna vsem državam za paroplovbo, se je pridružila zdaj tudi Anglija. Angleški zunanji minister Bevin je izjavil, da Anglija ne bo podpisala mirovne pogodbe z Romunijo, če ne bo vsebovala točke, da je Donava pristopna za svobodno paroplovbo vsem evropskim državam.

Odgovoril je jugoslovanski delegat Edvard Kardelj, ki je izjavil, da nilla ta mirovna konferenca nobene pravice razpravljati o vprašanju Donave, ker mora imeti glavno besedo pri tem Jugoslavija, ker gre 50% njene-ga toka skozi jugoslovanski teritorij.

Zdaj, ko je pogodba z Italijo izvršena, je prišla na vrsto pogodba z Romunijo. Prvi se je oglašil ameriški senator Vandenberg, ki je zahteval v pogodbi točko, ki daje svobodno trgovino po Balkanu in svobodno paroplovbo po Donavi vsem narodom. Rusija je izjavila, da ima pravico uporabljati Donavo samo one države, ki so ob njenem bregu. Ruska delegacija je odgovorila senatorju, naj misli o reki sv. Lovrenca. Senator je nato rekel, da se paroplovbe po reki sv. Lovrenca lahko svobodno posluži vsak.

Zbornica je bila v zasedanju do zgodnjih jutranjih ur danes in je končno sprejela točko, kakor jo je predlagala delegacija Zed. držav, da je reka Donava prosta za paroplovbo vsem. Glasovanje bilo 15 proti 6. Proti je glasoval ves slovanski blok.

Mesa še dolgo ne bo, tudi če odpravijo OPA

Kansas City, Kans. — V časopisu Kansas City Star je napisal poljedelski izvedenec John Collins članek, v katerem dokazuje, da goveje živine za meso še dolgo ne bo v klavnih, tudi če odpravijo OPA.

Collins je vprašal živinorejce glede tega. Ti so mu povedali, da bo vzelo od 12 do 19 mesecev, predno bo zopet dovolj govedine na trgu. To pa radi tega, ker ni dovolj telet na rančih. Temu je pa kriva OPA, ki je postavila postavno ceno na klavno govejo živino, na teletino pa ne. In to je imelo za posledico, da so začeli farmarji prodajati teleta, namesto da bi jih redili za goveje meso pozneje.

Mesna industrija je dala te podatke poljedelskemu tajniku ter apelirala nanj, naj odpravi vladno kontrolo nad mesom, pa ga bo takoj dovolj na trgu.

Washington. — Mesna industrija se je včeraj obrnila na poljedelskega tajnika Andersona, naj takoj ukaže odpravi OPA nad mesom, češ, da je v Ameriki dovolj klavne živine, torej ni potrebna vladna kontrola. Mesna industrija je dokazala tajniku, da je danes 16,000,000 več govedi na ameriških pašnikih kot pa pred vojno.

V letih od 1925 do 1939 je bilo na ameriških pašnikih do 64,459,000 govedi, danes jo je pa nad 80,000,000. Ako poljedelski tajnik odpravi OPA nad mesom, bo v nekaj dneh že dovolj mesa na trgu, prav gotovo prej kot bodo novembarske volitve.

Poljedelski tajnik ima namreč pravico odpraviti vladno kontrolo nad mesom, če izjavi, da ni pomanjkanja klavne živine. In tega ni, kakor mu dokazuje mesna industrija.

Včeraj so zborovali v Beli hiši svetovalci predsednika Trumana in ti so baje sklenili, da urgirajo predsednika, naj se vladno kontrolo nad mesom takoj odpravi ker sicer bodo vsled tega trpeli demokratski kandidati pri novembarskih volitvah.

Sliši se tudi, da je ponudila Argentina 280,000,000 funtov mesa Zed. državam, da odpomo-ruje pomanjkanju v tej deželi. Zed. države so prepovedale uvažati govedo iz Argentine, da se ne bi sem zanesla bolezen na parklji in gobcu. Argentinski poslanik Ivanisjevič je pa rekel, da ta ukaz ne bi zadel tega uvoza, ker je Argentina pripravljena pripeljati sem mesne konzerve in ne živo govedo.

