Annual National Model Plane Exhibit

Boys and girls in Greater Cleveland schools, aviation clubs, air scouts and model plane groups began this week to build model airplanes to compete in Cleveland's Fourth Annual National Model Plane Exhibit Contest to be held in the Higbee Auditorium on Saturday, February 24th.

Over 1000 model planes are expected to be entered in the 1951 meet which is sponsored by the Air Foundation and the Cleveland Chamber of Commerce as a tribute to the Community Chest of Greater Cleveland.

Dr. Edward Sharp, director of NACA Laboratories and Chairman of the 1951 Contest, announced rules and regulations for the competition are being

mailed from Contest Headquarters at 1001 Huron Road this week. Persons of all ages may enter the contest, and models will be judged according to age classifications.

Last year's Contest attracted over 10,000 spectators to the Higbee Auditorium. In addition to the 1000 models to be displayed in the Fourth Annual Contest, Dr. Sharp announced that local and national aviation organizations will display the latest technical equipment in the field.

The Civil Aeronautics Administration will exhibit a flight assistance demonstration showing how pilots use the CAA Air Navigation Facilities. U. S. Air Forces OQ-19 Pilotless Target Plane with a moving exhibit.

Cleveland's NACA Laboratories will display the latest research findings on a new-type rockets and jet propulsion. Registration dates for the 1951 National Model Plane Exhibit Contest has been set at Higbee's Tenth Floor on Thursday, February 22nd and Friday, February 23rd from 10:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m.