V tem je pa OPA ukazala, da se podražijo teletina pri prodaji na drobno od 7 do 8 centov, govedina in svinjina pa od 1 do 2 centa. Ta odredba bo stopila v veljavo v ponedeljek.

Predsednik Truman se je sino-či osebno udeležil seje vladnih uradnikov, ki so se posvetovali glede situacije mesa. Sklenili niso nič, toda iz Bele hiše poročajo, da bo predsednik Truman danes povedal nekaj važnega v tem oziru. Nekateri prerokujejo, da bo meso kmalu vzeto iz vladne kontrole.

CONDENSED NEWS FROM OUR HOME FRONT

Cleveland, Ohio

Friday, October 11, 1946

At the American Legion convention in San Francisco, the Harwood Post No. 5, Joliet, Ill., was voted the best band. It is made up of 56 veterans of World War II and one veteran of World War I.

If Judge Burt W. Griffin is elected to Common Pleas Court, it means that Governor Lausche can name another to fill the vacancy thus created in Municipal Court. The other vacancy was caused by the death of Judge Perry A. Frey. And if the three Municipal Court judges who are candidates for Common Pleas Court are elected, there will be four more to be named. Those who are being considered are: Anthony A. Rutkowski, Felix Matia, Edward Sawicki, Michael M. Lucak, John J. Prince, Leonard Franks, Henry Speeth, Frank Durkin and others.

An order came thru from Washington from the Army and the Navy allowing all personnel to wear civilian clothes when not on duty.

Mrs. Jacob Yanchar of 10302 Prince Ave., has returned home from the hospital and wishes to thank her friends for their visits and gifts.

The American government has closed the U. S. Library and Information Service as ordered by Tito's government. Yugoslavia's Foreign Ministry said that propaganda against Tito's government was spread there.

As a coal shortage is expected this winter, all users of coal are advised to consult with their coal dealer and let him know how much coal they expect to use this winter so that he can order enough for all needs.

Geauga County farmers have organized to protect their cattle after a killed calf was found. The county sheriff has armed and deputized 50 patrolmen and 110 were placed in reserve. Their motto is: Shoot first and ask questions afterward.

The American Military Commission at Guam has found 13 of the 14 accused of cannibalism, guilty. Among the accused are a general, captain and a major. This inhuman deed took place when a plane with four American flyers was shot down and fell into the hands of the starved Japanese troops at Chichi Jima.

The "Truculent Turtle," a Navy patrol bomber, landed at Columbus last Tuesday, completing a record-breaking non-stop flight of 11,237 miles from Australia in 55 hours and 18 minutes, exceeding a previous record by 3,321 miles. The pilot was Commander Thomas D. Davies of Cleveland.

A visitor at our office was Miss Mildred Kebe, daughter of the well-known Kebe family of Beech Grove, Ind. She will stay in Cleveland to follow her career as a stenographer.

A Mexican police official said that American racketeers have been taking their used cars over the border and selling them for high prices and then reporting to insurance companies that the cars were stolen, thus collecting insurance as well.

From Jay, Vt., comes the report that a snow storm hit the higher places. Much damage was done to the potato crop still in the ground and the wheat which has not yet been put away.

In the Eastern part of Ohio, farmers have been forced to bring water to their cattle from a dis-

tance because all the wells have dried up. There hasn't been much rain during the last three months.

Elinda Justin, 29, of Jonesboro, Ark., waited for her boy friend near a farm building, as she had done many times before. But when he did not show up, she started a fire to show him how badly she felt.

An American Overseas Airlines plane hit the side of a hill last week on Thursday and burst into flames in the wilds of Newfoundland, killing all 39 persons aboard. Among the victims were 12 women and 6 children en route to Europe to join their husbands and fathers.

The American government has given \$2,700,000,000 or three-fourths of all the money which UNRRA has received. In addition, Americans gave out of their own pockets to relatives and to various relief funds from Sept. 1939 to Jan. 1, 1946 a total of \$925,000,000, which has probably now reached a billion dollars.

Lieut. Governor George Nye, on his visit to Cleveland, told about a "smear" campaign being carried out against Gov. Lausche here with a circular bearing 50 names of foreign origin, said to be members of the Democratic Central Committee. The circular emphasizes that U. S. is fighting Communism and that this fight cannot be successful if "foreigners" are running the state, and hinting that the signers are Communists.

Milk has gone up two cents more per quart, making it 21 cents for home delivery. Coffee cream has gone up two cents on a half-pint and cottage cheese is 4 cents higher per lb. Cleveland housewives will pay \$10.00 more daily.

Harry Williams of Beliefontaine, O., will receive \$40,000 from the NYC Railroad as damages for a broken heel while working for the railroad.

Mrs. Johanna Mele of 6806 Bonna Ave., passed away in St. Alexis Hospital.

Ill at her home is Mrs. Mary Cook of 886 E. 139 Street.

Louis F. Budenz, former editor of the Daily Worker and former member of the American Communist Party, revealed that more than a year ago an order came from Moscow that U. S. must be destroyed to make way for Russian domination of the world.

Last Friday night, Gov. Lausche told the State Democratic Convention that he knew it to be a fact that his opponent, Thomas J. Herbert, was wooing the support of those who do not want law and order. Also that he himself had given no heed to what the political consequences of some of his own acts might be.

Allied Headquarters in Rome announced Saturday that a British plane was forced down in Yugoslavia, apparently by signals from Yugoslav combat planes.

In a speech at Kenyon College at Gambier, O., Senator Taft bitterly denounced the Nazi convictions in Nuremberg as "vengeance, not justice" and "a blot on the American record that we shall long regret."

Pope Pius XII denied that he ever had approved "forced conversions" to Catholicism in Yugoslavia, as charged by the prosecution at the trial of Archbishop Stepinac

in Zagreb.

The U. S. Superfortress Dreamboat landed in Cairo at 9:45 a. m. last Sunday (2:45 a. m. E.S.T.). This plane began its nonstop flight in Honolulu, crossed the Pacific ocean, Alaska, northwestern Canada, the north magnetic pole, Greenland, Iceland, the British Isles, France, Switzerland, Italy and the Mediterranean. The trip of 10,925 statute miles was made in 30 hours and 37 minutes.

At the state convention of the Democratic party, Senator Boyd presented a resolution in which he urged President Truman to call a special session of Congress to solve the food problem which is endangering the health and welfare of the nation.

A new OPA regulation was effective yesterday allowing restaurants a 15 per cent increase over their June 30 prices on meals and items whose major ingredient is meat.

Cardinal Francis Spellman, archbishop of New York, condemned the trial of Archbishop Stepinac in Zagreb as a perfidious example of Communist godlessness, barbarism and slavery.

The power strike in Warren, O., has forced the Republic Steel Co., General Motors, Genesee Electric and other plants to lay off hundreds of employees. The condition was made worse by the strike of AFL Motor Coach Employees which has paralyzed all public transportation.

At the AFL convention in Chicago, the 600 delegates who represent 7,518,808 workers, blamed President Truman and the CIO union for the rising prices which followed the demand for increased wages.

Ohio's Senator Taft said in Detroit that if America had lost the war then our leaders might have been judged and condemned.

Dr. Robert Kemper of Philadelphia, one of the judges in Nuremberg, said that the H. condemned Nazis will be buried in an unknown and unmarked grave to prevent fanatical Nazis from making pilgrimages to the graves.

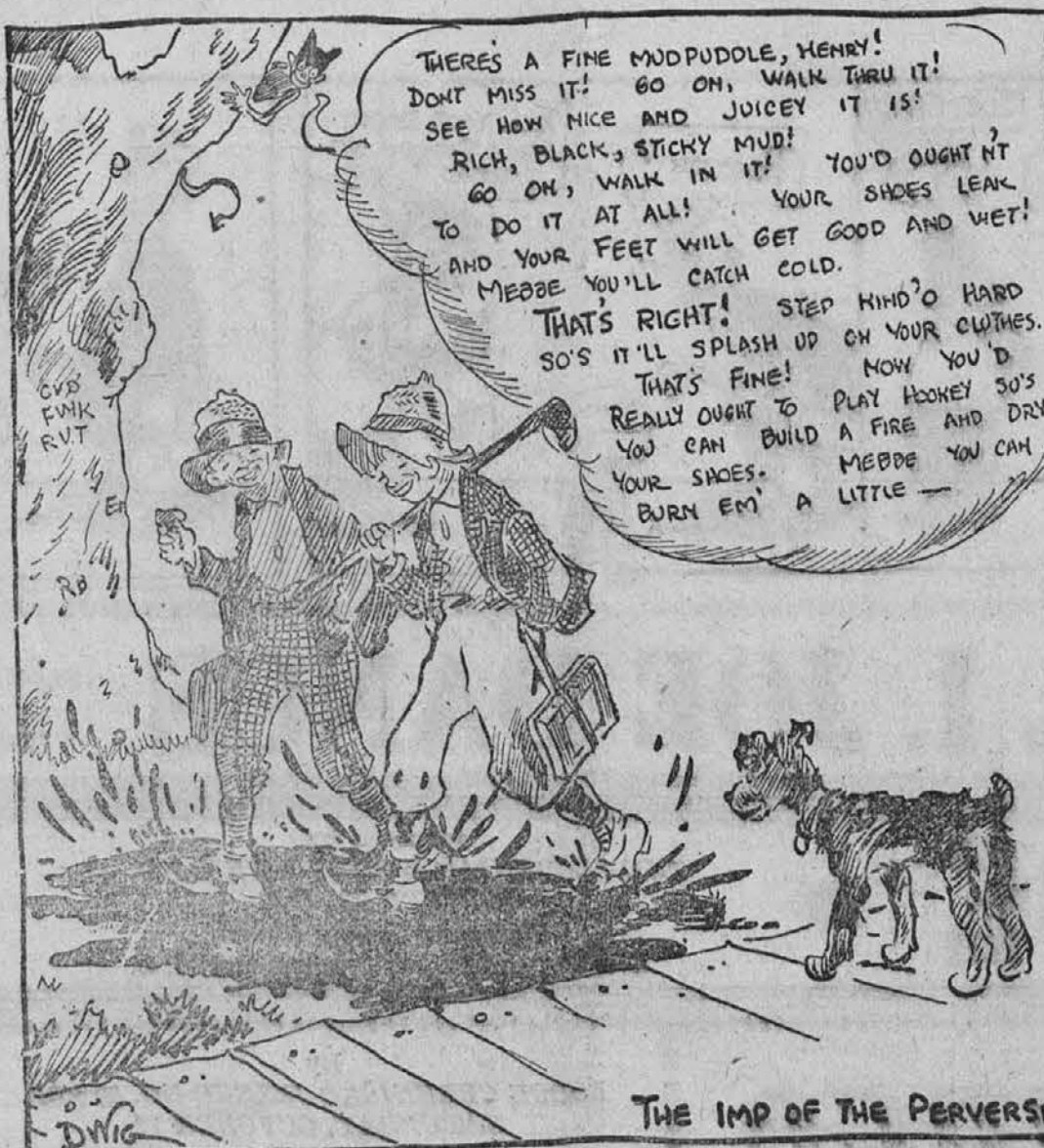

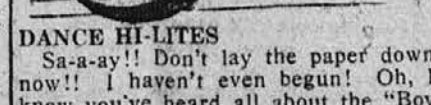
